

Town Clerk's Desktop

Town Board meetings, public hearings, court cases, youth programs, concerts and recitals, book sale, community meetings, and presentations about our aquifer. There's a great variety of things happening in the Danby Town Hall. The building and grounds, which lie close to the geographic center of Danby, are its governmental and operations center. Keeping track of all of these meetings and events and assuring that different groups are able to use the center without stepping on

each other's toes is part of my job.



The Town Clerk (in Danby, at least) is also the *Keeper of the Calendar*. The first priority, of course, is to provide meeting space so town government business can take place. The Town Board meets twice a month to take care of regular business—including oversight of the Town's financial obligations (reviewing bills and vouchers, approving expenditure of funds, awarding bid contracts for larger projects and overseeing the progress of the same). The Planning Board meets once a month. These are

vital activities, even if they sometimes seem dry, esoteric, or microscopically complex in their details.

The Town Hall also houses the Danby Town Court. Every Tuesday evening, our local Justices deal with the business of minor cases related to traffic violations and violations of local ordinances. Once a month, usually the first Tuesday, more complex cases involving the office of the Tompkins County District Attorney are heard by the court. Occasionally a full court case involving a jury is held in Town Hall.

Not all of the activities at the Town Hall are so serious. The Danby Community Council sponsors youth programs and concerts throughout the year. The Town Hall regularly rings with the laughter of children during Wednesday afternoon programs. Simone Lackey leads young people in a wide variety of creative and exploring activities, both indoors and across the street in the Community Park.

Recently, the staff in Town Hall, spellbound by small and large birds of prey shown by Cornell's Raptor Program, joined the youth group for a school-break educational program. The raptor program will be repeated in June, and all Danby residents are invited.

The 2013 concert series has begun with a family-friendly Storytelling program (accompanied by cello) in April. The May concent will venture into nautical music, with a concert by *The Johnson Girls*. Later in the year we can expect additional classical, folk, or jazz music concerts. These concerts generally take place on Sunday afternoons are are open to all.

The Town Hall serves the needs of the community in many ways. Our local library/reading room is also a computer center with Wi-Fi and computer terminal access. Some residents spend time here regularly, using the Internet for their jobs, to check Email, or to search for information.

Spring Rabies Clinics: not in Danby

Many pet owners in Danby rely on free rabies clinics, provided by the Tompkins County Health Department, to keep their cats and dogs up-to-date on rabies vaccinations. Danby usually hosts one of these clinics, but that event is *not* on the calendar this spring. Other clinics are in Lansing on May 1, Ithaca on May 8, Enfield on May 9, and Dryden on May 15. Office Hours

In May, as Spring blooms, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. With summer hours in effect, we will be closed on Saturdays from May into August. Clarity has said that, to some extent, the order of buildout locations will be determined by the level of interest shown. That means people who are interested might well ask neighbors to register *their* interest as well!

The online survey can easily be found on Clarity's web site, [clarityconnect.com]. Click on the "Contact Me About Wireless Internet" button.

If you already have service—e.g., Time-Warner, Verizon, etc.—and you're happy with it, don't worry, this needn't change anything for you. On the other hand, while the buildout is intended to cover only those regions where there is no other service, radio doesn't know about political or commercial boundaries. As a result, the project may give you a service choice that you didn't have in the past.

Over the past few months, a number of people have contacted me with questions about the project and its coverage. I've tried to respond with a guess at the quality of service to be expected, based on an old, preliminary map of proposed coverage (the same map that was exhibited during the Broadband Info meeting in Danby on 10-Oct-2012). I can still do this. Contact me at 607.273.8678 or [danbybroadband@tedcrane.com].

Clarity Connect is surely the best source of information about this project, but here's a summary of answers to frequently asked questions.

What Does It Cost and What Do I Get?

Monthly cost for basic service is between \$35 and \$45; paying quarterly or annually is less expensive than paying monthly. Discounts for income-limited households are available. There is a one-time installation fee. Basic service provides about 6Mbps bandwidth; this is comparable to or better than our local cable service. There is no bandwidth cap! Higher speed service—up to and beyond 32Mbps—is available, particularly where there is strong signal coverage. It costs more.

When?

