

# West Danby Water District Update

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### TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

#### **Budget** Time

It's officially Autumn, but where are the apples? Last year, our region enjoyed an abundance of apples. This year, only the commercial orchards have fruit. The natural "boom and bust" of apple harvest reminds me that, even with careful planning, we can never be 100 percent certain what to expect during the next year. Planning for municipal budgets requires a multi-year approach. We look carefully at what we need, conserve



as much as possible, and hope for solid reserves to carry us into the future.

The Town Board has begun the 2015 budget planning process by undertaking an internal audit of all Town fiscal matters. The Board has scheduled several extra meetings, dedicated to budget review and planning, in October. Meetings (in the Danby Town Hall) are set for 7:30pm on October 6, 6pm (prior to the regularly scheduled meetings) on October 13 and 20, and 6pm on October 27.

The Preliminary budget should be available for community review at the end of Octo-

ber. A formal Budget Hearing, when residents may comment on the budget and the Town Board will vote on its adoption, is scheduled for 6:30pm on November 10.

The Town Clerk works in cooperation with the Town Bookkeeper, the Town Board, and others to prepare the budget for the next fiscal year. This is very much a team effort. While the Board sets policy and the bookkeeper does most of the financial figuring, the Clerk is responsible for the official record of each year's budget. Preliminary and final versions of the budget are available. Residents can take part in the budget process by attending budget review meetings, becoming informed about the financial health of the Town, and making concerns known.

The Town Board is responsible for three of the four sections of the budget: General Fund, Highway Fund, and the West Danby Water District budget. The fourth section, the Fire District budget, is included in the Town of Danby tax assessment but it managed by the Fire District.

The Water District budget includes funds to pay the Water District commissioners and all fees related to the upkeep of the West Danby Water District. The Highway Fund includes most of the budget lines related to the care and maintenance of our roads. The General Fund includes everything else. By adjusting numbers to reflect real need, we are looking towards a 2015 budget for the Town Clerk's office and Town Hall that will be almost unchanged from that of recent years. Last year, we were able to reduce and eliminate budget lines in some areas. This year we continue to look to what we can cut, while adjusting non-tax revenues (such as clerk fees and dog licenses) upwards. Changes to hours and wages for myself and my support staff will be at the same rate offered to all other Town employees. I appreciate the flexibility and efficiency of Mary Ann Barr (Records Assistant) and Sue McLellan (Deputy Clerk) and the creative ability of Town staff to share work between offices.

Information and history about the Danby budget can be found on the Town web site. PDF versions of the budget for the past three years is located at the very bottom of the "TownBoard" page, [town.danby.ny.us/ TownBoard].

During October, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. As always, the Clerk's is closed on Sundays and Thursdays. And yes, there's plenty of chocolate in the bowl at the Clerk's office window.

# COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

Think about this: If I bought the exact same things this year as I bought this year, if I took the exact same vacation as I took last year, and if I hired the plumber and the roofer and landscaper for the same number of hours this year as last year, it will actually cost me more this year than last year. The cost of materials generally goes up and so does the cost of labor, services, and health insurance. Things cost more, even if they are the same things as last year.

This is the basic idea behind the County budget this year. We don't plan to do much new this year, but the cost of doing business will still be rising. It will cost more in 2015 than in did in 2014 to provide the same recycling pick up at your house, to keep the library open the same number of hours, to keep the roads plowed, etc.

Mandated costs from New York State continue to rise, and there is nothing we can do about that. County employees will be getting a small raise this year, as per their contract. The price of asphalt and road salt and health insurance have gone up.

In order to factor in these and other cost increases and still keep the tax rate reasonable, we have asked each County department to cut their non-mandated expenses by 1 percent. If you take that 1 percent decrease and combine it with the mandated increases, the result is a 2.34 percent increase in the budget. What that means for an average home in Tompkins County (with a value of \$165,000) is a County tax increase of \$6.34. However, Governor Cuomo has instituted something called the 'tax freeze'. What that means this year is that you will receive a refund from NY State equal to the increase in your County tax bill. So the average homeowner's tax increase of \$6.34 will be refunded to you, for a net tax increase of zero.

The Solid Waste Fee in Tompkins County, which is charged to each household, is going down this year from \$56 to \$52. That means that along with the tax freeze, the average homeowner in Tompkins County is actually going to see a decrease in their total tax bill of \$4 from last year.

There are other factors that may play into what your tax bill is actually going to be, and I can't address all the possibilities here. Bottom line: the average taxpayer will pay \$4 less to the County this year.

I am happy to hear your input about the budget as we go along. Also, there will be a public hearing about the budget on October 8, 7pm, in the Tompkins County Public Library.

# SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Land use issues seem to be at the top of the list of what the Town and Planning Boards, along with the Conservation Advisory Council, are working on, but there are other topics that the boards have on the "to do" list.

These include emergency management certification, Health Care Consortium workshop, Town-wide water resource maps, construction projects for Highway, the Water District, contract negotiations with Time-Warner and Tompkins County Animal Control, and updates to our Email handling and web site.

