# PROUD HISTORY OF WOMEN In The Danby Fire District

LTHOUGH IT STILL EXISTS TO THIS DAY, The Ladies Auxiliary of the Fireman's Association of New York, established in the 1930s, has given way in many counties

across New York State to full membership for women in fire departments, including here in Danby.

Today, there are quite a few women active who are members of the Danby and West Danby Fire De-



partments, serving ably at every level. Dee Bowles, currently the Treasurer for the Danby Fire District, was our first female Assistant Fire Chief, followed by JoAnne Oliver. Christel Truttmann was the first Lieutenant for West Danby and Samantha VanEtten the first Assistant Chief. In addition, there have been two female Fire Commissioners, including yours truly.

Long before these advances, women were eager to be involved in the Fire Department. As a result, a Danby Fireman's Ladies Auxiliary was founded on October 9, 1956 by sixteen area women, "...being the wives and mothers and daughters of the Danby Fire Department." These early pioneers participated in parades, fundraisers and other volunteer activities to support the department and community.

## Trips to the Moon

Ever wonder how far you could travel on the energy used in one year to cremate people in the United States? Probably not, but it's surprising.

To gain some perspective on how far that could be we'll need to think big. So rather than just speaking of miles or kilometers, let's think in terms of trips to the moon...and back. And for something that's easy to relate to, suppose we have a vehicle that gets 30 mpg. Well, after crunching the numbers and triple checking the work, the answer is-hold on to your hats--over 1,979 round trips to the moon!

As they say, your mileage may vary. The quantity of energy used for a cremation can range between 12 and 50 therms. I'm using 25 therms as a modest average in this evaluation.

The 25 therms of energy used for one cremation corresponds to the oomph contained in about 20 gallons of gasoline. The 1,563,164 cremations in the U.S. during 2019 were equivalent to about 31,515,403 gallons of gasoline. That's a whole lot of fuel to propel your car! At 30 miles per gallon, you'd be way beyond its warranty after traveling 945,462,097 miles.

With the moon a mere 238,855 miles away, that's enough for well over 5 round trips...every single day...for an entire year.

Want to save some fuel? Tompkins County is home to two natural burial grounds, Greensprings Natural Cemetery Preserve in Newfield and Willow Glen Cemetery in Dryden. In addition to conserving energy resources, going that route saves on the tons of concrete used in burial vaults and the fancy materials for the caskets, not to mention the related expenses. Simple, environmentally-friendly caskets or burial shrouds make for a dignified natural return to the earth. Rick Lazarus here in Danby could build you a simple casket if you're interested. What about elsewhere? Information on the growing number of nature-friendly options available nationwide can be found on the Green Burial Council's website, [greenburialcouncil.org].

A return to natural burial practices can be a noble gift to the world we leave behind. Cremations consume an incredible amount of energy. I'd rather return to Planet Earth just once.

## SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

Boards Now Meeting In Person
July saw the end of Zoom-only meetings for the Town's decision-making bodies (Town Board, Planning Board, and Board of Zoning Appeals). With the Governor ending the emergency declaration that had suspended the Open Meetings Law, each of those groups had to return to meeting in person. We are, however, committed to continuing access by videoconference for those who would like to attend that way. The first such meeting was on July 12. I can't say that it went without a hitch; we can make it work and will do so. The conduct of the meeting will have to be more formal since the viewing audience cannot hear those in Danby's Town Hall unless they are using a microphone. Accordingly, those physically present will have to address the Boards using a microphone, which will be made available. It will actually be easier to be recognized and heard if you are participating from a remote location on your phone or computer! As before, the links to connect to these and all the other meetings where videoconferencing is either the supplement to in-person (hybrid meetings) or the virtual-space venue will be on the Town web site calendar. The calendar will indicate whether the meeting is hybrid, videoconference, or just in-person. The Town Board is still being very cautious about the in-person meetings. Masks are still required, whether vaccinated or not.

#### Waivers Granted

Ray Van De Bogart and Alice Napierski both applied for a waiver from the moratorium on subdivisions in the low-density zone, which is scheduled to end at year's end. Public hearings were held for both applications on July 12. The Board, in subsequent consideration, came to the conclusion that both requests satisfied the conditions for granting the waivers and both were approved. Should you want to take a close look, the applications and the resolutions associated with them are linked with the agenda for the July 12 meeting. Granting the waiver does not approve the subdivisions. The applicants are now free to pursue their applications with the Planning Board without waiting until the end of the year to do so.

