



Town Clerk's Desktop

The 2012 Annual Town Clerk's Report provides an interesting "snapshot" of activity which takes place in the Danby Town Hall. A substantial amount of money—outside of the January tax collection—passes though the Clerk's window. In 2011, we had total receipts of \$29,065.62; \$20,543.51 went to the Town via the Supervisor's office, while the remaining \$8,522.11 was disbursed to the NYS DEC (for sporting licenses), to the NYS Animal Population Control Fund, and to

the NYS Health Department (for marriage licenses).



Thanks in great part to diligent notification of dog owners (one of the benefits of licensing responsibilities shifting to local municipalities in 2011), the number of Dog Licenses issued to or renewed by Danby residents increased from 566 pups in 2010 to 595 tail-waggers in 2011. These licenses yielded fees of \$8,109, with \$7,326 retained by the Town (\$783 went

to the Animal Population Control Fund). The income offsets a portion of the cost of notifications, staff time, and the Tompkins County Animal Control contract. In 2012, we may need to review our fees—which have not changed for several years—to ensure that they are in line with actual costs.

Many people visit the Town Clerk's office to purchase Sporting Licenses, such as those required for fishing and hunting. Even though many more outlets for these licenses have opened in the past decade, Danby's income from *DECALS* (Department of Environmental Conservation Automated License System) has remained steady. During the past eleven years, an average of \$8,863 was collected by Danby for these license sales. 2011 saw a moderate reduction in *DECALS* sales, with \$7,853 collected, compared to \$8,724 in 2010. Only \$428.89 remained in Danby last year. The rest was transmitted to the NYS DEC.

Compared to a clerk's office in Niagara Falls, or even the City of Ithaca, Danby issues a relatively small number of Marriage Licenses every year. It was my joy to issue fourteen marriage licenses during 2011...three more than in 2010. The past decade has seen an average of ten couples receiving a license to marry (the actual marriage may or may not take place). Marriage records

are the most private information stored in Town Hall. While most details can not be shared in a casual way, I can note that the 2011 licenses included both "traditional" and same-sex couples.

The figures for Building Permits, Planning Fees, and hearings before Danby's Board of Zoning Appeals give an outline of the trend of development within Danby. In this respect, 2011 was within the average for the past decade. Fifty eight permits—including eight solar panel installations—were issued, with an income to the Town of \$11,142.12. The number of building permits issued—new construction, renovations, and other upgrades—implies that construction in Danby has been at a moderate pace in recent years.

In the meantime, we are still collecting taxes. Through the end of February, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-1pm on Saturdays (except 2/19, the Saturday of President's Day weekend). And yes, you can take the edge off the pain of paying taxes by dipping into the full the bowl of chocolate.

ICE DAMS: A MAJOR PROBLEM

(from a press release by Carole Fisher, Coop Extension)

Drive through almost any residential neighborhood this winter and you cannot help but notice the number of houses with massive icicles hanging from roof edges. While this may create a beautiful, wintry scene, ice buildup on roof edges can create some very ugly problems for homeowners.

Ice dams often lead to snow melt water leaking into a house and cause extensive damage. This winter's weather has set up perfect conditions for the formation of ice dams. When moderate to heavy snow is combined with several days with daytime temperatures between 15 and 29 degrees, conditions are ideal for creating ice build-up on house roof edges.

Ice dams occur when heat and warm air escape from the living areas of a home into unheated spaces near the roof. The escaping heat and warm air build up and increase the temperature enough so that the snow on the roof begins to melt. The melt water flows down the roof until it comes to the overhang at the roof edge. Since there is no escaping heat under the overhang, the melt water freezes and creates a thick layer of ice. This layer of ice becomes a dam, behind which a puddle of water from newly melted snow forms. Eventually this water works its way under roof shingles and into the house.

What should you do if your house is showing signs of excessive ice buildup on roof edges? Two issues that need to be addressed.

- 1) In the short term, the roof may need to be cleared of snow and the buildup of ice may need to be removed from the roof edge to prevent snow-melt water from backing up into the interior of the house. Many roofing contractors provide this service. Working on a snow and ice covered roof is very risky, so homeowners should be certain the firm they hire is experienced in doing this type of work and is fully insured.
- 2) At some point, the underlying causes of the problem need to addressed. While this does not need to be done immediately, the homeowner may want to identify the problems and fix them before the next winter season. This will usually require the services of a home improvement contractor who understands basic building science and its application to problems such as excessive ice buildup.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

It's a new year, and the Town is busily putting together a work plan for the coming year and beyond. We are trying to engage in this process a little differently than we have in the past: our target is a work plan with goals beyond the next twelve months.

