### Myra Kovary: Harp Music for the Holidays

Enjoy the peace and beauty of classical harp music when Myra Kovary presents a free concert of classical harp music through the ages at the Danby Town Hall, 2pm on Sunday afternoon, December 17.

Myra Kovary performs as a harpist with several orchestras including the Cayuga Chamber Orchestra, the Syracuse Symphony Orchestra, and the Tri-Cities Opera Orchestra. She has played chamber music with faculty ensembles at Ithaca College, Cornell University, with the Finger Lakes Chamber Ensemble, and with Pro Musica of Ithaca. Kovary was well-known for many years for her harp performances during Sunday Brunch at the Ramada Inn of Ithaca.

A twenty-year musical partnership with flautist Laura Campbell has led to two recordings featuring Myra on the concert grand harp. *Morning Light* contains the light classical, peaceful background music which Laura and Myra often play for weddings and receptions, and *Visions* captures a harp new piece written especially for Kovary by local composer Laurie Conrad.

The Concert grand harp stands close to five feet tall, and has a big, full sound. Contrasts of plucked and strummed strings evoke a series of ringing harmonics. Myra plays with a crisp precision, using the full range of her harp. The music is both thrilling and soothing to the soul. The December 17 concert will include music by J. S. Bach, Johann Pachelbel, Georg Frederic Handel, Claude Debussy, Carlos Salzedo, and Stephen Sondheim. Kovary will end with *Silent Night*.

Kovary's solo performance is appropriate for the entire family; the concert is free and open to everyone. The Danby Community Council concert series is supported by a grant from the NYS Council on the Arts/TC Community Arts Partnership Decentralization Program.

### An Internet Option in Danby

Many Danby residents appreciate the relative peace and quiet of our spread-out community, close to but outside of the Ithaca metropolis. Sadly, these advantages also make it difficult to obtain the reliable, high-speed Internet access required for daily life—including childrens' homework assignments. Slower dial-up service from Ithaca's major ISPs, Clarity Connect and Lightlink, has been the only alternative for many net surfers.

Danby is beyond the three-mile range of DSL service from Verizon's downtown Ithaca office, and low population density on some roads has delayed Time Warner's Cable access. Satellite connections are faster than dialup, but have certain restrictions.

During the November 8 Danby Community Council meeting, John Guttridge of Lightlink described its expanding wireless Internet system. Unlike short-range, in-home wireless networks, wide-area wireless uses line-of-sight communication from a home or office to an antenna which may be several miles away. [Clarity Connect currently has limited wireless service in Danby but, according to Chuck Bartosch, it plans to have fairly complete coverage by late Spring.]

The wireless installation process begins with a free site survey to locate an existing, direct line-of-sight antenna or to determine that a new antenna is required to provide service. There is a fee (Lightlink: typically \$600) for the initial equipment purchase and installation. The monthly service fee (Lightlink: \$60) is competitive with DSL, cable, and satellite service.

Eloise Greene is collecting the names of Danby residents who have an interest in exploring a wireless connection. There is no purchase commitment but, obviously, if there is interest from several homes in a region that is not currently served by an antenna, the provider has an incentive to expand in that direction. ## Danby Town History: The Road of Danby

Did you ever wonder how our roads came into being, who planned them, and why they chose the locations and directions they did? Our roads are older than our villages, towns and cities. Many of the roads we travel today were adapted from the paths and trails that deer and Indians forged centuries ago through the forested wilderness; over hills, through valleys, and along waterways.

#### THE DANBY TRAIL

Traveling from Ithaca to Danby, the *Catherine's Town* trail went out Spencer Street, up the Stone Quarry Road and past the present site of Kings Cemetery. The trail then followed the Buttermilk Creek (or, as the Indians called it, Sto-ke, meaning North Creek) into the village of Danby. A short branch connected with the Cayuga-Owego trail at the Wilseyville turn-off. This branch followed southeast down the valley of Danby Creek.

Heading south from the village of Danby, the main trail continued past the west side of Jennings Pond up the slope of the north end of Bald Hill. It crossed Bald Hill through the southern extension along the ridge that descended a steep slope to the Point of Rocks where the Michigan Creek flows out of the hollow. From there it followed a level to Spencer Lake (Ganiatarenge), where it joined the Inlet Valley trail.

This trail was used as a direct route south to Tioga Point, now Athens, Pennsylvania, at the junction of the Chemung and Susquehanna Rivers.

#### THE INLET-WEST DANBY TRAIL

Two Indian trails, separate but with parallel routes, headed south from the Ithaca valley, leading to and joining at Spencer Lake before continuing south. The lower, *Inlet Valley*, trail from Ithaca followed the Catherine's Town trail to a point just south of the Inlet Valley Cemetery on the Ithaca-Elmira highway. It branched to the left and crossed the Enfield Creek close to where it joins Cayuga Inlet Creek, then continued south toward Spencer following NYS Rt.34/96. The trail in its primitive state must have been exceedingly difficult to travel over. The long rough climb toward West Danby traversed a dark, narrow valley, filled with boggy places, steep pitches, and the debris of fallen timber. Continuing on through West Danby village, the path joined the Danby, or *East Branch*, trail at Spencer Lake.

