TOWN CLERK'S DESKTOP

This month, I'm writing my *Desktop* article just prior to Thanksgiving. I am inspired to share yet more reasons I have for gratitude. In my experience, gratitude is a very good antidote for confusion and other unpleasant feelings, of which there are many, this post-election season.

I'm grateful for the returning health of our Supervisor, Ric Dietrich. Ric needed serious surgery at the end of September and is now well on the way to making a full



recovery. It has made me more aware of the preciousness of our health and relationships with each other. I'm glad, and grateful, that part of my job involves helping to bring some people a measure of ease in the midst of physical disability or recovery through issuing auto accessibility "hang tags."

The approach of winter weather always seems to bring more needs for temporary (red) or permanent (blue) accessibility parking tags. These rearview mirror hang tags allow legal parking in accessible parking areas. They are issued through munic-

ipal clerks, and the process takes less than five minutes. You can obtain the required medical form from your physician, physical therapist, or other medical office.

There are plenty of reasons to get out and take part in community activities this December. The Danby Fire Department will host a pancake breakfast on Sunday, the 11th and the Fire Commissioners election is on Tuesday, the 13th. There are several events at the Danby Community Church, intended for the public (see the calendar). And there are a number of family friendly events, hosted by the Community Council, held in Danby's accessible Town Hall. Residents can learn more about nature during an *All About Ants* program on Saturday, the 3rd, and about the Christmas Bird Count during a warm-up session on Saturday, the 10th. The bird-like sounds of a Wind Quartet will grace Town Hall during an afternoon concert on Sunday, the 11th. All of these events help bring our community together.

All residents are also invited to witness and take part in the workings of local government by attending meetings of the Town Board, Planning Board, Zoning Appeals Board, or Conservation Advisory Council. The 2016 year-end meetings will include a public hearing for an Environmental Quality Review local law and site-plan reviews before the Planning Board. Come, listen, learn, and consider applying to fill a board vacancy. Each board has at least one seat that opens each year. Applications are due this month and interviews will be held in early January.

I feel gratitude for a community that treats each other with respect, even when we have differences of opinion. I'm grateful to live in a community which welcomes people from many different cultures and backgrounds-whether they are residents, visitors to Tompkins County, or just traveling through. Please know that the Town Hall, and all of its offices, will always be a welcoming and safe place for all.

PRIVATE FOREST LEGACY PLANNING

The Penn State Center for Private Forests has posted a webinar on Legacy Planning for forest owners. If you are interested in accessing this webinar, google "private forest legacy planning".

In Pennsylvania, 738,000 private forest landowners manage nearly 70 percent, or about 11.5 million acres, of woodlands across the state. Surprisingly, more than 65 percent of all forest landowners own less than ten acres. Whether you own an acre or several thousand acres, you need a legacy plan to carry your stewardship forward. •

NY GROWN AND CERTIFIED

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo has announced funding to help New York fruit and vegetable farmers join the New York State Grown & Certified program. \$1.5 million is available to help farms implement an Agricultural Environmental Management plan, and a reimbursement of up to \$1,000 is available for growers who participate in a third party audit of safe food handling practices.

Farmers must participate in programs supporting good agricultural practices and environmental management to be eligible for New York State Grown & Certified, and this funding will help more farms join the certification program.

BOARD VACANCIES

The Town Board of the Town of Danby invites residents to apply for volunteer municipal boards. Your involvement is welcome and needed.

Each year, one seat opens on the Planning Board and another seat on the Board of Zoning Appeals. The Planning Board term is seven years, while the BZA term is five years.

The Planning Board meets monthly, currently on the third Thursday, to review subdivision and development applications, and to review and revise the Town Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance. The Board of Zoning Appeals meets as needed, currently on the fourth Tuesday of each month, to hear and decide variance requests related to the Zoning Ordinance. Copies of the Comprehensive Plan and Zoning Ordinance are available on the Code/Planning page of Danby's web site and in the Town Clerk's office.

There are several open seats on the Conservation Advisory Council. The CAC advises the Town Board in the development, management, and protection of the Town's natural resources.

There are open positions for Town Historian and Town Webmaster. As provided by NYS Law, the Town Historian collects and preserves Town history. The Historian is encouraged to engage the public in local his-

Fire Commissioner Voting and Bus Service

The Danby Fire District will hold an election for Fire Commissioner on December 13, 2016. The polling place is open 5-9pm.

In the past, we have had two polling places, one in the West Danby Fire Station on Sylvan Lane and the second in the Danby Fire Station on Danby Road (NYS Rt.96B). This year, on the advice of our lawyer, there will be only one polling place. Please note that Town, County, State, and Federal elections are not affected by this, only Fire District Elections.

To help West Danby residents, we will provide bus service from the West Danby Fire Station to the Danby Fire Station for voting. The bus service, provided by Airport Limousine, will make continuous loops between the two locations, beginning at 4:45pm. The last returning trip will return to West Danby shortly after 9pm.

The West Danby Station will be open to wait in and this will be a way to get out of any weather. We hope to have doughnuts and coffee there for any voters, as they wait for the next bus.

You do not have to have any reservation, and we expect the bus will hold enough passengers to accommodate voters from West Danby.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

You will be reading this after Thanksgiving, but I thought I would share some information that was sent to me. I have no idea of the source of this information, but I find it interesting, nonetheless.

