KNOW YOUR NEIGHBORS: MAUREEN JAKUBSON

THIS MONTH, WE THOUGHT we would talk to George Jakubson an Economics professor at Cornell and a devoted member of the Danby Fire Department. When I reached him on the phone he said, “Yeah, that would be OK. But who you really want to talk to is my wife, Maureen. She’s way cooler than I am.”

Truth be told, both George and Maureen are both pretty cool. They have so many talents, interests, and involvement in the community. So, let’s get to know Maureen now and we’ll get to know George better another month.

The Jakubsons came to Tompkins County in 1983, after George was awarded a PhD in economics from the University of Wisconsin. When he was offered professorships, they chose Ithaca over other locations, in large part because both George and Maureen were able to find employment in their chosen fields.

Maureen is a pediatric occupational therapist. She worked for the Racker center for 25 years before moving into the public school system. She has done early childhood intervention therapy and currently works with middle and high school students. The work can be demanding in many ways, and Maureen found that she needed a “personal therapy” occupation as well.

Maureen’s fiber art evolved through her love of hand stitching. When choosing fabrics for quilting, she wanted something different and more specialized. George remembers nudging her on, “Why don’t you make your own then?” That quip led to many years of learning about natural dyes and their effects on different fabrics. Maureen works with silk, bamboo, and rayon as well as repurposed clothing. All of the cotton and vintage linens she works with are second use.

Her interest in natural dyes melded with her joy of gardening and making use of “found dyes” from the woods and fields around Danby. By growing her own indigo (blue), madder (red) and weld (yellow) she has a complete color wheel for dye experiments. She’s also experimenting with growing woad (a medieval blue dye) and collects sumac and goldenrod. Other garden plants, like marigolds, calendula, and purple basil, also wind up in her dye pots.

In recent years, Maureen has concentrated on developing graphic impact with Shibori Stitch Resist dyeing. She completed the Art Cloth Mastery Program at Dunnewold Studios in San Antonio, Texas In February 2018. Art Cloth Mastery is a two and half year intensive study of dyes, color and mixed media techniques.

Experimenting with the mark of the stitch and learning the history of hand made cloth has inspired Jakubson’s original fabric creations. She produces the fabrics using traditional Shibori techniques reinterpreted for contemporary surface design, and also uses a variety of fabric printing methods to produce mixed media fiber art. She has developed innovative, large scale stitch resist work based on African Adere and Japanese Shibori styles traditionally dyed in Indigo. She hand dyes, prints and dye paints on cottons, linens, wood and paper.



Maureen takes special care about where her materials come from and makes sure that her dye processes are as non-toxic as possible. Designing fabric colors and patterns is an integral and important part of her life. “I enjoy coming home and having this part of my day. While one batch of fabric is in the dye pot, I’m working on stitching up the piece that will go in the next dye pot. And I get to meet interesting people.” She remembers a particular Cornell student from Japan and their mother who was very interested to see some of the Shibori scarves she had made. “She wanted to know if I’d gotten them in Japan and I had to explain that I had made them myself. She was so excited. She bought three of the best scarves I ever made. That was a real affirmation.”

If you would like to see Maureen’s creation, her fabric art will be part of a mixed media show at the Trumansburg Conservatory, August 6 to September 25. The show *Looking in, Looking Out, Looking Forward* features recent work created during the pandemic. “There are different reflections of this time,” Maureen explains. Her scarves and fabric creations will also be available at the Tompkins County Quilters Show in October.

NOISE LAW: MORE INFO

PLEASE ALLOW US TO CORRECT part of Mr. Gugino's letter, Noise Law: Con, in last month's Danby News. First of all, according to our memory there have been several issues with noise going back 40 years. Noise issues have included loud parties, excessive gunfire, a bar that is no longer in business, and probably other issues between neighbors.

Second, work on the most recent noise ordinance proposal was triggered by ATV noise by Nelson Road, excessive gunfire, and the hemp dryers on Howland Road.

The issue with the hemp dryers was raised not because, "one resident had a problem with a hemp dryer." It was that all eight families living on Howland Road—many of us having lived here more than 40 years—had a problem with the ten boxcar-sized hemp dryers with high-capacity fans and the large diesel generator running 24 hours a day for almost four months on property not occupied by the operators...who rebuffed friendly attempts at conversations. Our problem was recognized by members of the Town Board and we are happy that, at the urging of members of the Town Board and Planning Board and also the vagaries of the hemp business, the problem has been at least temporarily solved.

Granted it is hard to define noise and even harder to establish a fair way to regulate noise. But, from recent experience, we would like to suggest that unusual or unanticipated noise certainly can, "interfere with the comfort, repose, and health of members of the public." (Quote from proposed noise ordinance.)



We do believe Mr. Gugino is correct in asserting that the proposed ordinance could be fine tuned. As Ms. Wohl states in her letter, "We can craft a law respecting everyone's needs. No one is imposing silence, just protecting neighborliness and peace."



