#### **SNAP!** PERFORMANCE



# Town Clerk's Desktop

"Hello. You've reached the office of the Clown Turk, Clown of Danby." April Fool. I've wanted to say that for several years and, if you telephoned on Monday, April 1, you might have heard it! We don't get many opportunities to play or be foolish in Town Hall. People come to our desk with serious questions and serious tasks—whether it's paying taxes, being issued a handicap parking permit, or requesting a marriage license.

Another serious, but lesser known, part of my job is



swearing in all Town officials, both elected and appointed: Town Board, Planning Board, Board of Zoning Appeals, Fire Commissioners, Commissioners of the West Danby Water District, and those who serve on the local Board of Assessment Review. Who swears in the Town Clerk, you might ask? The Town Supervisor performs that duty.

Each Town official must take an Oath of Office, during which they swear or affirm to support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitu-

tion of the State of New York, and to faithfully discharge the duties of their office to the best of their ability. These sworn and witnessed statements are among the documents which must—by law—be kept permanently in the Town archives. We now assure that each Oath of Office is saved by recording them in a bound book made of archival quality paper.

I recently swore in a Planning Board member, Naomi Strichartz, for a second seven year term. There are several Boards that still need members. Nancy Medsker's term on the Board of Zoning Appeals has ended and a candidate is sought for a five-year term. The Board of Zoning Appeals arbitrates and decides requests for property variances—requests for dimensions or use that is not permitted by Danby's Zoning Ordinance. These requests have included some types of subdivision, deficiencies in setbacks or frontage for structures, commercial uses in areas zoned residential, and other building anomalies. The BZA meets on a "as needed basis," when an issue must be decided.

If you are interested in the development, management, and protection of natural resources in the Town of Danby, you might be interested in serving on the Conservation Advisory Council. When fully "staffed" the CAC has 5 to 7 members, including, "a person engaged in agricultural use of land, a large landowner, and, op-

tionally, a youth 16 or 17 years of age at the time of appointment." The CAC currently has four members, none of whom meet those specific preferential categories. The Town Board encourages applicants who meet these categories. Members serve two-year terms. The CAC meets once a month. The next meetings are April 1 and April 29 at 7pm. Danby residents are always welcome.

In addition to these positions, the Planning Board is currently seeking a Secretary. Duties of this secretary are to attend Planning Board meetings and create minutes which will be available in Town Hall and on the Town web site, and become part of the permanent record of Danby activities. This is a paid position working closely with the Code Enforcement and Town Clerk's offices.

Applications, and more information, for all of these positions can be obtained through my office.

Spring has arrived on the calendar (April Fool?) and as Spring weather arrives in April, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. We are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And yes, there's still chocolate in the bowl by the Clerk's office window.

## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

By the time you read this we should have caught some wind and be on our way. After a long, tense wait, our Governor has announced that Clarity Connect has been awarded several million dollars to build out broadband internet service to parts of Tompkins and Cayuga Counties, and Danby is part of those parts.

As I write, I feel that we're still in the doldrums, afloat on a vast ocean. The present situation is little more than waiting patiently for the bureaucratic clogs to click and for information and movement to begin flowing. I fully expect to hear the go-ahead from the state to proceed during the last week of March. We should have a better understanding of the next steps by the time I write to you again, next month.

The Broadband grant is a welcome addition to the roster of funding we're been awarded recently: the West Danby Water District, the biomass boiler at the Highway barns, and a no-added-cost agreement to install solar electric panels at Town Hall. They are all current projects, each presents it own unique challenges, and all need constant supervision from our staff.

Our water and air are our greatest natural resources, and residents have a right to see these vital elements protected. The completion of the USGS study of our central aquifer has given us a better picture of our water resource, and has created a new awareness of its fragility. A wider discussion about all of Danby's water is in the works: a meeting of the Town and Planning Boards is developing, and its agenda may include an Aquifer Protection plan originating from the Gas Drilling Task Force.

Meanwhile, conversations about Youth Development (programming, employment, and more) are proceeding. I've been joined by our Community Council, which oversees these programs in Danby, in meetings with other Towns and the County Youth Bureau, brainstorming ideas to ensure the long-term success of the effort. Youth programs—in the county as a whole—need to adjust to new, narrower funding streams. This process will unfold during the spring and summer.

My notebook says that, last year, ice cleared from my pond by the 6th of March. My apple trees were getting impatient..and had flowers, just before they froze. This year, the chipmunks are still digging their way to the surface, and there's a lot of snow above the fourteen-hundred-foot line. I haven't found any groundhogs

around here to ask, "What happened to the prediction," of six or eight weeks of winter left. But, I have seen my first robins today, and maybe a killdeer. The geese have been beating a path northward, although they have become less frequent; I suspect the jet stream is not doing them any favors. The cardinals getting more and more aggressive in their song, and the wife claims to have heard the blackbirds.

Well, Spring has arrived, I can see its manifestations. Now all we need is warmer weather.

Sipping coffee out of his blue and gold *J'adore Paris* mug with its prominent fleur de lis, Hal decided that the trip had actually occurred, that he had not imagined the whole experience, and that he was glad. Hal was reaching that time in life when people can get more forgetful and unsure of where they have been and what they have accomplished.

The daffodils in the front garden were reaching up through the mulch with impressive determination, just as they had done for so many years; the cold and snow only temporarily slowing down their progress. This floral resurrection always reassured old Hal and he was very determined to live through another growing season.

Originally, they were off the grid, not getting any power from NYSEG, but now they are connected. Steve says, "There's nothing like watching the meter spin backwards on a sunny day. You can expect to get back your investment, but you're not going to haul in cash. It's just the right thing to do."

