Tidying up at the Highway Department

IN THE LAST COUPLE OF MONTHS, the Highway Department has been undergoing big changes. However, these changes aren't as noticeable as the new stairs and renovated offices. With all hands on deck, Highway has been overhauling and organizing their records going back all the way to the 1960s and 1970s.

Organizing consists of going through tons of boxes and deciding which ones are duplicates (like vouchers and minutes) and which ones need to be archived (like payroll). These, along with zoning and coding records, are being sorted and filed through by Mary Ann Barr, Danby's Document Manager and Town Historian. Before she can even sort and file (and put documents in fresh new file folders, just waiting to be put in the vault), she has to get the documents ready, which consists of getting rid of the humidity and other gunk that has been building up for many decades.

One way to decrease humidity is through silicon beads. The indicating beads

change color while the non-indicating ones don't...but both of them absorb the humidity of the documents. It is very satisfying and mystifying to watch the beads turn from orange to green. Green beads are full of moisture and are dried out by being baked in an oven for a few hours before being replaced in a document box.

The boxes keep coming, and Mary Ann gamely sorts through each one, making sure that the town records are saved. It takes a lot to keep a Town and Highway Department running, and tidying and organizing is just one part of making sure it functions well.



Applicants Sought

The Town Board of the Town of Danby invites residents to apply now for volunteer seats on the Conservation Advisory Council starting immediately. Your involvement is welcome and needed.

There are currently open seats on the Conservation Advisory Council. This past spring, the Town Board increased the potential number of CAC members in order to increase involvement. Terms on the CAC last two years, with the potential for reappointment. The CAC advises the Board in the development, management, and protection of the Town's natural resources. The full charge of the CAC, including recommendations to the Town Board for Conservation Easements on property in Danby, keeping an open space inventory, and drafting management plans for Town of Danby Property, is available in the Town Clerk's office.

The Town Board is also seeking applicants for the position of Town Planner. John Czamanske has been serving in this role since CJ Randall resigned to take another position. Czamanske's tenure is temporary; he came out of retirement to help the Town through this transition. A new job description has been developed and Danby is now seeking a permanent Planner, to help guide the Town into the future.

Appointment applications are available through the Town Clerk's office. This simple form includes contact information for the applicant and three simple questions: any experience (professional, educational, etc.) which would assist in the position, a brief description of why you would like to be considered, and what you would hope to accomplish in this position.

EV: PLAYING WELL THE INDUSTRY

ONE OF THE POWER INDUSTRY'S better-kept secrets is that green energy sources don't always play well with traditional, large-scale power generation equipment. Integrating the two presents challenges.

Solar, wind, and even hydropower are intermittent sources of energy (night time, calm days, and dry spells get in the way) but the power industry must provide continuous service. Older, coal-fired generators do not "turn on and off" easily and cannot be used as backup. It's expensive to construct new gas-fired installations, not to mention the issues related to gas production.

Big batteries are needed to store energy produced when the sun shines, the wind blows, or the water falls, so it can be used when green energy isn't available...and for peak usage periods like scorching summer afternoons.



New England's largest battery is mechanical. A "pumped-storage hydroelectric" battery is inside a mountain in Northfield, MA. Energy is stored by pumping

water uphill and recovered, when needed, by letting it flow back down. Like spicy foods, though, this solution isn't for everyone: are there any caverns for storage underneath the Finger Lakes? Yes? Could they be used for this purpose?

Cheaper and more efficient versions of the ubiquitous chemical battery are a hot topic. All too often we hear about potentially revolutionary advances in battery tech but the key word is, "potentially."

The cost of lithium-ion batteries has fallen rapidly: about 85 percent less than ten years ago and as much as 30 percent less than just last year. It still takes many batteries to store large amounts of power but it can be done less expensively than in the past.

Some power utilities are installing massive battery banks to service peak power periods. The cost is less than building new generation plants, let alone running them.

Other utilities are taking a different approach. Green Mountain Power, serving 265,000 customers in Vermont, has a dream—and an ongoing program—to place whole-house batteries in every home. These would capture green energy and provide service during power interruptions—effectively allowing the utility to shed load during peak power demand moments.

WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

THE SECOND of our twice annual hydrant flushing will be done on Monday and Tuesday, August 12 and 13, weather permitting. The hydrants north of the fire station will be done on Monday and those south on Tuesday, starting both days at 9am.

On July 16, we replaced the chlorinator in the pump house as it had been intermittently not functioning. Hopefully, that will alleviate some of the swings in chlorine counts we've been experiencing. We had a service line leak on Brown Road that was repaired by Minter Construction on July 11. Apart from that leak, our water consumption has been about normal for summer months.

Thank you to Carl Seamon for his years of dedicated work in our Water District as he will soon be leaving his position as one of our two water operators. Carl's position will be taken over by Scott Wendt who was approved by the state for the position. Welcome Scott.

Our next District meeting will be on Wednesday, July 31, 5pm, in the West Danby Fire Station conference room. ♣

Tompkins County can follow this example. A PPP (public private partnership) with local power utilities, including traditional fossil-fuel generators and developers of large-scale solar, wind, and hydroelectric facilities, could explore ways to decentralize power production and storage. The goals would be to reduce reliance on aging, expensive fossil-fuel generation, provide increased reliability for consumers, and in the long run, save money.

