## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Danby Broadband Initiative Info Meeting Submitted by Ric Dietrich, Town Supervisor

I invite you, one and all, to a meeting on Broadband Internet on October 10. I will attempt to explain my journey during the past five years, all the way to our present situation...where I hope you'll be joining me and continuing forward.

Don't worry, it will not be a blow-by-blow story. You will hear about:

- The definition of Broadband from the Feds and New York State.
- Clarifying the speed numbers. What does Broadband give you that you don't have with, say, dialup access?
- A summary of two years of research by the County Legislature's Broadband Committee.
- A summary of the results of phone surveys and feedback from previous meetings with the county's residents.
- A description of two potential Broadband buildout projects that we are aware of. One of them, an exten-

sion of Cable TV service, is aimed at only a few houses, so we'll concentrate on the other, a fixed wireless system intended to provide service to almost all unserved households.

- Sample coverage maps illustrating wireless "poles" locations, potential signal quality, and the resulting speeds. These are not the final maps, but they are good examples.
- Some words about how the project buildout can be funded.
- And, yes, some words about what households might expect to pay for the service.

The Town Board recently agreed to "partner" with a local service provider to submit a grant application to New York State. If the grant is awarded, it


## Town Clerk's Desktop

### Budget...

The air is cool and crisp and the leaves are starting to turn the brilliant colors of Autumn. We may not have much in the way of apples or wild grapes to pick, but I'm busy canning and preserving peppers, tomatos, and green beans.

During this time of harvest and preparing for the next year, it's timely that we're also preparing the Town budget for 2013. I'm happy to realize that a few years of ex-



perience provides a better understanding of what we need, what we can do without, and what we can expect for the next year.

The Town Clerk works in cooperation with the Town Bookkeeper, the Town Board, and others to prepare the budget for the next fiscal year. This is very much a team effort. I hope that Danby taxpayers will know that we are doing our best to keep costs in line while assuring that we have everything in place to effective-

ly do the business of local government.

By adjusting numbers to reflect real need, and by a fair amount of reuse, making do, or doing without, we are looking towards a 2013 budget for the Town Clerk's office and the Town Hall itself that will be as flat as possible compared to recent years. Hours and wages for will be kept at an appropriate level. I appreciate the flexibility and efficiency of Mary Ann Barr (Records Assistant) and Sue McLellan (Deputy Clerk) and the willingness of our town staff to be creative about sharing work between offices. We've actually been able to reduce or eliminate budget lines in some areas.

While the Town Board sets policy and the Bookkeeper does most of the financial figuring, the Town Clerk is responsible for recording and maintaining a record of the budget for each year. Preliminary and final versions of each annual budget are available through our office. Many are also available via the Town web site.

Residents can play a part in the process by attending budget review meetings, becoming informed about the financial health of the town, and making concerns known. It's not so different from what each of us does for our home budgets. We take a careful look at what we need, conserve as much as possible, and hope for solid reserves to carry us into the future.

### Hunting Season - Deer Management Focus Area

In September, I reported that the NYS DEC had adopted a *Deer Management Focus Area* for a sizable portion of Tompkins County. According to the DEC web site, the purpose of such Focus Areas is, "to enable intensive management of over-abundant deer populations in defined areas." At that time, very little information was available about the Deer Management Focus Area... particularly what role (if any) local licensing agencies (such as Town Clerk's offices) have in the issuing of Focus Area permits and carcass tags. We've been keeping our eyes and ears open, and still don't know anything more that what was reported in September. Hunters and other residents with questions should contact the Department of Environmental Conservation directly via [dec.ny.gov].

Autumn office hours for the Danby Town Clerk are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday 10am-5pm, and Saturday mornings from 10am to Noon. As always we are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. ## WHAT IS FIXED WIRELESS?

Let's face it: if you're like me, you're probably more comfortable with a wired handset on your telephone than with a cordless. When you connect to the outside world via the Internet, you'd rather have a wire leading into your house, not an antenna.

