
### TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

#### **Busy Times**

Outside Town Hall, the first leaves are turning red on the maple tree near the mail box. As we watch Autumn unfold in the park across the street, I remember a conversation from Danby Fun Day, back in July.

A friend asked, "When's your downtime?" After a moment's thought, I replied, "Usually around now...but this year, not so much." We've had a busy summer in the Town Clerk's office, learning the new procedures



for issuing marriage licenses, keeping up with extra Town and Planning Board meetings (and their minutes), and preparing and passing local laws protecting our community from the ill effects of high impact industrial activity.

Danby's Local Law #3 of 2011, "Zoning Ordinance to Prohibit Gas and Petroleum Mining and Related Activities," was passed by the Town Board on September 12,

signed by the Town Supervisor and Town Attorney, and mailed on September 17 to be filed with the NYS Department of State Records Division. It was the final step in a long process.

Now the season has turned, and it's time to think about the Town budget. This is very much a team effort involving the Town Clerk, the Bookkeeper, the Town Board, and others. While the Board sets policy and the Bookkeeper does most of the financial figuring, the Town Clerk is responsible for maintaining a record of each year's budget.

Residents have a part in this process: they can attend budget review meetings, become informed about the financial health of the Town, and make concerns known.

We're reviewing the Clerk's portion of the budget to ensure that it reflects the real needs of the office. We have already been cautious and conservative about spending. No new equipment was purchased in 2010 or 2011, and we will do our best to make do with what we have for 2012. Some really antique equipment, like our "collectible" telephones, may need to be replaced. Hours and wages for myself and my support staff will be kept at an appropriate level. I appreciate the flexibility and efficiency shown by Mary Ann Barr (Records Assistant) and Sue McLellan

(Deputy Clerk) and the willingness of our Town staff to be creative about sharing work between offices.

Taxes are not the only revenue source collected for the Town. The Town Clerk's office accepts and records fees from building permits, marriage licenses, hunting and fishing licenses, and dog licenses. We even take donations, particularly to the Danby Reading Room Library . Several of our computers, including the ones available for public use, have arrived that way!

Local municipalities have no control over the level of some of these license fees—notably those from the Health Department (marriage licenses) and the Department of Environmental Conservation (hunting and fishing licenses). We are, however, able to set appropriate fees for building permits, Planning Board and Board of Zoning Appeals hearings, and dog licenses.

As part of the budget process, we are reviewing dog licensing costs. Towns across Tompkins County are making the same calculations, working together to adopt similar fees. Dog license fees may need to be raised to keep up with cost increases: mailing renewal reminders (and followup reminders for those who are late), the computer database system (no longer provided by the State), and the animal control officers mandated by the State.

#### Being Good Neighbors

Speaking of protecting the welfare of the community, I send an enormous "Thank You" to everyone who has donated food, cleaning supplies, and personal care items to the flood relief efforts for those hit in Candor, Catatonk, and Owego in Tioga County. We have sent several carloads of donations to the McKendree Methodist Church in Candor, where donations are distrubuted to those in need. It is expected that assistance will be needed for some time. We will continue to collect donations at the Danby Town Hall for as long as there is a need.

An Aftrican proverb says it all: "If you think you are too small to make a difference, try sleeping with a mosquito." We can all help to make the world a better place.

Autumn office hours for the Danby Town Clerk are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, 10am-5pm, and Saturday mornings, 10am-Noon. As always we are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And yes, the chocolate kiss bowl remains well supplied.

### GAS DRILLING TASK FORCE UPDATE

This fall, the Danby Gas Drilling Task Force will hold business meetings on October 12, October 26, November 9, and December 14, all at 7pm in the Danby Town Hall. All are welcome to attend!

The zoning and comprehensive plan amendments passed by the Town Board on September 12 are an important part of the Town's response to possible shale gas extraction, but much work remains to be done. Two important areas of work this fall will be

- developing a clear and strong response to the NYS
   Department of Environmental Conservation's revised
   draft Supplemental Generic Environmental Impact
   Statement (rdSGEIS comments are due by December 12) and corresponding proposed regulations regarding shale gas extraction.
- supporting the Town of Danby in further work to develop a "toolkit" to address municipal governance issues raised by shale gas extraction activities.

We'll be working closely with the Tompkins County Council of Governments Gas Drilling Task Force on getting public comments to the DEC and on ensuring that Town and County activities are coordinated.

As in past years, we will sponsor a number of educational events and community conversations here in Danby. The first event, with Ruth Tonachel from Bradford County, PA, will be on October 21 [see sidebar]. We will also be sponsoring events on other energy issues, including energy conservation.

## Danby Fire District Update

In the August issue of the Danby Area News, Pat Caveney, Commissioner for the Danby Fire District, reported that the district had voted to upgrade the lighting in the truck bays at the Danby Fire Station and that the cost was expected to be \$398.85.

However, the actual price ended up being \$997.20. The reason for this increase is that New York state law requires all municipal entities to pay "prevailing wages" for labor costs, plus a mandatory \$250 administration fee; the first quote didn't reflect that and was therefore much lower.