"In 1817, New York became the first of several states to officially adopt an annual Thanksgiving holiday; each celebrated it on a different day, however, and the American South remained largely unfamiliar with the tradition.

"In 1827, the noted magazine editor and prolific writer Sarah Josepha Hale—author, among countless other things, of the nursery rhyme *Mary Had a Little Lamb* launched a campaign to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday. For 36 years, she published numerous editorials and sent scores of letters to governors, senators, presidents and other politicians.

"Abraham Lincoln finally heeded her request in 1863, at the height of the Civil War, in a proclamation entreating all Americans to ask God to, 'commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife,' and to, 'heal the wounds of the nation.' He scheduled Thanksgiving for the final Thursday in November, and it was celebrated on that day every year until

See you there! 1939, when Franklin D. Roosevelt moved the holiday up a week in an attempt to spur retail sales during the Great Depression. Roosevelt's plan, known derisively as *Franksgiving*, was met with passionate opposition, and in 1941 the president reluctantly signed a bill making Thanksgiving the fourth Thursday in November.

"As an annual celebration of the harvest and its bounty, moreover, Thanksgiving falls under a category of festivals that spans cultures, continents and millennia. In ancient times, the Egyptians, Greeks and Romans feasted and paid tribute to their gods after the fall harvest. Thanksgiving also bears a resemblance to the ancient Jewish harvest festival of Sukkot. Finally, historians have noted that Native Americans had a rich tradition of commemorating the fall harvest with feasting and merrymaking long before Europeans set foot on their shores."

My past history with pre-Thanksgiving snowstorms, like the one swirling outside as I write this, forecasts more of the same for the upcoming winter. I really hope I am wrong.

The Town is finishing up its year, taking care of end of year work, budget adjustments, appointments for our boards, closing up the financial books. I will be reporting on additional happenings underway in the town next month: Where we are with our efforts to establish a large solar array, potential land swaps with highway, and budget information.

I hope your Thanksgiving was all you wished it to be.

A HAPPY HOLIDAY FROM THE DANBY FIRE DISTRICT TO ALL

One Christmas afternon, when I was about 17, my dad was napping, my mom was dozing, my sisters were doing what kid sisters do, and my brother...well...my brother took his friend and his new basketball into the basement.

There, he found a can of spirits and some old paint brushes. He set fire to them to see if what we told him about flammability was correct. Then, he tried to put out the fire with water from the utility tub.

His friend came upstairs and—finding me awake said there was a fire. I questioned this but started down into the basement anyway. At the first landing, I found a real fire in progress.

Retreating to the first floor, we called 9-1-1 and got everybody out of the house. The dog remained to attack the firemen but all was quickly taken care of (the fire station was only a city block away). My dad served drinks to the curious neighbors, my sisters ogled the young firemen, and my kid brother got into more trouble by running around and opening windows.

While amusing in the retelling, it could have been a tragedy. We were lucky; the plaster ceiling and walls confined the fire to one room.

The lesson is to take care; get rid of flammables, check your alarms, and have a usable fire extinguisher on hand. Consider the use of appropriately rated plaster board walls and ceilings in rooms where fire hazards might exist and open studs and joists prevail.

As this holiday season gets underway, we wish you good cheer and joy. Have a safe and memorable holiday, but hopefully, not quite like to the one I remember.

SIGNS OF CHANGE

The sign is gone, long live the same sign in a new place, and a different sign in the old place.

Thanks to gracious permission from landowner Olivia Vent, the Community Council's sign, a.k.a. "The Town Sign," has been relocated from the lawn in front of the Volunteer Fire Department, to a spot across from Danby's Town Hall. By the time you read this, the old location should have become home to the Fire District's brand new, \$18,000, LED-illuminated, electronic sign.

A small group of volunteers—aided by passers-by removed the sign from its old, rusting posts and reinstalled it into a rustic wooden frame on November 13 and 14. The inexpensive, natural materials were donated to the Community Council. Additional framing along with earth-tone stain will be added over time.

According to legend, the sign—already pre-owned was donated to the Community Council in the 1980s. Over the years, it has displayed everything from local events to seasonal proverbs. Currently, it announces meetings and events drawn from the pages of the *Danby News*, with an emphasis on the Community Council's concerts and presentations.

The sign is an excellent example of effective use of lowtech resources to achieve modern communications goals.

Gleason's RWV of *TC*, the product of a 10-year long research and writing effort, contains brief histories of men who served in the Revolutionary War, and went on to live in Danby; in most cases they were buried here.

POLLINATOR PROTECTION CLUB

During its November meeting, the Danby Community Council discussed a proposed Danby Pollinators Protection Club. Everyone liked the idea! Now, the community-at-large is being asked for opinions and suggestions.

The concept is based on a need shown by the decline of pollinators. Honeybees, wasps, solitary bees, moths, butterflies, birds and numerous other pollinator species show population declines. This compromises the integrity and success of agriculture, horticulture and wild environments. Such declines threaten safety, food production, food quality and food security.

These losses are being met by programs in various jurisdictions, both large and small. Small community-based projects complement international initiatives like the United Nations Environment Programme, Federal efforts like Obama's Pollinator Task Force, and the USDA/EPA National Pollinator Health Strategy and Pollinator Research Action Plan, and the work of the NY State Pollinator Network and the Pollinator Stewardship Council Protection Programs.

Cornell's Dyce Lab is a significant player. Local initiatives attend the onsite local work of planting for pollinators, building nesting environments and organizing educational programs and resources.
