THE DANBY NEWS IS LATE, NOT GONE.

On January 19, 2022 the Danby Town Board passed a resolution eliminating its funding for the Danby News.

Preparing, printing, and distributing the Danby News is no small expense but the Danby Community Council feels that it is highly cost-effective. The DCC committed its own funds to continue the Danby News for, at least, a limited period of time.

The timing of these unprecedented events has resulted in delayed publication of the February, 2022 issue.

This isn't the time or place to discuss the justification offered by the Town Board for its action. Suffice to say that the DCC feels that the community-building and connections offered by a printed edition—delivered to every household in Danby—are far stronger than could be achieved by any other means.


A substantial number of residents read the Danby News from cover to cover. Even if some copies go straight into the recycle bin, many rely on it as a community heartbeat. Far fewer would go searching the web to find the similar information...that is, if they could go to the web in internet-starved Danby.

Finding new funding along with changes to content will be necessary. To make it work, the DCC may explore grants, more sponsorships, advertising, and asking those residents who are willing to help out by chipping in to cover the costs for themselves and evervone else. # GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

OR A QUARTER OF A CENTURY, the annual Great Backyard Bird Count has been a bright spot for nature lovers. The 25th edition of the event is coming up February 18-21. Everyone is in-



Backyard Bird Count is a joint project of Cornell's Lab of Ornithology, the National Audubon Society, and Birds Canada.

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Each participant counts birds for any length of time (but for at least fifteen minutes) and reports what they see online. It's easy for people of all skill levels. The 2021 count included a record number of participants. An estimated 300,000 people submitted checklists reporting 6,436 species!

# DCC UPDATE

Everything changes, everything stays the same Submitted by Pamela Goddard, DCC President

ANBY'S COMMUNITY COUNCIL was founded more than 25 years ago for the purpose of building community through youth development programs along with educational programing and entertainment for Danby residents (and the general public). The DCC's Corporate Bylaws were approved by New York State and it was awarded 501(c)(3) (not-for-profit) status by the IRS.

In recent years, we've expanded our program offerings and we're proud of what we've been able to accomplish on a very limited budget.

Time passes; times change. Our Bylaws were last updated more than a decade ago but, even then, mostly for better organization. The last ten years have brought amazing changes—imagine life before the internet and the aging Bylaws no longer reflect either useful—or actual—operating practices. Another update was required to clarify procedures and meet current needs.

That process uncovered bigger problems. Unbeknownst to small organizations like the DCC, New York State has significantly changed its rules for non-profits. Danby's Town Board noted one particular problem: the Bylaws make every resident of Danby a voting member and, in the absence of specific directions in the Bylaws, NYS law now requires 50 percent of the members to approve any changes. There's no way that 1,500 people are going to inform themselves, attend a meeting, and vote.

This situation is known as a Catch-22. You have a problem and the problem prevents you from fixing the problem.

So, here's where we are:

- the DCC postponed its 2022 General Meeting until a time when we can, once again, meet and take action.
- the DCC is approaching legal counsel. The early word is that the Bylaws will have to be substantially rewritten to meet current standards. For example, we will have need a whistleblower policy; 25 years ago, the term was associated with traffic cops and lifeguards, not employee protection.
- of the seven Directors continuing or elected in 2021, three were over term limits (the DCC is the only local body with term limits; another Bylaw anomaly). The remaining four are sufficient to continue business. The

Bylaws allow for the appointment of Directors to fill

• The Directors have committed to expeditiously resolving the problem, but recognize that neither the State nor the IRS—nor the court system, if it comes to that—are guaranteed to operate quickly.

We're certainly looking for more involvement by Danby residents. As our Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion statement says to all of our community, We want to know who you are and we want to include you in celebrating our Town's diversity. If you have an idea, we'd like to help make it happen.

Please bring us your ideas or bring us your volunteer efforts to help make other's ideas happen.

Meanwhile:

- Yes, the DCC Board will continue the Youth Programs.
- Yes, there will be a concert series; this year, it will honor the efforts of Bob Strichartz, who guided it for many years.
- Yes, other public educational and information programs will continue.
- Yes, the Danby News will continue but we will be turning to Danby residents to help us with funding (see separate article).

# SUPERVISOR'S UPDATE

#### Zoning Update Passed!

We didn't make our self-imposed deadline of year's end, but the Town Board unanimously passed the zoning update during the first meeting of the new year on January 4. What was passed does not include the Transfer of Development Rights component because that will first need a Generic Environmental Impact Study and findings. I expect that to be done in the next couple of months, whereupon the TDR will be taken up by the Town Board. Passage and inclusion in our zoning law is not assured. The GEIS is important, as is the expressed opinion of the public.

