an organic farmer/gardener for 30 years. Each student will go home with a container of sowed seeds and seedlings to transplant.



Time To Go Fishing

TROUT SEASON OPENED APRIL 1. Fishing is a very popular sport in NY, and fly fishing is especially popular in our local rivers and streams. If you are fishing for trout or salmon, you will want to know where the public fishing spots are. This information and much more can be found on the NYS DEC web site and in the April 2019 Fishing Digest available at the Town Clerk's office.

Anyone over the age of 16 needs to have a freshwater fishing license to fish legally in New York State. Residents are



allowed to fish on their own lands without a license. If you fish anywhere other than your own property, you need to purchase a license. These are available from Town Clerk's office during our regular hours. And, yes, you need a license even if you release all the fish you catch.

A resident license—valid for one year costs \$25. We accept cash or check (no credit card payments). You can purchase it any time during the year and the license doesn't have to start on the purchase date; you can choose any start date that doesn't

overlap with a current license. Many people buy these when they get their hunting license in the Fall. Others, particularly those who don't hunt but only fish, often get their license in the spring, at the start of trout season.

If you get caught fishing without a license, the violation could have a fine as large as \$250 and/or 15 days in jail. Why take the risk, when a fishing license costs such a relatively small amount? Your license fee goes to help protect the waters we all enjoy for recreation.

A few days each year, New York allows *try before you buy* fishing, when a license is *not* required. The dates for 2019 are June 29-30, September 28, and November 11. If you've been interested in fishing, these could be good dates to try it out. Avid anglers can bring a friend or relative fishing along on those days.

Housing Survey

Danby has been awarded a \$30,000 Community Development Block Grant to update information on the state and condition of housing in Danby. This Housing Survey needs to be complete by February 17, 2020. The exact details of the housing survey are still being formulated. The public will be informed when it is underway. When the grant funding is 75 percent expended, there will be a public hearing to inform residents and property owners of the preliminary findings of the Housing Survey. Public participation is an important part of CDBG projects. So, keep your ears and eyes open for more details in the future.

Summer Hours

As the brown flora around us turns green, thoughts turn to gardening and spending time outdoors. Summer hours for the Town Clerk's office begin in May. Our last open Saturday (until the Fall) is May 4. We begin summer hours on Mother's Day weekend.

The Danby Library is still open, and you can take out books on Saturday mornings, 10am-Noon, in addition to any time the Town Hall is open for regular business during the week.

For all services, the Town Clerk's office is open 10am-5pm Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. As always, we are closed on Thursdays and Sundays, and the chocolate bowl remains well supplied. Thank you for your sweet generosity.

County Legislature Update

TOMPKINS COUNTY IS ABOUT TO PURCHASE a piece of downtown property. As of this writing we have voted to purchase the property, but the closing has not yet happened.

The property, which you may know as Baker Dental Associates, is located half a block from most of the other County buildings: the Old Jail, the legislature chambers, the courthouse, and the building that houses the Board of Elections and the Assessment Department.

There is no definite plan of what will happen on this site, but the intention is to solve several problems:

- Most of the current office space is badly overcrowded.
- There are insufficient parking spots for the employees and no parking spots for the public.
- We currently rent several office spaces around town to house all our programs.
- We are working on getting a third County Court Judge to ease the caseload on the overcrowded system, and we will need to make space for that court.

The goal would be to pay for the cost a new building without raising any new taxes. We would do this through a combination of the fund balance (the "savings account"), money saved from no longer having to rent some of the office space we currently pay for, possibly selling off one of our less-functional buildings, and modifying the capital spending plan that we currently have in place.

The property spans the block from Sears Street to Tioga Street. About 30 years ago, 3 houses were knocked down on the Sears Street portion of the property, and it has been used illegally as a parking lot ever since. We would likely restore some or all of that housing, and seek to make it affordable housing.

The County currently has 65 parking spots, but about 110 employees who drive to work. You can imagine how this can be a very unpleasant and stressful experience for the employees. In addition to the new building, the new property will help a lot with making a reasonable amount of parking available for County employees. Plus, I am hoping that we can finally give some parking to the public who are coming to the County buildings to conduct business and for public meetings.

Every time the County spends money on big projects like this, we get a lot of complaints from the public. I believe that this project is very justified, and I wanted to try to lay out some of the reasons why I think that. As always, feel free to contact me with questions or comments.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

HELLO TO THOSE OF YOU who are reading this. Here is my monthly report to the Town on relevant events.

The year-end report to the State on Town finances is out, kind of like our tax returns. This has freed us to explore different parts of the Town infrastructure. Roads, buildings, and equipment are not the only things holding the Town together.

Finances are at the heart of the matter, with things like insurance being thrown into the mix. Danby is a two million dollar Town. This money is dispersed, if we have budgeted properly, over the year. This means a lot of money sits in the bank for extended periods.



In May, I will be bringing a proposal to the Town Board for its consideration. We have been working with our bank to understand this issue, and feel we are ready to share what we have learned. This proposal would have the Town do some investing of idle funds.