Sadly, two or three miles outside of an urban area, the houses get farther and farther apart and the utility companies become less and less anxious to run wires for miles and miles. If you live in the parts of Danby known as the "gap", the digital wilderness, having Internet delivered to you by wire...may be pie in the sky.

Many of us have turned to stopgaps including satellite service, tethering computers to cellphones, and to using Mi-Fi (devices that convert a cellphone signal to a wireless, Wi-Fi signal; they work almost anywhere, but signal quality varies widely). A surprising number of cars are parked outside Town Hall with one or more occupants connected to its public access Wi-Fi signal.

Let's bring wireless communications into the picture. Many of us are used to *mobile* wireless, also known as "cell phones", but few realize that *fixed* wireless has been around a lot longer. All those big microwave towers, part of the backbone of national data transfer, are a form of fixed wireless. What's new in the fixed wireless toolkit is the ability to economically scale *down* to the residential level.

While cellphones ("mobile wireless") and fixed wireless are both radios, that's more or less where the similarity ends. They use different technology to communicate and have different strengths and limitations.

The bandwidth (data carrying ability) available to fixed wireless systems has far exceeded the capacity of mobile wireless. It uses different frequencies to better penetrate trees and other water-based interference. Its antennas are directional, less prone to interference and more able to deliver a good-quality signal using less power. This not only ensures better download speed (from the Internet to you), but lowers latency (the time it takes to make a round trip from your home to the Internet and back), and provides more upload capability (from you to the Internet) speed. Upload speed is vital for interactive uses (web- and mail-servers, two-way communications, and, yes, gaming).

Cellphone networks are designed to be flexible, to handle a wide variation in the number of simultaneous

users—up to hundreds or thousands—while a fixed wireless systems are pre-planned for a specific job.

The bottom line is that fixed wireless has many of the strengths of a mobile wireless, but few of the weaknesses. Line-of-sight (can my antenna see the "central" antenna?) is an issue for both.

The downside of wireless systems is that a lot of "central" antennas may be needed to ensure coverage in hilly regions like Danby. However, fixed wireless equipment and towers need not be nearly as large or as expensive as cellphone towers. More important, though, is that "a lot" may be a smaller number than you'd think.

Modern fixed wireless equipment can be mounted on forty- or fifty-foot telephone poles, just the same as those that carry electric and telephone wires. These mini-towers are inexpensive enough to serve five or ten households in a hidden valley.

A fixed wireless pole (a.k.a. ,a tower) typically has the capacity to handle 30 to 40Mbps; 80Mbps is not unusual and leading-edge systems are much faster. At 40Mbps, a typical issue of the Danby News would download in less than one-quarter second.

While this bandwidth is shared by the users of a pole, typical fixed wireless installations in our area have fewer than 50 users. This ratio compares very favorably to our local cable service, with its 20 to 40Mbps capacity divided among up to 200 users.

Service providers use mapping software that takes geography, trees, and ground cover into consideration. The software predicts what an antenna will "see" and how well it will see it, resulting in a "coverage map." Maps are color-coded to indicate signal quality.

Unfortunately, because these programs aren't perfect, test equipment is used to measure actual signal strength before residential equipment is installed. Unlike mobile-wireless-based systems, most users of fixed wireless links know what they're going to get...in advance.

The height of a residential antenna is a big part of the service equation. The small, flat plate antenna can be mounted in a window or higher up on a home. If necessary, a homeowner might mount it on, say, a pole near the residence.

Locally, the Town of Dryden recently installed a fixed wireless system to serve many hundreds (more than a thousand) households. All the reports, so far, say that it's been a success. Attend the information meeting on Wednesday, October 10, to learn about proposals to provide Broadband Internet to the "gap" in Danby.

would pay as much as 80 percent of the buildout cost. During the meeting, we also expect to discuss alternative paths we could take if we do not get the grant. If we decide to do it ourselves, what would would that look like?