What do we want to accomplish this year, how can we build on these efforts to get where we want to be in five years, and how are we going to get there? We hope to build on a model, like the Gas Drilling Task Force or the Broadband Committee, that has worked well for the Town.

The now-forming Energy Task Force is another good example. Groups like these rely heavily on volunteers to scope out projects, understand short and long term goals, and write proposals to present to the Town Board for approval.

Our Town Clerk framed this question in an Email to our committees:

The efforts of communities such as Danby to alter how they function and how their needs are met in such areas as the use of energy in food production, transportation, home heating, will help determine community sustainability and quality of life in the future. Sustainability, a very broad topic, can include many community efforts in a wide range of areas, such as environmental protection and stewardship, economic vitality, and community well-being; and involves making decisions that will benefit future generations while addressing today's needs.

We would like to task you to look at your work in 2012 with the themes of sustainability, energy conservation, and climate protection in mind. Your help is needed in renewing and updating the Town's Vision, as well as working on specific objectives and strategies.

This will be a challenging effort. We will need to involve many different types of people. In addition to the scoping out goals, we will need writers, editors, researchers, public forums, education, and outreach efforts.

The Energy Task Force has had its first meeting. It was reassuring to see so many new faces and talents show up. Our bio-mass boiler is going to be online soon and its primary fuel will be wood chips. This effort to use sustainable and local resources to offset our fuel oil and gas fired boilers serves as an example of efforts the Town is putting forward. But it is only the first step.

What should our next generation fuels look like? Chips can be produced locally, but are there other ways that

we can bring fuel production (gas drilling aside, of course) closer to home?

Although efforts by Danby's Land Bank Coop could make ours a truly unique energy system, we are still some ways off from producing alternative fuels from local endeavors.

A useful project might be to inventory the alternative energy sources already used by our residents. How many wood stoves are in use, how much solar, wind, geothermal, and passive energy (sun rooms) systems have been installed? This inventory would be a resource for others to tap into, to ask questions about, and to get advice from.

Installing "new" forms of alternative energy is only the tip of the iceberg. Much effort needs to be aimed at informing residents about improving the energy efficiency of their homes—energy audits and general "tightening up"—to save on fuel costs, and about the resources that can help offset the initial cost of any needed work.

During the initial Energy Task Force meeting, someone commented that its goal should be to make Danby a showcase for ways communities can become less dependent on fossil fuels. Caroline has adopted a similar goal, and other municipalities are updating their Comprehensive Plans to encourage these efforts.

These are all laudable goals, but can only succeed with your help. Thank you one and all for your enthusiasm in getting us here, and we hope to see more of you in the future, working together to make this happen.

On the Virtues of Modern Fire Engines

Our current fire trucks were built as long as forty years ago--Danby's in 1975 and 1988 and West Danby's in 1990 and 1999--when fires were frequent, manpower was high, and almost everybody could drive standard.

They were built to be indestructible and to carry huge

amounts of water. Danby's engine and tanker have non-synchromesh manual transmissions, meaning that the driver has to match the



gear speed to the wheel speed in order to shift. Let me tell you, this takes some learning for anyone without a commercial driving history! A manual fire truck manufactured today wouldn't comply with the industry standard.

Right now, there are only about half a dozen people who can drive our engine or tanker. At Danby's last fire, one person drove both trucks to the scene, jogging back to the station to fetch the next truck.

Everything about modern fire trucks is firefighter friendly. They are automatic transmission, driveable, and optioned with features to prevent injury to the driver and damage to the truck. Equipment is within easy reach. The Jaws of Life are preconnected to a power source, ready to be pulled off the truck and put to work opening a crumpled car. The master stream (a high capacity water jet) is mounted and preplumbed on top of the truck, operable by one person. The higher capacity pump can draft more powerfully and push more gallons per minute, and it's programmed with fail-safes to protect the firefighters manning the hoses.

In short, tasks that would take multiple firefighters several minutes to accomplish with our old trucks could be achieved with less energy, less risk of injury, and faster by a single firefighter. A new fire truck would have additional qualified drivers. It would beat our old trucks up Danby's formidable hills and arrive faster on scene. Its equipment could be deployed quickly by two or three firefighters, who could even have energy left over to fight the fire or tear apart a wrecked car.

And, oh, it would be red.

Danby Renewable Energy Group

A new group has been formed to research and advise the Town about effective long-term strategies for sustainable/renewable energy sources for Town buildings and for its residents.