The Town also puts money away for certain long-term purchase plans; things like the solar project, equipment purchases, and building reserves. I believe these funds should be working harder for us.


New offices and space at the Highway Department includes a wash bay and heat pumps. Garage door construction can begin now that our energy loss survey is accomplished.



Final approval of our housing grant has happened, and we will be looking for a consultant to do the work. Housing in the Town will be evaluated, the different aspects of the Town will be looked at, and action plan will be generated. This project will evolve over a number of years, and position us to apply for funds for remediation.

The process is similar to what we've done with work on stream stabilization: pick a problem, hire an engineer to draw up recommendations, and then seek money to remedy the problem.

WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE Submitted by Tod Sukontarak, Water Commissioner



THE DISTRICT HAS AP-PROVED TOd's request to attend the New York Rural Water Association Annual Workshop, held at Turning Stone from May 20 to 22. It is a good opportunity for water operators to meet their necessary training hours as well as to get first hand feedback on issues confronting our system.

We are currently looking at more accurate ways to monitor our water disinfection and hope to discuss them with other system operators.

The next water district meeting will be held at the West Danby Fire Station on May 29, 5pm.

By next month, our roads will have dried enough for actual work to begin. My June report will have a update on roads, bridges, and culverts.

EV: What's Watt?, cont'd from front page—

We all live with electricity and gasoline, but few of us have a gut feeling for how the energy in a kilowatt-hour of electricity compares to the energy in a gallon of gas.

A kilowatt-hour (kWh) is 1000W (watts) for 1 hour. Your toaster uses 1000W, but only for a minute or two. Toasting a bagel is maybe 0.033kWh; not much compared to the average home, which uses about 28kWh (about 840 bagels) per day. Let's roll that bagel down the road.

A reasonably efficient EV passenger car, say, a Prius Prime, gets about 4 miles per kWh during the summer. So 28kWh of daily home electricity rolls that Prius 112 miles down the road.

Gasoline has a *lot* of power in it and that power can be expensive. Play with numbers and units, and it turns out that 1 gallon of gasoline is the same thing as 33.7kWh. Wait a minute, here. If 28kWh gets you 112 miles, then 33.7kWh gets you...almost 135 miles down the road.

Does this mean EV cars are getting 135MPG? It's not that simple, but yes. Electric motor drive, thanks to fewer moving parts and no energy going out a tailpipe, converts about 60% of the power in a battery to motion; a gas engine drive uses only about 20% of the power in its fuel. Fewer parts also mean lower maintenance cost (imagine no more motor oil changes).

But, wait, it gets better. If you charge the EV battery at home, the fuel cost savings (electricity vs. gasoline) is amazing.

The \$3 you pay per gallon at the pump would buy you about 20kWh. The gallon might get you maybe 40 miles but the 20kWh could get you 80 miles. Not bad at all but, if you have extra Solar PV power that you sell back to the power company, the \$3 could get you 120kWh...or 480 miles. Your fuel cost savings can help finance those Solar PV panels!

VOU HAVE OUESTIONS about Dotson Park

You have questions about Dotson Park...and we have answers!

What's up with the natural playground?

Thanks to park donors and a recent grant, we now have funding to begin phase one of the playground construction! Climbing boulders and a slide should be arriving in May.

Now we just need a few volunteers to help our project leaders get the work done. Our first work party will be on Saturday, May 18 and Sunday, May 19, Noon-4pm both days. Projects for the weekend include bench and boardwalk construction, story walk development, and sign installation. DCPA will provide food and drinks each afternoon, along with guidance on what work needs to be done. Bring a cordless power drill, if you have one. How does DCPA prioritize its budget?

The DCPA receives an allocation from the Town of Danby that covers the cost of the equipment and gas to mow the park, as well as the cost of insurance. All other funding for the park is by donation. For example, the DiscIthaca members donate all of the materials and labor to build and maintain the disc golf course, and we appreciate their commitment!

Speaking of mowing, who does that?

Volunteers! There is a core group of folks who are trained to drive the tractor, and they donate many

hours of their time each summer and fall to keep the grass under control. The tractor can only go so far back into the park, because the ground is so wet. In fact, sometimes you might see tire tracks where the tractor starts to sink in.

Any plans to work on the trails soon?

Some of the trails overlap the mowed areas of the park, and those are in pretty good shape. In areas the tractor cannot access, the trails can be rough. We are looking for volunteers to help trim branches and keep the trails clear. Please contact [dotsonpark@gmail.com] if you are interested in helping with this!

We are also building some new boardwalks—make soggier areas easier to traverse—during the May 18/19 workdays.

What's the deal with the new parking area by the Dotson Park entrance?

TCAT and the Town of Danby worked together to build a new park and ride area on the east side of Danby Road. In the near future, they will build a shelter to protect people waiting for a bus.

This did not cost the park any money, DCPA simply agreed to host the parking area. Good news for park patrons: with the addition of the park and ride, the Highway Department will be plowing the park road, which will make the park more accessible during the snowy months!