### Fake Fire at the Town Hall

The building will be full of smoke, but there will not be a real fire. The Danby Fire Departments requested use of Danby's Town Hall for fire training and the Town Board readily agreed. Having our volunteer firefighters familiar with the building, both inside and out, is a big advan-

tage to the Town in the event of a real fire. The training benefits the volunteers as well, a classic win-win. The departments have already practiced on the Highway Department building.

## Other Emergency Preparation

Training and Mitigation of Hazards are a big part of Emergency Preparedness. In the last year, we updated our pandemic planning. We are revising those plans in light of our experience and to broaden them and make them more robust in dealing with future threats. There is also a county-level emergency preparedness plan under revision, with Steve Cortright, Danby's Code Enforcement Officer (and a Fire Department member) serving as Danby's representative in that effort. Our Highway Department has plans in place for storm emergencies, and we will look to harden our roads and bridges to make them more resilient. On a human level, an ongoing project led by Matt Ulinski, Town Board Member and Deputy Supervisor, is evaluating risks of workplace violence and developing a plan for mitigating the risks and responding to actual instances. That plan, developed with the help of consultant Gina Lord, is nearing completion and will soon be advanced to the Town Board for review and adoption.

## Library Free to Expand Hours

The library volunteers expressed a wish to expand the hours when the library will be open for browsing. In years past, the library had been open whenever the Town Hall was open. It was the general feeling of everyone in Town Hall that the library should not be open without having library personnel around to staff it. The Board decision was to permit the library to be open as desired, but only when staffed. Masks required for patrons, as they currently are for everyone using Danby's Town Hall (and for unvaccinated visitors to the Court in the building).

## **Budget Process Initiated**

Seems like we just closed the books on last year, but it is time to begin the budget process for 2022. The first step in that process was set to begin with a meeting on July 19 focused on capital improvement planning. We are creating a wish list of projects so we can prioritize them and budget with a longer view as the context for each year. Graduating from a wish list to a schedule of projects is the next stage. Planning goes beyond improvements to our physical plant, though, and how to better do the work of government is also part of the planning. I will share the highlights as they develop.

## Re-zoning Proposal Floated For Public And Town Board Review

A primary objective of the subdivision moratorium was to adopt a plan for re-zoning the Town. At a minimum, this would involve a plan for the areas outside of the hamlets, but ideally it would include the entire Town-and all by the end of the year. We are on track to accomplish that objective. David West, the Town Planner, was to advance to the Town Board a rezoning proposal at the July 19 "zoning update" meeting, the product of well over a year of meetings by the working groups of the Planning Group. Whether the plan goes far enough toward retaining the Town's much-valued rural character-or too far--will be the focus of much comment, no doubt. The most useful comments will be more specific, pointing out areas of weakness and suggesting changes that might make it better. I hope you will be curious enough to check it out. The entire month of August is devoted to getting feedback, with time enough left to revise if it is wanted. The written proposal will be on the Town's web site (I suggest accessing it via the calendar link for the July 19 meeting). The meeting was to be recorded and the recording should also be viewable as a YouTube video in the list of planning videos. A couple of highlights:

- The low density zone, which currently includes almost all of the Town outside of the hamlets, would be divided into 4 new zones, with additional overlay and "floating" zones.
- Within limits, development rights can be bought and sold to make it easier to protect larger parcels in an undeveloped form while facilitating clustering of the development that does occur.
- The hamlets are also proposed to be divided into core zones and neighborhood development zones.

That is just a taste. Check it out!

Enjoy summer while it is still here. We will soon enough be complaining about the cold.

## CAC UPDATE

Our July meeting was very productive and very long. George Adams and the other members of the Timber

Harvest Committee (Don Shaufler and Jonathan Zisk) handed over nearly final version of the draft of the Town of Danby Timber Harvest Law. After responding to questions from the Council and making minor revisions to the draft. CAC unanimously

voted to recommend forwarding the draft Law to the Town Board for re-view during its July 21 meeting. Next steps include final review by Code Enforcement and the Highway Department and revision by the Town Lawyer. Before the draft can be turned into law there will be a public hearing.

