towards programs that develop Middle School decision making. The program will be led by Laura Smith, the Youth Coordinator from Cooperative Extension. The UW also wondered whether the Danby Area News could be delivered electronically but, while the DAN is available on the web, there is little advantage to not delivering individual copies.

The DCC is reviewing its newsletter guidelines and policies. It is agreed that this is a collaborative effort between DCC and the Town Board. The discussion centered on fairness and objectivity in reporting, and concern about candidates statements in DAN. DCC does not want its mission of community building overshadowed by possible political overtones.

June Pollack reported that many requests have come in for Youth Scholarships, and that 75 percent of this year's funds have already been awarded. [Since the meeting, the remainder of the allocated funds have been awarded. We are sorry, and wish we could do more.]

Ted Crane reported that the DCC now has a web presence, [town.danby.ny.us/DCC], as a part of the new Town web page. Minutes and announcements will be available online, along with the Danby Area News.

The DCC concert series continues with a folk concert featuring Richie Stearns and Steve Selin in the Town Hall on June 21 at 3pm. A local band, the /West Danby String Throttlers/ will play at the West Danby picnic on August 29. Bob Lieberman's film /Last Stop in Kew Gardens/ may be shown in the fall.

The DCC hopes to provide summer activities at Jennings pond during the summer (see Julie Kulik's separate article).

The next meeting of the Danby Community Council will be on July 2, at 7pm in the Town Hall.

A short extract from Joel Gagnon's Broader View articles

Town Board

Two local laws and a proposal to commit the town to participate in a new health consortium were all on the agenda for June.

The public hearings on the local laws (the Right to Engage in Agricultural Activity in the Town of Danby, and changes to its Subdivision Regulations) were thinly attended, but the comments covered the full range of reasons to be in support or opposition.

There was some discussion regarding the mention of CAFOs (concentrated animal feeding operations) in the "Right to Engage" law. It simply states that Danby is not an appropriate place for CAFOs. The sense of the Town Board was that the Comprehensive Plan Implementation Task Force should propose an amendment to the Danby Zoning Ordinance to outlaw CAFOs outside of agricultural districts. Such a change would have very limited applicability since most of the Town is in an agricultural district, but it was pointed out that some CAFOs--such as large poultry operations--do not need a lot of land. The law passed, 3/2, with Beavers and Salino voting against and Connors, Klein, and Dietrich in favor.

The vote on amending the Subdivision Regulations went the same way. The changes apply to only lots created by permit and do not affect those created after consideration by the Planning Board. Lots eight acres or larger can now be created by permit as often as desired, and lots smaller than eight acres can now be split from a parent parcel once every three years. Lots created by permit still need to conform to standard criteria; the Planning Board is still the path of choice for unusual situations and complex subdivisions.

The proposal to create a health insurance consortium of Tompkins County municipalities is coming to a critical decision-making juncture. The potentially participants have been asked by the Council of Governments to commit to the plan by July 1. Danby, like the other small municipalities, is expected to have substantial cost savings and enhanced benefits to covered workers. The Town Board voted unanimously to become one of the partners in the new venture.

In other action, the Board reviewed plans for a public meeting on the impact of natural gas drilling, scheduled for June 15. Kathy Halton, a volunteer for this effort, did a lot of the prep work for this meeting.

Ronda Roaring, during the privilege of the floor section of the meeting, reminded the Board that a year has elapsed since she pointed out that the fines specified by the Dog Control Ordinance have not changed since the ordinance was passed and are completely inadequate in today's dollars.

On behalf of the Highway Department, Laura Shawley reported that the new radios (promised by the County) have been received, that the crew are all trained in their use, and that the radios are now in service. The Highway Department received a NYSERDA (NYS Energy Research and Development Authority) grant (\$1650) to install new energy-efficient lights at the highway barn. The highway crew is down one worker since the recent retirement of Gary Hollenbeck. The department is trying to postpone hiring a replacement, to save money, but Shawley reported that Highway Superintendent Carl Seamon will want to replace him at some point.

Ric Dietrich, Town Supervisor, reported that he is working on getting the Cornell Veterinary College to collaborate with the Tompkins County SPCA to provide veterinary services as part of the vet school training. The construction of a new treatment facility, adjoining the SPCA's building, has been proposed. The hope is to save the SPCA money on treatment, while enhancing the educational training of the veterinary college.



Supervisor's Update

Updates this month on gas well drilling, emergency management, summer community get-together, CSEA agreements, NYSERDA, and budgets.

A well-attended gas drilling information session was held on June 15. One of the requests made during the evening was for information on specific topics, in addition to a general overview. We're ready to arrange follow-up on any topics that you'd like to know about.

The H1N1 "Swine" Flu has properties that make it unlike other flu outbreaks in the past. Training and preparation for continuity of Town services are now weekly topics of discussion, as the Town tries to stay ahead of this learning curve. We are concerned that the general community is informed about the need to pre-plan. We will have information available and will schedule workshops. Please watch for more information.

Some of our neighborhoods are planning community get-togethers. We encourage efforts that bring residents together. If you would like organizational help, or would like to sponsor a get-together, please feel free to contact me for assistance.

