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SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

The most difficult conversations—for both families and municipalities—often center on how to spend money. New York State has mandated a strict cap on tax levy increases and this puts pressure on its Towns.

Danby has been able to stay under the cap by keeping a watchful eye, by being financially responsible, and by attending to its financial needs in a realistic fashion. Now, along with many municipalities, Danby is feeling the pinch.

During the last three years, Danby not only stayed within the tax cap, we stayed far enough below it to carry forward credits to the following year. This allowed qualified taxpayers to receive tax refund checks from New York State.

New York State is asking for cuts in 2016, above and beyond those which have already been made. The credit

carried forward from last year is not nearly enough to soften these cuts.

In an effort to comply with these new cuts, which we would have to sustain over several years, Danby has hoped to benefit from Tompkins County's proposal to the State showing cost savings realized by the sharing of services. We do not know, yet, whether this proposal will be successful but, even if it is, I do not believe it will be sufficient to comply with the tax cap for next year.

The very small credit carried forward from last year—\$1,600—combined with the very much smaller growth rate factors declared by the State for 2016 will not make it easy to stay within the tax cap. In 2015 we were allowed more than \$38,000 of budget growth but, in 2016, the limit is less than \$24,000.

Compare this figure with an expected five percent increase in health insurance costs (about \$10,000), with increases in retirement costs, and with more. Just like household costs, municipal costs always increase.

Hunting Licenses

The sale of DEC sporting licenses contributes to a busy part of our work routine in September. Doe Management Permit (DMP) sales began on August 10 and continue through the end of the work day on Thursday, October 1. As a service to Danby hunters, The Clerk's office will be open that day.

Sales in August started out slowly and, once again, with



a bit of a bumpy ride. We can hope that all of the computer data-entry and problems with the DMP lottery will be over by September. Remember that, even if a hunter has a Life time License, they still need to visit a sales agent for DMP tags and other "add-ons." Licenses are on sale all year 'round. If you bring your previous sporting license or your driver's license, it'll make it easier for us to find you in the DEC License sales system. Remember, your Town Clerk's office is just one of many outlets for DEC license sales: in addition retail outlets, you may also pur-

chase your licenses online.

In 2014, several changes were made to the available license types and to the fees associated with those licenses. These include the loss of the "Super Sportsman" license. Those who bought that option in the past will now have purchase each privilege separately. In a number of cases, this change actually reduces fees for NYS resident hunters.

Due to ongoing updates in the sporting license sales system, it make take more than just a few minutes to process hunting and fishing licenses. Sue McLellan and I appreciate your patience. Remember, the license year has been adjusted to run from September 1 to August 31. Fishing licenses may be purchased during any season and run for a year from the date of purchase.

Information about all of these changes can be found in the 2015-2016 hunting and fishing guides, available at the Clerk's office.

Each year, we encourage Danby hunters to make donations to the New York State Venison Donation Coalition. The Coalition is a non-profit that coordinates efforts of hunters, deer processors, food banks, and other individuals to add locally-sourced food to New York State food banks. Ground venison is distributed through food pantries, soup kitchens, and senior living centers. One deer can provide up to 160 highly nutritious servings to those in need. It's easy to support this effort, even if you butcher your own venison. Simply tell the Clerk to click the donation link and a small fee, \$1, will be added to the license fee. Donations are also accepted through the VDC's secure website [venisondonation.org] or send a check payable to: Venison Donation Coalition, Inc., 415 West Morris Street, Bath, NY 14810. Call 866.862.DEER for more information.

WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE Submitted by Tod Sukontarak, Water Commissioner

We flushed hydrants in the second week of August on the schedule published in last month's Danby Area News. There were several people, especially in the Hillview Road area, who experienced bad brown water most likely as a result.

One customer said she had laundry ruined. We are sorry for that but I am not sure what to do about it. It is a bit of a conundrum, as flushing the hydrants is necessary for getting a handle on reducing the amount of sediment and discoloration in the lines but flushing them also sometimes causes short-term brown water conditions.

