

## Town Clerk's Desktop

The cruel month of January is, once again, upon us. We barely get over the indulgences of holiday parties and staying up late for New Year's Eve when reality hits us. There is no escape from Cold, Dark, and Taxes, and this year appears to be—and this year seems set to be colder and darker, and more snowier than last year. There are days when it seems that even our chocolate supply isn't hardly enough to get us through.



Tax bills are sent out at the very end of December and should be in your mailbox by the first week of January. If, for some reason you do not receive your Town and County property tax bill by that week, please call us as soon as possible. If your taxes are paid by an escrow service, the original bill is sent to the bank or payment service. If there has been a change in your escrow status and the bill should come to you, let us know. We can print out a duplicate copy at get it to you right away.

Remember, Town Clerks don't conjure up your assessment or calculate your tax liability, we just collect the payment...and we pay taxes, too. I can promise that the candy bowl will be filled with chocolate kisses including plenty of dark chocolate, but that's about all I can do to make paying your taxes easier. And, thanks to the generosity going into the, "loose change chocolate fund," there will be plenty to go around.

Sue McLellan and I can renew or issue dog licenses, issue marriage licenses and parking permit tags, and answer questions about Town government. All three at the same time!

The end of the year is a good time to look back at the business of 2016. Taxes are the main revenue source for the Town, but not the only source. Revenue received in a calendar year can be an indication of how busy we were. Once again, indications are that 2016 was an average year for Danby's Town offices. Average is OK. As of December 16, the Town Clerk's office had collected \$29,210.70 in total receipts. While this is a bit more than in 2015, it is not enough to cover expenses in the office, let alone the activities of the Code Office and review boards. But these fees do help defray some costs.

We received permit funds for 49 building permits in 2016, down from 54 in 2015. An average 55 build-

ing permits were issued per year during the past seven years. Development considerations have kept the Town busy as well. The resumption of a traditional site plan review process has resulted in a sharp increase in work for the Planning Board.

Requests for marriage licenses have slowed, with only five to date in 2016. At one time, it was common for our Town Clerk's office to process ten or more marriage licenses a year. On the other hand, we have seen an increase in requests for Certified Copies of marriage licenses. New requirements (many related to Homeland Security) mean that more people need to submit proof of marriage for driver's licenses, retirement benefits, and other insurance matters. Certified copies of marriage license are available to those individuals for a \$10 processing fee.

Income from dog license renewals decreased somewhat in 2016. Only \$6,982 has been collected so far, nearly \$1,000 less than 2015. We've learned that many older dogs have passed away, and offer our condolences to those who have lost an animal companion this year. New dogs are being licensed and more people are renewing their dog licenses on time, in order to avoid late fees being attached to their bill. Thank you, responsible dog owners!

In order to be as accessible as possible, the Town Clerk's office will be open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday, and 10am-1pm on Saturdays. Danby's Town Hall is closed Monday, January 2 for the New Year holiday. The first day of tax collection is Tuesday, January 3, and the last day to pay Town and County tax without an additional finance charge, or to pay with the installment option, is Wednesday, February 1. The Town Clerk's office is always closed on Sundays and Thursdays.

### COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

This month I'm going to write about a little bit about a number of items going on with the County Legislature. Space limitations make it so I can't go into much depth on any one of these topics. Feel free to contact me if you want more information about any of them.

The Housing Summit made quite a bit of news locally. About 300 people gathered to hear about and talk about what many people consider the housing crisis in Tompkins County. I think this is an important topic to focus on, but I'm not sure we really came up with any solutions. I also noticed that most of the focus seemed to be on downtown Ithaca. Very little was mentioned about the rural housing situations we find in Danby.

Another headline grabber was the County Legislature's vote to raise the salary of the next Legislature (2018 to 2021) to rise to the level of the living wage (calculated at \$21,400/year for these positions). This discussion was far-ranging and included ideas about the role of public servants, the ability to attract low-income people to participate in local government, politicians having the ability to set their own salaries, and the legitimacy of the living wage as applied to elected officials.

Another controversial issue was in the spotlight at a community meeting about the proposed extension of the South Hill Recreation Way. This trail already exists from Ithaca to Burns Road. The proposal is to continue the trail along the old railroad right-of-way to Middaugh Road in several phases, with the first two sections out to Banks Road being the simplest to complete

in the short term. There are landowners along the proposed route who are opposed to this project. Based on the community meeting, the rest of the public seems inclined to support it. The County is working with the Towns to facilitate an agreement with NYSEG, who would license it for use as a trail; but the trail would be jointly developed and maintained by the four Towns which it crosses—Ithaca, Dryden, Danby and Caroline

The County has been involved in a long discussion, initiated by the Tompkins County Council of Governments, about changes that might be made to the municipal courts system. Currently if an arrest is made in Danby in the middle of the night, one of the Danby Town Justices receives a phone call to come to court for the arraignment. Also, someone from the District Attorney's office and an assigned counsel (public defender) must come to court. An alternative is being looked at where there would be one court for the whole county for this purpose, to eliminate some of the timeconsuming logistics, and to make justice a little more consistent and efficient. This court might either be in one permanent location or it might rotate from town to town for one month at a time. My guess is that if we are going to initiate such a consolidation, it will take quite a bit of time to implement. It will need to be approved locally and also by the NY State Office of Court Administration.

## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

You'd never know it, down there in Ithaca, but winter is here in Danby. My flat and level driveway looks great for dirt bikes but is generally challenging the for stand-up guys and other vertical beings.

Town staff are gradually leading me up to speed on issues and projects. What I have to share this month, first, is a deep debt of gratitude to my coworkers, for the incredible support they have given me in my absence.

