Budget Time

The Town Board has begun its 2016 budget planning process by passing a local law to override the Albanyimposed Property Tax Cap. As Supervisor Dietrich explained in the September issue of the Danby News, this step is not taken lightly. Passing an "override" law does not compel the town to go over the tax levy limit, but simply provides the option to do so if necessary.



Town Clerks have a role in passing local laws: formatting the law itself, coordinating legal review of the law, informing neighboring towns, posting legal notices, and, once a law is passed, filing with New York's State Department. All of these steps are required if a law is to be passed legally.

The Board has set several extra meetings, dedicated to budget review and planning, during October. The meetings, in Danby's Town Hall, are set for 7:30pm, Monday, October 5, 7am, Wednesday, October 7, and 5:30pm, Monday, October 19 (preceding its monthly meeting).

The Preliminary Budget should be made available for community review at the end of October.

A formal Budget Hearing, when residents may comment on the budget and the Town Board will vote on its adoption, will be scheduled for one of the regular Town Board meetings in November. Please feel free to contact our office, if you have questions about any part of the budget process. All Town Board meetings are open to the public.

PROTECTING DRINKING WATER

The Town of Danby is hosting a two-part educational forum entitled *Protecting Danby's Drinking Water*.

The first session, is on October 8, 7-8:30pm in Danby's Town Hall, 1830 Danby Road. During this program, the issue of where our drinking water comes from will be discussed, including an explanation of ground water basics, types of local aquifers, and the various forms of water supply sources. Results from a residential water supply survey conducted earlier this year will be presented as well. for Planning Board meetings on the third Thursday of each month and Conservation Advisory Council meetings on the fourth Monday of each month. Meetings generally start at 7pm.

The Danby Library has its home in the main meeting room, with staffed hours on Saturday mornings and Wednesday afternoons. The Courtroom serves as important judicial space on Tuesday nights and doubles as a meeting space at other times.

The Danby Community Council has an impressive event schedule this fall—concerts and informative presentations—on Sunday afternoons. Its next concert, on October 4, features fiddle/mandolin wizard (and Danby resident) Rick Manning.

Residents can learn about water resources and ways to protect local drinking water during a two-part educational forum on Thursday, October 8 and Tuesday, October 27. Additional information about these events will be found in the pages of this month's Danby Area News.

The Town Clerk maintains "flight control", ensuring that events don't run into each other. Even though these meetings and events are related to several different boards and community organizations, I help to get the word out, doing my best to get the information into the Danby Area News. Information can also be found on the calendar portion of the Town of Danby web site, [townofdanbyny.org].

In October the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Fridays and Saturday mornings, 10am-Noon. We are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. You can always reach us by phone, 607.277.4788 and by Email, [townclerk@townofdanbyny.org]. And yes, the chocolate bowl is still kept full.

The second program is also in Town Hall, 7-8:30pm on October 27. In this session, the various threats to the quality and quantity of drinking water supplies will be discussed, with examples of issues presented from rural New York. In addition, steps that individuals and the community can take to protect drinking water resources will be examined.

Steven Winkley of the New York Rural Water Association will present both sessions and will be taking questions from the audience following his presentations. \$

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

I am writing this month about the tentative Tompkins County budget for 2016. The tentative budget is the budget proposed by the County Administrator. The County Legislature then spends two months examining it and proposing modifications to it.

The Governor instituted something called a tax freeze this year. If a municipality stays under the tax cap and if the municipality also submits a plan to lower the tax levy by 1 percent each year for the next three years, then the taxpayers in that municipality will receive a refund from NY State equivalent to the local tax increase. Tompkins County submitted its 1 percent tax levy plan to NY State back in June, but as of this writing (in mid-September), we have not heard if NY State has accepted our plan.

Regardless, the County Legislature has set a goal of staying under the tax cap this year. Tompkins County's tax cap this year is 1.8 percent. The tentative budget calls for a 1.3 percent increase.

This budget calls for a small decrease in the tax rate. If your assessment did not go up this year, then you would actually see a small decrease in your taxes. If your assessment went up, then you will likely see a small increase in your taxes. The average increase for a home in Tompkins County would be about \$15. The value of a home used to calculate that average is \$170,000, up from \$165,000 this year.

There are ten extra meetings scheduled for the budget. They are all open to the public. Of particular note though is one dedicated to presenting the budget to the public, and then receiving questions and comments from the public. That meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, October 7, 7pm, in the County Legislature Chambers in the Daniel Tompkins Building (Old Courthouse) off Dewitt Park.

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SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

What a fine August and September I have had. I got so much done around the house, and I hope your weather-related objectives were realized as well.

The apples are marginal, the cherries not so hot, but chestnuts and walnuts did guite well. We let the garden go over the summer, as we were out of town at an important time of its development...and this turned out not so bad as June floods followed by a dry summer saved me time—from washed out beds to weeding and later having to water—and I was able to put it into long overdue house projects.