There is a lot that is new and different in the new zoning law. The Planning Board will be on the front lines of the approval process for applications under the new rules. The January meeting of the PB focused on David West, our Town Planner, conducting something of a tutorial to get the group up to speed.

#### Tax Abatements Tied To Conservation Easements

Governor Hochul signed into law the authorization, passed in both the Assembly and Senate, allowing Danby

to reduce the taxes on land protected by conservation easements. We sought this enabling legislation because in its absence land is mandated by the State to be assessed at market value. While some can afford the taxes, for others the cost is a driver to subdivide and sell. This pressure from taxes was called out in the very first meeting of the Planning Group, two years ago, and resulted in a working group being formed that focused on how to get tax relief for those in need—who are primarily large landowners. The group coalesced around a proposal, discovered when researching options, to seek State authorization to do what four Towns in New York State had already done, using a Department of Environmental Conservation template which is to reduce taxes on land protected by conservation easements. The model law provides for temporary easements, with the amount of the abatement tied to the length of the easement term as well as for the permanent easements we were already doing here in Danby. The fact that we already have a conservation easement program in Danby, administered by the Conservation Advisory Council, put us in a good position to take on the work the law would enable.

Now that we have been given the authorization, we need to pass a local law to implement it. During the January 4 TB meeting, the CAC was charged with working with our Town Planner to propose how this will work in Danby. A committee of the CAC was created at the January 11 meeting and has already met to kick-start this effort.

There are many questions that need to be addressed. Do we have to adhere strictly to the provisions in the enabling legislation, or can we do something less? "Less" could be having fewer categories of abatement (the legislative authorization has four) or granting less of a reduction (the committee agrees that the difference between a permanent easement's reduction of 90 percent and the 85 percent for a 50-75 year commitment is smaller than desired). No point in even thinking about it if we have to implement exactly as written. It is already clear that the Town can pick and choose which properties are allowed to participate based on the perceived public benefit, so developing criteria for

# Danby Early Birders

**2022 Christmas Bird Count** Submitted by Wes Blauvelt

WITH TEMPERATURES approaching 50 degrees F, the Cayuga Bird Club's annual Christmas Bird Count took place on January 1, 2022 in unseasonably balmy weather. This year's count was the 60th consecutive count by the bird club and 122nd sponsored by the National Audubon Society.

The Ithaca count circle is divided into 10 areas, radiating 15 miles from a central location approximately at the intersection of Mt. Pleasant and Turkey Hill Roads. The Danby area has boundaries extending from the Cayuga Inlet behind the Wegmans parking lot, south to Lick Brook and up over Sandbank Road to the southern most point in the Ithaca count circle at Dotson Park. Along the way, several birding hotspots are included, among them Upper and Lower Buttermilk Falls, Sweedler and Thayer Preserves, Kingsbury Woods and the campus of Ithaca College.

The count effort is an important part of the Audubon national survey. Nineteen Danby area residents participated in the count.

They covered sixteen designated hotspots along with several backyard bird feeders. Cumulatively, the Danby surveyors spent more than 50 hours counting birds, covering 32 miles on foot and over 100 miles by car.

But what about the birds? Several early birders started surveying for owls at 5am. The bird count picked up steam when additional surveyors entered the field at sunrise, and continued until sundown. During this 12-hour period, 41 species were found in Danby. This was one species short of the 2021 result of 42 species. Within the Ithaca count circle, 81 species were identified, down from a 10-year average of 93 species and well below the all-time high of 101 species recorded in 2018.

New high count records were established in the Ithaca count circle for 8 species that may best be described as migration procrastinators: Turkey Vultures (89), Double-crested Cormorant (14), Belted Kingfisher (18), Red-bellied Woodpecker (339), Yellow-bellied Sapsucker (9), Blue Jay (1424), Winter Wren (11) and Carolina Wren (213). There were no record low counts for an individual species within the Ithaca count circle this year.