### Supervisor's Update

I'd like to report to the residents of the Town of Danby about various projects we are involved in. This first report will focus on the Environmental Protection Agency Notice served on the Town Highway property on Hornbrook Road.

In 1984, the EPA began implementing provisions of the Clean Water Act Underground Injection Control Program in New York State, including a regulation that prohibited municipal garage floor drains from draining into septic fields. When the Town Highway Garage on Hornbrook Road was built in 1990, it included a combined floor drain/sanitary drain system that was designed and and approved by the the Tompkins County Health Department. At that time, the Town had no knowledge that the EPA had already begun to prohibit these systems.

Around 1995, the EPA began inspections in upstate New York, sending mandates for changes to non-compliant systems. The Danby Town Board was not aware of these mandates until March, 2006, when a notice was received from the EPA.

During the last two years, the EPA has conducted a general survey of many commercial, industrial, and municipal facilities in our area, and the Danby Highway Garage is only one of many facilities that has recently received a notice from the EPA. All facilities with floor drains connected to septic systems were ordered to correct the problem.

The Town was proactive in addressing the EPA mandate. The Highway Department quickly closed the floor drains, changed the chemicals used to more environmentally-friendly ones, adopted 'best management practices', and arranged to wash vehicles at the City of Ithaca and at Tompkins County until a new system could be installed. We expect that a new wastewater system will be installed by mid-January.

Further, the Town Board retained an firm that specializes in this kind of work, as well as an engineering firm to oversee the project. The Town checked with its attorney and insurance company to see who would have to bear the cost of bringing the drainage system into compliance. The research is ongoing but, at this time, it looks like the Town will have to foot the bills.

During testing this summer, a small amount of *Freon 12*—only slightly higher than NYSDEC standards—was detected in ground water samples. Freon 12 was often used in automotive air conditioning units manufactured prior to 1995, but it has also been used in aerosol spray cans containing insecticides and fungicides. Because of the low concentration of the compound, the Town's consultant has concluded that the Freon 12 does not appear to be indicative of a significant environmental concern.

A Bonding Resolution, subject to a permissive referendum, was adopted by the Town Board on September 11. It was announced at the Town Hall and in the Ithaca Journal, but no substantial public comment was received during the 30-day review period. The Bonding Resolution was based on an estimated maximum cost—a very worst case scenario—of \$385,000. Since then, we are hopeful that the project cost will be less than \$300,000, perhaps as low as \$270,000.

The Bond for this project will not be taken out until 2008, but a Bond Anticipation Note will be obtained soon. We are fortunate that Bonds from older projects, such as the Town Hall addition, will be maturing soon, so that the Bond for this Highway Garage Project should not result in a significant increased debt load for the Town.

### Can We Find Your House?

If you have an emergency at your home and need to call for police, medical, or fire personnel, can these responders easily find your house?

Many residences in the Danby Fire District—with addresses in Brooktondale, Danby, Ithaca, Spencer, West Danby, and Willseyville—are difficult to spot because they are poorly marked. If an address is difficult to find in the daylight, think how much more difficult it might be to find during night time! This difficulty translates to lost minutes in coming to your aid.

Take time today to make sure your house numbers are clearly visible from the road. For best visibility, all numbers should be a minimum of 4" tall and visible from both directions along the road. This may mean affixing numbers on both sides of your mailbox. Residents of multi-dwelling structures and complexes should make sure each unit has visible labelling. Numbers are sold in most hardware stores. Please replace deteriorating or faded numbers and remove overgrown vegetation.

The Danby Fire Company is sponsoring a sale of address number signs to the community. These signs are designed to be placed along the road in front of your house, preferably near your driveway entrance. The custom-made signs, with 4" tall lettering on a 6"x18" green metal reflective background, are becoming more popular and can be seen in many surrounding towns. Up to five digits are printed on each side, and you choose a horizontal or vertical orientation.

Each sign costs \$12.00; a metal support post with mounting hardware is available for an additional \$5 (without the post, you will need to mount the sign yourself). Fire company members will assist anyone who needs installation help.

To order, contact the Fire Company closest to your address: in Danby, contact Neal Franklin 607.273.3831, or in West Danby, contact Steve Cortwright or Marrell Schutt at 607.564.0020. The signs will be delivered free of charge to your residence, or we will contact you when your order is completed.

Whichever type of identification you choose, please take care that it identifies your residence clearly. Your Volunteer Fire Company hopes that you won't need us, but we want to find you quickly if you do.
