DANBY HISTORY NOTES

YEAST CULTURES

Before the days of store bought bread most families made their own. The most important ingredient was the yeast.

The yeast culture is very delicate and complicated. It needs warmth to grow. It stops functioning at 63°F (Fahrenheit). Optimum results are obtained between 80° and 95°F. Above 95°F yeast culture begins to slow and at 109°F it dies.

The yeast culture crock/pot should be ceramic or plastic, the same for utensils. All utensils used in the yeast culture must be sterile to prevent the introduction of bacteria that will kill it. The yeast culture converts simple starches and sugars into ethel alcohol and carbon dioxide. A loose fitting lid is required for the crock to allow the carbon dioxide to escape. It's important to keep a close eye on the yeast culture because the alcohol it produces can eventually kill it. If it stops frothing it is either out of food or nearing toxicity. Adding carbohydrates (sugar or flour) and water will prevent it from dying.

Below are two accounts of the use of yeast cultures.

As told by Maud Shurtz (born 1896).

"We kept our yeast culture in a gallon crock jar. When making bread, we used all the contents except about a cup. This gave us the 'seed' to rebuild our culture. We did this by adding cool potato water, some mashed potatoes, a cup of sugar and a cup of flour. We then gave it a stir, and set it in a warm place near the stove. When potatoes were cooked for dinner, we added the cooled potato water to the yeast culture. If all went well with our culture, the yeast was ready for the next bake day. If for some reason the yeast died, we carefully washed and sanitized the crock pot then went to the neighbor's place for another start."

As told by Rose Adamson (born 1915).

"When making bread, my mother pulled a piece of dough off maybe the size of a cup and threw it in the flour bin. The day before she made bread she went to the bin and got the bread dough which was now large and flat and quite hard. She put this in a bowl of warm potato water with some sugar and let it sit in a warm place. The next day when mother was making bread she poured the now frothy yeasts culture into the bread makings. (If left in the flour bin for more than a week the yeast culture dies.)"

I hope you found these accounts interesting. It gives us a new appreciation for the pioneer housewife. Resources: Walton Feed, Al Durschi, Maud Shurtz, and Rose Adamson.

Danby Farmers' Market Begins

The Danby Farmers' Market will return Thursday, July 7 on Route 96B in the pavilion between the Fire Hall and the Danby Market. Please leave the following information: your name; the nearest house number to the deer; the location (in ditch, driveway, near mailbox, etc.); and most importantly, a callback number in case we need further information. We will call in a report to the proper highway department (state, county or town). Town and county departments usually take care of deer in their roads the same day. The state contracts out this service and may take 24 to 48 hours for pickup depending on when they are notified. Deer are not picked up on weekends, but you may leave a message anytime.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISCUSSION LAUNCHES HAMLET PLANNING

At the invitation of the Town Board, Mike Stamm, Director of Tompkins County Area Development, led a discussion at the June Agenda Meeting on how the town could effectively pursue acquiring for itself the types of businesses we would like to see locate in the town centers of Danby and West Danby. Mike brought with him Gary Ferguson, Director of the Ithaca Downtown Partnership, and Heather Filiberto, Senior Planner with the Tompkins County Planning Department, so the discussion could better address planning. The ensuing back and forth with the board and others in attendance covered many topics of interest in incorporating economic development as part of hamlet strategic planning.

All three professionals said they would be happy to assist in whatever way they could to help us bring to Danby the businesses we want. We need to be realistic about what we can reasonably aspire to, and they can help with that assessment as well. Gary has information on what businesses need to be viable—the size population within a certain radius and necessary traffic counts, for example. All emphasized that the key to the process is a community consensus on what we actually want. Mike cited a bad experience he had in trying to assist a business to locate in Groton and having the community resist, and ultimately reject, the effort, despite a good match with what the village planning documents said they wanted. "If you can agree on what you want, we can help you get it" was the take-home message.

We are not starting from scratch in that regard. The Comprehensive Plan includes a desire to attract to Danby small support businesses such as restaurants, banks, doctors' offices, antique shops, bed and breakfasts and the like. A subcommittee of the Comprehensive Plan Implementation Task Force is developing a process for undertaking the hamlet strategic planning and the working rough draft was shared with the presenters in advance of the meeting to enable them to critically evaluate our approach. The comments and offers of assistance will help us focus on ensuring that we are after the right mix of businesses for Danby—ones the community both wants and can support.