Our first meeting in January saw seventeen people discussing lots of options for projects. We are researching bulk purchase of solar panels to get the price down, and to work with a solar installer to get some on-the-job training for Danby residents.

Together with the Gas Drilling Task Force and Cooperative Extension, we're organizing the *Tighten Up Danby* event on February 9 in Town Hall. It'll demonstrate energy efficiency options and help connect residents with contractors and loan options. Low-interest, on-bill financing is beginning to become available in New York.

With the Danby Land Bank Coop, we will help organize a demonstration of a portable pelletizer in April.

There have been eight solar, and a number of geothermal, installations during the past year in Danby. We talked about having a tour, so residents to see what's going on, and learn how to pursue these options. We talked about getting wind legislation in place, to support large and small turbines. We hope to have many hands-on workshops this year.

Angela had not spent the winter in Danby since 2004. She preferred her little "double-wide" in the gated community in Zephryhills, Florida. Now January, Angela was still at the family home on the Comfort Road, and she was not happy.

There was nothing for her to do but wait for the next appointment and endure the ice and snow. "Rotten cancer," she hissed over her morning coffee, "I hate it...hate the dark and the cold."

Something changed in Angela one day when she was looking through some old photo albums. There she was, just a kid, with her brothers and sisters smiling like crazy during what looked to be a blizzard; all bundled up in those funny looking coats and hats that she still remembered.

They had been sledding; even in the old black and white, grainy photos of the era, it was clear that they were all having the time of their lives. Her brother, Tim, as usual, was licking back the inevitable river of snot streaming from his nose, a disgusting act that always made them laugh in delighted horror.

Angela remembered that day! She recalled that school had been cancelled. They had gone sledding and had to shed their wet clothes when they came into the house.

Funny that she never remembered being cold or uncomfortable, but she did remember the chaotic pile of

CUE CARDS FOR THE PUBLIC?

I had a dream the other night. It was one of those "test anxiety" epics. Here's the plot: there's a book report assignment with a twist. The teacher has a specific book in mind, but hasn't given out its title or the name of the author. Or, maybe, it was given and forgotten?

Arriving in class, *sans* book report, you find a few student leaders sitting up front around a table, discussing the book. Strangely, though, it seems as though some of them have the same predicament: they don't sound like they read the book, either. Or, maybe, they read a different book?

Some local government meetings can be a little like a test anxiety dream. ing discussed—the text of any potential laws, regulations, or resolutions—isn't available to the public. How do you know whether to support or to question a policy, if the details of the policy aren't available to you? One way this happens is when a participant personally prepares a document and distributes copies at a meeting—often enough, giving copies only to "important" participants.

Just remember the dream: they're taking the test, but the grade goes on your report card. You have to live with the results. You are a participant, too.

During the summer of 2011, the New York Senate and Assembly passed legislation intended to increase public access to documents being discussed by a public body. Six months later, the bill reached the Governor's desk; it was signed on January 3 and goes into effect in early February. Unfortunately, perhaps to avoid undue pressure on smaller governmental bodies, its language is somewhat vague.

"[Documents]...scheduled to be the subject of discussion by a public body...shall be made available, upon request...to the extent practicable as determined by the agency...."

This requirement can be satisfied by having paper copies available—a fee can be charged!—to

the public. If the agency (read: Town, County, Authority, etc.) maintains web site, the documents should be posted as soon as practicable, prior to the meeting. But, all the details are left open.

The Town of Danby, whose leaders were elected on a platform that included both transparency and inclusiveness, is typical of other small governments: it runs hot and cold. The generalities of some resolu-

tions are discussed at length and special public meetings are sometimes called to answer questions, while other resolutions are voted on with little or no public discussion, and some documents are presented for approval with no advance notice at all.

Tip O'Neill, Speaker of the U.S.House back in the good ol' days, coined the phrase, "All politics is lo-

cal." Many believe that Washington is a bottomless pit and that Albany is broken, but the closest level of your government—the Towns—is easily accessible. One evening of your time, once a month, is all it takes to participate and to show your leaders that you care.

Beginning in February, the law suggests that you will be able to, "read all about it." If your local legislators provide documents in a timely fashion and your local administration follows up by placing them on the web, you

should be able to do your homework at home.

The meeting room in Danby's Town Hall is equipped with a wireless network. The public can access online documents directly via laptop, or it can read them on one of the several public access computers in the room...but only if the documents are made available by legislators and administrators. It'll take considerate action on their part to allow the public to do its part of participating in the process.