Buildout should take about six months, once the funding stream is in place. A more specific timeline may be available soon.

How Do I Get My Signal?

An antenna is mounted on your house (or any other unmoving object). This antenna points at one of the "towers", and the "tower" has to be visible to the antenna. The higher up the antenna can be mounted, the better the chance for a good signal. The wireless signal can pass through some thickness of trees, but the fewer the better.

What's a Tower?

Most of the communication towers used by this wireless system will be no more than telephone poles, and most of them will be located near roadways (where electricity is easily available).

The system will also utilize a few *existing* "big" towers, like the one on Curtis Road.

What If I Can't Quite See A Tower?

Danby is full of hills and valleys, and some houses are in locations that do not have a good line-of-sight view of any of the proposed "towers". Sometimes, installing the wireless antenna on a telephone pole "tower", adding a few extra feet of height, can make a big difference. Clarity has confirmed that the grant funding includes —in a limited number of cases—the cost of installing that telephone pole! If you're in a marginal coverage situation...you have a huge incentive to register your interest promptly.

What Happens If I See Several Towers?

This is a "fixed wireless" system. Your antenna is aimed at only one tower, and each tower is configured to serve only a limited number of antennas. Your signal will not be lost because the tower you're talking to becomes too busy.

Cellphone-based wireless systems, a.k.a "mobile broadband" work differently. If you're moving, or if a tower becomes too busy, your connection can be re-routed to any available tower. If a handoff fails, your connection drops. This doesn't happen in a fixed wireless system.

What If My Neighbor Can See A Tower?

If one household in a cluster of houses can "see" a "tower", a repeater can be installed to serve the other houses. The repeater might be installed on a telephone pole (see above). Yes, each household has to pay for service, but this option allows service to extend into otherwise unreachable locations. That's more incentive to get your neighbors involved!

Why Isn't My Neighborhood Covered?

In most cases, it's because an existing provider claims that service is available. OK, you know better than that but, to minimize the chance that one of these providers would complain and try to block the grant, the build-out aimed to provide service *only* where there is no existing coverage. Then there are cases where a provider offers service, but only after the customer agrees to pay a substantial installation fee. And, sometimes, the terrain prevents a clear line-of-sight to a "tower". In all of these cases, it's worth checking whether the installation of a telephone pole in your neighborhood will help. \$

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

An initial "interest" survey of potential wireless broadband customers is online. Eventually, your interest will lead to specific information from Clarity Connect, and you will be able to sign up for service. I encourage you to visit the survey page (see separate article in Danby News). I am concerned that some of you might be "out of the loop", information-wise, and I want to be sure you aware of this exciting new program. Your feedback is needed to see what can be done to include you, and this can only happen if we know who you are!

The County Broadband Committee met in late April, and was given its first major post-grant-award update. As you may have heard, almost all coverage in the Towns of Caroline and Enfield was omitted from the grant award; while some Caroline residents will be served by the Danby coverage, a few Danby residents may be affected by the "Caroline gap". Right now, talks are underway to get a handle on this loss.

I know this is slow going and—for all of you who are waiting patiently for this service—I am still optimistic that the buildout will happen this year.

Solar panels are still on schedule for installation this month at Town Hall. On the Solar-Power-At-Home front, informational meetings (in Danby and West Danby, and around the County) are scheduled during May by the Solarize Tompkins project (see separate article). Like the Broadband project, Solarize asks that you respond to show interest; your response doesn't commit you to participate.

The Town Budget has been on our Board meeting agenda lately. We have been in contact with the State Comptroller, and the Board was given information that they made available to us. This checklist is a way for the Board to more accurately isolate the different checks and balances within Municipal Law, and should result in a more useful way for the Board to monitor the Town's finances. We will be setting up some working sessions for the Board, and these should put us in a more enlightened state when, later during the summer, we roll into budget season.

We should also be hearing back from the courts on the legality of the Town of Dryden's ban on fracking; it may be a bellwether for our own ban on large-scale industrial activity. The hearing was held in Albany a couple weeks before this writing, so between now and the first part of June we should know whether we were successful or not.

We are holding a public hearing in West Danby on May 8, to move the Water District project forward. I hope to see you all there.