This is a "contract negotiation year" with the union representing our highway workers. I am sure you have all read articles describing how the NY State pension fund is in trouble. You guessed it, they will be looking to the taxpayer to bail them out. This, and a large jump in health insurance costs (if the Town does not benefit from the proposed county-wide insurance cooperative) will dramatically affect our budget. As a result, this year's negotiations are somewhat different than previous ones. Updates in August.

The Town recently participated in an energy audit with NYSERDA. We have received their report and will have met with them by the time you read this. We believe that, if recommendations are implemented, there will be a sizable decrease in our energy consumption at the Town Hall and the Highway Barns.

The County and State budgets, along with the union contract negotiations and costs associated with additions to our Fire Station, pose a unique situation for the Town this fall. State revenues will decrease, County services will decrease, and the Town is facing expenses for the maintenance or replacement of aging Highway equipment. The Highway Department will present its recommendations for equipment replacement in July.

It's a challenge.

Otherwise, my garden is doing well with just enough rain. I truly love the taste of fresh veggies from the garden. Enjoy the long days, June, so far, is being a good month.

FIRE STATION UPDATE

The proposed addition to the Danby Fire House is struggling. Our cost estimates (done by a professional in that line of business) were well below the construction bids; we are required to obtain competitive bids in four disciplines: General, Heating and Air Conditioning, Electrical, and Plumbing.

All the bigs came in too high, so we cut back our requirements and re-bid. Those bids were OK, except Plumbing. We have now re-bid Plumbing and are approaching satisfactory costs.

Since we have already gone to the public and passed a referendum on the original cost estimates, we are trying to bring the cost within that range. Let's hope we can start construction soon.

In the meantime, Fun Day is coming up. We, the Commissioners, plan to do the chicken barbeque as "Famous" as ever. See you all there.

Danby Trails Committee

The Danby Trails Advisory Committee met on June 9 at the home of Marika Briggs.

We got down to business at our June 9 meeting, transferring lines from the map we created previously—which were rubbing off—to tracing paper. We included all the existing roads and proposed trails, and intend to add natural, historic, and cultural features and the UNAs at our next meeting. The map will ensure that the trails will connect to these features.

The committee noted that the northeast part of Danby is not yet served by trails; we hope to address this, perhaps by the acquisition (either outright or via conservation easement) of Bonnie Tyler's property with its wooded creek and gorge.

It has become clear that the Committee should seek out involvement from 1) residents, 2) State agencies, 3) Town and County government, 4) local businesses, 5) non-profit organizations, and 6) the Chamber of Commerce. We need to answer several questions:

- Should a *Friends* group or some other organization be established to represent Danby trails?
- Will the Town fund any of the expense of creating these trails?

A number of people are in favor of a trail connecting Jennings Pond to the Michigan Hollow Trail, but there are valid concerns that it might disturb the otters and orchids at the back of the pond and nesting rails in the wetland area.

Ronda has contacted Jim Loomis of the Spencer-Van Etten trails group. Although their main goals are to connect with three large hiking trails in their area, Loomis was supportive of the idea of creating a connector from Spencer Lake to the Danby State Forest.

In the near future we will need to make decisions about what kind of trail marks, signs, and boardwalks to use or recommend. We hope that some of the work will start before our 5-year plan is approved, including a portion of the Danby Park trail which may be underway in mid- to late-August.

What Can We Do About BPA?

Bisphenol A (BPA) was created in 1891 as a synthetic estrogen. It has been used in the manufacture of a variety of consumer products, including water bottles and various items for children. Unfortunately, studies have concluded that acidity and high heat increases our exposure to BPA through leaching, and it is suspected that even low levels of BPA can trigger early puberty, breast or prostate cancer, obesity, and diabetes.

Katie Kelly, the Child-Safe Products Campaign Coordinator for Clean New York, spoke to last month's meeting of the Environmental Management Council. She explained that the Federal Food and Drug Administration still classifies BPA as safe, even though 93 percent of government funded low-dose studies have found harm. Canada has deemed BPA unsafe and is implementing a ban, and twenty states in the U.S. are acting independently to ban BPA. Within New York State, Suffolk County has already passed a ban.

There are several reasons to support local action: federal laws take longer to update; local laws can be stronger; and local laws create momentum and bring attention to the issue. After Katie's presentation, the EMC voted to support a Tompkins County ban on products containing Bisphenol A (including baby bottles and sippy cups, toys for age 3 and under, and infant formula cans and bottles).

Working to get BPA children's products out of the marketplace is the first step. Major changes are occurring, but lobbyists and industry are voicing strong opposition to bans. Part of Katie's job includes doing outreach to daycares and nursery schools on how to choose safe products. She is also available for "Healthy Home Parties," to promote product safety education. These parties are free and there is nothing to purchase. It's a fun way to get together with your friends and family and learn more about being a safe and aware consumer. COUNTY REP'S UPDATE

Undoubtedly the most challenging of budget years is facing us! In order to achieve the 3 percent tax levy goal set, and reduce the tax rate for 2010, the County must trim about \$4.4 million from the budget. Most programs will be affected, and potentially some eliminated. Though we were fortunate to receive some Federal Stimulus Monies these are one-time and short lived. Agencies will be affected as well; services throughout the county surely may be reduced.

