They were incredibly helpful in finding houses.

Second, I want to encourage you, if you haven't installed one of these number signs already, to do so. They are available from the Danby Volunteer Fire Company for the same price I paid when I bought mine decades ago—\$12 for the sign and \$5 for s post, if you need one. Seniors (65 years or older) and the disabled get theirs for free.

They can be clearly seen in the dark and will help the Fire Department find your home in an emergency. To order a sign, visit [danbyfiredept.com] (safety page, then the house numbering page), fill out the form, and return to the address specified.

- 2021 TOWN BUDGET
- Highway Superintendent

THE TOWN BOARD WILL HOLD two potentially controversial Public Hearings in November. They may happen on the same night, Monday, November 9.

The annual Budget Hearing is likely to happen during that meeting. This year's budget is particularly challenging, thanks to fallout from the COVID pandemic. Information is (as always) a little hard to find, but you can get a copy of the budget from the Town Clerk.

The Town Board has planned a Public Hearing for the same night, regarding a another proposed change to the way Danby selects its Highway Superintendent. Changes passed by the Town Board were defeated by voters in 2018 and 2010 (a third attempt, in 2016, was abandoned after a well-attended Public Hearing).

This time, the Town Board is going at it differently, in a way that does not require voter approval. Although there appear to be Danby residents interested in the position, the Town Board is considering expanding the eligibility to run for that office to all the surrounding Towns. If you're informed on the issues, the Public Hearing is the time and place to voice your opinion.

- Reduce/eliminate twig and refuse piles in your yard
- Make sure all fire extinguishers are fully charged and in working order
- Have your chimney cleaned
- Schedule a furnace check and tune-up
- Make sure dryer vents and hoses are lint-free
- Dispose of ashes in an empty metal garbage pail or can with a lid
- Ensure space heaters are surrounded by three feet of empty space
- Turn off space heaters when you go to bed or leave the house
- Make sure no combustible materials are within three feet of
- within three feet of a fireplace
- Always use a fire screen
- Learn when you can and can't burn debris and how to so safely

Do Not (never!)

- Leave fires—inside or outside—unattended
- Dispose of ashes or embers in plastic receptacles, a yard or woods
- Light candles and leave them unattended or forget to snuff them out
- Use oil lamps without proper precautions or leave them unattended
- Place clothing or other items on top of space heaters
- Store combustible items near heaters
- Leave cooking unattended on the stove or the oven on when not home

Special holiday considerations:

- Make sure Halloween costumes are made with fire retardant materials and use battery-powered lights in pumpkins and displays.
- If you deep fry your Thanksgiving turkey, be sure to do so safely.
- Check Christmas lights before you hang them to be sure they are in good working order and please refrain from using lighted candles on trees.


An embarrassing glitch

public hearing on the proposed local law adding the residents of adjoining towns to those eligible to run for Highway Superintendent in Danby. We rescheduled to Monday, November 9, 7pm.

Planner search under way

A planner search committee was created during the Town Board meeting on October 12 and is reviewing applications. Seventeen so far, with a few more days to accommodate those who missed the initial deadline and asked if they could still apply. We have already identified the most attractive prospects and have conducted the first interview. By the time you read this we may have already offered the job and had it accepted. That is my hope. I am encouraged by the quality of our leading candidates. Jason Haremza will be a tough act to follow, but I think the chances for a worthy successor are very good. Meanwhile, John Czamanske is filling in admirably. I am aiming for a resumption of our grand planning effort in December.

More on the budget

It is likely that, during its meeting on October 21, the Town Board will decide on a Budget to propose to the public in November.

Equally likely, it will set the date for a public hearing on the Budget--probably November 9. Check the Town

Calendar on our web site for confirmation. As of the October 12 meeting, two different options were on the table. One would avoid further depleting our savings (the "fund balance") but result in exceeding the tax cap. The amount raised through taxes (the "levy") would rise by 5.4%. That translates into a \$38.20 increase/\$100,000 of assessed value. The alternative budget scenario would use enough of our savings to stay under the tax cap. I came into this year with a strong desire not to keep running our savings down by continuing this pattern. Ultimately, it is not sustainable and we would do better to move away from doing that. This might not be the best year to stop though. We still have a substantial balance and can absorb the increase in the budget. If this alternative budget is adopted, the tax increase/\$100,000 of assessed value would be \$10.70. The budget can be examined on our web site in advance of the public hearing. For those who would prefer a paper copy, it will be available through the Town Clerk. Your comments are welcome.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

A S I WRITE THIS IN MID-OCTOBER, the Tompkins County Legislature is deep in its budget process. Our final budget adoption is scheduled for November 17.

One sobering piece of the budget puzzle that I will mention is that for 2020 so far, January through the end of September, sales tax revenue is down in the county by 11 percent. This is the biggest drop of any county in NY State (not including NY City). It's probably safe to assume that this is because of the large number of college students who weren't here for part of the year, and also because of a decrease in tourism. The average drop in sales tax revenue statewide was 3 percent.

Sales tax and property tax make up most of the County's budget.

Medicare is health insurance for people aged 65 and older, or for those under 65 with a disability. The open enrollment period for Medicare runs through December 7. If you need help figuring out how Medicare

works and how to apply, you can contact Lifelong, a local not-for-profit organization. Call 607.279.6617 for an appointment for free help. They will not be trying to sell you anything.

Governor Cuomo recently ordered all municipalities with police departments to engage in a community conversation and plan to reform and reinvent public safety. The County and the City are working on this jointly. The final plan is due in April. I will be writing more about this as an actual plan emerges. Between now and then, anyone is welcome to share their comments, questions, and concerns on this difficult and complex subject. All the public forums on this subject, as well as all County government meetings, are archived on the Tompkins County YouTube channel.