The Town's summer was spent transitioning the Zoning and Planning responsibilities, rebuilding, cleaning, and replacing damaged drainage systems in the Town Highways, watching the new bridge at White Hawk going in, and working on this years budget.

By the time you read this, our public hearing regarding a local override of the NYS Property Tax Cap will have happened, and we will have a better context for moving forward. We still have to understand the effect how CSEA negotiations will affect increased expenses, but I am reasonably sure that health care costs will be in the lower single digits as opposed to the double digit national average. Retirement costs will be within budget projections.

While these items are all manageable, there are lines in the budget that saw an increases. The legal line has increased—mainly as a result of the complexity of zoning issues that have come before the Town.

The Marsh Road changes were completed in July, Eagle Automotive is on hold, and the Gunderman Road development project is still in process.

Sue and Matt's departure from our Code Office, and the subsequent personnel transition, also took more legal hours than usual.

FIRE STATION PARKING

Our infrastructure took a hit in June, this being only the second time I have felt it was necessary to declare a state of emergency. Highway held a special meeting with the Town Board, to discuss the damage and share its plans for upgrading our drainage system.

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Danby Fire District Budget

The Danby Fire District's obligation and goal is to respond to any emergency demand made on our two companies. So, each year, the Danby Fire District Commissioners develop a preliminary budget and refine it before public comment and before voting on its adoption. Over the past dozen years, the Commissioners have sought to minimize taxes and, as a result, now face several issues.

The first is that major fire apparatus has not been replaced in a systematic way and its average age is now over 24 years. National standards suggest that apparatus over fifteen years be placed on reserve; over 25 years, it should be totally retired. The second is that station maintenance has been deferred. The third is that fire fighters' gear and equipment has aged more than deemed prudent and also becomes technologically obsolete. The fourth is that critical water availability has not been expanded nor improved. The fifth is that we need to recruit volunteers and that may mean incurring recruiting costs.

The positive side for the homeowner has been that the tax rate, the item controlled by the Fire Commissioners, has declined from \$1.64 to \$1.45 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, a decline of 12 percent from 2007 to 2015.

Property Taxes are the principal source of Fire District income. They are supplemented by occasional, unpredictable, modest grants. Our current tax income is \$405,000 per year. Over the last few years, we have decreased reserves to offset operational needs and keep taxes low.

In the recent past we have explored other ways to fund needed apparatus and building repairs. We have submitted a grant application to fund the replacement of our oldest tank truck. We have successfully sought smaller grants to replace our current outdated hose and other equipment, and will continue to seek such grants. For example, we have recently been successful in four grant applications totaling \$59,000 for some turnout gear, a thermal imaging camera, hose replacements, nozzles, and Jaws of Life tools. These grants were awarded by FEMA, The Fire House Subs Foundation, The NY State Forest Service, and The Triad Foundation. While this is a substantial sum, it is about fifteen percent of what one new tank truck with hoses, etc. costs.

The Danby Fire District is now faced with serious major apparatus (fire trucks) needs and this, in turn,

means substantial cash outlays; substantial in relation to our tax income. A tank truck will cost about 80 percent of our 2015 tax income. One of our two tankers, is 41 years old, the other 17. We have two brush trucks, one 31 years old, the other 25 years. We have two semiretired rescue trucks: the 27-year old, rusting one reduced to carrying signs, the other, a 25-year old truck, is stripped of much of its gear to equip one of the newer pumper/engines. We have one 11-year old operating rescue car. Thanks to a bond issue of a few years ago, we do have two 3-year old pumper/engines.

The state requires certain equipment be replaced based upon age. Thus, we continue to have needs for:

- Replacement turnout gear and items such as helmets, boots, and high tech gloves.
- Breathing apparatus; mandatory for interior firefighters and vehicle accidents.
- A generator to power tools on one engine.
- Additional dry hydrants and water extraction equipment.
- Repairs to a station.
- Snow removal equipment.
- Recruiting.
- Training at all levels.

Beyond playing catch-up, we face a tightening tax cap (estimated at 0.73 percent, less than one percent), and rising utility, insurance, and other operating costs. We are currently considering issuing a short term bond or entering into a lease agreement to finance the new tanker. Existing debt service, to pay down bonds issued for the two engine/pumpers and the stations is over \$110,000 per year, one quarter of our current budget.

Yet our all volunteer departments of Danby and West Danby understand that their obligation is to provide fast and able response to any fire or medically related demand made on our Fire Companies. We are there to protect and rescue people first and property second. To do this we need to increase the number of trained and fully equipped volunteers, replace our oldest tanker, both brush trucks, and at least one EMS vehicle, upgrade our communications gear to remain compliant with State and County requirements, and increase our water supply to aggressively fight fires.

To meet our obligation, we will have to exceed the tax cap in 2016 and currently estimate the increase—to obtain better fire and emergency protection—to be approximately \$52 per year for the median home value in Danby of about \$168,000.