The early birder counters were able to identify bird song from four Great Horned Owls whose who-hoo-hoo, who calls could be heard near the village and along Rt. 96. Wrens and woodpeckers were abundant in the Danby area as well as the Ithaca count circle. For example, Redbellied Woodpecker (46), Downy Woodpecker (63), Pileated Woodpecker (11) White-breasted (41) and Red-breasted Nuthatch (10) each had a strong showing in Danby with year over year counts exceeding 2021. Winter Wrens, an uncommon winter resident, were present in the Danby count along with Carolina Wrens (24) whose numbers continued to trend upward in Danby. In the Danby area, Ruffed Grouse, Great Blue Heron and Brown Creeper were observed in 2022 but not 2021, while Hermit Thrush, Gray Catbird, Red Crossbill and Common Redpoll found in 2021 were not seen this year.

The Danby count participants are an enthusiastic group and their dedication helped make the 2022 Christmas Bird Count a success. If you are interested in joining the *Danby Early Birders* for next year's Christmas Bird Count, mark your calendars...we will be doing it all over again on Sunday, January 1, 2023. Thank you and good birding in 2022.

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# COUNTY LEGISLATURE REPORT

THERE IS A FEDERAL AND STATE redistricting process ■ going on right now. This article is about just the Tompkins County redistricting process. The district that I represent on the Tompkins County Legislature, District 7, includes Danby, Caroline, and a small section of the Town of Ithaca (south of East King Road).

Danby and Caroline have been grouped together in one County Legislature district for many decades. I consider it a positive that neither Danby nor Caroline is split into separate districts, like many of the municipalities in Tompkins County are (City and Town of Ithaca, Enfield, Dryden, Lansing).

Tompkins County established an Independent Redistricting Commission after the last census, ten years ago-the only such one in NY State. Since then, we have amended the County Charter—kind of the constitution for the County—to mandate an independent redistricting process going forward.

The County's Independent Redistricting Commission will be looking at the census data and making a recommendation of how County Legislature district lines should be drawn for the next decade. There are many factors they will take into account. If you want input into their process, you can give that input at any time (search for tompkins redistricting). Also, there will be a session on Tuesday February 22, 5:30pm, for the Redistricting Commission to hear input specifically from our district and some of the surrounding districts. The meeting is by Zoom, and you have to register in advance if you want to attend that meeting. Or you can watch it on the Tompkins County YouTube channel.

The only input I plan to offer is a) most importantly, I hope that neither Danby nor Caroline gets split into separate districts, and b) keeping Danby and Caroline in one district seems to work well.

My reasons for saying that Danby and Caroline are good partners in one legislative district:

- Danby and Caroline both have a strong sense of place.
- Danby's and Caroline's topography and population density are similar. Our issues concerning broadband internet and cell phone reception are similar because of this.
- Danby and Caroline are contiguous. No strangelydrawn tentacle shapes are necessary for this district.
- Both Danby and Caroline have good community newsletters. I'm not sure any other municipality has an all-town newsletter, and Danby is the last Town in the county with a newsletter that is mailed to all residents. It makes it easy for the County Legislator to communicate with most residents of the district. By contrast, I have no easy way to communicate with the Town of Ithaca residents in my district.

making those judgments will certainly figure in. The Town Attorney is being consulted to understand what can and cannot be done.

Another consideration is the participation of other taxing entities within the Town. The enabling legislation allows for School Districts to also exempt from school taxes participating properties. Ditto for the Fire District and the County. These additional taxing jurisdictions have generally agreed to opt into the program in the other Towns that have adopted this approach. Opting in would be revenueneutral for them, not affecting their budgets or the amount of taxes they can levy. It will reduce the tax base from

which the taxes are raised, though, so that the remaining properties in the taxing jurisdiction will have to make up the difference. The additional cost would be small. How small? That is another question the committee will investigate. A meeting with Jay Franklin, the head of the Tompkins County Assessment Department, is another early step for this committee.

#### State Broadband Survey

As I mentioned last month, the Town has contracted to have the Town surveyed to determine who has access to wired internet and who does not. The results are expected in February and will inform our strategy for how to ad-

## FIRE DISTRICT HOLDS ORG MTG

TVERY JANUARY, FIRE DISTRICTS in New York State Lare required to hold an Organizational Meeting to confirm the election of line officers and any new commissioners, and appoint a Secretary and Treasurer and any deputies. The chairperson and an alternate chair of the Board of Fire Commissioners is made official as well.

The meeting is also an opportunity to distribute committee assignments among the commissioners and Fire Department representatives. The Danby Fire District committees include: Audit, Buildings & Grounds, Budget, Grants, Insurance, Long Range Plan, Policy, Tech, Purchasing, Records, Town Board, Trucks, and Membership and Training.

