The Wonderful World of Bats and Bat Detecting

I would like to invite people of all ages to to join me on a "bat walk". Come and learn about the bats in our region.

On Sunday, May 17, we will use bat detectors to hear bats' echolocation calls as they search out and eat their insect dinner. Be prepared to see (and hear)



these often misunderstood animals in a new light.

I am not a bat biologist but I design bat detectors for a living. I know, I know, it is still strange to me, too. I will

provide a nice overview of the bats around us and why they need our help, but my main expertise is in the electronic gizmos that are used to detect bats--and in the echolocation calls the gizmos detect. I will dive into those subjects and will have several types of bat detectors on hand. I'll demonstrate how to use them before we whare them and go outside.

We will meet in Danby's Town Hall at 7:15pm for a talk and then head out to Dotson Park, across the street, at 8:15pm for our walk. Sunset is at 8:20pm, so it should still be bright enough to see what the bats are doing in the sky as we hear their calls.

Spring is finally arriving and we're having a bit of spring fever in the Clerks' Office. Here's a wee bit of what's happening with our support staff, Deputy Clerks Sue McLellan and Mary Ann Barr. Mary Ann Barr is not only a conscientious and meticulous archivist for our historical town records, she is also a recognized artist. You may see her paintings and drawings at Brookton's Market in Brooktondale and in other gallery spaces around Ithaca.



We send a well deserved "Congratulations" to K-9 Sargeant Tyson, a beloved black lab who is living with Sue McLellan and fellow retired Marine Mike McLellan. On April 15, Tyson was honored by the Red Cross as a military hero. During two tours of service in Afghanistan (and one in Iraq), Tyson specialized in sniffing out Improvised Explosive Devices, drug detection, and patrol work. Two years ago, after suffering wounds--but no lasting injuries--from a bomb blast, Sargeant Tyson was decorated and honorably dis-

charged. He went into the adoption lottery, and Vietnam Veteran Mike quickly bonded with his new canine friend. Tyson has learned to help Mike with his war-related disabilities, learning to pick things up (overcome earlier training not to put things in his mouth) and easing stress when Mike feels down.

We always enjoy Tyson's gentle, happy visits to Sue when Mike swings by Town Hall. Clearly Sargeant Tyson is thriving in his well-deserved military retirement and has made a smooth transition to civilian service. As is true in most other New York State Towns, Danby is pleased to offer a license fee exemption to retired "War Dogs" and other service animals.

In other news, we have had a lot of extra meetings and lengthened meetings during the past month. You will find extra sets of minutes for these minutes on the Town web site, under "Boards and Committees."

Some of these meeting have been to facilitate the process of re-staffing the Code Enforcement office. Code Officer Matt Cooper is moving to New Mexico at the end of May, where he will pursue a graduate degree in architecture. We look forward to working with new staff. Paul Hanson (a Danby resident) will be the new Zoning/Code/Fire Officer. During the 1980s, Hanson

worked for the Town of Ithaca Zoning office as a building inspector; more recently he's been doing home inspections for bank loans from the Alternatives Federal Credit Union. At the same time, he has operated a private construction and design business with a specialty in LEED and green construction.

The Code office and Clerk's office work closely together. We process the funds that come in for building permits, land division fees, etc. We also collaborate on documentation and notification of new addresses and public hearing matters and official resolutions which need to go before the Planning Board and the Board of Zoning Appeals. This is an exciting time for the Code Office, and we're happy to support them.

Through mid-May, the Town Clerk's office is open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-Noon on Saturdays. During the summer and gardening season, the office is closed after Mother's Day weekend, but hours can be arranged by special appointment. As always, we are closed on Sundays and Thursdays, and there are chocolate kisses in the candy bowl.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

I remember first hearing about fracking in 2007 from Town of Danby Supervisor Ric Dietrich, who warned of an upcoming issue involving something called the Marcellus Shale. It was not on most people's radar yet. I did not realize at the time what a major concern this would become for so many people locally and statewide for years to come.

In 2011, I was proud to be a key member of the team that enacted a fracking ban in Danby. In 2014, New York State announced a statewide ban.

However, there are ways in which we are still vulnerable to the negative effects of the fracking industry. One involves the disposal of fracking waste coming out of Pennsylvania.

