Danby Green Homes Tour Highlights Renewable Energy

Danby's [Renewable] Energy Group has put together a "Tour" of Danby homes on April 21, 10am-4pm. Modeled after Cooperative Extension's highly popular autumn-time event, the Danby Green Homes Tour will highlight what your friends and neighbors are doing to reduce utility costs while improving their homes.

Unlike that County-wide event, you'll be able to visit a lot of homes with a minimum of travel: in Danby, for Danby-ites.

The terms "sustainable" and "reducing carbon footprint" have been so popular lately—overused, some might say—that we all need to see some concrete examples of how they can improve our lives.

Many of the homes on the tour are making use of renew-

able energy sources—solar and geothermal are popular—while others demonstrate the effectiveness of improved energy efficiency. Either way, using less energy means lower energy bills and less impact on the environment.

In addition to solar electric and hot water panels and geothermal heat transfer, you'll see installations like a masonry stove that heats a home all winter using only three cords of wood, wood boilers that heat multiple buildings or homes, root cellars for inexpensive food storage, and much more. Some of these homes have the features built in, while others have been retrofitted with super insulation and other improvements. Several Danby homes have made a point of using locally harvested wood and environmentally friendly materials.



Town Clerk's Desktop

We're all familiar with the parking spaces designated for those with disabilities that impair mobility. For those who have never needed a disability parking permit, it may come as a surprise that the Department of Motor Vehicles does not issue those permits.

Should you get lame, short of breath, or disabled in any way that makes it difficult to walk long distances, the Town Clerk's office is where you come for one of those tags that hang from your rear view mirror. All appli-



cations are processed locally by an issuing agent in the city, town, or village where you live. In rural areas, this is usually the Town Clerk.

Permits are issued in the name of the person with the disability. This person does not have to be a licensed driver or even the owner of a vehicle. Children and persons who are legally blind are eligible for a permit. Medical certification is required, usually a letter or form

prepared and signed by a qualified practitioner.

Parking permits may be issued for either a temporary and permanent disability. Red hang tags—the temporary permits—are issued for up to six months, regardless of expected recovery date. They are issued to a person who is temporarily unable to walk without the aid of an assisting device (such as a brace, cane, crutches, wheelchair) or the assistance of another person.

Permanent hang tags are blue are issued for five years. These can be renewed as needed. Permanent permits are issued to persons who are not expected to recover from disabilities, such as arthritic conditions, lung disease, use of portable oxygen, or other impairments that impose unusual hardship in getting around.

"State" hang tags are valid in any designated space everywhere across the state, with two important exceptions.

- Cornell University issues its own permits. If you have a regular need to park there, you should contact Cornell's Department of Transportation for more information.
- New York City does not have on-street spaces reserved for persons with disabilities (the State permits are only valid in off-street parking lots). However, the New York City Department of Transportation issues a special City Permit for curbside parking.

The Danby Town Clerk's office recently filed a report with the NYS DOT, regarding the permits issued during 2011: we issued 37 permanent (blue) hang tags and 15 temporary (red) hang tags. Each year, though, is different; by mid-March of 2012, we had issued 3 blue tags and 6 red ones.

Speaking of access, consider taking advantage of a rare opportunity to visit homes in Danby that are making use of "green" sustainable energy or have other unique features. Many of your neighbors will open their doors to visitors and questions on Saturday, April 21. You can chat with them about solar electric and/or hot water, wind power, geothermal heat, passive solar construction, and other "non-traditional" heat and energy sources. There's even some examples of energy-efficient retrofits. More details can be found in other sections of the Danby Area News.

The end of March marked the close of the Town Clerk's involvement with the collection of this year's local taxes. Second installment payments of Town and County tax are collected in the Tompkins County Finance Office on Court Street in Ithaca. For everything else, the Danby Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday, and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. And yes, it's still possible to dip into the bowl of chocolate kisses.

Installing renewable energy features is not the only way to save on heating, cooling, and energy bills. You can also conserve energy through repair and insulation projects. On the tour, you can learn more about free energy audits, on-bill financing (set up so that your NYSEG bill stays the same as it is today, but a portion of it is paying the improvement cost), subsidized improvements (how about a 50-50 split of the costs?), and for those who qualify, outright free insulation.

