HOW WELL IS YOUR WATER?

Residents of Tompkins County who drink water from privately owned residential wells will have an opportunity to test their well water for contamination and learn how to best protect their wells. A program sponsored by the Cayuga Lake Watershed Network and the Town of Danby is being offered from 7:00– 9:00 pm on Wednesday, February 16 at the Danby Town Hall. Thanks to funding by the Tompkins County Department of Health, participants will receive a 75% discount on bacteria and nitrate testing.

The program will provide information on common sources of water contamination, maintenance methods, water sample preparation, and interpretation of test results. Participants will receive bottles for taking water samples, which will be collected the following morning between 8:00 and 9:30 am at the Town Hall for analysis by a certified laboratory. Results will be distributed by mail.

Preregistration is required at the Cayuga Lake Watershed Network office, (607) 532-4104 or at <manager@cayugalake.org>.

Well users are encouraged to test their water yearly, or sooner if a change is noted in the water. While public water supplies are regularly tested, private wells are the responsibility of the owner.

PROPOSED OPEN SPACE LEGISLATION

The January 5 meeting of the Comprehensive Plan Implementation Task Force resulted in a group consensus around what changes in our land use laws to recommend to the Town Board for possible enactment prior to the end of March expiration of the moratorium on subdivisions and rezonings. Changes to the subdivision regulations are the most extensive. These are aimed at steering development away from environmentally sensitive or agriculturally valuable areas and into areas where building would have reduced character-altering impacts. All initial subdivisions of land in what are now the Low Density and Medium Density Residential Zones would be subject to this process, the end result of which would be identification of conservation areas (minimum of 60% of the land area) and buildable areas. Lot creation would not be limited to the buildable area, but the buildings (agricultural buildings excepted) would. Wetlands, flood plains, stream corridors, and steep slopes would be fully included in the conservation area. Additional, preferably contiguous, land would be added to these if necessary to produce the 60% minimum, with unique natural areas and agricultural land among the priority areas to include.

The zoning ordinance would also change to adjust the overall density of development to match the 60-40 pattern of the subdivision regulations. Lot sizes and frontage requirements would not change, but the number of lots that could be created would be calculated based on the greater of 1 lot for every 200 feet of frontage or one lot for every 5 acres of land. Please note that we are describing how many lots can be created, not their size. For example, a 100 acre parcel could be divided into 20 lots (1 for every 5 acres) — more if the frontage exceeded 20 X 200 or 4000 feet. The subdivision regulations would set forth the process for carefully looking at the 100 acres and determining where at least 60 acres would be designated conservation area, where non-agricultural buildings would not be allowed. The

20 allowed lots would then all be located at least in part on the 40 buildable acres (that's where the houses and their septic systems would have to go), but could include some or all of the conservation area if desired.

There are other proposed changes besides these, including a beefing up of the public notification requirements by adding a provision requiring signs posted at the boundaries of properties proposed to be subdivided early in the process so neighbors are aware and can monitor the process at an earlier stage.

The revised Subdivision Regulations and Zoning Ordinance are posted on the Town's web page (http: //www.town.danby.ny.us/). You are invited to attend a joint meeting of the Town Board and Planning Board on February 7 at 7 P.M. where the proposals will be explained in considerable detail by Crystal Buck, County Planner and task force consultant. Formal public hearing will follow in March, barring unforeseen major problems.

There are additional pieces to the open space protection package still being worked on by the Task Force. These are not quite ready to be passed on to the Town Board and will be considered for passage after the moratorium expires. These include further revisions to the Subdivision Regulations and Zoning Ordinance, an affordable housing ordinance, and regulations to help minimize erosion and runoff, as well as a package of changes to enable the creation of a Conservation Commission to conduct a purchase of development rights program for the Town. All are welcome to join in the Task force's work. The group has decided to meet in the future on the second & fourth Wednesdays of the month, 7pm, at the Town Hall.

HISTORY NOTES

Over the course or 2005–2006 I will be writing about the life of Dr. Lewis Beers. I will not be writing about him in every issue of the Danby Area News as it would be far too lengthy and could easily become boring. Each part though will be numbered for easy reference.

DR. LEWIS BEERS — PART 1

Lewis Beers, who was born in 1768, was originally from Stanford, Connecticut. He was the second of four sons and the third of eight children born to Mr. and Mrs. Abner Beers. Abner senior was a carpenter.

As a child Lewis was an excellent student and in very good health. At the age of 12 he began to learn carpentry from his father. When he was 14 he was permitted to work in the fields doing "a man's work of mowing the grass with a scythe and reaping grain with a cradle." In the summer of 1782 he refused to let on that working on the harvest was causing him a great deal of pain in his knee. He continued to keep it a secret through the last day of harvest. "The following day one knee became highly inflamed, and he was kept in close confinement for four weeks. Before he could walk again the other knee went through the same process. He slowly recovered but never regained that state of activity and strength that he had possessed."

Since Lewis wasn't able to have the active life he'd once enjoyed he began to read whatever he could get his hands on and it was mostly of a religious vane. In April of 1784, when he was 16, the school district members of his Connecticut hamlet came to him and asked if he,d like to become a teacher. He consented and taught there for four years. He had 40 students and received \$40 every three months as pay. He opened and closed each school day with a prayer and on Sundays he taught Sunday school. His elders suggested to him that he might want to study for the ministry and he took their advice. He continued to teach school while he studied theology. After a few years he became skeptical or the Calvanistic Presbyterian dogma and gave up his studies at the age of 20. He had though familiarized himself to a good extent with the "Swedenborgs theology" and found it more to his liking.

At the age of 22 Lewis Beers decided that he needed to improve his intellect and began reading what he referred to as "the popular works of the day." He felt that the added knowledge of these books would give him more to converse about, "especially at parties" as there was a young woman who often attended these social events and of whom he was very fond.