Part of the fracking process (and other petroleum extraction and storage operations) involves injecting large amounts of water into the ground. That water is brought back up, laced with salt, a variety of potentially harmful chemicals, and low levels of radioactivity.

A big problem for the fracking industry is what to do with that contaminated water. One solution (pardon the pun) they have come up with is to sell it inexpensively to municipalities, who use it to spread on their roads to melt snow and ice.

I wrote (with a lot of help) and introduced a law, which the Tompkins County Legislature passed last month, making it illegal for this to happen in Tompkins County. The law stops anyone from disposing of this material anywhere in Tompkins County, including underground. It also prevents solid waste and wastewater treatment facilities from accepting fracking waste for treatment.

I am proud to be part of the efforts to keep our local environment clean and healthy, and our quality of life high. We should not take these things for granted.

Getting something like this passed is a team sport. I owe thanks to the attorneys who gave advice, the highway superintendents who will be most affected by this law, and the Caroline resident who first approached me with the idea.

JOYS OF JUNK MAIL...AND ZIPCODES

Living in two places can be quite an experience. A learning experience with unexpected prizes. For one, I've learned that I depend on junk mail.

For some time now, I've had two addresses in Danby: the old place in the Ithaca/14850 ZIPcode, where I've lived for more than 38 years, and the new place in the Spencer/14883 ZIPcode. The two are different in many ways, but I've been most surprised by how much a three-mile difference can make to the content of my US Mail mailbox. The three miles just barely crosses an arbitrary border imposed by the Post Office, and it's a different world out there.

So far, almost all of what little I've received in Spencer is what many people call, "Junk Mail." You know, unsolicited advertising. It sure looks like Spencer is wild about cars. All the junk mail seems to be brightly colored advertising on heavy paper, each one happily telling me that—if the attached car key works—I may have won a new truck. And, oh yes, maybe one or two sample local newspapers from Spencer/Van Etten...obviously wonderful towns, but towns that I usually pass through on the fly. I've been on foot in Spencer a only handful of times.

What I'm missing, it seems, is the wide variety of announcements that arrive regularly in my Ithaca mailbox. Restaurant coupons, department store coupons (I think Kohl's has given me well over \$100 of free merchandise), hardware store coupons, and more. I hear about the Flax sale in Ithaca. In Ithaca, I get a variety of telephone books. In Ithaca, there are few auto ads, except from the dealer/company whose car I drive.

It all makes me wonder whether Danby's "Spencer" residents are aware of the rich variety of useful junk mail they aren't getting. When the Postal Service divided Danby into different ZIPcodes, they may also have pigeonholed a lot of residents into inappropriate demographic regions.

After a few conversations, it sounds like Willseyville/13864 residents have the same issues, or worse, possibly because the 138xx ZIPcode region is based in Binghamton. Mail has to travel hundreds of miles through regional postal centers to get from Ithaca to the southeastern corner of Danby. Oddly, though, some magazines seem to show up weeks later in the

Danby certainly has been in the news.

Since January of 2014, we have almost constantly been dealing with land use and zoning and legal issues. It began with concerns about Marsh Road, continued with a special permit for Eagle Automotive on Danby Road, then the Hornbrook Road incident around New Years, development on Gunderman Road, and, most recently, the Unity House location on Nelson Road.

At times, these issues affecting our town—and our lives—seem to be moving faster than our ability to digest and comprehend them.

For the Town Board, as for myself, the intense and heartfelt public response to some of these issues has confronted us in overwhelming ways. It is hard for me sometimes to keep all the different laws that govern our Town separate. The decisions I contribute to are about the law, the rules that must apply to the understanding of a complex question, and not my feelings about the situation.

Since many species have distinctive echolocation calls, we will be able to determine what species we are hearing in the field.

There are nine species of bats in New York. Of them, the Indiana Bat (Myotis sodalis), is federally listed as endangered and another, the Northern Bat (Myotis septentrionalis), is federally listed as threatened; one or two more are well on their way to one of those undesirable distinctions.

It is a bit early in the season for returning migrators, so we will likely encounter only one or two species. But you never know, I have recorded six species over the years at our house on Muzzy Road!

Hopefully some of you will take up the hobby and continue in the busier summer months. Be warned: bat detecting is addictive!
