# **BLUES SKIES IN CONCERT**

The next free concert in the Danby Community Council's 2008 concert series features *Blue Skies* (David Frumkin and George Kobas) at 3pm on Sunday, April 13, 2008 in the Danby Town Hall. Blue Skys presents unique interpretations of classic jazz, blues and standards along with original compositions on guitar, mandolin, violin and combinations of solo and harmony vocals. They have performed at many regional music festivals, and live on WVBR-FM radio.

David and George performed together in the jug band, The Amazing Dr. Zarcon's Breathing Machine, and the contemporary folk trio, A Fine Kettle of Fish. David, who plays violin and acoustic guitar, appeared for six years with Peggy Haine and the Lowdown Alligator Jazz Band. George, who plays mandolin, acoustic and slide guitar, has performed with the string band, Martin, Bogan and Armstrong, and with the traditional Celtic group Castlegate.

This concert receives grant support from the Community Arts Partnership of Tompkins County. We had a great turnout for our first concert in February, despite the snow. This one should be lots of fun, and we hope the weather will be blue skies for Blue Skies!

# Tompkins County Update: Disposal Coupon/Punch Card Prices

A press release from the Solid Waste arrived just before print deadline, reminding us that disposal fees are changing (going up!) on April 1. No fooling.

The PR was a little ambiguous about the fate of the older-price punch cards and disposal coupons. It was clear that *unused* cards and coupons could be exchanged, along with some extra cash, for new ones; the fate of partially used punch cards was not as clear.

We telephoned the Solid Waste offices and, at first, were told that old punch cards would be invalid. Persisting, we spoke to Tom Richardson, the Recycling Supervisor, who explained that pro-rata credit for unused old cards would be applied to the purchase of new cards.

So, next time you visit the Solid Waste Transfer Station on Rt.13, near Wickes Lumber, be sure to stop into the office and exchange your old cards—plus cash—for new ones.

### Danby Town History

The Victor Talking Machine Company, 1901-1929

The Victor Talking Machine Company of Camden, New Jersey, was at one time the leading American producer of phonographs and phonograph records.

Eldridge Johnson purchased the Berliner Gramophone Company in 1900 after its owner lost a legal battle over the rights to manufacture flat disc, horned gramophones. In 1901, he reorganized his Consolidated Talking Machine Company and called the new enterprise *The Victor Talking Machine Company*. The *Victor* name is believed to have come from his "victory"—scientifically and commercially—in the first improvements of the Gramophone.

Johnson's logo, *His Master's Voice*, included the little fox terrier, Nipper, with his ever-familiar cocked ear listening intently to the sounds emanating from the horn of the phonograph.

In 1904, the Deluxe Victor VI table top model sold for \$100 (\$1900 in today's dollars). The popularity of the large, external horn of the phonograph rapidly declined because it occupied too much parlor space and was prone to damage. The cabinet was redesigned in 1906 and the first internal horn phonograph, the Victrola, sold for \$200.

By 1912, Victor wanted to expand its market downward to the range of the average family's budget. The table top Victrolas were converted to floor models, handsomely crafted pieces of furniture manufactured in an assortment of woods including oak, mahogany, and walnut. With the new upright configuration, the horn had more room, improving sound quality. The domed floor model had 2 sets of doors; the upper doors could be opened to provide a simple volume control, and the larger bottom doors hid shelves for record storage.

The original discs were single sided; double sided discs weren't introduced until 1923. Victor had its own recording studio and chose "new" celebrities to record under their label. One such celebrity was Enrico Caruso, who recorded on its *Red Seal* label from 1904 until 1920. Caruso's records were used by retailers to demonstrate the Victor phonograph because his rich, powerful, low tenor voice highlighted the best fidelity range of the early audio technology...and minimized its defects.

In 1921, with the growing popularity of radio, Victor introduced its first Console style phonograph but sales continued to slide until 1925, when Victor introduced the first totally automatic record changer. It sold for \$600 (\$5,600 in today's money) and was powered by an electric motor.

After over 30 years in the business, Eldridge Johnson sold Victor to a holding company. In late 1929, it was sold again, to the Recording Company of America (and General Electric), and became the RCA-Victor Company. Resources: [victor-victrola.com/History], [victrolas.com].

I am writing this report one week after Danby was clobbered by an ice storm. Many of us were without power for several hours or more; my home was hit very hard and was without power for several days.

I am fortunate to have a generator and can heat my house with wood. I had to cut my way out of my driveway--twice--when large tree limbs blocked my exit. I lost computer access, a connection to the world that I have come to rely on. Although this only lasted for a few days I wondered whether we would be able to cope in an emergency that lasted for weeks. Are we prepared?

More and more, I feel that we need to have the resources to take care of ourselves. Last summer, some of you got together in neighborhood block parties to talk about how to support each other in a protracted emergency. This year the Town will encourage more block parties so that neighbors can help neighbors in any kind of emergency. I hope neighborhoods will inventory resources so that our fire and highway departments can focus on what is most urgent, and neighbors help each other whenever possible. Let's help keep each other safe.

### Ice Cream Stand Melts

It was a nice idea when first presented, but Ted Huizinga's proposal to build an ice cream stand at the southeast corner of Hornbrook Road and NYS Rt.96B ran into a chilly reception at the Town Board meeting. All the immediate neighbors showed up in opposition; the corner is zoned *Low Density Residential* and those who owners of nearby properties don't expect business to locate there. The Town Board comments were also uniformly negative.

By getting an up-front "read" of the town board's receptivity to rezoning, the proposer is saved a lot of money and time pursuing approval. That feature of the zoning ordinance, called *Informal Sketch Plan Review*, demonstrated its value in this instance.

### Youth Employment Restructured

The Town Board approved a proposal, originating from Cornell Cooperative Extension and supported by the Danby Community Council, to add a hired crew manager for an expanded youth employment program.

The Council has had trouble finding adequate opportunities for Danby youth seeking to make an entry into the working world. With the supervision of a paid, older worker (such as a college junior or senior), young workers can tackle a variety of jobs. There's already a list of possibilities including helping out with the Danby Pond preparation, trail development, and the Highway Department. These job will add to the existing opportunities running the Danby Farmer's Market and to Tom Archibald's regular youth programing.

### 2008 Road Projects to Focus on West Danby

The Town Board approved the capital projects plan proposed by the Highway Superintendent. The major effort this year will be to rehabilitate several roads in West Danby. Valley View Road, Maple Avenue, and a section of Brown Road north of the bridge will all be rebuilt.

### Other Action

The Board reappointed Robert Roe as Planning Board Chair, agreed to reimburse the Supervisor for his cell phone expenses, approved the contract with Danby Community Council for provision of services, and agreed to spend up to \$1000 to support printing and other expenses of the Danby Emergency Management Planning Committee for its outreach efforts at Danby Fun Day and other gatherings.

shake agreements" that are the basis for much of the trail into more durable grants specifically permitting use of the trail to the public.

A new state law that gives grantors of conservation easements a tax credit for their protected property. Using money from the Environmental Protection Fund, the state will reimburse 25 percent of local property and school taxes, easing the burden of taxation on protected properties while being revenue-neutral for the local taxing jurisdiction.

### **Board Supports Trail in Caroline**

A transportation and recreation trail from Caroline to Ithaca and potentially further southward has been proposed. It would use the old railroad bed to connect to the South Hill Recreation Way. Old railroad beds make excellent bicycle trails because of their gentle slopes.

The Planning Board endorsed the project and recommended that the Town Board to sign on as co-sponsors, with the Town of Caroline, to act as Lead Agency.
