Spaghetti Dinner Benefit for Erik Gaden

The Danby Fire District (Danby and West Danby volunteers), will host a spaghetti dinner at the Danby Fire Station, Noon–5pm on Sunday, October 14. The of the dinner will raise funds for a local resident, Erik Gaden, who was badly burned in an accident at home on August 15.

Erik was helicoptered to SUNY-Upstate in Syracuse and has undergone two skin graft procedures. He remains in the intensive care unit with injuries and cardiopulmonary issues. His expenses are overwhelming.

Erik has been a resident of Danby since 1967 and is a past member of the Danby Fire Company. His son, John, has volunteered since 1985 and is the current Chief. Erik is self-employed and has been unable to work since the accident; his recovery is projected to take 6–12 months. The community has planned this fundraiser to give him a hand.

The spaghetti dinner includes a choice of meatless or meat sauce, salad, bread, beverage choice, and dessert. Suggested donations for the meal are \$7 for adults and \$5 for children; children under 5 eat for free.

The event include a raffle, with proceeds going directly to Erik. 310 tickets are available (in advance and during the dinner) for \$10/ticket. Everyone is encouraged to sell tickets and will receive a free ticket after selling fifteen; call 607.277.5543 for info. Up to three winners, chosen at 4:30pm during the dinner, will receive a cash prize of up to \$100 plus certificates donated by area businesses.

Supervisor's Town News

It has been a busy month for the town. We approved

a backup power system for the West Danby water district, connecting it to West Danby's Fire Department generator.

Additional water news pertains to our aquifer study. We approved bid preparation for the drilling of two to three test wells. One well will be on Town Highway Department property and one or two on property owned by the Community Park Association. The town wants to record natural water level conditions for two years before equiping the wells with pumps.

Speaking of the park, the Planning Board approved the Community Park Association's request to begin rough grading for an access road and they are also developing ball fields. Work on parking and support facilities are subject to further Planning Board review.

The Town also approved an agreement to continue participation in the Recreation Partnership. Many Danby youth are involved in these programs which include sports and cultural activities. Because the programs are partially subsidized, this program includes families on limited incomes.

We approved the purchase of a badly needed new truck for the Highway Department and, luckily, it will arrive in Danby before the snow falls.

We discussed a request from the S.P.C.A. for additional funds. The S.P.C.A. claims that it will shut its doors next year unless each town doubles its current contribution. For Danby, this would be a sizable sum, \$14,162.

The Town of Danby is also reviewing the costs for an alarm system and painting of the Town Hall.

I will keep you posted about this and other issues involving taxpayer money and the quality of life for Danby residents.

What is the name of the program that can help you find the local food stamp office? What is that number that parents can call to get referrals to programs serving teens? I can't remember who I call to find housing assistance programs in my community!

You don't have to remember a name or a 7- or 10-digit number. You don't even have to look in the phone book. You just need to remember three numbers: 2-1-1.

Tompkins County residents can now dial 2-1-1 to find health care, services for seniors, programs for people with disabilities, mental health services, legal assistance, addiction treatment, employment, housing, food resources, consumer information, transportation, day care, and other community services.

Callers speak with an information and referral specialist with access to a database of hundreds of not-for-profit and government organizations that provide services in Tompkins County. Specialists are available 24 hours a day, every day including weekends and holidays.

2-1-1 Tompkins is free, confidential, consumer-focused, and non-judgmental. Referrals to services are based solely on callers' needs. Interpreter Services are available for callers who do not speak English.

Cellular service for 2-1-1 is under development. In the meantime, dial toll-free 877.211.8667 (211.TOMP). Look on the web, too: [211tompkins.org/].

FLOOD INSURANCE

Even though Danby is a member of FEMA and NFIP, this only entitles residents to lower cost federal flood insurance. Most likely their homeowners/renters insurance does not cover flood damage.

Residents must ask for—and get—an extra rider.

The definition of "flood" in the minds of Danby residents can be very different from the precise insurance company terminology.

Typical insurance policies include many kinds of water damage under the term "Flood Damage" and won't pay a cent unless there is an extra federal (FEMA) flood insurance rider. Meaning, if someone lives on high ground, but their first floor is wrecked by a heavy rain, a sewer pipe line break, or a water pipe break...that's a "flood" and must have federal insurance to cover damages. If high winds rip off part of a roof and the house interior is damaged by rain, that's a "flood" and, again, federal flood insurance is required for reimbursement.

Of course there is always the possibility of real floods-flash floods, mud slides, and slow rising, but devastating water levels in low lying areas.

So many people tell me, "I have homeowners insurance and live on high ground, I have nothing to worry about." That is a complete fairy tale in this day and age!

My main message is to get people to check with their insurance provider to make sure a federal flood insurance rider is included in their policy. If not, they need to add it ASAP!
