WHAT IS A CRANKIE? A crankie is an old storytelling art form. A long illustrated scroll is wound onto two spools, which are loaded into a box with a viewing screen. The scroll is hand-cranked while the story is told, accompanied by song, music or puppetry.



#### Property Tax Collection - An Update

Do the actions of policy makers in Washington affect local municipal operations? They certainly did this year, at the turning of the year. Thanks to the "tax reform" passed by Congress, and the limits it will place on allowed state and local tax deductions (starting in 2018), hundreds of property owners scrambled to prepay 2018 Town and County property taxes during the 2017 calendar year. 2017 will be the last year that many property owners will be able to deduct the full amount of the state and local income, school, and property taxes.



Tax bills were sent out just before Christmas in order to give people the opportunity to decide whether the pre-pay option was of benefit to them. Normally, the first day for property tax collection is the first business day in the new year; this year, we were ready after Christmas.

To give you an idea of how the timing, the "original warrant" (total amount to be collected for County, Town, and Fire levies) was \$3,779,519. By the end of business on January 12, \$942,606 was already in hand. This much is not usu-

ally collected until around the 25th of January.

About \(^2\)—roughly \(^5\)675,000—of that was pre-paid before the end of calendar year 2017, both in person and by mail.

It's worth mentioning that a huge chunk of the total levy is received via escrow services at the end of January. This year, however, many escrow services allowed their customers to pre-pay and get reimbursed.

A rough estimate is that 300 people pre-paid 322 tax bills (some people have more than one bill, for more than one property). At least 172 bills were paid in person during the days we were open between Christmas and New Year. While we didn't have the lines reported by some NY Towns, it was quite a ride. We enjoyed a quiet New Year's weekend after that.

After the big rush, the beginning of January has been a bit slower than usual. 184 bills, worth about \$267,000 have come in, versus 238 bills, worth about \$357,000, that were processed by mid-January last year.

The \$675,000 collected in the last two days of December 2017, was truly extraordinary. And, given the change in tax law, a one-time event.

If, for some reason you have still not received your Town and County property tax bill, please call us immediately. We can print out and send a duplicate bill. Please note that if your taxes are paid by an escrow service, the original bill was sent to the bank or payment service. If there has been a change in your escrow status and the bill should come to you, let us know. Again, we can print out a duplicate copy and send it to you right away.

Remember, Town Clerks are only tax collectors. In fact, we face the same "tax pain" as all of the rest of the property owners in Danby. I'm proud that we were able to be successful in helping as many property owners as possible with pre-payment in December, in an effort to help with allowed deductions. I know that there is little I can do to make winter better, but I can promise that the candy bowl will be filled with chocolate kisses including plenty of dark chocolate. Thanks to the generosity of the "loose change chocolate fund," there will be plenty for all.

#### February Hours

During January Tax Collection, the Town Clerk's office will be open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Fridays 10am-5pm, and Saturday mornings, 10am-1pm. We are closed on Sundays and Thursdays. Starting February 1, we'll revert to the usual 10am-Noon hours on Saturday. Tax collection continues through Monday April 2. ## HISTORY IN FEBRUARY

WAYMARKS OF HISTORY CAN BE FOUND almost every day, some big and notable. while some are small and seemingly inconsequential. All are interesting to those of us who are intrigued with delving into the past.

The History Center in Tompkins County (a.k.a. the History Center) is a great place to indulge one's interest. Since February is African-American History Month, the following items in the History Center's news letter caught my eye and reminded me, once again, that history's waymarks are right in the middle of our own communities.

"The Webbs--A Tompkins County Family. In honor of our county's bicentennial, the History Center is celebrating one long-established family from Caroline, the Webbs and their descendants, who exemplify the strength, character, and dedication to family and community that highlight the best of Tompkins County.

"Peter and Phyllis Webb were both born into slavery sometime in the 1790s and brought to New York as children. Phyllis (she had no last name) was born in North Carolina. Peter Webb, who was born in Virginia around 1792, was brought here by John James Speed, a slave merchant who settled in Caroline on Level Green Road.

"Through tremendous hard work and perseverance, Peter bought his freedom in 1818; Phyllis would be freed when slavery was abolished in New York State in 1827."

This photographic exhibit tells the moving and enriching story of one family's triumph over extreme hardship and their prosperous and vibrant descendants.

## Volunteers Fight Blazes

MORE THAN 30 DANBY AND WEST DANBY volunteer firefighters were called into action to fight fires over the holidays. Their job was made more challenging by freezing temperatures, snow, and ice. Fortunately, there was no loss of life or serious injury.

On Christmas evening, a fire on Larue Road destroyed a home. The Danby and West Danby Fire Departments received mutual aid in battling the blaze from the firefighters of Brooktondale, Newfield, Candor, Spencer, Slaterville, and Bangs Ambulance.

