OPEN BURNING IN DANBY

Since 2009, New York State has prohibited any burning of trash, and has very strict limitations on other open burning. *No burning at all is allowed from March 16 through May 14*.

During the rest of the year, essentially, the only open burning allowed is:

- Campfires less than 3 feet in height and 4 feet in width or diameter.
- Small cooking fires.
- In Towns like Danby with populations less than 20,000, you may burn brush with tree limbs less than 6 inches in diameter and less than 8 feet in length.

The Department of Environmental Conservation regulates burning in Danby, and in case of any questions or to report open burning violations call the DEC hotline, 844.332.3267. Report any fires by calling 911.



Town Clerk's Desktop

Once again, the cruel month of January is upon us. We barely get over the indulgences of holiday parties and staying up late for New Year's Eve when reality hits us. There is no escape from Cold, Dark, and Taxes. The nights are dark and, while this year hasn't been especially cold or snowy, that pleasure is balanced by...

Tax bills are sent out at the very end of December and should be in your mail box during the first week of



January. If, for some reason you do not receive your Town, Fire, and County property tax bill by that week, give us a call. Please note that if your taxes are paid by an escrow service, the original bill is sent to the bank or payment service. If there has been a change in your escrow status and the bill should come to you, let us know. We can print out a duplicate copy at get it to you right away.

Please remember that Town Clerks are only tax collectors. We don't assess your property or set your tax rate. I know that

there's little I can do to make January better than it is, but I can promise that the candy bowl will be filled with chocolate kisses including plenty of dark chocolate. Sue McLellan and I can renew or issue dog licenses, issue marriage licenses and parking permit tags, and answer questions about Town government at the same time.

The end of the year is a good time to look back at the business of 2015. Taxes are the main revenue source for the Town, but not the only source. Revenue received in a calendar year can be an indication of how busy we were. Indications are that 2015 was an average year for the Danby Town offices. Average is OK.

We received permit funds for 54 building permits in 2015, down from 70 in 2014, but matching the 10-year average of 55 per year. Development has kept the Planning Board and Board of Zoning Appeals busy as well, with 8 appeals going to the BZA in 2015 (above the 10-year average of 5), and 5 Planning Board site plan reviews and hearings (vs. the average of 10 per year). One of issues considered by the Planning Board is the proposed change to Planned Development Zone #10 (the old Angelheart facility on Gunderman Road) has taken more time and effort than most other site plan reviews and hearings during the past several years.

Funds received for hunting and fishing licenses in 2015 were nearly identical with those in 2014. Requests for marriage licenses have slowed, with only three in 2015. Could it be that all, or most, who wish to be married in Danby have already done so?

Income from dog license renewals is similar to 2014. \$7,840 has been collected so far, and there are more renewals to come in the next few weeks. More people are renewing their dog licenses on time in order to avoid late fees being attached to the bill.

To date (December 16), the Town Clerk's office has collected \$28,256 in total receipts, less than in 2014 but in line with the 10-year average of \$26,625. These collections are not enough to cover expenses in the Town Clerk's office, let alone the activities of the Code Office and the review boards. But these fees do help defray some costs.

In order to be as available as possible, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-1pm on Saturdays. The first day of tax collection is Saturday, January 2. I'll be there if you will! The last day to pay Town and County tax without an additional finance charge, or to begin paying with the installment option, is Monday February 1. As always, we are closed December 31 and January 1 for the New Years holiday, and we are closed on Sundays and Thursdays.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

How Local Politics Has Made Me A Better Person Submitted by Dan Klein, County Legislator

I am now halfway through my first four-year term on the County Legislature. I usually write about concrete matters—budgets, programs, and issues facing both taxpayers and elected officials. But, right now, I want to take a moment to write a little about how I think of local government and politics.

I still remember very clearly the moment in 2007 when I received the phone call telling me I had gotten enough votes to be on the Danby Town Board. I instantly felt different. I knew in that moment that my thoughts and opinions mattered in a different way now. Before, I was free to say anything I wanted. Now, my words and actions would have real consequences on real people's lives.

Since then, I've constantly asked myself, "Who do I represent?" Is it the people who vote for me or all residents of the county? Should I give more weight to the desires and opinions of the residents Danby over those of people in Lansing? Do I owe anything to my fellow legislators? How do I balance the interests of the approximately 700 County employees with the interests of the taxpayers who finance their jobs? Or was I elected to just make whatever decision I want?

I spend a lot of time talking with and hearing from people I disagree with. When I was just Dan Klein the gardener, I had the option of ignoring whomever I wanted. But now I don't think I can do that and still be doing my job. I have to take that extra step to really try to understand what people are saying, to spend time exploring if maybe we really do have some common understanding of the issue, and to look for ways for them to be able to get what they want while still doing what I believe is correct. This is not easy, sometimes not possible, and I'm not saying I come close to always achieving this. But I really feel that if I don't try, I am not fit for public office.

