 $B_{\text{songbird}}^{\text{obolinks}}$ are a relatively common migratory songbird, often found in hayfields and meadows in the Danby area during late spring and summer.

On Tuesday, May 29, 7pm in Danby's Town Hall, I'll be giving a talk titled "Ecology, Behavior, and Conservation of Bobolinks in Upstate New York."

As a Professor Emeritus from Cornell's Department of Natural Resources, I've studied Bobolinks in New York for years. The ecology and behavior of Bobolinks is amazing. Local farmers can make a difference in protecting this species if they are able to adjust their mowing practices in June. Please come to hear the details.

SEED TO SUPPER GARDENING CLASSES GROW AND USE YOUR OWN PRODUCE

The sixth class will feature harvesting, nutrition, and recipes for your vegetables. If it's preferable to the class, that class (June 13) may be moved to August, when harvesting has begun.

All participants will receive a free beginning gardening book, seeds, transplants,



Spring Rabies Clinics

Many Danby pet owners rely on the free rabies clinics to keep their dogs, cats, and ferrets healthy and safe with up-to-date vaccinations.

In order to renew dog licenses each year, we need to have the most current rabies vaccine certificate on file in the Town Clerk's office. Thank you, to all of the dog owners who renew their licenses on time. This saves the Town time and money, and reduces paper waste, by avoiding the need to send additional monthly reminders.

The Tompkins County Health Department has scheduled its Spring Rabies Vaccine Clinics in the following

locations: Lansing on May 2, Danby May 3, Dryden on May 9, Enfield on May 10, and Ithaca on May 17. The Free Rabies Clinic in Danby on May 3 will be held at the Fire Station on Route 96B. Proof of prior vaccination is required to receive a three year certificate for cats and dogs. Those with questions about the Spring Rabies Clinics should call the Environmental Health Division of the Health Department, 607.274.6688.

As a reminder, Spring office hours for the Town Clerk are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday 10am-5pm and Saturdays 10am-Noon. We shift to *summer hours* in the middle of May, with our last Saturday for the season on May 12. And, thanks to resident generosity, the bowl of chocolate kisses remains full.

Culverts and bridges

The engineering report on the Gunderman Road bridge will be completed and reviewed soon, so I will have to wait until next month to fill you in on whether it can be repaired or will need to be rebuilt. There are other projects around Town, also awaiting approval.

Water, Water, Water

It seems like a lot of what the Town is engaged in involves water. Everything that is built requires water in some form or another: wells, ponds, road ditches, culverts, homes, farms, and more, so water is a big deal for all of us. Danby has been, and still is, making a big commitment to understanding all of our water needs.

The Cayuga Lake Watershed conference we are helping to organize will address storm water issues. The involvement of our Highway Department in the storm water coalition, is an example of our concerns.

The movement of surface water remains a Town priority but it is not the only concern. Subsurface water,

The "Seed to Supper" program is a shared program of the Oregon Food Bank's Learning Gardens and has been adopted by the Cornell Cooperative Extension of New York State.

aquifer water, is an issue as well. We have invested a lot of time and energy over the last few years to develop a ground water protection plan. You might ask, "Why is this important?" It can show us where our recharge areas are; this could help to create zoning that protects the recharge in areas where it is limited. In addition, establishing a baseline for additional water information, like well log data, is useful. Knowing where the deepdrilled wells are, having estimates of well yields, and even gathering related information about water quality is important.

Some areas of the Town have lots of good quality water, others have hard water or water with lots of iron in it. Many have sulfur water, others have little water. So, everything we learn about all aspects of our water helps our planning and helps new residents understand the dynamics of their land.

Woods Hollowed Out

Deputron Hollow received a great deal of attention this month, thanks to a logger who disturbed the land and road while removing hundreds of trees from the hollow. There are many issues that have arisen from this tragedy and The Town is dealing with them in an active way. Some of what we can do involves changes in our land and road use laws. Other aspects we will be asking our Conservation Advisory Council to explore include landowner education, and permits to log that require a forestry report to be submitted. This is an ongoing story, so there will be more to come.

Water, Water, Everywhere SURVEY OF QUANTITY & QUALITY

NE OF THE MOST DIFFICULT parts of attending Danby's board meetings is understanding and reacting to the various stories presented by residents who are concerned about changes to their neighborhoods.