The Water District flushing schedule is conducted twice annually, once in the second week of April and once in the second week of August. Doing so in the second week allows time for the Danby News to be delivered and for water customers to have read it. The Danby News also has contact information for people to communicate with me if they want to know the exact day. The day that it is done is dependent on weather and work schedules but will be done in the stated week.

If you do experience brown water during the flushing period, one method of removing it immediately is to run a garden hose until the color goes away. Another method is to not use water for a few hours until the sediment settles.

The cause of the brown water is dislodging of material on the inside of the pipe accumulated over time. Our water is tested monthly in various locations and has always been passed as safe for drinking. We understand that nobody wants to bathe or do laundry let alone drink brown water so we will continue to flush on the current schedule to try to eliminate the problem.

County Legislature Update

The unemployment rate in Tompkins County (4.1 percent) is typically one of the lowest in NY State, and has been for a very long time. However, that doesn't mean that everyone who wants a job has a job, or that everyone has the job that is the best match for them.

I recently got to spend some time at the Tompkins Workforce New York One-Stop Career Center. I wanted to share a little of what I learned there.

Tompkins Workforce New York is a partnership--a collaboration between eleven local partner agencies, both public and private. Tompkins County government is a partner in the workforce system and receives federal grant money to help people gain skills and employment (or find better employment). Other partners include TC3, Challenge, NYS Dept of Labor, Office for the Aging, DSS, TC Action, Experience Works, Women's Opportunity Center, ACCES-VR, and TST BOCES.

There are a variety of programs for all Tompkins County residents and grants to assist certain populations with job searching and training. These populations include veterans, individuals with low income, individuals with disabilities, people who have left school, those experiencing long term unemployment, and at-risk youth.

Services provided to job seekers include career counseling, resume development, career workshops and career fairs, a career library, job search resources, job placement assistance, E-learning programs, vocational classroom and community college training funding, and access to computers, phones, fax machines, and copiers.

Tompkins Workforce NY averages 2,000 job seekers each year. Approximately 78 percent of job seekers find employment within a few months. About 32 percent decide that education or training will help them become more marketable, and assistance is provided to access that training or education.

Tompkins Workforce NY also provides services to businesses to help them find, train, and retain qualified employees. It's something you don't necessarily hear about a lot, but there are plenty of examples of jobs available in Tompkins County where the employer can't easily find local people who have the required skills for the job. Tompkins Workforce NY helps makes those connections.

A basic component of a good life for many people is finding the right employment. Tompkins Workforce NY exists to help fulfill this basic need. The Town is also going to have to absorb the costs of storm damage and flooding mitigation that resulted from recent storms. As State highways and roads were being washed away, Danby declared a state of emergency. Together with the County, we accumulated damage estimates in the hope of reimbursements from FEMA, but the cumulative damage cost was not enough to meet FEMA threshholds.

Danby must pay the significant costs incurred by its Highway Department in full, by itself.

To safeguard against future damage in a proactive way, immediate action—in the form of a new *GradAll*—is needed. The current equipment is 24 years old and has a high maintenance cost. With current low interest rates, we can enter a 3-5 year leasing agreement but these payments must be built into the budget. To get leasing approval, we have to demonstrate enough budget flexibility to satisfy lending agencies.

FIRE STATION PARKING

This is just a friendly reminder that, if you use the Danby Fire Station for voting or other events, you should not park in the lot directly in front of the building, with the exception of the two handicapped parking spaces.

In the event of an emergency, responders may need to get in to the building quickly and the emergency vehicles need a clear exit from the truck bays. Vehicle and pedestrian traffic in the lot can impede response and cause potential for injury.

The siren at the station does not always sound during an emergency, and you may not have sufficient warning to get your vehicle moved before responders arrive at the station. In these situations seconds count and the lives of your family and neighbors may be at stake. Thank you for your consideration.



Keys Found

Did you lose a Chevy key and an electronic key on Comfort Road? They were found in mid-August, just uphill from Lieb Road. Contact [dis2@cornel1.edu]. Bottom line, I do not believe that Danby can remain within the NYS tax cap during 2016. To override the tax cap, a local law must be passed by the Town Board. Passing such a law does not obligate the Town to override the tax cap, but it gives the Town the flexibility to do so if it finds that path to be the most fiscally prudent decision. This local law must be passed before November deadline set by the State for establishing our 2016 budget.

