WEST DANBY WATER DISTRICT UPDATE

TF YOU ARE A CUSTOMER OF the West Danby Water **▲**District, by the time you are reading this you will likely also have received a letter from the Water District and Town Board concerning the District's new water rate structure. I won't restate the details of that letter here but the short of it is that your quarterly bill will be significantly higher...and your tax (paid to meet unmet expenditures) will be considerably lower.

Overall, the majority of customers will wind up paying nearly the same for their water as they have in the past, it will just be done more on consumption than in taxes levied. Again, I won't go over the details here but the rate change has been a project in progress for more than a year and is intended to be more consumption based than tax based.

On Wednesday December 14, Mark Manzari from Beyond Boundaries Land Services in Locke spent the day with our operator looking for leaks in the distribution system. Currently, approximately 16 percent of our consumed water is unaccounted for. Even though that loss is just on the cusp of where a water system would typi-

cally call for assistance, we contracted with Beyond Boundaries to help us locate the unmetered water. We did not find any leaks but leak detection is good maintenance as it requires someone to put their hands on all the valves in the distribution system, thus checking on issues that may be present. There are a few that we'll have to address. Mark will be coming out again sometime in

the coming months to continue the work. In the meantime we will try to inventory and begin correcting some of the issues we found.

Candace Balmer directed us to a water engineer who we will consult to see if he can help us solve some of our brown water problems. We are awaiting a return call from him to discuss this and hoping he will be able to help alleviate the issues that some customers are having.

As of January 1, 2022, I am officially changing roles with Scott Wendt in the Water District. He will become the primary operator and I will assume his role as secondary. I will be leaving employment in the district altogether as soon as we find someone to take the secondary role. Water operation has been mostly enjoyable and I am only leaving because Sarah and I have plans to take the dogs traveling around the country for extended periods; we won't be around for the time necessary to do the work. Anyone interested in this very important and satisfying work should contact Town Hall. I would also be happy to answer questions about the position that you may have. As I am stepping aside, this will be the last Water District Update from me. Thank you, I have interacted with most of the people in the district at some point and it has most always been a pleasure.

SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

s I write this, COVID-19 cases in Tompkins County top 1100, including workers in Danby's Highway Department. Mostly breakthrough cases, since vaccinations are high. The good news is that most of those getting the virus are not deathly ill, in marked contrast to the beginning of the pandemic, and hospitalizations are still low. It is looking increasingly like this is not a problem that will just go away, and with higher rates of infection we are all at increasing risk of being exposed to and contracting the virus. It is disappointing that vaccination does not confer complete immunity. We can hope that treatments will continue to improve, but the best defense available at this time is a combination of vaccination, masking, physical distancing, and mental and physical fitness. Both mask fatigue and depression from physical distancing are very real and constitute impediments to mental health. Let's hope that the longer days ahead lead to a brighter future as 2022 unfolds.

Target Missed! Zoning Update Still To Be Approved

The Town Board had hoped to approve the zoning revisions before year's end and before the expiration of the moratorium on subdivisions in the low density zone. Didn't happen. It came to light that a requirement of NY State enabling legislation for transfer of development rights is that a generic environmental impact study be conducted in conjunction with considering this feature and making it a part of our zoning law. Doing such a study will take time--at least a couple of months. Rather than extend the moratorium to allow for the study to be conducted and including TDR in the zoning revision, the Town Board is expected to opt to delete TDR (we can look at adding it later in 2022) and consider passing the rest of the package in January. I expect a public hearing on the scaled-back proposal to be scheduled for January 4. There is no plan to extend the moratorium, but the Board could still opt to do so if my recommendation does not find favor. We will post updates on the Town's web site to clarify what path has been chosen and there will be a public hearing on any option the Board chooses to pursue.