The following line officers were elected for the Danby and West Danby Fire Department on December 16, 2021 and slated for approval at the district's organizational meeting on January 25, 2022.

During the organizational meeting, the Commissioners also designate the Official Newspaper of the Danby Fire District—the Ithaca Journal—and affirm the district's bank/s, attorney, and membership in relevant organizations, such as the Association of Fire Districts of the State of New York

and Tompkins County Chiefs Association.

The Organizational Meeting is one of many ways in which the Danby Fire District Commissioners undertake their duty to comply with New York State Fire District regulations and policies—all with the aim of keeping our fire departments well-trained and equipped so that they can keep all of us safe.

## CAC UPDATE

THE CONSERVATION ADVISORY COUNCIL (CAC) 

The Council set up a subcommittee to work on the proposed Town law providing tax abatement for Conservation Easement donors. The subcommittee went straight to work on January 14, meeting with David West.

Jonathan Zisk gave updates on the Conservation Easement signs, which are being very carefully installed in a way that allows for the trees on which they are posted to grow and thrive. He reported on the ongoing annual monitoring of existing easements. Monitoring requires CAC volunteers to inspect the properties and submit reports that ensure the terms of the easement are being followed.

Many people attended the third in the series of Danby Agricultural Education Presentations hosted by Betsy Keokosky on the evening of Thursday, January 14. Eloquent experts discussed ideas ranging from the highly detailed and practical to the cultural aspects of farming, in our area and beyond. The speakers gave a whirlwind overview of their perspectives on maintaining and revitalizing farming practices. They also shared several very useful web sites that provide resources for governmental and academic direction and assistance.

Brittany Lagaly, a member of the Conservation Advisory Council and terrestrial plant specialist for the Finger Lakes Institute, will give a presentation titled Gardening with Native Plants on Thursday, February 10, 7pm, via Zoom. Topics to be covered include the ecological benefits of using native plants in your garden, alternatives to invasive horticultural plants, pollinator-plant interactions, and sourcing native plants and seeds.

We began the New Year by welcoming Katharine Hunter back to the Council.



dress unmet need. Some measure of public subsidy of line extensions is likely to follow. Funding will, of course, be an issue. The good news is that there is now broad agreement that universal high-speed internet access is a modern-day necessity, even for very rural residents. State and Federal money is increasingly being made available. The need and cost of extending service to everyone is huge, though, and our ability to compete for funding is enhanced by documenting how existing service is inadequate. You can help by participating in a survey being conducted by the New York State ConnectALL Office (CAO). The brief survey enables you to report your actual on-the-ground broadband availability and experience, which may help direct future funding. All are encouraged to participate, even if you already have some degree of internet service. If you have access to the web, visit New York State Broadband Assessment Project for info on how to participate in the survey. If you don't have access or would rather fill out a paper survey, call 855.692.2627.

As the day warmed up, the snow on the roofs started to melt and slip off. ther already have the needed training in system operation or be willing to take the training to be certified. The district will pay for the training, if it is needed. The required apprenticeship can also be satisfied by working with the operators. This is a very part-time salaried position (\$3,932/ year) that carries a lot of responsibility. If you are interested, give me a call, 607.227.4440.

#### We did not opt out of Cannabis

The Town Board put forth a local law to opt out of Cannabis Consumption sites so that the public could speak to the question at the associated public hearing. There was very little comment from the public, though. A motion to vote on the law failed for want of a second, so we are opting in to both the possibility of sales and consumption. This despite the lack of relevant information from the State about what either sales or consumption sites would look like or how they would function. We will still have some measure of control for either of these should they be proposed for Danby, given the requirements of our Zoning Law.

#### New Trucks for Highway

Along with the loader, our plow/dump trucks are key pieces of equipment for the Highway Department. We have three 10-year-old trucks that are becoming expensive to maintain. While we take good care of them, salt is even harder on them than it is on your car or truck. The Town Board committed to buying three new trucks (at \$250,000 each!). The delivery time for these vehicles is even more stretched than for autos. We don't expect that they can be delivered for at least 18 months (which is when we really want them). By ordering now we locked in the current price. We will pay for them in installments. Because the trucks being replaced will not be junkyard ready, we can get some of the needed funds by auctioning them off. Since they will be paid off, we have the money that we have been putting in the budget for their installment purchase to apply to the new trucks. There will be more needed, of course, but we can plan ahead and budget for it. The result will be an increase if the tax levy in one year, but not a big increase.