Another fire at the beginning of the New Year also resulted in the total loss of a home, on the 2000 block of Danby Road. First responders arrived shortly after 9pm and fought the conflagration into the early morning hours. Our volunteers were joined by firefighters from Candor, Brooktondale, Newfield, Enfield, Spencer, Slaterville and Ithaca.

These recent house fires serve as a timely reminder to thank the first responders and others who put their lives at risk to keep us safe and protect our property. From the chiefs on down, all of the Danby Fire District's firefighters and EMS members are volunteers who devote many hours to training and practicing and are on call,

day and night, to assist in emergencies.

It's also a good moment to remember these timely fire-safety tips:

- Never leave candles or stoves or ovens unattended
- Check tree lights for safety and unplug them when you are not at home
- Make sure that any additional heating devices are approved for home use and turned off when you leave the house.

Demographics factor in as well, with older residents having the difficult task of living on fixed incomes. They cannot afford costly upgrades that would help them reside in their homes.



## Danby News Delivery Changes

It's funny, how our lives are ruled by the strangest things...or by faceless entities like the Post Office.

An innocent address change—three miles down the road—moved me from ZIPcode 14850 to 14883. That meant receiving the Elmira phone book instead of Ithaca's, along with mailings appropriate to Tioga County residents rather than Tompkins dwellers.

Now, the Danby News is having its world turned on its head. *Thanks to recent strict enforcement of USPS rules, the Danby News can no longer be delivered cheaply* to "Postal Patron." We are required to individually address every copy.

Because we've been counting on the "one in every mailbox" feature of Postal Patron delivery, we don't know every Danby address. Until we can figure out which addresses have been "lost", circulation will go down from about 1540 copies to 1350. In spite of this, total postage will go up significantly, as will the cost of printing and the cost and labor of applying most of a thousand extra labels. Delivery time may become longer, as well.

## Our Neighbors: Mark Speiser

I MET WITH MARK AT HIS HOME ON Hornbrook Road on a cold but sunny January day. He's a member of the Danby Volunteer Fire Company and had been fighting a

fire until 3m, so I was happy to find him tired but ready to talk. It had been the town's second major fire in three weeks. We certainly appreciate everything Mark and the other volunteers do for the town.

Mark was born in Hoboken, New Jersey. He made his way to Tompkins County through friends. Here he met and married his wife Sara, who works as a social worker at Hospicare in Ithaca.

Originally, the site on Horn-brook Road was just a trail up to a small cabin. Mark had a woodworking shop in down-town Ithaca and envisioned not only building his own house but moving the woodworking shop to the property.

The shop eventually became Danby Hardwoods, a nationally known hardwood dealership, selling kiln-dried hardwoods that

are used by professional carpenters, home hobbyists, furniture builders, school technology classes, students (including architectural students from Cornell), and others. He gets most of his wood delivered by a company in Pennsylvania, but he also buys wood from other sources like exotic wood dealers or through referral from tree services, who are cutting down interesting trees on private property. Mark pays the tree owner for the wood.

Mark built the house himself in 1984. It's "super insulated" with walls that are a foot thick. Mark stressed that the walls shouldn't be built with 12-inch boards but with two 2x4s with space in between for insulation to prevent transfer of the cold through the wood. He used R36 in the walls and R40 in the roof. "Our property was originally wooded and still is except for the [vegetable] garden."

When I asked Mark what he envisioned for Danby in the next 20 to 25 years, he replied, "We like it here undeveloped. If you want the land around you to be undeveloped,

you better buy it—that's the way it works here." Mark started with 10 acres. When the property next to his began to be subdivided, he bought 10 more acres. "I'm a little bit of a hermit. I wanted to have a boundary between me and my neighbors."

"What goes on on the highway [96B] is not that much of interest to me." He went on to say, "I don't want to get real political about these things. I'm kind of standoffish about it. I know a lot of people want to sell whatever they want and to do whatever they want as long as it's legal. It's a tricky situation, and I understand both sides. And I'm not involved in it. In that sense, I'm apolitical."

Mark made a lot of the furniture in the house and transitioned some time ago to making bowls. Some are all one piece of wood, others are laminated with wa-

terproof glue. One way or the other, they have a unique beauty and vary greatly in size, shape, color, and type of wood. One was made of zebra wood from Africa. He sells the bowls at Ithacamade in the DeWitt Mall and on his web site. Many are special orders. He also sells at craft shows and will sometimes make 150 bowls and go off to several shows at a time. Although Mark is devoting more and more of his time to creating bowls, his son is spending more time helping with Danby Hardwoods and may eventually take it over full-time.
