Danby Town History

Labor Day

"Labor Day differs in every essential way from the other holidays of the year in any country", said Samuel Gompers, founder and longtime president of the American Federation of Labor (the AFL). "All other holidays are in a more of less degree connected with conflicts and battles of man's prowess over man, of strife and discord for greed and power, of glories achieved by one nation over another. Labor Day...is devoted to no man, living or dead, to no sect, race or nation."

The Origin of Labor Day

There seems to be a veil of doubt shrouding the true founder of Labor Day. Some records state that Peter J. McGuire, the cofounder of the AFL and general secretary of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, was the first to suggest a day to honor those, "who from rude nature have delved and carved all the grandeur we behold."

Recent research seems to point to Matthew Maguire, secretary of the Central Labor Union in New York, who, in 1882, proposed the holiday and formed a committee to plan the festivities for the day.

The first Labor Day was celebrated on Tuesday, September 5, 1882, under the direction of the Central Labor Union, in New York City. The same date was also observed the following year. In 1884, the first Monday

in September was chosen and the CLU encouraged similar unions in other cities to join them in celebrating a "workingmen's holiday" on that date.

The idea was a popular one with the increase of labor organizations, and in 1885 Labor Day was celebrated in many industrial centers of the country. In June 1894, Congress passed an act making the first Monday in September, "A legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories."

The Nationwide Holiday

The proposed observances for the holiday included union parades, speeches by prominent men and women, and festivals including entertainment and recreation of the workers and their families. At the AFL convention in 1909, a resolution passed, adopting the Sunday preceding Labor Day as *Labor Sunday* and dedicating it to the spiritual and educational aspects of the labor movement.

Although the character of Labor Day celebrations has progressively changed over the decades, the premise is still the same. In this country, at least, the vital force of labor has contributed to a high standard of living and the greatest production the world has ever known. It is appropriate that the nation should pay tribute to the American Worker on Labor Day.

ADOPTION OF LOCAL LAW NO. 4 OF 2007 ENTITLED: "A Local Law Amending the Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Danby, New York by Reclassifying Certain Land Divisions and Subdivisions, Modifying Procedures Related to Such Land Divisions and Subdivisions and Incorporating Standards and Guidelines Set Forth in the State Environmental Conservation Review Act."

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Town Board of the Town of Danby held a public hearing at 1830 Danby Road, Ithaca, New York, on Monday, August 13, 2007 at 6:30pm to hear all comments of interested persons related to a proposed amendment to the Subdivision Regulations of the Town of Danby, New York and adopted Local Law No.4 which reclassifies certain land divisions and subdivisions and modifies procedures related to such land divisions and subdivisions and also incorporates standards and guidelines set forth in the State Environmental Conservation Review Act. Under the terms of the amendment, the text of the current Subdivision Regulations of the town of Danby, New York have been deleted in its entirety and replaced with amended text. The amended subdivision regulations provide for extensive changes to the current subdivision regulations and are applicable on a Town-wide basis. The full text of Local Law No. 4 of 2007 is on file in the Office of the Town Clerk of the Town of Danby located at 1830 Danby Road.

Many of you will be transitioning to the school year. September features a transition toward Autumn. Ithaca and Danby undergo many changes through the year. At the end of this year, in January 2008, the Danby Community Library will be transitioning to a time of resource consolidation in preparation for a future move to the new community center.

What does this mean for you, our borrowers? A bit of a change in how we run the Library and use our volunteers. We'll maintain our current hours until December 31, but starting in January, we will be open on 1st and 3rd Saturdays, 11:30am–1:30pm, and 2nd and 4th Wednesdays, 1:30–3:30pm.

Our open sign will *also* be out at other times when volunteers are available. More information to follow!

Another change will be that we will only be circulating Danby-owned books, videos, and other materials, which we will update through donations, the Friends of the Library, and a purchasing program for new materials. If you look at our materials now, all of the Danby-owned materials have an orange sticker.

Come in and borrow the new Harry Potter (or request a hold on it), look for new collections of Adult Fiction, Young Adult Fiction, Biographies and Large Type.

Remember, "change is good". We welcome feedback and additional volunteers as we enter this transition period.

Supervisor's Town News

We are having a busy and productive summer here at the Danby Town Hall. Here are a few of the current issues we are working on.

We are moving towards an agreement for an cooperative Recreation Partnership with other towns. As you may know, financial difficulties have jeopardized the Partnership. This agreement will allow Danby residents to continue to participate in sports, recreation and camp projects so many families have enjoyed for many years.