The successful process of negotiating the easement for the Deputron Hollow property has sparked a great deal of discussion among the Council members about how to improve the Conservation Easement Template, available in the Documents category of the CAC web page. By the end of the meeting, we had accomplished a thorough review of the Template and Town Supervisor Joel Gagnon also hopes to hand it over to the Town Board for the July 21 meeting. While the template itself might seem like a daunting legal document, you should consider it just a template. There are helpful links on our web page. Once you have had a look at these documents, it's probably best to contact one of the members to begin your discussion.

We would like to remind everyone that several recorded informational presentations are available at the CAC web page, as well as links to the meeting notes and agendas of our meetings.

The CAC meets on the second Tuesday of the month. Our next meeting will be on August 10, 7pm. Check the Town of Danby web site to find out whether the meeting will be held via Zoom or in the Town Hall.

# Why Danby's Youth Programs Are Important

Author Carol O'Connell wrote, more or less, that, Of all the department stores in the world, only Bloomingdale's had parishioners. It was a psychedelic womb, with mazes of color and light, a vast array of goods on floor after floor, enough to shut down the neural synapses of the novice shopper. There were no less than five restaurants.

What's that got to do with Danby's Youth? Growing up in New York City, with weekly visits to Bloomingdale's, (where you were treated like royalty, even if you weren't buying, and home of the second-best toy department in the world), to F.A.O. Schwartz (number one, where kids off the street were welcome to play with the merchandise all day), to the Museum of Natural History (dinosaurs, gems and minerals, space exploration, oil rigs, animals of the world, the big whales, butterflies, and Teddy Roosevelt), to the Metropolitan Museum of Art (learn about both additive and subtractive color, medieval armor, Egyptian temples and mummies, and—oh yes—paintings and sculpture).

Bloomingdales offered expensive coffee and pastries, but youth tended to enjoy the dozens of nearby coffee shops with inexpensive burgers-and-fries. The Museum of Natural History had lousy food but eating it between walls covered with dinosaurs made it seem really, really exotic. And then there were thousands of ethnic eateries: Chinese, Japanese, Thai, Mexican, Czech, German, French, Greek, Italian, seafood, steaks, and even...vegetables.

The City, itself. The people, the subways, the buses, the buildings, the bridges, the theaters, the parks, the zoos, the beaches, and the rivers and the docks.

Danby has Jennings Pond. There's lots of greenery around town. If the Gathery served food, it might be gourmet quality. Ithaca is pretty impressive. For a city of its size, it offers a disproportionately large helping of stimuli for a growing youth.

Little around here can beat the interaction and experiences offered by Danby's Youth Programs: cooking, outdoor programs to learn about moths, wild foods, and fishing, art, trips to museums, parks, and lakes, games, theater, Claymation, and more. All this is offered for free. The programs are taking a pause right now but, when they return, we should support them and encourage all our youth to participate! See [danbycc.org/YouthPrograms]. \$

## FIRE DISTRICT SEEKING TREASURER

THE DANBY FIRE DISTRICT IS IN NEED of a new treasurer as a result of the resignation of treasurer Deanna Bowles. Deanna joined the Danby Volunteer Fire Company in February 1987. Deanna trained and became an EMT, an Advanced EMT, exterior firefighter and a qualified driver on the fire apparatus



In 1990, Deanna became the Fire Company's first

female Assistant Chief. In August 2000, Deanna became the Fire District secretary and, in 2011, Deanna broadened her workload to include not only secretary but treasurer as well. In 2016 Deanna chose to be only the District Treasurer and has reached an impressive "gold star" recognition level by her peers.

The fire district treasurer is appointed by the Board of Fire Commissioners for a one year term ending on December 31 each year. It is a paid position. The treasurer is the fiscal officer of the Fire District and receives and has custody of all district funds. The Treasurer is responsible for maintaining all financial records, bank accounts, financial reports of the district and paying all district bills.

This month's event is set for Friday, August 20, 4-7pm, with a rain date of Friday, August 27.


## SENIOR STRENGTH CLASS