Many of the homeowners on the tour can tell you what an energy audit involved, who they used, and what they learned.

Yes, you can see many interesting green features, but the Danby Green Homes Tour is more than shop talk. This event gives you the opportunity to talk to your neighbors and learn about what has worked for them and what they might have done differently. You can get ideas for your own home just by "looking around" and by learning from your neighbor's experience. Learn who did the work, what the cost range of your own project might be, and how the improvements or additions have worked out for a variety of other homes.

Best of all, the Danby Green Homes Tour is a great way to meet your neighbors, build community, and be inspired by the many ways that residents of Danby are renovating old homes, building beautiful new ones, and, oh yes, sustainably reducing carbon emissions.

It's a wonderful way to celebrate Earth Day.

One hundred years ago, the old Bald Hill Community was one of Danby's most close-knit neighborhoods. The Danby History Group invites you to enjoy an intimate visit with the families who lived on Bald Hill long ago.

Local history advocate Wayne Myers takes us on a, *Stroll Down Bald Hill in 1880* on Thursday, April 12. He will read another chapter from his book-in-progress on the Bald Hill community, and will display some of the photographs he has collected during his life-time. The program starts

at 7pm and is free and open to all. Refreshments will be served.

The area that is now the Bald Hill section of the Danby State Forest was once a thriving micro-community with a school, active farms, and supportive inter-relationships. Wayne Myers has dedicated himself to collecting and preserving the memory of the old Bald Hill community, through photographs, family histories, and other stories. The April 12 program will take up where an previous presentation on Bald Hill "genealogy" (the family inter-relationships on the Hill), and the impact of the Civil War on this community, left off. Myers will be available for questions after his reading.

Anyone interested in Danby history is encouraged to join the Danby History Group. This is an informal group of people interested in the history of people and places in Danby. The group is currently gathering information to be included

Supervisor's Update

Seabrooke Leckie, co-author of the forthcoming Peterson's Field Guide to the Moths of Northeastern North America will give a half-hour presentation about her new book and the extraordinary beauty and wonder of moths.

The new field guide has over 2000 color plates covering about 1500 species, over 1000 of which can be found in Danby. After her presentation, Seabrooke will have signed copies of her new field guide for sale. At about 9pm, weather permitting, she will lead a moth walk to a number of black light stations set up around Town Hall and the Danby Community Park. This event is enthusiastically sponsored by the Danby Conservation Advisory Council.

LIFE IN DANBY

Hello All! Lots of changes going on out there; I am watching a pair of courting cardinals by day and listening to the peepers by night (on March 15!). This is what I heard

from folks this month. If you have any sightings your-self—anything tree/plant/animal/bird related—I would love to hear about them. Please send them along to me at 607.272.2292x222

Here are this months submissions:

Amphibians/Reptiles: Bull Frog migration, Spotted Salamander migration, Wood Frogs, Peepers.

Weather: "I actually saw some snow, a few miles south of Danby, on one of my trips between NYC and home. It appeared to be pretty ordinary snow, you know, white and fluffy. At 60mph, it looked like insubstantial baseballs hitting the windshield. Not much, maybe none, of it was sticking to the ground (a good

thing, considering that my sighting was from the Interstate, where traction is important)."

Birds: (Early March sightings: Killdeer, Woodcocks, Robins, Redwing blackbirds, Phoebes, Tundra Swan) "On 5 February I was hiking, minding my own business. At exactly 4:50pm, I became aware of a slow but steady crescendo of heterophonic goose-honking. It sounded like a lot of geese, but it also sounded far away. Looking up, I saw the largest flock of geese I've ever seen, covering about 3/4 of the sky on the North-South axis, and 1/2 of it on the East-West. They were flying due South at an amazingly high altitude, and it was neither a single V nor multiple ones, but this large branching formation that looked as though some skywriter were attempting to diagram an impossibly complex sentence. It seemed to take forever for them to pass overhead. As far as I could tell, not having had binocs, they appeared all to be Canada geese. I'm familiar with the relatively soft honking of a snow goose, and if there were any of those, they were certainly drowned out."

