

# CHINESE MUSIC CONCERT

# **ELECTION DAY COMING!**

The 2010 General Election will take place, as always, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November; November 2, this year.

Danby's polling places are the same (the Town Hall and the West Danby Fire Hall) but the voting machines will be different. A "trial run" of the new machines during the September primaries showed that voters found the new technology both quick and easy to use. Multiple "privacy booths" allow several voters to vote simultaneously before queuing up for a 10-second visit to the ballot scanner. Poll site mamagers are available to answer questions about the voting procedure.

Mid-term elections traditionally have a lower turn-out, which means that

your vote matters even more than during "big" national elections. Voters will choose New York's next Governor, Attorney General, and Senators, along with the Tompkins County Sheriff. Mid-term or not, these are important decisions.

In addition, there's an important local referendum on the ballot. Danby voters will decide whether the Town Highway Superintendent should be changed to an appointed position or remain an elected one.

With election day so early in November this year, this may be the only reminder you will see in the Danby Area News. Mark your calendars.

Remember to vote on Tuesday, November 2, from 6am to 9pm.

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# TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

Autumn brings a harvest of all good things in our gardens and orchards. It's time to plan ahead for the long winter to come. As I look into October, there are two things on my mind: budgets and dogs.

In Town Hall, that means budgeting for the next year. With funding cutbacks expected from the State and County, and with an expected rise in retirement and health care costs for Town employees (particularly our unionized highway workers), each department has been asked to make a 2% cut in budgets for the next year. With the help of bookkeeper Laura Shawley, we've got a good handle on



appropriate costs for the Town Clerk's office for the next year.

The Town Board will be holding budget hearing meetings on Mondays from the end of September into October.

Now, what do budgets and dogs have to do with each other? Quite a bit, it turns out. Although dog licensing is mandated by the State, all licenses and dog control are managed by local municipalities. In particular, Town Clerks are responsible for all of the record keeping related to dog control. Danby, along with other members of the Tompkins County Consortium of Governments has found it most effective to contract with Tompkins County Animal Control (managed by the SPCA) for the control of wandering and nuisance dogs. Since the municipalities share this service, devising an equitable rate of pay is important. Any change in Danby's rate could have a noticeable impact on the Town budget.

An accurate count of all the Danby dogs is the most important thing we can do to make sure that our Town is paying its fair share (but no more!) of the TCAC contract. The last full dog count in Danby was in 2008 but, knowing that the population of Danby has grown in the past few years and that people come and go, we want to make sure that we have the most accurate information possible regarding Danby's dog population.

#### **October Dog Enumeration**

After months of failed starts with a previous contractor, we've entered into an agreement with a highly experienced and skilled person. Richard Leonard has previously successfully counted dogs for Dryden, Newfield, and Groton. He is the dog control officer for the Town of Dryden and knows all of the "tricks of the trade." He will count the dogs in Danby in October. When he's finished with us, he will continue with the Town of Caroline.

Richard Leonard will conduct a door-to-door

count of all dogs residing in Danby. New York State law requires that all dogs must be licensed if they are (1) three months old or more and (2) in the Town for more than 30 days. If you have a dog that is licensed, you will need to show a renewal notice signed by the owner and the Town Clerk. Proof of a current rabies vaccine must also be provided. If you don't have these papers handy when Rich-

ard visits, you will be required to bring them to Town Hall to avoid a citation.

New York State law adds a \$5 surcharge to the licensing fee for a dog that is found unlicensed during a dog enumeration. This fee is kept by the Town, and helps to offset the cost of dog control.

You may license your dog at the Danby Town Clerk's office during regular business hours, Tuesday through Friday 10am-5pm and Saturday 10am-Noon. The license fee is \$12 for a spayed/neutered dog and \$20 for an unspayed/unneutered dog. Proof of spay/neutering must be provided. If you license your dog prior to being visited during the enumeration, you will not be charged the additional \$5 fee. Stop in soon, and take care of this simple task.

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# SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Gosh, there seems like a lot more on my plate than usual. Probably, its just me and my house repairs, gutters to hang, wood to split, stack, and generally get ahead of... and I'm jealous of those who are far enough ahead to be behind on next years chores.

As you have probable noticed, the front of the Town Hall is getting a facelift. I've had a chance to look over the whole structure—inspecting all the nooks and crannies and there is a lot of work that will be done and more that will need to be done on our historic structure.

The problems have been hidden, running through the upper stories. For example, the old flashing is failing in spite of patchwork over the years. We will be conducting a complete assessment and I will let you know the results.

The salt shed is getting ready for ground-breaking, with completion expected later this Fall. The Town was hesitant to enter into any new debt—or tax increase—so, after the bids were opened for the foundation work, the Board decided to reject all the bids and have the Highway Department do the work; they're qualified and can do it less expensively than the bidders. The structural work was previously awarded to Benson's Farm Equipment from Groton.

Broadband Internet access (or, the lack of it) still has residents calling and Emailing me for information. A newly formed broadband committee of the Tompkins County Legislature will investigate how to best promote the technology county-wide and advise the legislature on the issue.

They will bring together all the local private and commercial concerns in the County and draft a proposal for us to pursue. I would advise everyone not to hold his or her breath on this topic, but it is still moving along.

The boiler project at the Town Barns has taken some twists and turns. We are currently waiting for approval from NYSERDA of a change order related to what we want to burn: we're hoping to use locally-produced hay bales! Next month, I will let you know how this is going. If approved, it will—I have been led to believe—be the first gasification hay burner in the United States.

CSEA negotiations begin again this week, I am sure there will be more on this subject coming in future articles.

