DANBY TOWN HISTORY

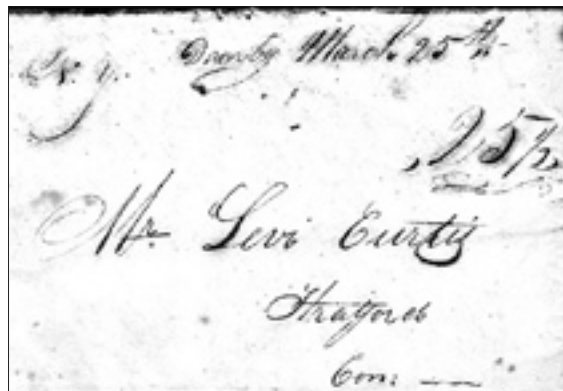

Earlier this summer, Peter Fraissinet of West Danby sent me two 19th century Danby letters that he wanted to share.

I found them to be very interesting and I hope you will also. This month, I'm including Peter's cover letter—with a fascinating historical twist—and the first letter, from 1816. The misspelled words and grammatical errors are as written. The second letter will appear in the October Danby Area News.

PETER WROTE

Here are the two letters I spoke to you about. I bought them from a dealer in Connecticut earlier this year, pure serendipity that I found them. The 1816 letter is from Elbert Curtis, the 1824 from Betsy Curtis. Young Betsy's letter includes many details of everyday life.



The 1816 letter mentions the weather. It was written at the end of the winter following the eruption of the great Tambora volcano in Indonesia, and just before the summer of 1816, now known as "The Year Without a Summer".

I had always wondered what the winter of 1816 was like hereabouts, and this letter answers that question: frigid and dry. *"We have not had any sleighing this winter but good wagoning and cold weather severe as I ever experienced part of the time."*

THE ELBERT CURTIS LETTER

Addressed to: Mr. Levi Curtis, Stratford, Con.
 Danby, March 25th 1816
 Dear Sister,

I received your letter with pleasure and happy to think I had some boddy that thought of me. I had not heard from there since last fall only as I heard of the loss of R-bin's children, which I suppose he felt if not I did for him.---

I am sorry that Stephen is so attached to the school and Ma-a that he could not spend time to write a few lines

to me: but I hope you do not wait for his motion. I was glad to hear that he enjoyed himself in his situation which I did not expect but sufficient reason: being part of his journey there.

I have but a few lines to write only to give you information of the death of Old Mr. Abner Beers which was about the commencement of the year. He died with old age and pretty sudden. His widow now living with Nathan and is well.

Uncle Dr. has been to New York this winter and purchased a new stock of goods and cheap- they have not all of them got in yet but expect them in tomorrow or next day. We have not had any sleighing this winter but good wagoning and cold weather severe as I ever experienced part of the time.

We have traded largely this winter considering the scarcity of money [?] was never been so great before- there has but little been done with plaister this season which has stopt the circulation of money. We have not bought any plaister but am a getting some through Mr. C. Pumpelly which we do by paying in goods and that turns into money in the same amount.

Nathan Beers's wife is a different woman since I have returned: whether it is because she can't get me away or quit the Blue Presbyterians I cannot tell: The head Blue Belly is married to an old maid a fit character for him the same profession. I have not any thing more but to inform you that I am well and all the family as usual. I have had a very bad cold, but got well. All old inhabitants of Stratford are well that reside here. Give my love to all. Father and mother and all Brothers and sisters- especially Charles B. and all relations and neighbors. Sally B./Remember.

Your true Brother Elbert Curtis.

P.S. Write soon. I have seen Wm. Peet that married Joseph Burris's daughter- he lives twenty miles from here and talks as if doing well. Tell Uncle Joseph. E.C.

P.S. Not any boddy married yet that come from Stratford nor any prospects at present only myself---I calculate to be some time or other---E.C. ❀

PLANNING BOARD VACANCY FILLED

At a special Meeting of the Town Board held on August 7, 2006 the Town Board appointed Edward (Ted) Melchen to the Planning Board to fill a vacancy that expires December 31, 2008.

PLANNING BOARD PUBLIC HEARINGS ON SEP.21

1. Sandra Kenne, Owner - Proposed Subdivision of Tax Parcel No. 6.-1-26.2, 16.2 acres total, located on the northwest corner of the intersection of East Miller Road and Coddington Road, into four(4) lots of two(2) to 5.136 acres each.

2. Donald and Nancy Wright, Owners - Request for Special Permit to install a temporary site-built dwelling for a family member needing care, at 18 Station Road, West Danby on Tax Parcel No. 17.-1-19. The proposed installation would also be subject to application to the Board of Zoning Appeals for variance.

3. White Hawk Community (an ecological neighborhood). Public Hearing is to consider a recommendation to the Town Board with respect to the proposed White Hawk Community Planned Development Zone proposed to be located on Tax Parcels 7.-1-68 and 7.-1-69.1 on the west side of Danby Road between Gunderman and West Miller Roads. As proposed there would be thirty (30) clustered dwelling units on a 12-acre portion of the 118 acre site. Henry Peterson, Applicant and Owner.

The Planning Board reviewed and amended a Proposed "Right to Farm Law". The Planning Board unanimously approved the draft local law and made a recommendation to the Town Board that they consider adoption of the proposed local law with their suggested amendments.

Also, the "Group Preparation & Selection II-Model Approach To Partnerships In Parenting" (GPS II-MAPP) classes will begin September 12, 2006. This is the beginning of a 33-hour, 11-week program to prepare you to foster or adopt and enable you and this agency to determine what kinds of placements are best suited to your family's strengths and needs.

• **Coping With the Loss of Your Pet.** People who have experienced the loss of a pet are invited to come and share their stories through writing and reading on Tuesday, Sep.26 from 6:30-8:30pm. The session, sponsored by the Colonial Veterinary Hospital, is designed to encourage participants to pay tribute to their pets and provide support to each other. ATTENTION DOG OWNERS!

Every dog over the age of four months owned or harbored in New York State for longer than 30 days must be licensed in the town where they are harbored and a renewal licence purchased each year. A valid rabies certificate is required for registration.

The Town of Danby has a local law regulating the activities of dogs. The law to promotes the community's health, safety, and welfare and protects the property of residents by regulating and controlling activities of dogs within the Town of Danby. The law also specifies enforcement measures.

A resident shall be in violation of this law if a dog:

1. Is not restrained by an adequate collar and leash when not on the property of the owner or any other person harboring or having custody or control of the dog;
2. Engages in habitual or continued barking, howling or whining so as to cause a person's rest to be broken, sleep interrupted or reasonable use or enjoyment of his home or property;
3. Causes damage or destruction to property, or defecates, urinates, or otherwise commits a nuisance other than on the premises of the person owning or harboring such dog.

The entire Danby Dog Law is too lengthy to publish in the Danby News but residents may pick up a copy at the Town Clerk's Office during regular office hours. Requests should be made to the Town Clerk. ❀