Budget workshops will soon be crowding this agenda, but we'll keep on with the everyday business of running the Town: paying the bills, keeping the lights on, and just keeping on keeping on.

Yes, Broadband is still out there, waiting for the green light from the State (in the form of money!) to move ahead.

There is a common thread in all of the above, nothing happens the way you might think it should and everything takes longer than reasonable, gets more complicated than expected, and all because there are unforeseen new things always cropping up.

Town business takes an inordinate amount of time. Most boards meet only once a month. That is not to say that work is not being done outside meeting times, but there is a legal constraint that all decisions must be made by Boards during public meetings. Public input, feedback, needs to be a part of the equation. Staff, on the other hand, work regular hours, but must check in with Boards for approval and assignments during the public meetings.

For most of the year, the Town Board meets twice a month to stay on top of events, understand the ins and outs of contracts, land use regulation, budget restraints, and legal procedures. During October, the Board will be meeting every Monday to work on the 2015 budget. The Water District is being certified in its new software programs and, yes, is still working to keep the water running.

All these meetings are open to the public and I welcome you all to attend--or read the minutes--to keep track of the progress we are making.

We have passed the one-year anniversary of our Solar PV installation and are now able to better understand our energy use over the course of the year. We will be reviewing changes to specific areas—the big one being winter heating—to improve our energy usage.

It seems as though the Town is challenged with at least one new development every week. Bus transportation, critical to many, is threatened this week. Old zoning laws no longer seem to reflect neighborhood growth, and we are just finishing up a water supply problem at Town Hall.

Life in Danby is a moving target. Enjoy your Autumn!

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### Danby Fire District Receives Grant

During the past two and one half years, the Danby Fire District has responded to over 50 motor vehicle

accidents and has had to use extrication equipment, the *Jaws-of-Life*, in a high percent of these where seconds count.

Our Fire District contains two Fire Companies, both volunteer, one in Danby (on NYS Rt.96B), and the second on Sylvan Lane in West Danby. Each station has emergency rescue equipment including the *Jaws of Life*.

The high pressure hydraulic pump driving the cutting tool on the Danby Rescue Truck was failing and pronounced irreparable, and the spreading tool on the West Danby Truck has been a continuing concern of the fire chief.

Neither of these items were in this year's budget and contingency funds, designated for other purposes, were eyed.

However, the Triad Foundation stepped forward and awarded a \$15,000 grant to the Fire District to replace the failing parts of these high pressure systems.

The District members, Chiefs and Commissioners extend a big Thank You on behalf of the community to the Triad Foundation.

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#### TILTING YOUR SOLAR ARRAY Submitted by Ted Crane

Are you the proud owner of a Solar PV (electric) system, perhaps installed through *Solarize* or *SolarTompkins*? If you are, and if you have an adjustable (tiltable) mount to grab more of the solar energy, this article contains a helpful tool to determine your array tilt.

I've been adjusting my Solar PV arrays every few weeks since they were installed last year (by coincidence, the installation date was December 21, the solstice, the darkest day of the year). Sometimes I estimate the angle using the shadow of a pencil held perpendicular to the array; when it vanishes, the panels are at right angles to the sun. That works, but it's quicker to know the angle in advance. So, I've prepared a chart of dates and angles.

To do the job right, you'll want a tool to measure the angle. Several stores sell a "Magnetic Protractor" for less than \$10. You stick the protractor to the underside of the array and its moving arrow indicates an angle.

It's usually easy to tilt if the arrays are well balanced. One person can do it in a minute or two, most of the year, but two always make it safer. Around mid-sum-

mer, when the arrays are nearly horizontal and harder to reach, two people are a very good idea.

The chart is optimized for the Town of Danby. It uses the location of Town Hall (*GPS: 42.354, -76.482*) for its calculations. Town Hall is near the center of Danby, so the difference between it and your home is negligible.

Your array travels from nearly vertical in the winter (December 21, the winter solstice) to nearly horizontal in the summer (June 21, the summer solstice) and then back again. This means that the same angle is used twice a year. For example, you can set the array to 22° on both May 21 and July 21, since they are about one month distant from June 21, the spring equinox [caveat: months aren't all the same length, but the chart is "close enough"]. To make things easier, the chart includes angles for dates at two-week intervals.

You probably won't adjust your arrays on the exact dates given in the chart. No problems: estimate. I like to set the arrays at an angle that would be "correct" a few weeks in the future...and then come back again a few weeks after that date. Bear in mind that the angles change rapidly around the equinoxes and slowly around the solstices.

The chart also has a column illustrating that adjustabletilt arrays produce a lot more electricity than equivalent fixed-tilt arrays. If you choose a roof-mount or a fixed ground-mount, its fixed angle is usually based on its latitude (in Danby, something like 42.354 degrees). Twice a year—on the equinoxes—it will be exactly at the correct angle; the rest of the year it isn't. At worst (the solstices) as little as 60% of the sun's energy is available to the PV panels. A tilt mount costs a bit more, but can produce 20 percent more electricity from the same panels.

So, clip this chart. You can laminate it or cover it with clear packing tape to protect it from the weather and attach it to the underside of your PV array.