Solar Farm Update

The Norbut Solar team has responded to concerns by Planning and Town Boards and the engineering firm hired by the Town to review Norbut's application. What is proposed is a roughly 15-megawatt array to be located

north of Bald Hill Road near the center of the Danby hamlet. A new wetland delineation has been conducted and the panels reconfigured as a consequence. There is some loss of the total count of panels as a result--on the order of 200. The interconnect facility has also been moved from north of the barn on the Roe property close to 96B to a location across the creek west of Danby's Town Hall. These accommodations reduce the potential adverse environmental impacts and so also reduce the chances that the Town Board will find a significant impact (a finding that there is a potentially large impact would trigger a need for an environmental impact study-large expense and time are associated therewith).

Workplace Violence Prevention Study/Plan Approved

Credit Matt Ulinski. He chaired the group that interacted with Gina Lord, the very capable consultant that we contracted with to help us identify risks and propose ways of addressing them. The Town Board approved the report she prepared and also the plan of action, directing me to work on implementation. Some of the recommendations include adding security cameras for Danby's Town Hall (the Town Court already has cameras that cover its area), better physical barriers between the Town Clerk and Code offices and the public to reduce their vulnerability. Sad that we even need to concern ourselves about these things, but worker safety deserves priority. A Threat Assessment Team will be created to monitor progress in achieving the goals, assist in investigating workplace violence incidents, and periodically reassess whether the plan is adequately meeting the needs identified. The first appointments will be made in January.

Broadband Survey Authorized

The contract has been signed and the work of identifying where wired broadband is available in Danby will be completed by mid-February at the latest. This study will also identify where wired broadband is not available, which is the real objective. Once we know that, we can identify options for hooking up those who lack access. Most expedient will be to extend service from nearby suppliers at public expense. That will be faster than Dryden's approach of installing municipal fiber-optic cables and then letting internet service providers compete for customers to hook to them. That approach, a public-private collaboration, offers the potential for better service at reduced cost, but it will take a couple of years to im-

plement. It would take Danby much longer, since Dryden had already been working on this issue for several years before the pandemic hit. Danby may ultimately be able to piggyback on Dryden's system.

Vacancies Yet Unfilled

The Town Board will have acted in December to fill some vacancies due to resignations, but as of this writing no one has applied for the open position on the Board of Zoning Appeals. This is an important board! It hears appeals from those who feel that the strict application of our land use regulations is unreasonable and can grant variances if they agree. It can also hear appeals from Code Official determinations where a resident feels that the Code Official has misinterpreted the code. No law can be written to be fair in all situations; the BZA is an important avenue of relief. Board members serve in a quasi-judicial capacity. Members need to have good judgment and a willingness to carefully examine the facts before ruling. While the requirements are significant, the job does not typically involve a lot of time. The Board only meets when there is an appeal--on average a few times a year. This is a good job for someone willing to help out but concerned about the time required. Application is easy. Form on the website.

Another group seeking a new member is the Hillview Road Landfill Citizens' Advisory Committee. This is a County advisory group focused on the Hillview Road landfill, located just over Danby's south border in West Danby. It has been closed and capped since 1993. To protect water quality, monitoring wells nearby are still sampled every year. The committee's main job is to review the results of the samples. It meets with County officials two or three times per year. If you have an interest in real-world environmental protection, please contact Brian Caldwell, [hgforganicapples@gmail.com], or me. We encourage you to join our meetings using the link posted on the Town Calendar. You will be welcomed and we want your input on issues currently under discussion. You will be given three minutes at the beginning of the meeting to share your ideas during the Privilege of the Floor. This month, Ronda Roaring began the segment by pointing out the importance of legal oversight—on behalf of both the owner and the Town—of each easement process.

COUNTY LEGISLATURE REPORT

THE NEW YEAR IS A TIME to mark changes and take stock of the good and bad. Despite all the craziness, there are many positive changes going on in the world of local government. Today I am going to write about something not so good.

