Proposed "Round 2-A"

Changes to Subdivision Regulations

On Monday, May 8, 2006, at 6:30pm, the Town Board will hold a Public Hearing to consider adoption of a Proposed Local Law Amending the Subdivision Regulations by Reclassifying Subdivisions, Modifying Procedures for Subdivision Applications, and Changing Requirements, Standards, and Guidelines Related to Environmental Conservation. The proposed revisions would:

- Allow some minor land divisions by permit from the Code Enforcement Officer, without Planning Board involvement.
- Remove the 60% Conservation Area requirement in Low Density Zones, while maintaining various provisions for environmental conservation.
- Reorganize the document to promote easier use.

For more information prior to the hearing, please contact the Town Clerk to see the Proposed Local Law and a complete summary of the proposed revisions. These documents are also available on the Town's web site, [town.danby.ny.us].

DANBY TOWN HISTORY

THE ROOT CELLAR

In the days before cold storage, pioneers knew how to store their harvests properly. They built root cellars. In an underground room, they could safely keep potatoes, carrots, tomatoes, etc., from freezing, for quick retrieval all winter. An original root cellar was dug with a pick and shovel.

Temperature: Summer temperatures in the root cellar hover around 50 to 51 degrees and in the winter between 45 to 47 degrees. The root cellar borrows its cold from the ground. "Earth, even two feet down, gives remarkable year wide temperature stability."

Humidity: Most fruits and vegetables require high humidity when in storage. A root cellar generally maintains its own (high humidity) because it draws moisture from the dirt floor.

Circulation: The highly efficient root cellar is vented. Vegetables give off gasses that are conducive to either spoilage or sprouting. For instance, apples give off ethylene gas which makes potatoes sprout prematurely. Vents are placed at ceiling and floor levels to help exchange air. Fresh air enters at the floor and gas permeated air exits at the ceiling. Shelves are built out about 2 inches from the walls to help promote circulation around the stored fruits and vegetables. It's important to store apples above potatoes. Vents need to be closed or plugged in the winter to avoid freezing temperatures from entering the cellar. Trips to the cellar in the winter will afford enough air exchange to avoid problems.

Size: An 8'x8' cellar is sufficient for the average family and a 5'x8' will hold 30 bushels of produce.

Shelves: Shelves should be built with rot proof cedar or pressure treated lumber. The more shelves the better use of space.

Type of Cellar: A cellar with the easiest access in the winter (no snow lying on the door) is one that is built into the side of a hill. For optimum efficiency, the door would be facing north. It isn't likely to flood and if water were to enter it would run out easily. Bracing is often required in the ceiling, though. The hillside root cellar is more difficult to excavate. A flat ground cellar is much easier to excavate and is less expensive to build. A horizontal door can be built over the staircase to help avoid shoveling in the winter. Bracing is usually at a minimum. A part-of-the-house cellar is one dug underground and attached to the foundation of the house, possessing a connecting doorway and a dirt floor.

Construction Methods: A cellar with dirt walls and floor is the simplest and the best for humidity control. If the floor is too damp, 3" of gravel can be put down and will raise the floor up high enough to keep shelves drier. In the same way, if the cellar floor is too dry, 3" of gravel can be put down and then water sprinkled over it to increase humidity. Wood walls can be built with gaps in the boards to allow humidity to penetrate the cellar. Rot resistant or pressure treated wood is the most effective.

Using a root cellar:

- Make sure doors are kept closed.
- Open vents overnight in late spring and early fall to take advantage of the cool overnight temperatures as long as there is no chance of freezing.
- Be sure that the root cellar floor is dirt.
- Use sand or sawdust to pack root vegetables.
- Cover vegetables with burlap, towels, etc., to absorb excess moisture.
- In extremely cold weather, if the root cellar is in danger of freezing, hang an electric light bulb. Remember to cover potatoes to prevent them from turning green from exposure to light. Kerosene lanterns should never be used because they produce ethylene gas.
- Leave as much undisturbed snow as possible over the root cellar as snow acts as an insulator.
- Any spoiled produce needs to be immediately removed to prevent additional loss.

Comprehensive Plan Task Force

This is a summary; contact the Town Clerk for the offical minutes. This meeting on April 5, 2006 included a Joint Meeting with the Town Board.

The Town Board agreed in concept to some proposed revisions for the new "Round 2" phase, which the Task Force will further refine and present to the Town Board and Planning Board.

These proposed revisions include providing options for Flexible Lot Dimensions and Flag Lots, without having to go to the Planning Board. Other proposed revisions are to be further worked on by the Task Force. The Task Force is also continuing to work on Bonus Lots for Agricultural Land Reservation, and a Right to Form Law

Farm Law.

The Town Board also agreed to have the County help the Town by providing basic information and tools for planning for the Central and West Danby Hamlets. The Task Force will review maps of environmental and land use conditions in the Hamlets, potential hamlet development scenarios based on environmental, physical, and infrastructure constraints, consider whether a hamlet survey should be conducted, and help prepare a new Strategic Planning grant application to the State.

The next Task Force Meeting is on Wednesday, May 10, at 7:00, at the Town Hall. All are welcome.