The Town Board approved additional renovations for our bathrooms, and we are seeking bids for the floor of Town Hall. I believe that Town Hall represents part of our heritage, and should be taken care of as a symbol of what we were...and a statement of commitment to our future.

Town Hall is an old building, one we should feel proud of, and it gets a lot of traffic. The Town puts taxpayer money away every year for this purpose; do you believe this practice should continue? I have heard from some of you, who feel we are just throwing money away.

The Highway Department opened bids for its new truck, and the Board approved its purchases, to be paid out of money set aside for this purpose.

The County's Youth Services Department will be meeting at the end of April with interested municipal leaders. CYS will present a recent "needs" report and is soliciting feedback. These ongoing dialogs are designed to find a sustainable direction for the future.

SOLAR SYSTEMS OF DANBY, PART 2

Last month I highlighted some of the 12+ homes in Danby that have solar power. Here are some more.

Tom Seaney and Nancy Medsker of 67 Marsh Road have both a solar electric system (installed last Fall) and a solar hot water system (installed 4 years ago). Tom says, "This time of year when we don't see the sun for days, it's a challenge to get excited about using solar energy. But the benefits are real when you see the water temperature on your solar storage tank get up to 150 degrees at the end of a sunny day or when you look at the electric meter and see the arrow pointing to your house as the source of the electricity instead of the grid." Larry and Barbara Chace of Durfee Hill Road had a solar electric system installed by Taitem Engineering last summer and are happy with it. The system provides up to 50% of their electricity, the biggest user of which is their geothermal heating system. Larry can be contacted at [rlc1@etnainstruments.com].

Zelda and Jake Blaine on Muzzy Road have had solar electric for 4 years and solar hot water for 5. "We love the systems, both are very low maintenance."

Another family in Danby, who preferred to remain anonymous, has had a solar electric system for 12 years. "We are very happy. They system has nearly paid for itself already. The State and Federal incentives are not as great now as they were when we got ours, but still worthwhile."

Guillermo Metz and Amanda Walts on Durfee Hill Road have solar electric for 8 years. Says Guillermo, "Solar electric (PV) systems are very simple, particularly when you're grid-connected (we're not and that has led to some complications with system components). I think the panels themselves are beautiful and the idea that they are collecting energy and making electricity is remarkable. We are looking into installing solar thermal." And finally, I want to mention my solar systems. I have both solar electric and solar hot water. I love to look at the meters at the end of the day to see what we generated that day. We got a good deal from a State program for people who heat their water with electricity who want to convert to solar. FRACKING AUTHORS SPEAK

Two authors of recently published books dealing with gas drilling came to Cornell University during April, and talked about their books and their experiences with gas drilliing.

Tom Wilbur, the first speaker, writes for the *Binghamton* Press and Sun Bulletin, and has been writing about gas drilling for several years. His book is called *Under the* Surface. He was not a very good speaker, but the message he wanted to get across to the audience was a very important one. appreciate these Up until now, drilling has occurred in distant places where we could ignore the costs and benefits of it. Now it's in our backyards, and we are much more engaged. More importantly, we are thinking more about the larger energy questions of our day. This is a good thing, Wilbur argued. I have not read his book yet, but plan to soon. A copy of it will soon be in Danby Community Library for anyone else to read.

Seamus McGraw was more entertaining as a speaker and his book, *End of Country*, is also quite easy to read. His mother lives near Dimock, PA, and has leased her farmland to the gas industry. He described the various people who have become active in working on the gas drilling impacts in that area, and has written very well on the industrialization of this hardscrabble farming community.

McGraw's book has a good section on the development of natural gas in this country. He tries to be impartial about whether it is a good thing or not, but does not hesitate to describe the mistakes made and damage done to the land in and around Dimmock. He draws a good picture of the background of the residents of this area, and the financial stresses that these farmers are facing due to the decline of small farming in the Northeast. The book's narrative ends around 2009/10, so there are recent events that occurred that we don't hear about. This book will also be in the Danby Community Library.

Anyone who is interested in reading about this topic, and is tired of the stridency of some of the discourse in the last few years will appreciate these two authors, who are attempting to present a more neutral approach to the question.