As of January 1, 2022, my term as Chair of the TCAT (Tompkins Consolidated Area Transit) Board of Directors is over. This is a role I will not miss. I am strong supporter of TCAT bus service. Despite the severe disruption to public transit, TCAT was still able to provide one million rides in 2020 and two million rides in 2021. The conversion to an all-electric fleet has begun. The TCAT staff are heroes in my opinion.

The trouble is with the structure of the organization. It is jointly operated by Tompkins County, the City of Ithaca, and Cornell University. The County and the City have one goal: provide good bus service to as many people as possible. Cornell's goal is to provide good bus service to Cornell. And therein lies the problem.

I have lived in Tompkins County for 35 years. Of course I have heard stories about Cornell being a bully. But I had never experienced it firsthand until I became Chair of the TCAT Board.

When Cornell students and staff get on a TCAT bus, they don't pay for the ride themselves. Instead, Cornell makes a bulk payment to TCAT for this system, and also gets increased service to campus. It is a good deal for both entities. The system operates under a 3-year contract.

Starting a little over a year ago, Cornell stopped making monthly payments on its contractual obligations. Its reason? Cornell said that, since TCAT drivers were getting paid by the Federal pandemic relief money at that time (the PPP, for those who remember), why should Cornell also have to pay? There are many reasons why this is a faulty argument, including that the Federal money was meant specifically for drivers' paychecks and not to subsidize Cornell, and also because TCAT still had to pay for buses, parts, gasoline, insurance, etc. There is also tremendous irony: Cornell itself received tens of millions of dollars of Federal pandemic relief funds and was not willing to use one dime of that money for TCAT.

Another aspect of this situation is that the funding agreement for TCAT states that if TCAT operates at a loss, the County, the City, and Cornell all must chip in equally to bail out TCAT. It has never come to that. But now, since Cornell has pulled out money from TCAT for its own use, if there is ever a deficit, County and City taxpayers will be subsidizing Cornell's action.

At one point, Cornell sought over \$800,000 from TCAT. After months of negotiations, and after Cornell simply stopped payment on its contractual obligations, TCAT settled for giving Cornell \$315,000 to end the stalemate.

Cornell received \$712 million in donations in 2020.

There are several other chapters to this story about Cornell's bad behavior but I have already gone over my word limit. Let me just say again that TCAT is a great community asset that should be supported by all who benefit from it.

We've been living with an unusual gift in our part of Danby: mail delivery on Sundays. OK, we understand that the gift comes from the USPS and not from your workshop. We're hoping you can bestow a gift on the USPS that will make it possible to resume delivery of Saturday's mail on Saturdays.

Here's the scoop: for months, mail for the "uphill Danby" part of the 14883 ZIPcode (Bald Hill, Comfort, Gunderman, and nearby Roads) has been arriving after dark, sometimes hours after sunset. Very often, it's long after residents have returned from work and other daily activities.

In this rural area, mailboxes can be a 5- or 10-minute walk from the front door. Unless someone is willing to hike out to the mailbox at 7 or 8pm—in the dark and cold and snow—the mail doesn't "arrive" until the next morning.

Please, Santa, can't you figure a way to have mail delivered around mid-day, like it used to be?

The Spencer postmaster is aware of the problem and is apologetic. "Uphill" is only a mile or two from the West Danby valley as the crow flies, but it's about 600 feet higher and only one or two unpaved goat trails connect the few mailboxes up here to the far greater number of delivery locations down there.

Maybe, Santa, you could deliver an extra postal carrier to Spencer? Or maybe you can magically convince the USPS that the "uphill" parts of 14883 served by the Spencer Post Office would be better served from Ithaca in 14850? After all, including *any* part of Danby in the 14883 ZIPcode means that we get the phone book from—of all places—--Elmira, that insurance companies think we're in Tioga County, and that our junk mail is aimed at a completely different demographic than the 14850 where we pay taxes and do our marketing.

Even you, Santa, can't prevent junk mail...but can you help us get the *right* junk mail? And not a day late?

If you can solve this one, Santa, next year I'll write to you about world peace.
