Rebekah Jordan-Miller is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and is a staff accompanist at Ithaca College. She has performed widely in Canada and the US and has recorded two CDs.

The composer Richard Hundley has written a body of concert songs that are performed by internationally known artists. *Opera News* said, "Some of his pieces are heart-stoppingly beautiful. His melodies stay in the mind." The *Christian Science Monitor* agreed, "He is an impassioned lyricist, who loves to caress the words with beguiling melody." Come hear for yourself!

Water Witching

Water witching, water dowsing and water divining: the Art of Finding Water. It is a unique talent that is still in use in many parts of the world to this day.

A Brief History—The practice is thought to date back at least 8,000 years, its origins lost in long-forgotten history. French archaeologists have discovered cave paintings that depicted a dowser surrounded by on-lookers.

In 1640, dowsing was made popular by a French Baron and Baroness. They went so far as to publish a book on the subject but, unfortunately, they died in jail while awaiting trial for sorcery. This event possibly led to the term, “water witching.” The practice of dowsing continued and arrived in America as part of the cultural lore of English and French settlers.

Theories—No one really knows exactly how witching works. There are many theories, but it isn't based upon any known scientific laws. Some believe there is a connection established between the witcher and the sought-after water. Others theorize that electromagnetic or other subtle geological forces contribute.

Harry Joel, an electrical engineer, has his own theory of why dowsing seems to work so easily. “I noticed on my portable AM radio, that running water changes the reception and superimposes some strange sounds on the RF signal.

“The earth's electro-magnetic field definitely is deformed by underground water. However, I have not found any scientific treaties that explore this phenomenon in any detail.”

Albert Einstein was convinced of the authenticity of dowsing.

Process—The tools used in finding hidden water vary. Dowsers most frequently use a rod or stick, witchers a stick and diviners a rod. The classic sticks are forked twigs from the peach, willow or dogwood trees. Rods are of metal angle iron or “V” shaped metal.

The witcher holds the tool tightly in both hands, palms facing up, at about waist level and walks ahead steadily. When the witcher is standing above water the end of the stick will vibrate and then pull downward. A sec-

ond pass, at a 90 degree angle to the first, is often used to confirm the location.

Our Local Connection—For those of you who don't know, Ken Barber, a life long Danby resident, is a water witcher. He's been finding well sites for 45 years. He said his first experience was at approximately the age of 12 when, on a lark, he went to watch his neighbor witching and found it to be very interesting. His step-father could also witch and taught Ken the basics. Ken said that over the last 45 years he's found 40-50 well sites in Danby, Slaterville, Ithaca's West Hill and Aurora. He says he has, “never witched a well that didn't work.”

Ken's tool of choice is the cherry twig but he says that, “any tree that produces a fruit with a pit will do.” He finds a fresh straight cherry twig, 12-16" long with a diameter of approximately $\frac{3}{8}$ ".

He follows the same procedure as described above. He says he begins walking and when he feels the twig pull down hard he continues to walk until the pull eases up. He then walks out and comes back crossing the original line on a perpendicular angle to more precisely identify the spot to drill. Ken is unpretentious when discussing his witching talents. He has never charged for finding a well, he simply seems content with his ability to help.

Corrections and Additions

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN TASK FORCE

Here's an unofficial summary of the CPTF meeting on March 8, 2006. The Town Clerk has official minutes.

1. **The 2006 work plan under the Tompkins County general planning services contract.** The Task Force reviewed the proposed 2006 work plan, which would include:

- Continuation of the GIS Mapping Project
- Conceptual recommendations on Subdivision and Zoning Regulations updates
- Assistance in Survey of Hamlet Area Residents
- Scoping of an Open Space Inventory and Plan, for possible development in 2007

The Task Force recommended to the Town Board that the work plan be approved, with the following modification: that the item related to Assistance in Survey of Hamlet Area Residents be changed to "Assist Town in initiating Strategic Plans for the Hamlets". (As of March 13, the Town Board has not yet approved that work plan.)

2. **Bonus lots for agricultural land reservation.** The Task Force reviewed a draft revision to the Zoning Ordinance. As proposed, when eligible agricultural land or other eligible land with certain agricultural soils is reserved for such uses as agriculture or forest management, then additional lot entitlement may be added.

For example, with every 5 acres reserved, there would be one additional lot entitlement.

The Task Force made some modifications to the draft, and then approved it in concept. It sent the draft to the Planning Board and Town Board requesting that these boards approve it in concept as well.

3. **Proposed "Right to Farm Law".** Chairperson Ray Van de Bogart introduced a model draft, "Right to Farm Law", and asked that the Task Force review it for the next meeting. The draft law would supplement right to farm provisions in the State Agriculture and Markets Law. It would emphasize to existing and to new residents that the Town encourages agriculture, and would request that the community be understanding of the nature of day to day farming operations. A similar draft has been widely adopted in other nearby towns and across the state.

4. **Proposed Round "2-B" revisions to the zoning ordinance.** A draft showing proposed revisions was circulated. It attempts to incorporate concepts that were reviewed by the Town Board and Planning Board last fall. The Task Force will review that draft for its next meeting.

5. **Joint town board/task force meeting, Wednesday, April 5, 2006, at 6:30pm.** The Task Force accepted the Town Board's request for a Joint Meeting. The meeting is primarily to discuss the work for the Task Force for the coming year. The Joint Meeting will be followed by the regular Task Force meeting. Everyone is welcome to attend the Task Force Meetings. ❀