Some of you have asked me why I am so hot on this Broadband issue, and others have challenged me about the product I have come to believe can provide good service for a reasonable cost to the majority (I am trying for 100 percent!) of residents in Danby.

I strongly believe that a

high-speed Internet connection to every household is a worthy goal—an essential ingredient—to all who live in Danby. It's a quality of life issue. It will affect who lives here, how they connect (literally) to the rest of the world, and why.

I expect and hope for a strong turnout from Danby residents who have been waiting for Internet access, or for more speed, better quality, or more reasonable costs, and would like to hear "details". I would also like to hear from people who might see things differently than I do, and from those who want to learn about the exciting possibilities Broadband can open up for all of us.

#### Also on the simmering burner...

I'm also spending effort on a sidebar issue: ongoing work on a new Cable TV franchise agreement with Time-Warner. Unlike Internet services, which are unregulated, Cable TV suppliers must be awarded a franchise; many municipalities in the County are working together to obtain a more favorable agreement with T-W. So far, our talks have not progressed to the point where T-W has offered a cost-effective Broadband service comparable to what we plan to talk about during the meeting. All that will be addressed at another, later meeting.

Pursuant to Town Law 176, the Board of Fire Commissioners must hold a public hearing before entering into the contract. The contract is a 4-year renewal of an existing contract with a 2% increase each year.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Proposed Budget of the Danby Fire District of the Town of Danby, State of New York, will be presented to the Board of Fire Commissioners of the Danby Fire District, for its consideration.

A PUBLIC HEARING will be held at 7pm at the West Danby Fire Station, 47 Sylvan Lane, in the Town of Danby, State of New York on October 16, 2012. (The Budget hearing must be held annually on the third Tuesday in October.)

I called Frontier back and said that others in my area were also having problems. They refused to do anything, saying they needed to hear from these people directly. It took all of these people complaining to get the problem, whatever it was, fixed.

I get no cell phone service at my house. Not just zero bars but a message that says, "Searching for Service." I thought that, perhaps, based on my success with Frontier, I might have the same success with Verizon Wireless. I called. Again I was told that I was the only person complaining and that they would do nothing about the matter.



If you pay for cell phone service from Verizon and feel that you are getting inadequate service or even no service, please call the phone number on your bill. Ask that a trouble ticket be created. Ask that an engineer be assigned to the matter. Only if we all

complain, complain will we get these large companies to take us seriously.

As always, to protect the innocent, I will not publish the location of your sightings, but will keep a record of where/when they took place. Here is what was sent to me recently:

Birds: Several bluebirds, pheasants, "Enjoying, and now missing, our resident swallows and hummingbirds (I swear the biting bug population went up just after the swallows left)."; "We have a barred owl in the woods next to the house and we had a lengthy conversation at 2am last night."; "Up until about two weeks ago, was

hearing Screech Owls almost every night. One night there were at least 3 in the same area, all talking to each other. Lots of turkeys, including hens taking large groups of growing chicks on field trips."; "We have numerous young bluebirds flying around our yard, two batches fledged from our

bird boxes this year. And there are Goldfinch galore enjoying the seeds on our wildflowers and catnip. A male Northern Harrier continues to cruise the fields, hunting for rodents. But most of the summer residents have sadly moved on."; "We were briefly puzzled by a sound in the night that turned out to be a begging cry of a juvenile barred owl."; "Many herons in a rookery."

Insects: Luna moth, Cottonwood Dagger-dines on poplar and willow, Giant Swallowtail, "Had an abundance of Painted Lady butterflies in our yard this year."; "A wild-looking caterpillar hanging out on a young birch tree proved to be a cercopia moth caterpillarnever got to see the moth itself."

Mammals: baby skunks, many twins, and triplet deer, "Almost all-white skunk with a limp."; "During the 3rd week in August, a bobcat ran right in front of my car."; grey fox.
