Thanks to funding from the CAP and the Town of Danby, all concerts are free and open to the public. When in-person programming is safe again, they'll be held in accessible locations outdoors and public spaces. Until then, Zoom and YouTube will have to do (and the recordings allow residents who missed the concert to view it later). ❀

## NATURE'S LIQUID GOLD

**N**ATIVE AMERICANS DISCOVERED the sweetness of the sap from *Acer saccharum*, the Sugar Maple. They learned to boil it and concentrate the sugars, making syrup—without using any metal pots or evaporators that are used today.

February typically marks the time to “tap trees”. When daily temperatures get above freezing, usually above 40 degrees, the sap stored in roots will rise up through the tree towards leaf buds. The perfect conditions are days in the 40s with nights below freezing. Freezing temps cause sap to return back down to the roots. This cycle of pumping up, then moving back down result in a “sap run”.

Initial runs for the year produce the lightest and highest grade of syrup. These are commercially processed into maple sugars and high grade syrup, known as Grade A light. Most people we know prefer the darker grades because the flavors are more broad and bold.

As the season progresses the syrup will darken. There are standardized small jars with amber light grade A through Dark B that can be purchased to determine which grade each syrup is. The grade is determined by color only, until you get to the final grade, robust. Robust is a dark color, but the flavor is really broad and robust in taste. Although it is considered inferior to grade A light, many syrup fans (including us!) prefer the darker variants.

There are two other grades. One has nitre in the syrup, or “maple sand”. Syrup with this is cloudy and, after sitting for a time, has a tan layer at the bottom of the jar. These are natural minerals in the soil that the tree has taken up. Commercial syrup producers use a press filter to remove all these minerals from their syrup. Cloth or synthetic filter, like the ones we use, are not as effective in removing them. We feel the syrup is its absolute BEST with nitre in it! Not all syrup has nitre, and its presence will vary from year to year. Last year, for instance, none of the 60 gallons of syrup we produced had any nitre.

The final grade is what we name “Really Robust”. It has the flavor of maple, but with an overtone of molasses. This is the last syrup to be produced in a season. We per-

sonally do not prefer it, but find that one in five or ten people do! We will not sell this as “maple syrup” because its flavor has changed from that pure maple to molasses maple flavor. We usually make about three gallons of it at the end of the season...then pull our taps for the season.

One final mention is “ropy” syrup. I have personally never seen nor produced any. It has strands in it and is super dark. This is not an acceptable product and the result of sap sitting too long or too warm between being collected and boiled. It results from the fermentation of polysaccharides in the sap prior to boiling.

We began doing Maple in February 2018, producing 12 gallons from 71 taps. We used 5-gallon food grade buckets to collect the sap. Danby resident Dick Oltz was to “blame” for our project, 'cause he gave us his

homemade evaporator before his passing. His 2-foot by 8-foot creation had three pans. My previous certification at a NY State Agriculture Teacher was a big plus, as was my training in maple production through the State Ag Teachers Association.

In 2019, we went to a tubing system with 300 taps and produced 60 gallons. Before last season, 2021, our 4th, we bought a commercial evaporator; it was smaller than Dick's but much more efficient. This year, we've grown to about 500 taps! The production—in gallons of syrup—will vary from year to year, depending on the weather and flow of sap. As an example, in 2020 our 300 taps produced only 30 gallons. Last year we increased to 450 taps but still only got as much syrup as 2019, 60 gallons.

Many say that 40 gallons of sap produce 1 gallon of syrup. We have found that it's more like 60 gallons of sap for every gallon from our trees.

Maple tastes *great* over vanilla ice cream, on pancakes, waffles, French toast, etc, or even in coffee as a sweetener. It is a natural, organic, healthy sugar, and so much better for us than high fructose corn syrup found in fake syrup like Mrs. Butterworth or Pearl Milling Company. Try some and see for yourself! ❁

## REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE

THE CONSERVATION ADVISORY COUNCIL is continuing its series of presentations on the importance of agriculture. This time it is sponsoring a Zoom on March 10, 7pm, entitled *A Paradigm Shift to Bio-Sequestration & Regenerative Agriculture*.

This presentation will take another look at the soil health practices of regenerative agriculture described by an earlier presentation and will demonstrate why our current thinking and agricultural practices—using petrochemical synthetics, monoculture GMO row crops and multi-pass tillage with heavy machinery—require a paradigm shift into a more ecological way of farming. Industrialized agriculture has been, and still is, destroying the world's topsoils, aquifers, atmosphere and climate.

