DANBY COMMUNITY AND PARK BECOMES A REALITY

Last July, we shared information about the merger-inprogress of Danby's two not-for-profit community organizations: Community Council and Community Park Association. This step had been a long time in the planning and an equally extended time in process. This Autumn, we celebrate the completion and the creation of Danby Community and Park, DCAP, for short.

In past decades, the two organizations provided recreation and connection for residents of Danby and beyond. They had always had the same goals—to enrich life in Danby—but followed different paths to achieve them. There was considerable duplication of effort and expense. By combining forces, the resulting organization is stronger and more efficient. We're excited for the future.

Together, we will still be offering a Community Concert Series and other public events and workshops—such as the wreath and centerpiece workshop in December. We will still publish the *Danby News*, so that residents can learn about activities from various community organizations including the Danby Seniors, the American Legion, and more.

Importantly, the DCAP will assure the preservation and maintenance of Dotson Park, as it is: 92 acres of natural landscape with fields and trails in the heart of the central Danby Hamlet. The park includes a natural playground, a pavilion, picnic and

meeting area, and a nationally-known 18-hole Disc Golf course that winds its way around the fields and through the forest.

The two organizations have a history of cooperative programming to utilize the park: public events as diverse as flower arranging, nature walks, 'open jam' music making, and the annual Harvest Festival. We're anticipating that even more ideas for nature-based programs will be created in the next few years.

In the meantime, we need to replenish the financial resources that were required to make this new organization a reality. We need the help of our Danby community. There is a parallel article outlining ways you can help. You can write a check to Danby Commu-

DANBY IS JAZZED IN MUSICAL WAYS

To those driving through either of the hamlets in Danby, central or western, we appear to be a sleepy, rural backwater. In truth, there's music rising all across town—especially at two of our businesses: South Hill Cider and Danby Food and Drink.

Our little community has many places to hear music throughout the year. Danby's Community Concerts run year-round (look for more during the winter). There's informal music at Danby's Summer Market.

Danby's Community Church offers spaces (its Fellowship Hall, Sanctuary, and Lawn) for non-religious performances like as a Youth Orchestra concert coming up on Saturday, December 14 and the outdoor concerts that accompany *Sundaes on Wednesdays*.

There are several opportunities to make your own music. In the summertime, we have open music jams in Dotson Park. On Sunday, December 15, we will again have a community Seasonal Songs Sing, to be held this year in the Great Room at *Slow Lane* on Comfort Road.

Two local venues have regular series of music, every week and all year long.

South Hill Cider has been keeping the music scene alive—through the pandemic and into the future. Their outdoor performance area allows visitors to relax, hear music, and enjoy the view. It has become one of the big attractions on this side

of Ithaca. Check out Jazz Mondays with Dave Davies and the Rhythm Makers on the 2nd and 4th weeks, and more Jazz on 1st and 3rd Thursdays. On other Thursday evenings, hear the eclectic old-time music sounds of Richie Stearns and friends.

Additionally, Saturday nights offer featured performers. In November, look for Calya Lee, Sarah Noell and Friends, and Jennie Lowe Stearns.

Participants are welcome to share their own festive greens. Got boxwood, grapevine, or bittersweet that needs trimming? This will be a perfect opportunity to turn that into something beautiful for the Winter Solstice and year-end holidays.

This will be Julie Clougherty's fourth plant-based *play day* and the second wreath and centerpiece party. The previous gatherings/workshops have been creative and fun. This is a great time to let you know more about Julie and her family.

Julie's "day job" is as a nurse. As folks in the health-care field know, a nurse's hours are variable. When not caring for the well-being of others, she's tending her garden—or raising chickens—or doing many things to take care of

Dotson Park and community programs in Danby. Growing and arranging flowers blossomed out of a generous intention to bring beauty to those she helped heal in medical settings.

Julie has been active with both the Danby Community Park Association and the Danby Community Council for well over a decade. In fact, hands-on park improvements, maintenance, and program planning is a family thing for Julie. Her

husband, Tom Janda, built and operates the pumpkinflinging trebuchet that has been a part of Danby's Harvest Festival for close to 10 years.

Julie and Tom's grown kids have been active as well, presenting programs (particularly when one of them was working on requirements as an Eagle Scout), and serving as youth representatives on the DCPA board.

The family has been instrumental in planning the natural playground, building the hypar pavilion, creating a stage area for children's theater, and many other valued elements of the park. Creativity and community are central to who they are.

Next year's Harvest Festival is also planed for the second weekend in October. It's a Federal Holiday (Columbus Day and Indigenous People's Day) and we'll take advantage of that to offer one or two rain dates.

WEATHER IN OUR HISTORY

This past July, tornadoes touched down in Central New York. Though Danby was spared it was an historic event. Tornadoes are fairly rare in this area.