RECYCLING GUIDELINES... ENFORCED

If YOU'RE STILL NOT RECYCLING CORRECTLY, now is the time to get your bin in order. Starting November 1, recycling bins and set-outs that do not follow the guidelines for Tompkins County will receive *Rejection* stickers and be left at the curb uncollected. This will ensure that Tompkins County continues to produce clean, high quality recyclables with low contamination that don't get rejected by recycling markets.

It's easy. Information about what is accepted in your curbside bin can be found at [recycletompkins.org] and in the *Curbside Recycling Guidelines for Tompkins County* brochure. The brochure is available at all municipal offices, the Department of Recycling and Materials Management office, the Recycling and Solid Waste Center, and at the customer service desk of most grocery stores in Tompkins County.

Some of the most common mistakes residents make include putting plastic bags and film, Styrofoam, electronics, and garbage in the recycling bin. Any plastic items must include a number 1, 2, or 5 recycling symbol to be accepted.

In the event that a bin does get rejected at the curb, you can make corrections and try again on their next collection day...or bring recycling directly to the Recycling and Solid Waste Center, 160 Commercial Ave, in Ithaca.

The plan to reject bins with contamination follows a one year *Warning* phase and decades of education from the Department of Recycling and Materials Management. For information, contact me, [sdennis@tompkins-co.org] or 607.273.6632.

CAC UPDATE

THE CONSERVATION ADVISORY COUNCIL held its monthly meeting via Zoom onOctober 13.

We had, again, hoped to finalize the Management Plans for the Town's Sylvan Lane and Deputron Hollow Road properties. However, CAC members provided a number of useful suggestions and Jonathan Zisk agreed to incorporate these and generate a penultimate version for comment as soon as possible, so that any final changes can be made before our next meeting.

We discussed the logging class that Elizabeth Keokosky had organized for October 22. It was designed to educate landowners on the value of their trees and the importance of getting guidance from a forester. It would be given via Zoom by Jay Harris, an experienced forester with Wagner Hardwoods in Cayuta. The workshop was announced on the front page of last month's Danby News; other methods of advertising it were proposed. The logging ordinance subcommittee has had problems convening with all of its members but hopes to do so soon and will report back on their progress at our next meeting.

Ruth Sherman assumed responsibility for this year's inspection of our easement properties. Three properties have now been inspected and another will be next week; two properties will not be inspected this year. George Adams shared an updated version of Camille Doucet's proposed sign—including our proposed text—to be displayed on easement properties. He will ask for a quote for making 25 of these signs. Membersof the CAC are actively working with two landowners who would like to grant easements on their properties and several more potential easements are being investigated.

Joel Gagnon reported that, with the departure of Jason Haremza, the Planning Group and its working committees—including the Conservation Committee—are on hold until a new Town Planner is appointed.

The CAC meets on the second Tuesday of the month. Our next meeting will be held (via Zoom) on Tuesday, November 10, 7pm.

Participating in Town Meetings A Brief Zoom Tutorial

Since THIS SPRING, Town Government has been happening largely by videoconferencing using Zoom. Here's how to join a meeting *in the comfort of your own Home*.

- ① If you don't have internet, you can dial in with any touchtone phone. It's a lot better with video, though.
- ② If joining with video, download Zoom from [zoom.us]. It's free. Run the program; you don't need to establish an account, but it can be convenient to do so. Most default settings are acceptable. It is worthwhile to check for updates every month or so.
- ③ If the Zoom MeetingID and PassCode aren't in the *Danby News*, try going to the Town web site calendar. Click on the event. There's usually a link there that'll run Zoom and get you into the meeting. Phone callers, you'll also find the MeetingID and PassCode on that page, along with a phone number to dial.
- 4 Turn on your audio and/or video. It's polite to keep your audio muted until you have something to say (and to wait to be recognized). It's also useful to set your screen name, although you don't have to.

- ⑤ The Town Board has recently chosen to disable Zoom's chat function. Side conversations between members of the public are still possible using text messaging (display your phone number?) and other programs outside Zoom.
- ⑤ Similarly, Zoom recording is not permitted by default, and you must use a third-party program to record the meeting. Screenshots work, though.
- Most computers, these days, have a built-in mic. It works fine...but *any* dedicated microphone is bound to help you sound better, if that matters to you.
- ® Video participants, the control to raise your hand is located in the *Participants* panel (show it by clicking on the like-named control at the bottom). Phone callers, you can mute/unmute yourself by dialing "*6" and you can raise/lower your hand with "*9". Meeting chairs often miss raised hands so, and only as a last resort, speak up and ask to be recognized.
- ☑ In general, meetings have two opportunities for you to speak your mind. Almost all meetings have *Privilege* of the Floor at the beginning; three minutes to speak on any subject. Public Hearings are held specifically for you to speak on a proposed action. There may (or may not) be a time limit.

INQUIRED ABOUT CHECKING OUT audio books and eBooks from the New York Public Library (NYPL). The reply I received stated that NYPL recommends that readers download the free *Libby by Overdrive* app and/or the *cloudLibrary by Bibliotheca* app instead of checking out books. The NYPL leases books from Libby and cloudLibrary anyway!

Downloading books directly from Libby or cloudLibrary will decrease your chances of having downloading issues; these seem to be common when downloading through NYPL.

You will need a library card for both of these apps-Tompkins County Public Library or NYPL for Libby; NYPL for cloudLibrary. Both cards are free. Keep in mind that they have a wide variety of audiobooks in Spanish as well as English.