All of this is closely tied to the ineluctable transition to EV (electric vehicle) transportation. Solar PV systems, together with battery storage, can collect daylight power and transfer it to an idle vehicle at night. Outside of the elusive *free* commercial charging station, charging at home is the least expensive way to fill an EV fuel tank (electric "fuel" is a lot cheaper—perhaps 2x—than gasoline). EV charging at home, with power from PV, is cheaper yet (by as much as 6x, or 12x compared to gasoline) and is pollution free. ♣

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

WELL, HELLO AUGUST, hope your summer is rewarding.

Town items of interest: we have met with the sheriff's department to talk about our roads. Many residents have asked the Town Board for speed reductions on Town Roads. All good, except that drivers apparently have trouble reading the new signage and do not slow down.

So, this month, short and sweet: residents, please notify me about speeding problems. Tell me the road where it happens, and tell me when—what day, what time—the traffic problems peak. So, let's say, "South Danby Road, 7:30-9am, traffic is racing, and then again around 4:30pm when traffic is returning home."

Send them in, and let's see if we can gather up all our trouble spots. We will compile this list and send it off to the Sheriff. The goal is to have this all together before start of school in September.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

HERE IS A ROUNDUP of several issues the County has been involved with.

TCAT, our countywide public bus service, is lowering its fares for buses to and from Danby (and everywhere in Zone 2). The regular fare for that route has been \$2.50. It will be lowered to \$1.50, which will be the same fare for all TCAT buses everywhere in the county. The new fare starts August 25. We hope that some of the money lost in fares will be made up by increased ridership. Regardless, we felt that riding the bus should cost the same no matter where in the county a person is travelling.

Many people are aware of a product known as a “personal emergency response system” (PERS), also called “medical alert”. This is the product you can wear as a pendant or bracelet that has a button to summon emergency help. What you may not be aware of is that Tompkins County offers this service to residents. There are many private companies offering this service, and if you are satisfied with your provider than you should stick with them. However, Tompkins County contracts with a provider with whom we have negotiated certain conditions. By using the PERS service provided through Tompkins County, you can be assured you are getting accurate information, no one is trying to sell you additional items, and there is a real, local person you can call or visit if you have questions. Also, a County employee would be the one installing and servicing your unit, and that person can provide you with other information about services for seniors. The standard fee is \$25 a month, but prices may vary based on equipment and qualifying factors. Last year, 531 people in Tompkins County took advantage of this program. If you are interested in knowing more about this service, call the Tompkins County Office for the Aging at 607.274.5482.

Living in Danby, I don't have to travel very often on NYS Rt.13 between Ithaca and Dryden. But when I do, I become aware of what residents on that side of the county know very well: traffic is often very heavy. Tompkins County is undertaking a study of the section of route 13 from Warren Road to the Village of Dryden. The study will look at traffic safety issues, access issues, bus transit and multi-modal possibilities, land-use along NYS Rt.13, zoning, and pedestrian safety.

WILD PARSNIP: KILL IT BEFORE IT MULTIPLIES

PARSNIPS ARE DELICIOUS root vegetables, so it was a surprise to learn that Wild Parsnip plants are capable of causing severe chemical burns on skin.

The plant produces a compound in its leaves, stems, flowers, and fruits that causes intense, localized burning, rash, severe blistering, and discoloration on contact with the skin on sunny days. This is not an allergic reaction, it is a chemical burn brought on by an increase in the skin's sensitivity to sunlight. Affected areas can remain discolored and sensitive to sunlight for up to two years, similar to but not as severe as contact with giant hogweed.



All of this was, for me and many Danbyites, mostly academic knowledge until this summer. I don't know whether it's a natural spread of the plant, or something brought on by the wet spring... but Wild Parsnip is all over Danby this summer. It completely surrounds my mailbox, and I've seen dense clusters lining the roads all around.

What's it look like? A lot like Queen Anne's Lace but, where the Lace has tiny white flowers, Wild Parsnip has bright yellow ones. The plants can be several feet tall, with sturdy stalks/stems with vertical grooves running full length. Kindof like a celery, but round, not U-shaped. If you cut the stalk (not with bare skin!), there are hollow tubes inside.

What to do? First and foremost, take precautions to prevent plant sap from contacting exposed skin! Mow when plants first produce flowers, but before seeds enlarge. Or, cut the root 1" below the ground using a tool like a spaded shovel or remove plants by pulling, gripping the stalk just above the ground (wear gloves and protect your skin). Wild Parsnip seeds are very hardy; they can last four years before growing a plant... so these control measures should be undertaken before wild parsnip plants go to seed. ❀

DANBY COMMUNITY LIBRARY

THE BOOK WOMAN of Troublesome Creek is based on the Pack Horse Library Project of Eastern Kentucky. The project was part of the Works Project Administration (WPA) in the years following the Great Depression. This project brought in librarians from around the state and charged them with providing routine library services to remote towns. The librarians would travel on horseback loading up their books before dawn and returning around dusk, traveling hundreds of miles each month. They were paid \$28/month and worked all year long. By the early 1940s there were 30 libraries. The program came to an end in 1943 after losing its funding.