The material costs remain the same, and the reasons for upgrading the lighting are still valid. The district will

still realize significant energy savings, and even though it will take longer for us to see a return on the investment, it still makes fiscal sense. Additionally, the quality of the lighting is much improved and therefore the safety of the truck bays is likewise increased.

## WHEN HOME BECOMES A GASFIELD

Ruth, a 6<sup>th</sup> generation resident of Towanda, PA, will talk about the ways in which the arrival of the shale gas extraction industry to Bradford County has changed daily life for her family and neighbors, and about how it has affected their sense of place.

Ruth will share both stories and photos, including images of the farm that has been in her family since 1790. Of special interest is the fact that Ruth co-owns and manages one of the largest remaining unleased tracts of land in Bradford County. Find out what has influenced her decision not to lease and what might change it in the future. Ruth also manages several rental properties and will touch on the issue of skyrocketing rents and their consequences.

This discussion, sponsored by Danby's Gas Drilling Task Force, will take place in the Town Hall at 7pm on Friday, October 21.

## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

#### Recent News Item:

NASA scientists are doing their best to tell us where a 6-ton satellite will fall later this week. The potential strike zone covers most of North and South America. Small differences in atmospheric conditions could mean the difference between hitting Dakota or Danby.

#### Older News Item:

Aeschylus, the father of Greek drama, was killed by a falling tortoise. He had been warned that he would be struck by a falling object, so he went into an open field to protect himself...only to fall victim to a tortoise dropped by an eagle.

No matter where you go, there you are. Life is full of surprises, revelations, and conflicting information.

Recently, the Danby Town Board passed revisions to our Comprehensive Plan and to our Zoning, in order to avoid a perceived threat to our Town. But, by trying to avoid one thing, we have run into another thing. Now that another Town's attempt to protect itself has run into a legal challenge, we will meet with our neighboring municipalities to collaborate on strategy for joint defense of our Towns way of life.

The property tax cap, recently enacted by NY State to restrict increases in local taxation, is another situation. It takes effect at the same time as the State is also cutting its support for services, transferring the burden to localities. We are reading about municipalities preparing to override the State's tax cap, just to maintain existing services.

Other energy programs are available to Danby residents, such as "energy audits" that could help you significantly cut your energy use for your home. Please call the Town if you would like more information.

The recent flood devastation of neighborhoods south of us reminds me that September is Emergency Management Month. I ask all of you to take time from your busy lives to consider steps you and your family should take to prepare yourselves.

A recent visit to Candor was a sobering experience. I was down there delivering essential materials donated by Danby residents. There are folks in Candor who have lost everything, residents who still have no electricity or running water, and who are still living in shelters weeks after the flooding.

Life happens quickly.

## OCTOBER COLOR: A BIG BANG

Not every October in Danby can be something glorious out of a 1940's technicolor movie, but most are. It's in the Fall when the trees, tired from the sedate, respectable, business-like, and calming effect of green, opt for riotous reds, oranges and yellows. The result alternates between stupefying and exhilarating; leaving one speechless one moment and poetic the next.

Vincent Minelli, the great director of yesteryear, seems to have been at work, selecting just the right color combinations to thrill and delight, much as he did to create all of the classic movies that are now so much a part of our American—and world—culture.

One could draw a comparison between October foliage and the outrageous and excessive goings on in Rio during *Carnaval*. Both events are over the top, exciting, and stimulating; both precede a period of somber reflection and self-denial. Going out with a big bang! We wish the incredible color would never end, but we know that it has to. Nature seems to understand the old show-business adage: *Leave them begging for more*. We look forward to October's gaudy outburst and understand that its ephemeral quality and bittersweet character make it all the more poignant and appealing.

Some years ago, Randy and I drove out to a hayfield in the hills around Danby on a particularly fine October afternoon and sat, eating our submarine sandwiches, just looking, and marveling at the wonder of it all. Talking seems an interruption during times like these, most especially since words fall short of expressing the hypnotic effect of the miracle of Fall color. It's like sitting around a campfire in rapt silence, just watching the flames.

Many years ago, when I was living with a family in Spain, I showed them photos of Upstate New York. I remember their awe and surprise at the variety and vividness of our October colors. Unlike most of Spain, we are blessed with many species of trees, with rolling hills covered by beautiful forests of impressive hardwoods. Seeing through the eyes of strangers is enlightening. It reveals what we have and helps us understand and appreciate what we often take for granted.

Take a good long look at the hills around Danby this October and thank whomever you are in the habit of thanking for what you see and how you feel. We are lucky to have such a visual feast before the winter of subtle palettes and muted hues, lacking the big bang of an October in Danby.

## Danby History: Getting To Know Bald Hill

Danby may not have obvious commercial centers, but it does have close-knit neighborhoods. On Thursday, October 13, the Danby History Group invites you to learn about the history of one such neighborhood that has undergone major changes in the past 100 years.

Wayne Myers will read a chapter from his book-inprogress on the Bald Hill community and will display some of the photographs he has collected during his lifetime. The program begins at 7pm, and is free and open to all. Refreshments will be served.