Ridership on Tompkins Consolidated Area Transit (TCAT) continues to increase in part due to economic need, better routing, and service improvements. Though New York State funding is slated to change, the three primary providers Cornell University, the City of Ithaca, and Tompkins County are doing their collective best to maintain the reliability and quality of TCAT. The proposed route changes were approved by the TCAT Board and should be effective this fall.

As Health and Human Services Committee Chairman please remember we're not out of the woods regarding the H1N1 (Swine) flu just because no active cases have occurred in our county as of this writing. Continue to utilize those sanitary practices as simple as washing hands, and covering your nose and mouth when sneez-

ing. Check with Tompkins County Health Department if you need specific information.

Topics such as the cell towers, broadband service, Cayuga Lake monitoring plan, sustainability, gas well drilling, agriculture and farmland protections, affordable housing, and flood hazard mitigation are all on our plate. LYME TICKS IN DANBY

Living in Danby is different, now that lyme disease (LD) has arrived. My friends' children, living north of West Danby, have been bitten eight times this spring and get deer ticks on most days. Nearby, I've been bitten five times in two years. Because I've seen what LD did to a friend and based on what I've read, I very much want to avoid it.

I also hope to share what I've learned from people who've had lyme and/or are involved with those who have. This info, based on actual experiences of thousands, often contradicts what is asserted by the Centers for Disease Control and National Institute of Health.

Here are some basics:

- Deer ticks (DT) that may carry LD are active much of the year, even in winter, when the temperature is 40F or above.
 - They can be found from the ground up to wherever deer can reach. They don't drop off higher branches onto people; they need to directly grab on.
- Symptoms of LD don't necessarily happen soon after a bite, sometimes they appear months or years later.
- The symptoms of lyme disease vary a good deal between individuals. Only about half of people infected get any rash. In addition to the bulls-eye shape, it can be a different rash anywhere on the body. If you're bitten, do daily checks for a rash.
- The rash is different from the reddish skin close around the bite, from the irritation of the bite itself, that often occurs very quickly.
- Deer Ticks like long grass and meadows (mown grass is considered a lower risk), leaf litter, logs, and stream sides. They may be anywhere that deer—or the small mammals (mice, voles, chipmunks, etc.) and birds that also carry them—can go.
- The best prevention is avoiding getting bitten.

Some suggestions:

- Wear very light-colored pants and shirts to visit tickinfested areas. The dark colored ticks are easer to spot when they're on light-colored clothing.
- Tuck pants legs under socks. Wear light-colored hats if you contact things at deer level.
- Check your clothes and hat while you're out and before you go inside. Adult ticks are black with a red mark. Tiny nymphs are blackish.

Some sources say that infected ticks need to be in you for at least 36 hours to transmit lyme, while others say 24 hours. However, experiences indicate that there are no clear cut-off times, and that people might get lyme from shorter exposure.

In Tompkins County, if you remove a deer tick intact, you can take it to the County Health Department for a free test that will show how many hours the tick was in the person, and get their interpretation of infection

risk (which will be lower than in the book mentioned below). The test results take about 10 days to get back to you. Unfortunately, to test a tick for the actual presence of lyme currently costs \$100 through the County.

According to the book, *Beating Lyme* by Constance Bean with Lesley A. Fein, MD, the two kinds of lyme tests (the enzyme-linked immunoabsorbent assay (ELISA) and the Western blot) are both very

unreliable. "ELISA tests pick up no more than a third, perhaps half, of the cases of lyme." The Western blot, much more expensive, is said to diagnose about two thirds of infections, but isn't given to most people. And

the spirochetes, "Cannot generally be found in body fluids or tissues [of infected people]."

In removing ticks, it's important to avoid squeezing them, to minimize the chance of infection if lyme is

present. Grab hold of the tick at the very base--at skin level—with tweezers and pull firmly, straight upward. Put it inside a container for optional testing. Do not kill ticks by squishing them with a fingernail, as they can contain other disease bacteria that might absorb directly into your skin. An even better tool that works even for tiny nymphs is a little pry-bar type "tick-remover" sold locally for \$5 by the staff of Primitive Pursuits.

1/2 cup butter, melted

1/2 cup flour

1 lb boneless chicken breasts, cut into strips

2 Tbsp fresh lemon juice

1 cup heavy cream

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1 dash paprika, for garnish

Method: Preheat oven to 400°F. Lightly grease a baking dish. Place butter and flour in separate shallow dishes. Dredge chicken strips, first in the flour, coating evenly, and then in the butter. Place chicken in prepared baking dish. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Add salt and pepper to taste. Pour the heavy cream over the chicken. Sprinkle evenly with Parmesan cheese and paprika. Bake in preheated oven until cheese melts and cream bubbles, about 20 minutes. Makes 4 servings.