One of my favorite local quotes is by Ithaca Mayor Svante Myrick. He said, "Government is in the forever business." At first I took this quote to mean we always have to be thinking about the future. Over time, I've come to realize that "forever" also includes the present. Balancing present needs with future needs is really key to what government does. Someone who only worries about how a decision will affect them in this moment is missing part of the big picture. But so is someone

who thinks they know exactly what will happen in the future and thinks they know exactly what we must do to get there, regardless of the cost in the present.

So I think the job description of politician is someone who can see across time and space and can reconcile the inherent differences in all people. Since Superman and the Dalai Lama are not available to run for local office, we are left with me, and you, and our neighbors.

The word "politician" seems to have a lot of negative connotations. I understand that. When we think of "politician," we are probably thinking about State and Federal politicians. State and Federal politics are a big unpleasant mess in my opinion. Local politics, on the other hand, is me and you and our neighbors trying to find reasonable solutions to everyday issues. I am someone who is trying to take in all the information that's out there, take the temperature of the people in the county, weigh various options, predict how the options might play out, help move us in a direction that will be good for individuals and good for society, and not hurt people along the way. And I need to be ready to hear and think and understand and do things that I might not otherwise do because all this listening and reading and weighing and predicting and moving and thinking and acting is not about me—it's about the 100,000 people of Tompkins County.

To the degree that I can, I must put others before myself, just as many other people do with their families, communities, friends, and jobs. That's why, unexpectedly, being in politics has made me a better person.

Supervisor's Update

I do believe I can say most of the Danby residents I know are in a flutter over the weather. So am I; I do know that perhaps this is not mainstream thinking, and it is not thinking I could have gotten away with if the kids were all still home, but *snow was a part of Christmas*.

In spite of all the snow events we engaged the kids in, they all moved south at the first opportunity. I love it. They've gone south and I have no snow. Maybe I have a premature knee jerk reaction to our last winter.

The Highway Department likes the weather. All that salt and sand we spread on roads; all the overtime, all the wear and tear on our equipment, they are all breathing a sigh of relief.

Topics that come up at meetings of the Council of Governments often have me wondering how to get feedback from Danby residents whose opinions I am supposed to represent.

During the CoG meeting today (you can see records of these meetings on the County's web site), topics included a minimum/living wage for the County's working residents. I had to abstain as I really do not know how I should vote on this issue. I will be inviting speakers and residents to attend a future meeting to have a discussion on this topic.

Another topic was the shutdown of Caroline's rescue squad, and this conversation soon spilled over to Fire Departments. Much of our way of life depends on our Fire Departments: insurance on our homes, and how

quickly they can responde to emergencies. Most all municipalities had questions about ways in which we can give more support to this vital resource and to its sister organizations, the Rescue Squads.

This will not be a simple task, but I do believe if we do not ask the difficult questions now, we will only be faced with a bigger problem down the road. Volunteer ranks are diminishing, both by aging out and by not being replaced. Training requirements and certifications for EMTs are increasingly more challenging. The private sector needs to be brought into this conversation as well. The question of volunteer vs. paid staff to provide these services is daunting in and of itself, requiring input from residents to the cost of options and their consequences.

I believe this is a Town-wide discussion as well as a County discussion and it will be a topic on next months Council of Governments meeting agenda. I will be listening and trying to learn more.

What a difference a winter can make. I do hope your sleigh does not get stuck in the mud. See you all in the next year.

Brush and Wildland Fires

Brush and Wildland fires (BWF) were in the news out west and may become of more concern for the Northeastern US. The New York Times wrote,



The sooner that firefighting agencies, public officials, ... and citizens acknowledge the impact that climate change is having on the frequency, intensity, duration and behavior of fire, the sooner that they will begin to develop new responses.

BWF results from insufficient rain fall, drying winds, and high temperatures. Climate change has brought these conditions more frequently to places that had rarely experienced them in the past. This winter's El Nino should also mean less precipitation for the Northeastern US.

BWF threatens our homes in Danby as we have built into the Wildland-Urban interface (WUI), where houses intermingle with trees and undergrowth. We currently encounter some four to eight brush, woods, and grass fires each year; some are in relatively inaccessible areas. To fight these fires, the Danby Fire District has two brush fire trucks: a 24-year old one in West Danby and a 36-year old one in the Danby fire station.

Brush trucks are expected to go off-road or up narrow driveways and country lanes, and to carry water, firefighters, and appropriate tools such as fire hose and nozzles, shovels, saws, and extinguishers.

Our trucks have very limited off-road capabilities and their projecting front bumpers further limit the locations they can reach. We also use the brush trucks in other situations: in traffic control, extra pumping or hose capacity, and as initial attack trucks for structure fires.