Danby is also having discussions with Cornell, the County School District, TCAD, and with other local municipalities about a possible common fuel depot and we are moving toward biofuels in order to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions.

Many residents have computer concerns and want high speed access available in Danby. We have developed maps showing where there is the highest density and are investigating which provider will be able to provide the the greatest access to the majority of residents. These talks are moving along quickly and I will have more information soon.

In order to learn more about funding these initiatives I attended a meeting sponsored by the county and learned more about how Telecom/Broadband is transforming the way we communicate by phone, internet and video.

On August 13, over the objections of the Town Planning Board, the Danby Task Force, and its Code Enforcement Officer, the Town Board voted to relax its existing subdivision permit requirements. I opposed this change and the process by which it was handled, but I was proud of my fellow Danbyites who, in spite of the fact that land use is such a hot issue, spoke at the Public Hearing in a civil and thoughtful way.

Subdivision Regulations Passed

A public hearing on proposed changes to the Subdivision Regulations filled the Town Hall on August 13. Two hours of public comment were followed by a vote. The Town Board adopted the changes it had proposed, over an objection by the Town Planning Board.

In addition to removing provisions that specified where houses can be built (area not to exceed 40 percent of the total land area of parcels in the Low Density Zone), provisions were added to allow frontage lots to be created by permit without Planning Board review or approval.

Lots five acres or larger can now be created at will, subject to NY State requirements for realty subdivision and relatively new storm water runoff regulations. Smaller frontage lots can also be created by permit, but are limited to one in any two year period.

These changes essentially reinstate the large lot exception that was in place prior to the adoption of the Comprehensive Plan in 2003 and the Subdivision Regulation revision of 2005. The small lot provision is less restrictive than the pre-2005 regulations.

Truck Purchase Moves Ahead

Bids were awarded for a new highway truck at the August 6 meeting of the Town Board. The Board discussed

deferring delivery until after the end of the year, when the retirement of an existing bond will offset the new truck payments, reducing the amount of new borrowing. Capital reserves are not adequate to cover the truck cost, and borrowing was preferred over raising the balance with a tax levy.

Other Town Board Actions

The Board adopted a policy on extensions to water lines for the West Danby Water District. The policy was prompted by a request for connection to a property that is primarily outside the water district; with the policy in place, the Board authorized the extension of water lines to a property owned by Shane Spencer, subject to a legal agreement specifying the limitations of use.

In another water district-related matter, Gene Beavers has been working to explore options for emergency power generation. The water district currently has no backup power to cover a protracted power outage.

Options include an independent generator and connecting to the emergency generator for the adjacent fire department building. This work is part of a major effort to better position the Town to handle emergencies.

In an unrelated matter, the Board voted to amend its agreement with the Highway Superintendent; road work to realign Curtis Road was among the funded projects.

DANBY WATER WIZARDS

During the week of August 6, kids participating in the Danby Youth Services summer programs explored Cayuga Lake and Six Mile Creek with the Cayuga Lake Floating Classroom Project. In all, 19 youngsters from several towns cruised aboard the M/V Haendel for three mornings, studying the ecology, health and history of Cayuga Lake.

Each participant started the week by figuring out where they live in the Cayuga Lake Watershed and identifying who lives "downstream" from their watershed address. They also shared their own questions and knowledge about the lake and the creatures that depend upon it.

Questions ranging from ecological—"How does the water change around the lake?"—to historical—"What kinds of sports have people used the lake for?"—provided many challenges for instructors Bill Foster and Nikki McGuire, as they planned the week.

Focusing the program around what the kids want to learn is of primary importance, according to Foster. Attention to the interests of the participants is a natural consequence of the program's ultimate goal of encouraging all participants to gain a better understanding of the nature of our lakes and streams, and to actually build a personal relationship with them.

"That was so fun and I learned so much!" exclaimed 10-year-old Danby resident Sam Stromswold after the first day of the program.

The group covered a lot of ground, collecting samples of water from the shallow south end of the lake as well as the deepest areas in the middle of the lake, over 400 feet down. The junior scientists discovered that the water gets cold quick, down that deep, and without sunlight there is not much that grows at that depth!

The group also spent one day in Slaterville Springs investigating a portion of Six Mile Creek and the Ithaca Reservoir, from which many Ithacans get their drinking water. The results of their biological surveys on aquatic insects showed that Six Mile Creek is pretty healthy.

This is the second summer that Danby youth have participated in the "Water Wizards" program. Last year, they focused on our very own Buttermilk Creek.
