Town Board Update

The Danby Town Board met on Monday, February 12, and had two public hearings regarding New York State mandates. One mandate concerned the training for the Planning Board and for the Board of Zoning Appeals, while the other concerned Code Enforcement. The Board also decided to change the Planning Board By-Laws in order to add two alternate member seats.

Other items considered at the meeting included: the highway remediation project, the Emergency Management Planning Committee, the aquifer and water monitoring study, and possible high-speed Internet service in Danby.

Two items received the most of the meeting's attention. The idea of creating a hamlet planning committee was tabled after some discussion as to whether West Danby or Danby should be the focus of attention. A resolution that would abolish the Comprehensive Planning Task Force, which is currently charged with implementing parts of the Comprehensive Plan, was also discussed. In both issues, the Town Board is split on the question of whether the Board should decide what is best for the Town, or seek input from the larger community.

Other items of interest at the Town Board meeting were the proposed White Hawk Ecovillage and the proposed creation of a Planned Development Zone in the center of Danby.

TC Legislature Update

An effort to engage the public early, in anticipation of the County's budget season, is being made. It's important to know in what areas we should focus County resources, getting a sense of what services the public wants us to pursue. It necessary to understand not only which services are required, but also which ones we can influence (local share).

With this mutual education in mind, three sessions—all on Saturday mornings, 9:30am-12:30pm—have been scheduled: March 3 at the Dryden (Neptune) Fire Department; March 10 at the Enfield Elementary School; and March 24 at the Tompkins County Human Services Building on West State Street. Plan to come and participate; for more info, contact Marcia Lynch, 607.274.5555 [mlynch@tompkins-co.org].

The County's draft Affordable Housing Strategy is being discussed; the next stop is the Council of Governments. This developing strategy addresses the County's need for more than 3,000 additional living units to meet population changes over an approximate ten-year period.

The continued emphasis on water quality and quantity, noted by residents, has encouraged the County Environmental Health Division to draft changes to its Sanitary Code. These will affect the installation of wells on developing properties. Public information sessions will be taking place soon to discuss the proposals. For info, contact Environmental Health, 607.274.6688.

We're looking at the current Recreation Partnership Agreement and will suggest changes to that agreement to better address youth needs.

Those receiving Agricultural Assessments need to get their applications back to County Assessment by March 1st or you may lose the benefits!

The Health Department Building Committee is moving ahead with plans to better meet County residents'

Danby Town History

Recently, Bob Snyder of Etna loaned me a letter bearing a Danby postmark that he'd come into possession of. If you ever wondered how towns supported indigent residents, this letter will give you a little insight.

Danby Letter, 28-Jul-1879 To the Supervisor of Enfield

From the 26th day of Sept. 1878 to the first day of March 1879 the Town of Danby paid \$104.76 for the support of the Jackson family-(Enfield paupers). Ex Supervisor Van Kirk paid \$12.00 and, overseer of the poor, Baker, paid \$82.26 making the amount paid the Town of Danby \$94.76 leaving \$10.00 yet due.

When Mr. John Baker paid the \$82.26 on the last day of March he agreed to pay the balance in a short time. I have written him but as yet he has neither paid, nor taken any notice of my letter. Mr. Baker has no receipted bill to show for what he has paid. Please inform me at once what will be done towards a final settlement.

Danby VFC Doings

The Danby Fire District responded to five fire or motor vehicle accident calls and eight medical calls in January. In one eight-day period, there was both a house fire and a barn fire!

The house fire was reported at 3am on January 29. The 8 degree air temperature and snowy roads (due to an overnight storm) amplified the safety concerns to all who responded in fire trucks and personal vehicles. To ensure an adequate water supply, Brooktondale and Candor also responded with tanker trucks. Fortunately, the home's occupants fled the fire without injury and the fire was confined to the front room and porch, but much renovation will be needed to restore the home.

At 3:10am on February 6, fire was reported in a barn housing dozens of pigs and cows. The fire engulfed the entire 2+ story, 200-year-old barn and, sadly, caused the loss of some animals and of the barn. The surviving animals were sheltered at another farm. Several other area fire companies provided assistance.

Several water pumps froze in the 0 degree weather! Although this was frustrating, there were no surrounding structures in danger of catching fire.

We'd like to thank the town highway department for sanding the icy roads and the location of our dry hydrant at Storks during the barn fire, and also everyone who helped with the tasks associated with such protracted events: cleaning and repacking hundreds of feet of hoses, cleaning and refueling small engines and fire trucks, refilling the tanker trucks, cleaning and returning tools to their proper places, and feeding and watering the fire fighters.

We extend our sympathies to the families of these properties for their losses.

On a brighter note, our third and last pancake breakfast will be held at the Danby Volunteer Fire Station on Sunday, March 18, 8am-Noon. C'mon down and get breakfast made to order: eggs scrambled, over easy, or however you like them, along with fluffy pancakes, sausage, hash browns, French toast, juice, coffee, and cocoa. Pricing is modest (and benefits the fire station).

SUBDIVISION UPDATE

The Town is close to completing a final draft revision to the Subdivision Regulations adopted in May, 2005. The revision incorporates various improvements based on public input.

