To join in, visit the DCC's web page [danbycc.org]; you'll find the Zoom link at the top of the front page and also on the events page.



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

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COUNTY LEGISLATURE UPDATE

TN JANUARY, the Tompkins County Legislature voted to increase the tax on AirBnBs from 3 to 5 percent. The vote was 8 to 5, and I voted against this increase. This comes at the same time that the City of Ithaca will be increasing its tax by 5 percent, so that an AirBnB in the City of Ithaca will now pay a 10 percent tax on each booking.

The final sales tax numbers for 2020 came in. Sales tax revenue in Tompkins County was down 10.4 percent from 2019. This is the largest drop in sales tax revenue in NY State, outside of NY City.

Home sales in Tompkins County in 2020 were down somewhat from 2019, but were virtually tied with 2017 and 2018 numbers at 856 home sales. But the median sale price jumped from \$235,000 in 2019 to \$258,500 in 2020. For those of us who have been here for decades, that price tag is astounding.

The vaccination story changes so often that any details I write here will likely be outdated by the time they are published. What I can say is that if you have questions about vaccinations and how to get an appointment, you can call 2-1-1. At the time of this writing, they cannot make an appointment for you, but 2-1-1 can help answer your questions.

In the early days of the vaccine rollout, the Tompkins County Health Department's website received 38,000 hits on one day. The County Public Health Commissioner joked that the website may not have had 38,000 hits in the entire last decade. Another statistic: the County received 1800 doses of vaccine one week in early January. Before any publicity was sent out, those 1800 appointments were taken in 20 minutes.

The County Administrator said that 'uncertainty' was the word of 2020 and 'patience' may be the word of 2021. I have found that idea personally useful as I have tried unsuccessfully to book a vaccination appointment for my 90-year old mother, and as I contemplate potentially having to wait until September to get my shot, since I am in the lowest priority group.

FREE HOT WATER! REALLY?


MIND THE FINE PRINT BUT, YES, you can get free hot water.

Previous Danby News articles in this series have talked about the Heat Pumps. This one is going to zero in on one—sometimes optional—component of a Heat Pump: the *desuperheater*.

Let's parse that. *Heater*: something that raises the temperature; *super*: over and above, sounds even hotter;

and *de*: negation, opposite. So this is something that gets rid of extra heat.

In plain words, a Heat Pump is a mess of pipes with two mechanical devices: a compressor and an expansion valve. The electric-powered compressor compresses a refrigerant gas, raising the gas'



temperature. All the plumbing from the compressor to the expansion valve is *the hot side*. The expansion valve, no surprise, allows the gas to expand, lowering its temperature. The plumbing from there back to the compressor is *the cold side*.

With apologies to the McDLTTM, the goal is to make the hot side cooler and the cold side hotter, moving heat into (or out of) a dwelling.

A desuperheater, really nothing more than a heat exchanger, is placed in the hottest part of the hot side—

> the plumbing immediately after the compressor. It heats hot water by transferring some heat from the refrigerant, leaving a bit less heat energy for the Heat Pump to work with.

> In the winter, when the hot side is in your house (and the cold side is outdoors), using a desu-

PARTICIPATING IN TOWN MEETINGS A Brief Zoom Tutorial Submitted by Ted Crane

SINCE THIS SPRING, Town Government has been happening largely by videoconferencing using Zoom. Here's how to join a meeting in the comfort of your own Home.

① If you don't have internet, you can dial in with any touchtone phone. It's a lot better with video, though.

2 If joining with video, download Zoom from [zoom.us]. It's free. Run the program; you don't need to establish an account, but it can be convenient to do so. Most default settings are acceptable. It is worthwhile to check for updates every month or so.

③ If the Zoom MeetingID and PassCode aren't in the Danby News, try going to the Town web site calendar. Click on the event. There's usually a link there that'll run Zoom and get you into the meeting. Phone callers, you'll also find the MeetingID and PassCode on that page, along with a phone number to dial.

(4) Turn on your audio and/or video. It's polite to keep your audio muted until you have something to say (and to wait to be recognized). It's also useful to set your screen name, although you don't have to.

perheater will reduce the heat available to heat your house. The Heat Pump is generally sized to account for this, but it means the hot water isn't exactly free, just less expensive than other hot water.

In the summer, though, your Heat Pump can be used to cool your house. The cold side is in your house and the hot side is outdoors. The goal of the hot side is to get rid of heat, and a desuperheater is using energy you want to get rid of. You're getting free hot water!

Here's the fine print. None of it is a fatal flaw in typical situations.

- You can't easily use radiant (in-floor) systems to cool a house. The floor would sweat like a glass of cold water. Hot air systems with ductwork or mini-splits are great with a desuperheater.
- Industrial, ammonia-based desuperheaters can almost boil water but household heat pumps operate at much lower temperatures. It'll take a while to heat a tankful of hot water. Some experts recommend a

7 Most computers, these days, have a built-in mic. It works fine...but any dedicated microphone is bound to help you sound better, if that matters to you.

⁽⁸⁾ Video participants, the control to raise your hand is located in the Participants panel (show it by clicking on the like-named control at the bottom). Phone callers, you can mute/unmute yourself by dialing "***6**" and you can raise/lower your hand with "*9". Meeting chairs often miss raised hands so, and only as a last resort, speak up and ask to be recognized.

In general, meetings have two opportunities for you to speak your mind. Almost all meetings have Privilege of the Floor at the beginning; three minutes to speak on any subject. Public Hearings are held specifically for you to speak on a proposed action. There may (or may not) be a time limit. \$

two-tank hot water system; the desuperheater preheats water to, say, 120°F in the first tank and that tank supplies a traditional water heater. In my own home, we just use the 120°F hot water; it can't provide restaurant-quality sanitization, but it's generally considered the maximum safe temperature from a hot water fixture.

• A desuperheater adds to the cost...but it pays for itself quickly.

Final words: always remember that a Heat Pump doesn't create heat, it just moves heat from one place to another. Every dollar spent running the compressor translates into three or four dollars worth of available heat (or, in the summer, air conditioning). It's an excellent way to cut your energy costs. And you can get free hot water!

CAC UPDATE



DCIL had another long but productive meeting on February 9. Our annual report for 2020 was approved and will be forwarded to the Town Board. The CAC's Management Plans for the Town's Deputron Hollow and Sylvan Lane properties were reviewed by the Town Board and the public was invited to comment during a Public Hearing on February 17; we hope they were approved. Both properties will be left in their current state with the minimum management needed for conservation/preservation.

We are working hard to complete easements on several lovely Danby properties and hope to start negotiations on several more soon. Margaret Corbit, with input from Joel Gagnon, has written a brief *Step-by-Step Guide to Donating a Conservation Easement* in Danby, which is now available online at [townofdanbyny.org/cac] We are also working on a separate conservation easement web page and will be presenting a Zoom meeting in May, during which we will describe the Danby easement program and answer any questions you may have. The date and time will be announced in next month's Danby News.

CAC members reviewed a preliminary draft of the proposed guidelines and requirements for landowners who wish to harvest timber on their properties. Before proceeding further we recommended that the logging subcommittee should consult with the Code Enforcement Officer and Highway Department, since they would be responsible for enforcing any logging ordinance. Their input will then be taken into consideration as we continue to work on the draft at our next meeting.

The CAC meets on the second Tuesday of the month. Our next meeting will be held (via Zoom) on March 9, 7pm. \$