If a law is not passed, the Town will have no option but to remain under the tax cap. This would mean very hard choices about cuts in services and responsible maintenance, such as a roof for the Highway Barn, replacement of older highway equipment, and even a municipal fiscal audit. Even big cuts like these might not be enough to stay under the cap and would not be financially responsible or properly address the needs of the Town.

Spending down our existing fund balance in order to pay for known and unexpected changes to the comfort and security of Danby's residents—like this summer's flooding—is also not a responsible way to provide for the future. You can only empty the savings account once. Retaining some financial flexibility is extremely important for emergency situations and for the future.

The Town Board has set a Public Hearing for 7pm on Monday, September 21 to consider a Local Law to Override the Tax Levy Limit. The Board is well aware that this is part of an ongoing and difficult conversation regarding how to most responsibly work with taxpayer money.

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Chimney Fires

A chimney fire in action can be impressive and has been described as creating:

- loud cracking and popping noise
- a lot of dense smoke
- an intense, hot smell

Chimney fires can burn explosively—noisy and dramatic enough to be detected by neighbors. Flames or dense smoke may shoot from the top of the chimney. Homeowners report a low rumbling sound that reminds them of a freight train or jet airplane.



A chimney fire originates in the chimney and is the burning of deposits of soot or creosote

that have collected inside the chimney in the same way as grease condenses on cooking stove vents.

The process begins with the incomplete burning of fuel in wood stoves or open fireplaces. The unburned gases rise up into the chimney and contact cooler surfaces, forming creosote and soot deposits. Over time, successive layers accumulate until either the chimney is completely blocked...or the creosote ignites. These fires tend to burn very hot and, thanks to the restricted flue, result in the rapid flow of hot gases and flame as if the chimney were jet engine; hence the noise and the fireworks.

Slow-burning chimney fires also exist and, while not as dramatic or visible, the temperatures they reach are high and can cause much damage to the chimney structure and the house. Soot and creosote can also be ignited when nests lodged in the chimney fall and catch fire.

There are several major risks from a chimney fire. Burning debris may blow out of the chimney igniting the roof or home. Heat from the chimney fire can pass through the masonry or surrounding chimney "chase" and overheat other combustible parts of the house (while building codes require a specific clearance of the framing members from the flue materials, this is not always found in actual construction). Finally, the heat can expand the creosote causing the flue to plug...and then the flames and heat come back into the home.

Roofs are particularly susceptible to fire damage. Both West Danby and Danby firefighters have responded to chimney fires in recent years. If they are required to climb onto the roof, there is danger of falling through.

Chimney fires are easily prevented.

When designing a chimney, you can reduce the problem by specifying an internal chimney structure when

possible, versus a chimney attached to an external wall. The latter is often more pleasing architecturally, but tends to be cooler, contributing to the problem. Bird nests can be prevented by using a wire guard over the chimney.

Once built, prevention comes from burning dry fuels and non-resinous logs.

The best way to keep a chimney fire from happening is to prevent the buildup of creosote. There are products that can help: the Creosote Sweeping Log for Fireplaces or a so-called creosote destroyer acts as a catalyst and destroys the binder that holds the creosote particles together.

Finally, and most critical, you should clean your solid fuel venting system annually using a qualified chimney sweep. Clean chimneys don't catch fire. Make sure a Chimney Sweep inspects, and cleans and repairs it whenever needed.

That could be one of your annual fall tasks; I just did mine.

Most importantly, if you have such a fire, get every one out and call 9-1-1 immediately. There is a risk of the chimney falling, a fire backing into the home, and/or a spreading fire.

Missing insulation? If it will save you money and improve your comfort, we'll identify needs and connect you with a trusted installer.

HeatSmart Tompkins will also recommend a heat pump system for heating and cooling your home. Heat pumps run on electricity, so they can be powered by renewable energy. They're also super-efficient and may cost less than what you're using now.