Site Manager

Develop site layout based on existing site plan and participant lists.

Lay out site the day before event. Post copies of final site plan in Fire Station and on pavilion to orient arriving vendors/exhibitors. Be on site at least part of the "afternoon before" and on the "day of" to interact with people bringing tents, etc.

Confer with Fire Company on availability of tables and chairs for community exhibitors, make arrangements and verify volunteers to get

additional from Danby Church or Town Hall if necessary.

Organize site volunteers, create list.

Site Volunteers

Day before event: around 3 people needed to help set up a few tents and install handicapped parking signs. Day of event: around 5 people needed to move tables and chairs to some community exhibit sites, hang signs, and orient arriving vendors. Around 2 adults and a few kids needed to blow up helium balloons and distribute on site. Around 5 people needed each for an hour or so during the event to help run games. Around 5 people needed at end of

event for site cleanup, moving tables and chairs back, dismantling a few tents, removing parking signs.

Sign, Flag, and Pole Manager

Get banner updated at Kinko's, arrange for its installation at former Danby Market. Update message board banner, arrange for its installation above message board. Arrange installation of 20 flag or pennant poles near fire station, one or two weeks before event.

Arrange removal of the poles and banners after event, and their return to storage.

CAC OPTS FOR PLAIN VANILLA

Low cost. Basic. Generally applicable. Just a few of the ways that "plain vanilla" can be thought of. That's what the Danby Conservation Advisory Council (CAC) hopes to accomplish with a conservation easement project just getting underway.

We want a program that is accessible to most landowners, is inexpensive, and is simple. "Plain vanilla" seems to capture the idea that the easement terms are meant to be kept to a minimum. Our hope is to protect the land base in Danby from being developed as housing lots while, at the same time, preserving the landowners' options for using the land sustainably.

When a conservation easement is granted by a property owner to a qualified conservation organization (to the Town of Danby, in our case), the right to develop the property is ceded to the "grantee". This transfer is entirely voluntary. The receiver of the development rights can in no way use them. They effectively cease to exist.

Only if the conservation purpose disappears (for example, a preserve set up to protect a rare plant loses its purpose if the plant goes extinct) might a court be persuaded to extinguish a conservation easement. Since the primary purpose of Danby's program is to preserve open space, that avenue for extinguishing an easement is precluded. The only other ways a conservation easement can be undone are by an act of the NY State Legislature or by eminent domain. It is as close to permanent as anything can reasonably be.

One of the biggest impediments to donating a conservation easement is that the cost to the donor can be substantial. The cost to the conservation organization can also be substantial, since guarding the features that are covered by the easement becomes a perpetual ob-

ligation. By keeping those features and restrictions to a minimum, the costs to both the landowner and the Town can be minimized.

Because the Town's Comprehensive Plan includes a goal of protecting open space, restricting development on land in the rural parts of Danby can be undertaken pursuant to that goal and need not be justified on the basis of the special features of any particular property.

Doing plain vanilla easements won't necessarily be easy. Why? We all believe our properties are special! Adding provisions to specifically protect something about our property that we value and would like to see retained for future generations to enjoy is a great temptation. We aren't saying that it can't be done--if you have a really special property and want a more complicated easement to protect it, the Finger Lakes Land Trust might be a better choice for a conservation organization.

If you just want to make sure that your land will be there for future generations to use and enjoy as you and you predecessors have, then the Town's program is tailored to your needs. The Town gets the development rights (but can't use them); you get to keep and use the land.

The CAC is just getting started with easements. Our first easement is in process as of this writing. Guy Krogh, the Town of Danby Attorney, has graciously volunteered his time and expertise (which is substantial--he has worked with the Finger Lakes Land Trust and other conservation organizations) to help us develop this initiative. We all stand to benefit from its success!

Music Manager

Arrange for and schedule musicians, greet on site, arrange payment from event account.

Parade Manager

Send entry forms to potential participants by snail mail or Email. Compile list of registered entries, (prior year lists are available) put list in order for parade lineup, including descriptions of each entry. Verify Parade Master, Lineup Crew, and Parade Announcer, give them all parade info. Optionally, Email parade lineup list to participants shortly before the event.