As we review our older fire apparatus, we are considering replacing our old brush trucks: the two trucks have cost us almost \$8,000 in repairs in the last 30 months and we are anticipating a significant added cost to repair our oldest one in the near future.

Modern Brush Trucks are generally one of three kinds. The minimalist school has moved towards using four wheel drive, heavy duty pickup trucks with a skid

mounted separate engine, water pump, water tank, and hose. These units carry a modest number of tools and are relatively inexpensive to buy; generally under \$70,000 with skid unit, communications gear, lights, tools, and compartments.



A more powerful truck, using a heavier engine and chassis (an F550, for example), and carrying special equipment for wildland fires and able to serve as a small fire truck for

other calls, is a second option. These can pump water while moving, allowing "running attacks" on vegetation fires. These would cost about \$120,000.

Finally, there is a move to multi-purpose vehicles. As the number of volunteers falls, staffing multiple specialized vehicles becomes difficult, so vehicles that can deal with a wide range of emergencies are desirable. Manufactur-



ers have developed a WUI fire engine that can maneuver in country settings and act as a back country brush truck-including pump-while-rolling--yet carries enough water,

pumping capacity, hose, and tools to serve as a light urban fire engine and rescue truck. Four wheel drive capability and automatic tire pressure adjustment to maximize traction allows them to climb steep hills and make it through sand, snow, ice, clay, mud, water streams, and rough terrain. The other features such as high ground clearance, high angles of attack and departure (to handle sudden changes in grade), and a highly flexible suspension combine to get these trucks into challenging areas. Of course, this versatility comes with a larger price tag.

At the current time, our smaller brush trucks are able to handle our brush fires. But the Fire District needs to plan ten and fifteen years into the future. As climate change occurs, as the number of volunteers continues to be a limiting factor, and as people build into the Wildland, we may need to consider an intermediate truck on an F550 chassis or even a multi-purpose WUI truck.

Commissioners Propose New \$453,124 Bond

On December 8, the same day as the voting for new Commissioners, the Fire District issued a legal notice describing a Bond Referendum to be held January 5, 2016, 6-9pm. Voting will take place at both fire stations, 1830 Danby Road and 47 Sylvan Lane.

The notice appeared in all the required places: on the bulletin board in Town Hall, the Town web site, and, presumably, in the Legal Notice section of the *Ithaca Journal*. For those who missed it, here's a recap and some additional detail.

The Bond Resolution (that must be approved by voters) allows for the purchase of two new firetrucks, along with accessories and services, for a total of \$753,124. Of this, \$453,124 will be financed by the issuance of serial and/or statutory installment bonds. The rest, presumably, will come from fund reserves that will been augmented by the roughly 23% increase in the Fire District levy, that you'll see on your tax bill in January.

This bond will be added to the existing debt service—currently paying down bonds issued for two previous engine/pumpers and the stations—of more than \$110,000 per year, one quarter of the Fire District's budget.

The need for these trucks was described in Commissioner Kokkelenberg's article in the October, 2015 issue of the *Danby News*. The need for another two trucks is described in his article, elsewhere in this issue.

Voters, hopefully more than 28 of them, should take the time to learn about the need for, and cost of, these purchases, and take part in the voting on January 5.

Broadband in Danby Update

Several Danby Broadband fans sent me info about a recent press release from the office of the New York State Attorney General's office. The A.G. has launched an online form where New Yorkers can test and then submit data on the Internet speeds they are receiving at home.

In October, the Attorney General sent letters to Time Warner Cable, Verizon and Cablevision asking for documents related to whether the Internet speeds they advertise are actually what households are receiving.

This is of particular interest to Danby residents, whether they're "big company" customers or they're getting service from smaller ISPs like Frontier or Clarity Connect.

The new online test is an opportunity for consumers to discover whether the advertised speeds are accurate. Full instructions for taking the broadband test can be viewed at [ag.ny.gov/internet-speed].

I tried it and, sadly, the test did not work on any of my (admittedly older) computers. The good news is that you can use other speed test pages and then, using the same instructions, report the results you obtain from those pages. Be sure to take more than one sample, from different "target hosts". Try [speedtest.net] (not .com!) and, when you're done, obtain the result summary by clicking "My Results"; or [speakeasy.net/speedtest] and get a summary by clicking "Results History".

Meanwhile, We're Waiting For...

A month or so ago there was a rumor that Clarity Connect was almost ready to begin a rollout to Danby customers. Well, maybe they were, but the new rumor is that NYSEG took a bit longer than expected to provide power to Clarity's phone poles. Latest estimate...by the end of the year, maybe?

Danby residents who have previously indicated interest will be contacted by Clarity. Others can contact Clarity via its web site, [clarityconnect.com], or by calling 607.257.8268.

Coming: reports from newly connected households. I can tell you that my own connection looked pretty good for its first two-plus months (6Mbps down, 2Mbps up), but then a configuration change lowered the speed somewhat...and Clarity is working to resolve the problem.