A resident Emailed me the other day about residents voicing their priorities for the coming year. He cited meetings where the Town was working on goals for the next year, boards, committees, and recommendations for appointments, chairs, vacancies. He was concerned about a Town seeking continuity of service, but with the general public being represented, not participating.

Yes, the Town and it committees and boards are putting together the projects we will be working on next year. For example, securing additional funds to address the stabilizing of streams and culvert replacements in the Town, starting to build a large Solar PV array to supply enough power for all the municipal buildings in the Town, changes to our Zoning law to allow for a more flexible housing within the Hamlet of Danby, renovations and upgrade to handicapped entry to Town Hall, and an extension of South Hill Recreation Trail to Danby.

If you as a resident have ideas or recommendations from your point of view please advise me. This is the time when ideas can be implemented.

Another resident asked for all Danby residents to be connected to high speed internet (rural youth are far behind their urban neighbors in computer literacy). A third Email wanted the town to entertain a community garden (Caroline has one). What's your idea for an improvement to Danby?

It appears, yes, that winter has come; time for the Town to close out its old year and prepare for a new one. The Solstice has come and gone, and I am watching for the sun to return!

## FIRE COMMISSIONER VOTING RESULTS

Wayne Westmiller, the sole candidate, was reelected for another 5-year term as a Commissioner of the Danby Fire District.

A total of 32 people voted. The results were:

Almost all of the voters were from "uphill" Danby. In lieu of a voting location in West Danby, the Fire District provided a shuttle bus to the DVFC but only three voters took advantage of the free ride.

### Fire Hoses

One of the items fire apparatus carry is fire hose. We seldom think about this, but hoses are an essential part of fighting fires with water. Between the two Danby fire District stations we have about 14,000 feet of hose or about \$45,000 worth.

Our fire apparatus carry a variety of hose: some are used for attacking structural fires, others to attack trash and other small fires, and then there are the supply lines. Most attack hoses and booster hoses carry water from the engine to a nozzle that is used to direct the water onto a fire whereas supply lines are used to provide water to an attack engine from a hydrant, another supply engine, a tanker, a pond, or from a portable pond.

Booster hoses, at about 1-inch diameter, are the smallest hoses and are carried on a reel on the engine. These all-rubber hoses are used for rubbish, brush, and washdown. They handle high pressure (approximately 200psi) but deliver a relatively low volume (approximately 50 gallons per minute). As these hoses are highly mobile, they can be handled by a single firefighter.

Attack hoses range from 1-inch to 3-inches in diameter. Danby uses 1¾ and 2½ inch attack hand lines. Attack hoses are designed to operate at higher pressures than supply lines, with a minimum design pressure is 275psi. These can be operated by 2 to 3 firefighters and can deliver up to 200 gallons of water per minute. Handling one of these requires a bit of training.

Attack hoses are made of an inner waterproof layer and one or two outer layers that, together, handle the high pressures. Hoses usually come in 50-foot lengths and several sections may be coupled together to reach the desired overall length.

A fully charged (filled with water) 2½ inch hose is difficult to maneuver. It weighs about 150 pounds per 50-foot section including couplings, hoses and water. When fighting a fire, the firefighters need sufficient lengths of hose deployed so they can be easily pulled forward, close to the structure or fire, without kinks and tangles. The fully charged weight and the need for hose at the ready is why firefighters pay considerable attention to laying out fire hose before they charge them. They also pay particular attention to the rolling of the empty hose and to properly storing it, readying it for use next time.

Supply hoses range from 2-inch to 6-inch diameter. Danby uses 5-inch supply lines and larger intake lines when drawing from Jennings Pond. Very large industrial fire engines may use 8 inch or even 10 inch hoses. Some of these are rigid hoses that come in 6-, 8- and 10-foot lengths. Others are flexible and they may come in 25-foot lengths. All of these are laid from the water source to the engine, where the attack lines are pressurized.

All of our hoses are tested, once a year, by an outside, licensed firm to meet state mandates.

So when you see a fire engine, you can look at the hoses with a better understanding of what is involved in getting water to where it is needed.

## BEWARE OF PHONE SCAMMERS POSING AS NYSEG REPS

NYSEG continues to learn of fraudulent activities—nationwide and locally—where customers are contacted and asked to pay current or past due charges. Unfortunately, these "payments" go to scammers.

Some customers are being told over the phone that their utilities will be shut off if they do not act quickly.

Take the following precautions to avoid falling victim to a scam:

Do not make any payments over the phone to anyone who contacts you or asks you to dial a different number.

•Never provide your Social Security number, credit card number, or bank information to anyone requesting it (over the phone or in person) unless you initiat-

ed the contact and feel confident that the transaction is legitimate.

- You can easily verify the identity of any NYSEG employee: ask for their employee number or their photo ID card (if in person). Then, contact NYSEG at 800.572.1111 to verify the identity and the nature of their business. NYSEG employees are happy to comply with an identity verification request.
- NYSEG does not ask customers to purchase debit cards (like Green Dot cards) to make payments.
- When making a payment by phone, always ensure you are dialing NYSEG phone numbers: 800.572.1111 (customer service); 888.315.1755 (payment arrangements); or 800.600.2275 (self-service line).
- If you are mailing your payment, the NYSEG address is NYSEG, PO Box 847812, Boston, MA 02284-7812.

Remember, if information about your account balance doesn't match what you expect, or if something sounds too good to be true...it probably isn't true.

It pays to protect yourself from scams. If you have fallen victim to a scam, immediately contact the Federal Trade Commission, [ftc.gov/] or 877.FTC.HELP or the Tompkins County Sheriff, 607.272.2444.