Traffic is a frequent concern, as is preserving rural character, but nothing comes up as often as water. The enormous investment we have put into our homes is painfully dependent on a water source. Our well.

Some parts of Danby have abundant water and limitless wells, while houses in other neighborhoods must conserve water and, sometimes, drill multiple wells.

have water con-The Town has benefitted from several water studies but only one of them—by the cerns. USGS—actually collected new data and only from test wells near the NYS Rt.96B corridor. All other information about wells was taken from reports submitted by well drillers.

The Well Completion Reports that drillers submit to the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation have only been mandatory since the year 2000. Prior to then, the DEC has only sparse records. The reports only exist for the hundreds of new homes/wells, not the thousandish older ones in Danby. Even for those homes, a key number—gallons per minute—is often only a rough estimate, taken rapidly in an ad hoc fashion, and not representative of long-term real-world water availability.

The survey on the next two pages is intended to bring our current, real-world well information to light. It will not be rigorously scientific because few homeowners can do detailed tests, and most, if not all, of the data collected will be subjective. Perhaps no better than a

rushed test conducted by a driller, but it will be current, and will describe wells have been in use for a while.

The survey is a private effort but the results—the overall summaries and maps,

not the individual responses—will be available to residents and to the Town. It might provide some comfort to homeowners who wonder whether their good water is a fluke or is neighborhood-wide; likewise to homeowners at the other end of the water spectrum.

Use your imagination: at some time in the future, the results might be a planning tool for the Town; perhaps to help identify an area where municipal water would be useful (as happened in West Danby).

The value of the survey comes from being able to see the answers to the questions laid on a map. Where is the water with minerals? Are there neighborhoods where there are seasonal water issues? Neighborhoods where residents believe water is becoming scarce...and for what reason?

All of this depends on knowing the location of the well, so it's important for responses to include this information. If you provide contact information (name, phone, Email), it will not be distributed unless you give permission. It would, however, be useful to help clear up any questions

about the information on your survey.

- It's very important to provide an address or GPS location for your well. Contact info is helpful in case there are questions.
- To make the survey useful, it's important to have as many responses as possible. Please fill out the survey.
- The most fun comes from measuring water flow (see below) but answers to all the rest of the questions are just as useful.
- A date can be a year. Month/Day are OK, too.
- On all questions, a good guess is great, but feel free to leave an item blank if necessary.

If you test your own water flow:

- If you fill a container at a sink or tub, the water flow may be limited by a flow restrictor in the faucet. The results are not limited by your well.
- If you measure flow from the spigot attached to your pressure tank, first measure how much water comes out before the pump kicks in. Then measure how long it takes to refill the pressure tank. Then repeat and average. In this case, you're measuring the output of your pump, not necessarily the well.
 - If you can pump water directly out of the well, determine how long it takes the well to recharge. Measure the water level first, pump out water, then measure the new water level...and see

how long it takes to return to the original level. A 6-inch casing has about 1.5 gallons per foot.

- The online survey at [danbyny.org/WaterSurvey] will have links to article(s) that describe this measurement in more detail. Use this, if you can...the results are much easier to tabulate.
- Return paper surveys to "Water Survey, POBox 6886, Ithaca, NŶ 14851" or to the Town Clerk's office. I can pick them up there.

HISTORY'S PLACE IN OUR TOWN OR, A PLACE FOR HISTORY IN TOWN



Danby's Unique Natural Areas

THE CHARGE OF the Town Of Danby's Conservation Advisory Council (CAC) is to determine ways to protect the Town's valuable natural resources and land.

One way the CAC identifies important conservation values is through the use of the Tompkins County Unique Natural Area (UNA) inventory. A UNA, "... is a part of the landscape that has outstanding geological and environmental qualities, such as special natural communities, or plants and animals that are rare or scarce elsewhere in the county or region. UNAs fall into at least one of these categories: important natural communities, quality of example, rare or scarce plants or animals, geological importance or cultural significance..." (quote from the County web site).

The UNA inventory was started in 1973 and has been revised and updated since then. There are currently 195 UNAs in Tompkins County, ten of which are part of Danby. "A UNA is not a regulatory designation, and it does not provide legal protection for an area." It does provide important information to help each landowner to become better acquainted with his or her own property and for municipalities to create policies to protect their natural resources.