MANAGING YOUR WOODS

DO YOU OWN A WOODLOT and wonder if you could manage it to produce quality timber long into the future? What would your options be? Would your work be worth the effort? Would climate change mess it all up? Is it better to leave things alone, or get involved as an active steward of your woods?

Brett Chedzoy, a regional forester with Cornell Cooperative Extension of Schuyler County, will speak to all of that and more on Thursday, May 30, 7pm, in Danby's Town Hall. Brett has a wealth of practical hands-on experience to draw on from thirty years of experience in forestry, including his long-time management of family tree farms in Argentina and NY. He knows how to integrate tree growing with other uses of the land--like pasture, "silvopasting". There are many consideration to successfully achieve one's objectives. Come find out what works now and what has the best chance of succeeding going forward in light of current challenges to healthy and sustainable woodlands.

NATURAL RESOURCES INVENTORY

DURING A RECENT MEETING of Danby's Conservation Advisory Council (CAC), C.J. Randall, the former Town Planner, presented the final version of the Natural Resources Inventory (NRI). This was a milestone for the CAC, completing one of its major tasks—a process that had been ongoing since its inception in 2010

The NRI collects information about the natural resources of our town in a usable format and interprets the findings. The NRI is digitally stored in map format

in a geographic information system. This provides a visualization of the patterns of natural and cultural resources and land uses within the Town and its surroundings. It's easy to see the relationship between the resources and features like roads and residential neighborhoods.

The primary purpose of an NRI is to provide data that can form the basis for municipal planning in the preparation of plans, review of proposed development plans, and completion of environmental assessment forms. The NRI also serves as an informational document for those looking to learn more about the natural environment of Danby. It clarifies information such as the location of prime agricultural soils and steep slopes.

The NRI includes the following easilyupdated databases containing vital information about the Town:

- Waterbodies
- Watersheds
- Wetlands
- Aquifers
- Soils
- Bedrock Geology
- Surficial Geology
- Flood Zone Areas
- Slope and Topology
- Protected Open Space
- Land Use and Land cover
- Unique Natural Aras
- Natural Heritage Sites
- Scenic Resources

The creation of this natural resource inventory also supports several goals set forth in the Town of Danby's Comprehensive Plan. These goals are:

- Maintain, enhance, and protect Danby's natural resources and natural areas for public and private activities.
- Support and create public and private programs related to natural resources.
- Promote public awareness and appreciation of Danby's diverse natural resources.
- Protect water resources from sedimentation, run-off from erosion, drainage, contamination, and flood-ing.
- Innovative and responsible land use.

Our town is home to many important natural resources. Protecting and maintaining natural resources is important because of their intrinsic value and also because their varied ecological, life-supporting functions. Through a better understanding of the exact nature of the Town's natural resources, better decisions will be made about future development and preservation of space.

EV IN YOUR FUTURE: GETTING CHARGED Submitted by Ted Crane

Ask YOURSELF, "What is my average daily travel?" Work, shopping, and back home. If the battery in an EV (electric vehicle) has the moxie (a.k.a. kilowatt-hours or kWh) to take you that far, you don't need a gasoline engine. An EV car with a smallish battery—like the Prius Prime—may have enough kWh to complete simple daily travel: Danby to downtown and around, and back.

Do you need to go farther than that? Two choices: a bigger battery or a hybrid EV with gasoline backup. When the Tompkins County Health Department began converting to EV vehicles, it knew the average daily travel per car was less than 50 miles. To stay on the safe side, it purchased Chevy Volts because the Volt's battery will go 50 miles and...it has a gasoline engine as backup. The Volt was a safe choice but, fact is, the Department hasn't bought gas for those cars.

What about long trips? Last weekend, I drove about 650 miles. The overnight charge in my Prius ran out after 25 miles...but the gasoline engine—augmented by energy captured and recycled by the battery—averaged almost 70MPG for the rest of the trip.

There are currently few EV options that will take you 650 miles, or even close to that, on one charge. You have to plan your trip around recharges: know where the chargers are and build charging time into your

travel (and time to wait for an available charger). Some drivers enjoy this twist to long-distance travel but it's not everybody's cup of tea. This will change in a few years, as the infrastructure providing the "gas station model" of charging improves.

> How about charging for short trips? EVs with smaller batteries can easily charge up overnight from a household

outlet (a "Level 1" charger). Bigger batteries could require "Level 2" chargers with wiring and outlets similar to an electric oven, electric dryer, or electric water heater.

Home charging is not without cost but, compared to gasoline, home electricity is cheap. The \$3 you pay per gallon at the pump would buy you about 20kWh. That gallon gets you maybe 40 miles, while the 20kWh could get you 80 miles. If you have Solar PV panels, the \$3 gets you maybe 120kWh...or 480 miles. Your fuel cost savings can help finance those Solar PV panels!

How long will it be before businesses take advantage of this and begin using free charging as a sales incentive?