In 2011 Danby did experience a tornado. It ripped through the northwestern part of town. A folder of facts and figures about the storm was compiled by Sue Beeners, the Code Enforcement Officer at the time. It is an interesting read. Here is one paragraph:

Twelve houses had minor to moderate damage. Three houses had major damage. One house was destroyed. Five accessory structures received minor to moderate damage. Four were destroyed. Miscellaneous damage occurred at nine properties.

The report goes on to report downed trees and other damage along the path of the storm. A map showing the path of the storm and where tornadoes touched down is included.

Compared to recent hurricanes and tornadoes, Danby's storm does not seem so noteworthy. But it was just as impactful to the individuals involved and it helps complete an overall picture of weather history in the whole country. And it tells a significant part of Danby's history.



REMINISCING #27

WENT BACK to my Danby Column for November 11, 2004 for these items.

In 1918, the *War to End all Wars* (World War I) ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, Armistice Day. We continue to observe it today as Veteran's Day. The freedoms we relish should be continuously remembered with gratitude, and appreciation for the courageous men and women veterans from past, present, future.

Through the years I had heard lots of ideas for what I called the Danby Wish List. The list included a laundromat, a restaurant, a car wash, and a post office. I think today, in 2024, we would still like to have these places in our neighborhood!

Tim Merritt had come back from his most recent Reserve training with some exciting news. While at Nellis Air Force Base outside Las Vegas, Tim and some buddies used some R&R time to stop in at Jimmy Buffet's Margaritaville Restaurant on the strip. They were introduced to Jimmy Buffet himself, who invited them to be his guests for dinner and a show!

Since Danby kids were now going to South Hill Elementary School, I wrote about a 50s sock hop being planned for the 50th anniversary of the current South Hill School building. During the week there would be school tours, music, and a birthday cake!

The Cornell University Klezmer Ensemble would be giving a free concert on November 21 in Danby's Town Hall. Klezmer was originally the ritual and celebratory music of the Yiddish-speaking Jews of Eastern Europe, where it developed over the course of many centuries.

I had heard from Don Burdick, a former Danby neighbor who moved to Florida with his family. Don was the principal at the Danby Elementary School from 1966 until it closed in 1979. Don reminisced about school field trips and overnight stays in New York City, Niagara Falls, and Washington, D.C. with students. Don said he misses his vegetable garden, friends, and fishing in the streams of West Danby, but he did not miss the snow and cold weather. Sadly, both Don and his wife, Mary Lou, have passed away, but my heart will always be filled with sweet memories of those years and that wonderful Burdick family. (Hello to daughter Lori Burdick and son Bobby Burdick).

Apparently, hunters know all about "the rut." The rut (the breeding season for whitetail deer) usually begins after the last full moon in October and lasts for 2-3 weeks. Boy chases girl, and the pursuit often involves the deer darting across the road, so please be careful driving during this time.

NOTE: As I am writing this in early October for the November Danby News, we are counting down the days until we see our grand-daughter, Maddison Huddle. She's been in Army training for 19 weeks at Fort Sill, OK. She will have a few days at home before her first assignment begins on October 19 at Osan Air Force Base in South Korea. She graduated from the Air Defense Artillery program with very high grades. We will be missing her like crazy but we are so proud of her. According to the Army's Field Manual 3-01, the mission of Air Defense Artillery is, "to protect the force and selected geopolitical assets from aerial attack, missile attack, and surveillance."

HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE

THE 2024-2025 REGULAR HOME ENERGY Assistance Program (HEAP) benefit is scheduled to open November 1, 2024.

HEAP provides assistance with fuel and utility expenses for income-eligible homeowners and renters. HEAP may also be able to help with furnace repair or replacement. The Tompkins County Office for the Aging processes HEAP applications for persons over age 60, and for those who receive SSI or SSD, and do not receive Food Stamps.

Three goals for the voting public: Stability. Security. Dignity.

An early outreach application was mailed out in September for those who received a benefit the prior season. Submit those applications as soon as possible since HEAP is a first come, first serve program. On November 1, those who did not receive a HEAP benefit the prior season can get an application.

The current income eligibility levels for HEAP in 2024-2025 are: Household Size 1: \$3,322, 2: \$4,345, 3: \$5,367.

HOSPITALS SIMPLIFY

New York State has mandated that—effective this October—all hospitals must use the same, simplified application for hospital financial assistance.

The income limits have been improved so that even more households are eligible. This includes: patients without insurance and "underinsured" patients, both with incomes up to 400 percent of the Federal Poverty Level. ("Underinsured" patients are defined as those whose paid medical expenses have exceeded 10 percent of their income during the last 12 months.)