#### SOLARIZE DANBY

The solar power project organized by volunteers from Danby, Caroline, and Dryden is going forward. The program is called *Solarize Tompkins SE* (SE stands for the South East towns of Tompkins County).

The program is intended to remove the technical barriers and complexities encountered by homeowners and business owners interested in installing solar photovoltaic (electric) and solar thermal (hot water) systems, as well as offering lowered pricing through bulk purchasing.

The committee has sent requests for proposals to NY-SERDA certified installers. One or more installers will be chosen by the middle of April. Community interest has been high and we are already approaching 50% of our ideal number of interested residents.

If you are interested in getting more information about a solar installation for your home, farm, or place of business, please visit our website (see below) and fill the interest survey. There is no obligation, but your completed survey lets us know your interest so we can contact you.

Six community meetings, designed to answer your solar power and installation questions, are planned. They are scheduled on

- Tuesday, April 23 and Wednesday, May 1 in Dryden
- Tuesday, May 7 and Wednesday, May 15 in Caroline
- Tuesday, May 21, 7pm, Danby Town Hall and Wednesday, May 29, 7pm, West Danby Fire Dep't The meetings are free and open to the public; you are welcome to attend any or all of them!

Following the six meetings, people who enroll in the program will have their sites evaluated by the installers to determine the feasibility of a solar installation. The signup for enrollment will close by early July. It is our goal to have all installations completed by December 2013.

The Coalition for Safe Medication Disposal has set the date for its next Safe Medication Disposal Day. The event, which gives residents a chance to safely dispose of no longer needed household medications, will be held Saturday, April 27 at two locations: the TCAT garage (just off Route 13 on Willow Avenue in Ithaca) and the Slaterville Fire Station (2681 Slaterville Road). Hours are 10am-2pm.

Remember, you can also dispose of expired or unneeded

medicines in the County's first *Med Return* drop box, located at the Tompkins County Sheriff's Office, 779 Warren Road. The box is accessible 24-hours-a-day, seven days a week, year-round. Additional secure drop boxes will be installed at other locations in the coming months.

done during 2011. Unfortunately, she resigned at the end of the year, but we have replaced her with another wonderful leader, Simone Lackey, whose programs for the spring are already underway.

Julie's 2012 Annual Report was presented to the DCC during its March meeting. Here's some of the highlights:

- A total of 78 Danby youth participated in one or more of the 22 programs offered during 2012, up from the 68 youth in 2011.
- Participants' ages ranged from 8 to 18, with the majority being 9 to 11 years old.
- The programs were held at several locations: schools attended by Danby youth (South Hill Elementary and Boynton Middle), Dotson Park, the Town Hall, Bald Hill Road and Jennings Pond, and Three Swallows Farm.
- Many programs had a specific theme, such as helping with Fun Day or the Halloween Party, crafts, history, community service, and exploring Danby.
- Some programs were offered jointly with the Town of Ithaca (exploring the larger area) or other Towns' Youth Programs (homesteading).

These programs were more than recreational; they were super fun and had more than one adult wishing they could participate!

A perennial favorite has been Primitive Pursuits, held both spring and fall. It brought in staff from Cooperative Extension's hugely successful program, and provided a local version for Danby youth—at no cost to parents. This program got kids outside, learning a huge variety of skills in the woods and fields of June Pollack's property and Dotson Park while having tons of fun together.

The South Hill program included children identified by the school's social worker as needing extra help in social skills. It emphasized communication and problem solving while working as a group on special projects. The middle school programs helped Danby youth find each other in the crowd, building trust and working on communication and conflict resolution skills while having social fun together.

Programs like these are important for kids, but especially for the kids in Danby, who attend school in several different districts and have no other way to find each other and spend time together in groups.

Time spent with positive adult role models like Julie and Simone, learning and practicing the skills mentioned above plus many more, will impact these kids immediately and well into the future—in ways they cannot imagine. This kind of investment in youth, year after year, pays dividends to more than just the youth and their families—it helps build a community.

Suzy and Todd Rose, 115 Marsh Road, have had their solar electric system for over 10 years. Todd says, "Reducing electricity usage is just as important as, if not more important than, generating electricity from alternative sources. We use compact fluorescent light bulbs, energy-efficient appliances, a relatively small refrigerator, etc, and we try not to leave things turned on (lights, computers, etc) when not necessary. A penny saved=a penny earned; a watt saved=a watt

Steven Hilsdorf on Danby Road has had a solar electric system for about a year and a half. Steven says, "When I was deciding to put up the solar panels, a friend of mine said the cost seems high, but you would pay that much for a new car. But your new car will not pay you back. With the tax incentives it brought the cost of the system in half, and it was nice at the end of the year to get some of my tax money back. ### YOUTH PROGRAMS IN DANBY

Youth Development in Tompkins County is a hot topic these days. Efforts are underway to assess and define youth needs and to develop and fund programs that will achieve the goal of giving kids what they need to succeed...in the face of drastically reduced funding. This kind of effort is happening on the Town level, too, so expect to hear more about it in the future.

Most, if not all, of our Danby-specific youth development programs are offered through the Danby Youth Program, managed by the Danby Community Council. In fact, youth programs make up almost half of the DCC budget and are primarily funded by the United Way and the Town of Danby. Most of this funding pays

for a half-time Youth Program Manager, who develops and runs seasonal programs throughout the year. The Manager works as an employee of Cornell Cooperative Extension, with whom the DCC contracts for this purpose. Other funding is used to employ Danby teens during the summer, giving them a chance to gain valuable work experience while providing excellent help on the job, including at the Town Hall.

Let's look at what went on with the existing Youth Program in Danby during 2012. Julie Kulik was the Youth Program Manager, continuing the great work she had