Currently, farming has become geared, like industry, to efficiency, production, and profit. These extractive goals ignore soil health and biodiversity and are eroding the soil. But the new biology of the soil microbiome is educating agriculturalists, farmers, and gardeners to encourage and feed the bacteria and fungi that live there and work cooperatively with plant roots for the benefit of both.

This presentation is given by Timothy Woods, a retired systems ecologist/field biologist/environmental engineer who also taught earth sciences at the K-12 and community college levels. He has owned and managed recycling companies, run an arborist/forest management service, and was a team leader for the USEPA Federal Region 6 Spill Prevention and Emergency Mitigation/Investigation Team.

He is also an advocate for the *Kiss the Ground* bio-sequestration/regenerative agriculture world initiatives. *Kiss the Ground* is an inspiring documentary available on Netflix in which Woody Harrelson narrates how regenerating the world's soils has the potential to rapidly stabilize Earth's climate, restore lost ecosystems, and create abundant food supplies. Mr. Woods is also a Conservation Board member in our sister town, Dryden.

## CAC UPDATE

THE CONSERVATION ADVISORY COUNCIL (CAC) met on February 8 via Zoom. With the development of the new Town web site, it is easy to find the meeting link on the Town Calendar.

February's meeting began with a discussion about the progress of the Tax Abatement subcommittee. There was concern expressed that the activities of the committee have not been transparent. However, right now, the members are working with the Town Planner, Town Lawyer, and the County on identifying exactly what options the Town has with respect to the State law and the interests of the County. There should be more information soon and opportunities for input.

The Town Board has asked for input on a planned solar farm on Bald Hill Road. So, we set up a small committee to work with David West to look at the potential ecological impact if solar panels were allowed on some of the wetlands of the installation. We will report back to the Town after review of a summary document at our next meeting.

Jonathan Zisk gave an update on annual monitoring of the existing conservation easements. This is not the season for walking boundaries, but CAC members have been working on generating documents that will help monitors plan their visits and record their observations.

CAC member Brittany Lagaly gave the presentation titled *Gardening with Native Plants* on Thursday, February 10. During the February meeting she told us about the Facebook page she plans to create that will support a community of people interested in learning more and perhaps in generating group plant orders. We are working to make all the CAC-sponsored talks available on the Town web site and will include a link to this resource.

We encourage you to join our open meetings using the link posted on the Town Calendar. The CAC meets on the second Tuesday of the month. Our next meeting will be held (via Zoom) on Tuesday, March 8, 7pm. ❀

## DANBY NEWS UPDATE

**I**N JANUARY, WE LEARNED that the Town of Danby had removed funding for the *Danby News* from its contract with the Community Council. In February, the Town announced that it will publish its own newsletter. Saving money was never mentioned (the consensus from print professionals is that the change will either significantly reduce content or raise cost); some feel the issue was control. Extreme opinions were part of the discussion: including, "Nobody reads the *Danby News*," and, "Everybody wants to read it on their smartphone."

Danby's Community Council faces two difficult decisions: whether to continue the *Danby News* and how to pay for it. There has been an tide of support from *DN* readers, both inside and outside of Danby. Like the Council, many feel that the *DN* is a strong community-building force in Danby.

Community support is a key part of the decision. Are Danby residents willing to help cover the costs?

In round numbers, delivering a monthly issue costs about \$10/year per mailbox...but the cost per mailbox goes up quickly as the circulation drops. Publishing less frequently means the content is less timely and less useful. Fewer pages per issue also raises the per-piece cost (a Town-news-only publication faces that conundrum).

Would you be willing to pay \$10-15/year to be able to read about important events in your community? Would you advertise your business?

Development (a fancy word for fundraising) experts say that the best way to start a campaign is to begin with a few larger contributions. Are you able to help bootstrap the process?

Would you be part of *The Danby 100*, a modest group of residents willing to contribute about \$100 to help provide the *Danby News* to everyone else?

## NEW FIRE DISTRICT COMMISSIONERS

**T**HE DANBY FIRE DISTRICT is governed by five Commissioners, each serving a five-year term. The elections—open to all Danby voters—are in December.

Grants are awarded quarterly for lessons, after-school programs, and more. The deadline was December 15 for programs beginning (or with payment deadlines) in January, February, and March, but it's seldom too late to apply.

Funding is provided by the United Way and the Town of Danby. Families who qualify for free or reduced price lunch are especially encouraged to apply.