SCOPE OF HAMLET STRATEGIC PLAN REVIEWED BY TASK FORCE

The June meeting of the Comprehensive Plan Implementation Task Force began a review of a rough draft for a process for hamlet strategic planning proposed by a subcommittee. The vision/scope for the process received the most attention. It was endorsed and sent on to the Planning and Town Boards for their comments. The scope incorporates all that can be extracted from the Comprehensive Plan by way of guidance. It reads as follows:

"To plan and promote the re-vitalization of the Hamlets of Danby. This plan will follow the same process to achieve a common vision in both hamlets while including steps to address location-specific differences such as geography and infrastructure. It is understood that not all land targeted will initially be available within the proposed hamlet areas, but over time, they will be transformed to conform to the over-riding vision. This scope/vision statement includes all elements identified in the Comprehensive Plan. It is believed that promoting growth in the hamlets will mitigate sprawl while increasing Danby,s revenue base. This plan will include, but is not be limited to, the following elements:

- Estimate for and accommodate to cover a term of 20 years
- Include consideration for 350 high density residential homes. This assumes that with promotion, 2/3 of new builds will occur in this area at the current rate of new builds (25 houses/yr x 20 years)(.66) = 350
- Include affordable housing
- Include senior living residences with community
- Integrate greenway-like areas
- Identify the type(s) and locations for commercial properties to include but not be limited to: bed & breakfast, diner/restaurant, drug store, fuel, hardware, and office space. It has been suggested that these might be co-located much like Community Corners creating a centralized community focal point.

- Include the type(s), size and location for light industry
- Identify and include opportunities for tourism
- Incorporate existing and potential recreation areas"

Before we get too far into this, let me emphasize that a project is easiest to influence in its early stages, before those involved have invested much time and effort and their opinions have hardened into positions. Please review the scoping statement carefully and if you think it misses the mark seriously call me (564-7647) or send me an email (joelpgagnon@hotmail.com) and I can forward your concerns to the task force for consideration.

The subcommittee proposes a working group to coordinate the hamlet planning. The Town is reapplying for grant money with which to hire one or more consultants to assist. With that money we could explore our options in greater depth, with greater public involvement, and craft a plan more swiftly. Without it we will necessarily have to limit the options we explore and take longer to create the plan. We have discussed creating a "committee proposal" as a feasible way to approach the task without the grant money. The working group will prepare a plan and then run it by the public for feedback. If we come up with something that finds favor with Danby's residents, that can work well; to the extent that we misjudge, the necessary changes will stretch out the process. Clearly the working group is important and we would like to expand its membership. If you have an interest in helping to plan the hamlets, now is the time to jump in. TASK FORCE ENDORSES LOT CREATION BY PERMIT

The June Comprehensive Plan Implementation Task Force meeting examined a couple of options to change and/or augment the first-round open space protection legislation enacted by the Town Board in May. It was agreed to add several ways of creating lots through a simple permitting process instead of having to go through a public process with the Planning

Board. This optional process, termed "Land Division by Permit", would allow lots greater than 15 acres to be created without any restrictions as long as they satisfy the frontage requirements for the zone they are created in. Lots smaller than 15 acres would require the landowner to give up the right to create one or more lots for every lot created this way and could only be used to create one lot in any three-year period. This by-permit mechanism would include considerable flexibility for lot size and placement, however. Besides the "standard" lot (minimum 200 feet of frontage and 2 acres in the Low Density Zone), options would be included for:

- 1) "Compressed" frontage lots with 150 feet of frontage and as little as one acre.
- 2) Flag lots (lots behind frontage lots) in lieu of frontage lots on an equal-area basis.
- 3) Other flag lots if the landowner is willing to forfeit the future creation of 3 additional lots to which s/he is entitled.

Let me emphasize that these "Land Divisions by Permit" would be optional. Landowners could opt to go before the Planning Board and would preserve all their development rights if they so chose.

The Task Force also looked at an incentive to preserve land best suited to agriculture. As proposed, a landowner/developer would acquire the right to create one additional lot for every 5 acres of class I, II, or III soils set aside and protected. The Task Force wanted to look at a map of where these soils are in Danby before passing judgment. Danby has little, if any, class I soils, very little class II, and a limited amount of class III. We will revisit this in July. Also in July, we will look at possibly dropping the delineated conservation areas requirement, seeing if we can accomplish the conservation objective in other ways. That meeting will be at 7:00pm on Thursday, July 14. Why not join us?