The area that is now the Bald Hill section of the Danby State Forest was once a thriving micro-community with a school, active farms, and supportive interrelationships. Wayne Myers has dedicated himself to collecting and preserving the memory of the old Bald Hill community, through photographs, family histories, and other stories. His October 13 program will focus on Bald Hill "genealogy" (the relationships between familys on the Hill) and particularly on the impact of the Civil War on this community. Myers will be available for questions after his reading.

Anyone interested in Danby history is encouraged to join the Danby History Group. This informal group explores the history of people and places in Danby. The group is currently gathering information to be included in history sections of the Danby web site; it also provides articles of historical interest for the Danby News, and organizes occasional public events. Topics include house histories, relevant names for family research, and neighborhood histories including West Danby, South Danby, Bald Hill, and the central Danby hamlet. ## Volunteers Needed Become a Firefighter or EMT

Every firefighter and emergency medical care provider in the Danby Fire District is a volunteer, but no amount of dedication can make up for the fact that we need more people!

The time commitment is three hours Monday evenings. Almost everybody joins with no prior emergency experience; we'll make sure you get the training you need. Depending on your interests and availability, there's a variety of ways you can get involved.

Support Members assist with events and fundraising, washing trucks, and may be called on to bring drinks or food to a long call to help rehab active members. Whatever non-emergency skills you can offer, we can probably use!

Exterior Firefighters perform all firefighting skills with the exception of donning an air-pack and entering areas with hazardous atmospheres. They use hoses, place ladders, tear apart crashed vehicles, and operate fire trucks. The training class, Scene Support (27 hours), runs two nights a week for a month.

Interior Firefighters have additional firefighting training that allows them to wear air-packs and work inside burning structures for rescue and extinguishment purposes. The required classes are Firefighter 1 (87 hours) and Firefighter Survival (8 hours); Firefighter 1 runs

## DVFC Helping to Extinguish Breast Cancer

The Danby Volunteer Fire Company is hosting a spaghetti dinner fund raising event for company member Bonnie Compton. Bonnie is battling breast cancer and is struggling to make financial ends meet. The dinner is on Saturday, October 22, 4-7pm in the Danby Fire Station (1780 Danby Road).

The spaghetti dinner includes meatballs or a vegetarian-friendly non-meatless sauce, garlic bread, salad, dessert, and drink. The cost is \$7 for adults, \$5 for senior citizens age 55+, and \$5 for kids under age 12. Dinners can be eaten in and take-outs will also be available.

This benefit not only supports Bonnie, but acknowledges others in our community who have had breast

in the fall and spring semester each year, two nights a week. Most people find it a transformative experience.

EMS Personnel respond to medical calls and provide care until the patient is transfered to Bangs Ambulance. Usually, we can arrive well ahead of the ambulance and provide comforting or sometimes life-saving care. Levels of EMS training range from CPR/AED (6 hours), to Certified First Responder (50 hours), to EMT-Basic (130 hours) and various Advanced EMT certifications.

All training and equipment is free to members. Joining is personally gratifying and can also create career skills and career opportunities. All of it is available in Tompkins County. We're also close to the NYS Academy of Fire Science in Montour Falls, where specialized classes ranging from Hazardous Materials Technician to Swift Water Rescue are available.

There is no such thing as a stereotypical volunteer firefighter. Our members range from teens to septuagenarians and include men and women with jobs and families and everyday responsibilities. The only thing we all have in common is our willingness to drop everything for a neighbor who's having a really bad day, and the only thing that sets us apart is our training. Please send us your questions and consider joining.

#### LIFE IN DANBY

This month's observations from Danbyites Submitted by Julie Kulik

Welcome Autumn. Lots of changes in the air, hope you enjoy this months' findings from your neighbors here in beautiful Danby. See you in the woods!

Mammals: Coyote walking along a road, Bobcat, Deer with emerging velvet antlers, bear tracks. "We had a large porcupine at our house on the night of September 3. It was rummaging on the ground, just outside our front door! First one I've seen in Tompkins County in quite awhile, since a roadkill in front of Lower Buttermilk State Park."

Birds: Turkeys. "The barn swallows have headed south--seemed like a good year for raising and fledging young. There's been a kestrel hunting grasshoppers in the pasture for a couple of days—returns to the top of a white pine to eat them. Nice visitor. Wood

ducks on the pond, also a Great Blue Heron. Ravens are calling a lot; beautiful woodblock tones sometimes." "This year's fledgling Broad-winged Hawks were seen hunting from perches along shady forest roads at various dates over the past month; Young Sharpshinned Hawks graduated from catching winged grasshoppers near their hatching site to chasing feathered prey farther afield. These youngsters may already have joined hawk migration, now getting underway."

Amphibians/Reptiles: Snapping turtles, Painted Turtles. "I have seen more pickerel frogs, American toads, and spring peepers on my property this year than ever before. The rain in May and June must have aided great reproduction this year. Does anyone else have this same impression?"

Insects: Monarch butterflies. "I notice gatherings of bumble bees in the luxuriant goldenrod that graces our fields this September. Such peaceful creatures, not at all angry, even though I sometimes plow right through them as I walk"
