Scots-Irish Roots Of Old-Time Music

David Deacon chuckles as he admits to his history, "I'm

a transplant from Southern Pennsylvania, near the small country town of Bird-In-Hand. It's sort of, like, near Gettysburg and near Amish country, and nowhere at all like Philadelphia or Pittsburgh." Some say he grew up, walking from General Store to General Store, and learning fiddle by sitting at the feet of old-timers perched on barrel tops...playing fiddle and banjo tunes.

David moved to Syracuse and, in the nature of how traditional music works, he met Deborah Justice (another PA transplant, but to Ithaca), a banjo, guitar, and hammered dulcimer player.

David and Deb are coming to Danby's Town Hall on Sunday, January 12, 2020, 3pm, to play for the first concert in the Danby Community Council's 2020 Vision series. Arrive early to get a seat!

In the 1820s, before the definition of the various genres of music that today make up American folk music, a man got on his horse in rural Pennsylvania and took a trip south to the Carolinas, west to Tennessee, and all the places between. He returned with a wife and with a sketchbook full of stories and tunes. He had the picture, in notes and staves, of what the only-recently-united States of America sounded like. David and Deb have those tunes, and they'll be playing them for us in Danby.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

The Loophole In Tompkins County's Open Meetings Policy

Earlier this year, the County Legislature spent a lot of time over several months discussing an update to our Open Meetings Policy. There is a NY State Open Meetings Law, and you would think it would apply to all meetings where County business was being discussed and voted on. You would be wrong.

I have personal experience with three different County programs, where a group called itself a "subcommittee" and then went ahead and met without public notice or the ability of the public to attend, did not take minutes, and took votes during those meetings. I believe that this is a clear violation of section 103(e) of the NYS Open Meetings Law.

To remedy this situation, I proposed numerous times to simply add the word "subcommittee" to our policy. I lost that vote. I have lost a number of votes, and someday I plan to write an article for this space titled *Legislative Votes I have Lost*. Usually I do not take it personally when I lose a vote. But this time, it did become personal.

Hamlet...no, not that Hamlet.

The term "hamlet" has its origins in Medieval Anglo-Norman (hamelet) and is related to the Old High German "heim" and Old English "ham", which mean "village" or "home". These words survive in place names such as Mannheim, Trondheim, Cheltenham, and Nottingham.

Through millenia we humans, as social creatures, have tended to gather together in groupings of various sizes. Cities, towns, villages, hamlets...home. A powerful and fundamental concept.

In human communities of all sizes, conditions from social bonds to the economic reason for being have changed. Patterns of transportation, employment, retail, education, and religious observance have altered the way we live our lives.

What can we do to improve our human settlements? Many city neighborhoods and small towns (what we in New York State tend to call "villages") have become desirable and valued places to be. Can hamlets in general do the same? Can Danby's two hamlets do the same?

Conservation Advisory Council Looking For New Members

Are you interested in advocating for preservation and protection of natural resources? Are you engaged in agricultural use of the land or a large landowner? Are you a person—young or old—interested in the conservation of your family's land against the pressures of development? Do you want to see Danby maintain its rural character?

The Danby Conservation Advisory Council (CAC) is looking for Danby residents like you to work on issues like these and more. Among our charges is to inventory and map open spaces and wetlands of the town, and develop a list of scenic and/or historic sites that the community decides are important to protect. One of our ways to help protect land is the Danby Conservation Easement (DCE) program. We are searching for people interested in protecting their land from future development. The DCE is a very flexible way for landowners to give up some or all of their development rights in order to protect their land in perpetuity—forever, in a word. A CAC member works with the landowner to help them determine the desired level of protection. Ownership and use remain with the landowner, but easement limitations pass on with sale of the property to future owners.

NY State tax credits on conservation easement protected land can help offset property taxes. Look on the Danby CAC web page for further information. Contact the Town Clerk to submit an application for appointment to the CAC.

Let me begin this, my first message to you as Town Supervisor, with a note of gratitude. Gratitude for your support at the polls, certainly, but also gratitude for the service of those just retired from public office.

Ric Dietrich served a total of 22 years as Town Supervisor, but even that remarkable achievement is merely the most recent phase of a lifetime of public service that included a career with the Ithaca Youth Bureau and volunteer stints with the Danby Fire Department and a variety of Town boards and committees. His ability to calm a crowd of sometimes angry and concerned residents was both impressive and admirable—a hard act to follow, although I will do my best to do so.

Pamela Goddard served 10 years as Town Clerk, succeeding the even longer-serving and much admired Carol Sczepanski under somewhat trying circumstances. She has earned a place among the best in that office and is even now helping to ensure a seamless transition to her successor.

Retiring Town Board member Jack Miller's cooperative spirit and thoughtful input contributed meaningfully to the good working relationship among Town Board members.

My gratitude extends to appreciating the team of public servants that are now in place and will carry the work forward. We are well-positioned to address the challenges before us; doing so is my highest priority.

Danby really is at something of a critical juncture. Unless we take action to invest in our future we are well on our way to being a former place, little more than a collection of roads connecting disconnected residences to Ithaca and beyond. That in itself is a very good thing, and one almost universally cherished. We love the rurality of Danby and the connection to nature that comes with it. Unless we take measures to protect it, though, this too shall pass.

Last month, I found out that a County subcommittee was going to release a 93-page report about the pros and cons of logging the County-owned forest. This is an issue that I have followed closely. I sent in a request to see the document that had already been circulated to the subcommittee members. My request was denied.

The job of elected officials would be easier without the Open Meetings Law. That is exactly why we have it, and why it's important to follow the spirit of the law to the extent that we can. There is no legal penalty for violating the Open Meetings Law. The only penalty is that the public knows that their government hasn't been doing everything it can to make sure that residents have the ability, if they so desire, to know what their government is doing. That is why I am writing this particular article.

The County-owned forest logging issue is active right now, although the formal public comment period ends January 3. If you have comments about the forest logging issue after that, please send them directly to me. You can find a lot of information, including links to the County-issued report, at a website I maintain, [tompkinsoldgrowth.org].