A previous draft, discussed at a public hearing in May, 2006, was not adopted because of concerns raised by the County Planning Department, related to how Land Divisions by Permit would be treated.

The Town Board will refer the 2007 draft to the Planning Board. A public hearing is targeted for April or May, 2007. Here's some highlights of the current draft; the final draft will be ready in early March. In the meantime, if you have any questions or comments, please contact me at 607.277.0799, [sbeeners@aol.com].

- Eliminated: 60% Conservation Area requirement.
- Provision for Land Divisions by Permit from the Code Enforcement Office.
- Requirements related to No-Build and Restricted-Build areas in the Low Density Residential Zone, for subdivisions that require Planning Board approval.
- Improved procedures to reflect the SEQRA environmental review process and Town Law.

Subdivisions are classified in the 2007 Draft:

Land Annexation—Land transferred from one lot to an adjoining lot is exempt from Town review, provided the transfer complies with zoning requirements.

Land Division by Permit—Permits can be issued:

- Large-lot, where all lots are 15 acres or more.
- Small-lot, provided that no other division(s) or subdivision(s) of the original parcel (except for Land Annexation) have taken place within the previous five consecutive years and that the division results in no more than two lots, including the parent parcel.

Standard Subdivision—Any subdivision other than a Land Annexation or Land Division by Permit. A variation of this is Clustered Subdivision, where the Planning Board may approve modifications in lot size and frontage requirements if there is a clear conservation benefit.

Let's Go Outside!

Why? Most of us realize that our natural environment needs more protection, and that if we want our children to have natural spaces to seek refuge in, we all need to do what we can to save these natural spaces. As parents, many of us know intuitively that having our children go outside is, "Good for them". I'd like to give you some great reasons to go with this intuitive feeling!

Reason #1: We "become" what our mind is patterned by—in other words, what our senses absorb becomes our reality. If our children are outside on a regular basis, their minds will "pattern" on nature, and they will develop a deep connection to nature, and thus a deep caring/concern to preserve our natural environment.

Reason #2: While immersed in nature, all of our senses are stimulated. This encourages complex thoughts and critical thinking skills. Nature is the best teacher!

Where? You and your children can start in your own back yard! Do you know five edible plants that are growing near your back door? Where does the sun rise, in the summer? In the winter?

How? Think back to what you liked to do outside when you were young—do it now, with your child! When was the last time you played hide and seek in a meadow, or stalked up quietly to a rabbit just to see how close you could get? Go for a "wander" in the woods, no destination, just go find beauty and ask lots of questions!

Look at the animal tracks. Who has passed through your yard today? Yesterday? Who lives there? What do they eat? Where are they right now? Who made that mark on that tree? Which way is the wind blowing? Where is that bird that you hear? What is it saying?

An effective way for children to become comfortable with nature is to have them find a "secret spot", a place where they can sit silently. In about 15 minutes, if they are completely still and quiet, the wildlife will return. The birds resume their songs and animals may walk nearby. Encourage your child to go there every day. Spending a few still moments with nature will give them perspective and balance.

How important is this? Unless our children make nature personal, they will continue to be aliens on their own planet, and destroy the environment through ignorance. Let's all go outside—see you in the woods!

by building a new facility. Our current facility is aging; it's often inadequate to handle the health programs it houses. Beyond changing needs, we hope to improve the services, too! The goal is to break ground in 2008.

Emergency planning efforts are coming together at an expanded, county-wide committee. Health emergencies and natural disasters are high on its list, driven in part by last year's flooding. A procedure to receive and document damage to private property is being developed, anticipating a request by State and Federal Emergency Services.

Proposed Addition to Danby Fire Station

The Danby Fire Station is in need of additional space and renovation. The building was originally built in 1968. Since then, it has had few modifications beyond normal maintenance. Items such as roof replacement, new stucco siding and remodeled restrooms are the only major improvements made since 1968.

Currently, four vehicles are housed in a building designed for three. Due to state-mandated records retention requirements, the District Office occupies space originally intended for West Danby Chief's office, and additional office space is required. The vehicle bay doors are in poor condition and provide little insulation. The restrooms do not comply with current handicapped accessibility requirements. The meeting room and kitchen facilities are inefficient for public events such as pancake breakfasts and community meetings. Insulation in the entire building is inadequate by today's standards.

A committee is at work, developing a proposal for additional space that would add two new vehicle bays, insulated vehicle bay doors, insulation upgrade, office space, enlarged meeting area, improved kitchen, storage

space and member ready room. An architect has been engaged for proposal development funded through a New York State Grant.

The Danby Fire District covers the Town of Danby, an area of 54 square miles. In the last five years, the population has grown approximately 9 percent and 132 housing units have been added. During the same period, there have been an average of 177 Emergency Response calls per year in the District, and the Danby Fire Department has been first responder on 112. Approximately one third of the of responses are for fire or related hazards, and the remainder are EMS/Rescue.

In the future, a rendering of the proposed addition providing more detail and cost estimates will be available for public review and a hearing will be held prior to a referendum for approval of funding. The committee intends to apply for state and federal grant money for a portion of the funding. This is a major undertaking that the District Commissioners and Department Officers feel will support the expected future growth of the Town of Danby.