The Health Consortium is beginning coverage next January. There are still lots of hurdles to be covered as this project moves along, and Don Barber (Caroline's Supervisor) deserves a lot of credit for moving the project over a variety of obstacles.

Budget workshops will be held every Monday during October, 7-9pm, in the Danby Town Hall. I will be giving the Board a preliminary proposal at our Board meeting this month.

#### Town Board Gives Go Ahead for Salt Barn

After unsuccessfully chasing grant money for many years, the Danby Town Board decided to just go ahead and build a salt storage "barn" using available funds. Thanks to diligent exploration of the lowest cost options that would satisfy the need, the Highway Department has come up with a plan to build the facility with an asphalt floor, braced concrete sidewalls, and a fabric roof over a metal frame.

The roof was bid first, with the winning bid (\$32,175) offered by Benson's Farm Equipment of Groton. The Town specified a small range of building sizes in its request for bids, hoping that bidders could base prices on stock, rather than custom, roof sizes. Once the winning bid was awarded, the building footprint was finalized and specifications for the walls and floor were developed to match.

When bids for the concrete work came in higher than hoped (one for \$91,788 and another for \$118,500), the Highway Department recommended to the Town Board that they be rejected and the Highway crew authorized to do the form work and concrete pour themselves. The cost of doing the work that way is projected to be around \$50,000. The Board authorized the work at it meeting on September 13; work is expected to begin almost immediately and be completed this fall.

A critical enabler for this project was the discovery by the Town's bookkeeper, Laura Shawley (who doubles as the office staff for the Highway Department) that CHIP (Consolidated Highway Improvement Program) funds from NY State are not limited to use for highway improvements but can also be used for other highwayrelated capital projects—including a salt barn. Since the Town would not want to commit an entire year's CHIP funding for construction (at the expense of road work), Shawley hit upon the idea of spreading the construction over two years.

The State money is supplemented by local funds garnered from improvements in operating efficiency within the Highway Department under Carl Seamon's leadership. The project will proceed with neither a need for borrowing by the Town nor a tax increase.

#### **Biomass Boiler Progress**

Danby was successful in getting a NYSERDA (New York State Energy Research and Development Au-

thority) grant for \$263,647 to install a state-of-the-art biomass boiler to heat the Town's Highway Barn. The Town needs to front the money for the project and submit the costs incurred for reimbursement.

The biomass boiler is coming from Europe, where the use of biomass as a fuel is much better developed than it is here in the United States. It will be capable of using hay bales as its primary fuel. The Danby Land Bank Cooperative is expected to be the source of the waste hay and fallow field mowings, thus resulting in a locally produced, renewable, and carbon-neutral fuel source. This boiler could also be fed wood chips or shavings, should those be available and cost-competitive. Any of these fuels are expected to be significantly cheaper that the propane currently used to heat the facility.

**Danby Planning Board: Alternative Fuels** Henry Peterson addressed the Danby Planning Board during its August meeting, touting the virtues of alcohol fuel. They are numerous, beginning with a reduced dependence on imported oil and, at the same time, exporting our country's wealth. Unlike extractive fossil fuels, alcohol can be produced indefinitely and it is also carbon neutral, contributing nothing to global warming. Production is easy on the land, provided that its byproducts find their way back onto the land, either directly as fertilizer, or indirectly as the manure of animals fed the byproducts.

Peterson spoke of small-scale distillation, with multiple stills potentially located in the town. Stills capable of producing 3 gallons/batch can be had for less than \$1500, or even

manufactured locally by anyone handy with tools. Peterson said he thinks alcohol can be produced for about \$1/gallon. The Federal government subsidizes the production at the rate of 55 cents per gallon, reducing the production cost to 45 cents.

There were skeptics in the audience. Some questioned the EREI (energy return on energy invested); some academics believe that the return is actually negative. Peterson said the figures he has seen are in the range of 35 percent, and agreed that corn is a poor feedstock. Sugar beets or sorghum would be better, and cellulosic feed stocks are also a possibility, but that technology is still being developed.

If it were produced, how would it be used? Before prohibition, engines were designed to run on alcohol or gasoline. Some engines currently being manufactured can run on E85 (up to 85 percent alcohol). Otherwise, there is an upper limit on what unmodified engines can use. Peterson suggested that that upper limit is around 50 percent. Others had it closer to 15 percent. Since gasoline already contains 10 percent alcohol, how much more can be added is important.

Alcohol can also be mixed with diesel fuel. Ric Dietrich reported that the Town of Dryden tried that with its highway fleet and found it worked well in the summer, but winter operation was less satisfactory. The fuel tended to gel at lower temperatures, a problem that could be solved by substituting kerosene, but at an increased cost that pretty much negated the cost advantage of adding the alcohol.

> Betsy Keokosky reported on the activities of the Danby Land Bank Cooperative. That group was partnering with a group of investors, led by Tony Nekut, to build a pellet fuel plant in Caroline. They have found the economics of wood pellet fuel do not support the venture, however, because of high costs for maintenance of the equipment. Keokosky said that she believes that grass has a better EREI than wood. The group is now looking into producing grass briquettes or logs that could be burned in conventional wood stoves. Ultimately, combined heat and power operations make the most sense, said Keokosky, with large

users like hospitals and universities best positioned to move in that direction.

The Planning Board did spend a little time discussing how to inform themselves about mixed use development as a precursor to considering incorporating it into Danby's land use laws. Olivia Vent reported that she had been in talks with Robert Morash, a planner with ties to the urban ecovillage being developed on Aurora Street in Ithaca. She suggested that the Board invite Morash to its next meeting, to explain some of the concepts and how they might be employed in Danby.