UPGRADED: W.DANBY FIRE HOUSE

THE WEST DANBY FIRE STATION, located at 47 Sylvan Road in Spencer, recently completed a series of renovations that address a number of pressing and time-sensitive issues.

Among other things, rusted sections of the siding were replaced. Wall brackets were installed to elevate electrical lines, moving them from off the floor where they were tripping hazards. An out-of-date, 27-year-old fire alarm panel that was

causing communication problems was also replaced, and new LED lights replaced older, less efficient ones.

Longstanding summertime moisture problems were addressed by the installation of air conditioning. This upgrade will also eliminate mold from condensation caused by humidity in the summer. Last but not least, magnetic door holders were added that will close automatically when the fire alarm goes off.



Although these renovations do not fully address all the building issues at the West Danby Fire House, they go a long way toward ensuring the Fire House will remain in good working condition for the next few years.

The station upgrades were overseen by West Danby Fire Chief Scott Wendt with the assistance of Fire District Chairperson Wayne Westmiller.

TCAT SERVICE REDUCTIONS

PERSISTENT LABOR and parts shortages are forcing TCAT to reduce service for its fall service period (roughly, August 21 thru January 21).

Like many transit agencies across the country, TCAT doesn't have enough bus operators and has trouble recruiting mechanics. International supply chain challenges are making it difficult to obtain parts to maintain and repair buses.

TCAT's planners carefully examined all routes and are proposing reductions on low-ridership trips. They are also calling for service cuts to be spread among all routes and route categories, and to end service earlier—with last trips departing around 11pm.

OBITUARY FOR A TREBUCHET

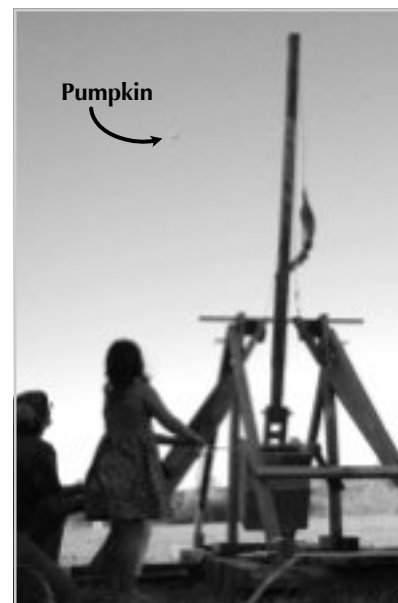

This follows a long period of decline, otherwise known as the COVID pandemic, which cruelly deprived Black Adder of its raison d'être, and left the trebuchet sitting alone, unused except as a perch for wild birds, nearly forgotten, and probably heartbroken. Most of it is now too far gone to be safe, and the time has come to say goodbye to our old friend.

But let us remember the good times! The thrill of seeing pumpkins flung far and wide, the breathtaking near-misses, the squeals and laughter that Black Adder brought to all of us who came to watch and pull the cord to release its mighty arm. That delightful medieval tool of destruction entertained us well for many years, and owed us nothing. Thank you all for the wonderful memories.

The demise of Black Adder begs the question: what will we do on October 16 if there is no trebuchet? How can we have a Harvest Fest without it? This, my friends, is where you come in! There is time enough before October to build the next generation of Black Adder, but we need a crew and we need lumber. Black Adder was built from a base of old barn timbers (now rotted) and donated wood. The DCC purchased the hardware, and much of it can be re-used.

Subject to some age (60+) and income limits, seniors can get free coupon booklets that include five \$5 coupons and can be used at any participating Farmer's Market, with any participating vendor. Participating vendors will have signs indicating that they accept the coupons.

The coupons can only be used to purchase fresh, local, unprocessed fruits, vegetables, and culinary herbs. Recipients can have someone else redeem the coupons for them if they cannot travel to a Farmer's Market themselves.

Seniors (or their qualified representative) can pick up booklets at the Office (214 West State Street). Additional distribution tables will be held at local food pantries and senior housing complexes. HEALTHY NEIGHBORHOODS PROGRAM

THE HEALTHY NEIGHBORHOODS PROGRAM (HNP) provides free home safety visits to promote healthy homes. HNP is part of the Health Promotion Program at the Tompkins County Health Department (TCHD), and is funded by a grant from the New York State Department of Health.

The program promotes healthy homes by pursuing the following goals:

- Prevent Indoor Air Pollution
- Prevent Asthma Hospitalizations
- Prevent Residential Fire Deaths
- Prevent Lead Poisoning
- Pest control

Homes are identified based on referrals from other agencies, community outreach, or interaction with TCHD staff. TCHD then visits (using a mixture of phone calls, Zoom, and in-person) to introduce ideas to promote a healthy home and to offer educational materials to help the resident determine what is best for their home. Staff may identify safety hazards or areas of concern, and follow-up with information and recommendations for improvement.

The program will also provide products (subject to available supply) to help the resident meet the goals. Products may include:

- Smoke detectors
- Carbon monoxide detectors
- Replacement batteries
- Radon test kits
- Fire extinguishers
- Asthma management tools
- Green cleaning items
- Child safety products
- Injury Prevention products
