A WHOLE LOT OF STUFF FROM WHOLE HEATH

THE HOLIDAY GIFTING SEASON arrived early for our household. Our Santa Claus arrived in a brand new, battery-driven Toyota Prius Prime, straight from the not-so-secret workshops of Tompkins County's *Healthy Neighborhoods Program*.

The HNP is one of many outreach programs offered by the Whole Health Department. A few months ago, it announced a new focus and incentive: to introduce Tompkins County residents to an alternative to gas cooking, it would be distributing free, one-burner induction cooktops. As amateur chefs, we enthusiastically cook with gas but, in the spirit of open-mindedness and learning something new, we responded to the offer.

Here's the executive summary: not only do we have a nifty, portable extra "burner", we ended up with a lot of good information and a countertop full of moderately expensive gifts. All are useful and many are things we would otherwise buy in any case.

The process started with an appointment for a 30-minute telephone interview. At a convenient time, the Whole Health representative called us and asked pertinent questions about our home, its safety devices, our need for health-specific items, and even about child safety products. A week or two later, Santa's Sleigh arrived. In the absence of a chimney, Diana Crouch came in via the front door.

For sure, there was the induction cooktop along with two pots: a frying pan and a saucepan. Diana demonstrated the kind of cookware that works with an induction heater (if a magnet sticks to it, it works) and provided a selection of refrigerator-door magnets along with brochures about use of the cooktop.

But wait, Diana reached into the magic bag and came out with a fire ex-

OUR NEIGHBOR: LINDA HOWE

IN THIS NEIGHBOR PROFILE we want to honor Linda Howe. Her 65 years of residing in Danby were a lifetime of community involvement, connection, and support.

While some of this profile will come from her obituary, it will also be my own personal view of Linda. We shared the “sisterhood” of working in the Danby’s Town Clerk office. I felt a bond to Linda, because of the shared ways that we gave service to Danby: in elections, and in Town Hall.

Others knew her longer and more closely; forgive me if I leave out key elements of Linda’s life in Danby. We learned, from her obituary, that, “Linda Ann Coursey Howe of Danby, age 83, passed away on November 25, 2024, at home. Linda was born on July 8, 1941, in Princeton, KY, daughter of the late Harrell McLin Coursey and Linda Elizabeth Ray. She graduated from Central City High School in KY and was a resident of the Town of Danby for over 65 years.”

“Linda met the love of her life, Robert, in 1958 when he was stationed at Ft. Campbell, KY. Together they built their home in Danby, where they raised four children. Linda and RB were married for 57 years until his death in 2016. She lived a beautiful life, married the boy of her dreams who became an incredible husband and father, built a home with him, prospered together with him, kept close ties to her Kentucky roots but fully embraced Upstate NY. She lived a complete and accomplished life, living it fully until the end.”

Ted, my husband, and I first met Linda when we were all election inspectors, back when voting took place Danby’s Town Hall. As inspectors, we represented different political parties. Over time, that barely mattered. We shared the connection and reward of, “Taking care of the details.”

Linda was a long-time Deputy Town Clerk, serving with Carol Sczepanski. I was the Clerk for ten years during the 2010s. We shared an understanding of what was needed to, “dot the Is and cross the Ts,” and to make sure that a clear and legal record of actions and votes were on file for the future.

Her obit notes, “Linda was very active in her community and touched many lives. She worked for Dr. Neish, Town



of Danby, and Longview. She was a member of the American Legion Auxiliary, the Danby Community Church and spent countless hours volunteering.” I would see her through her involvement with the Fire District elections,

when she would bring in the official results and voter lists to be kept with the Town records in the archive vault. She was friendly, efficient, and meticulous.

Any time we drove by the proudly marked *House of Howe* on Jersey Hill Road, it was easy to see that family connections were important to them. “Linda was extremely proud of her four children, all of whom survived her. Sons: Robert Chris (Sue) of Danby, William Harlan (Donna) of Pennsburg, PA, daughters: Nancy Jo (Steve) Phayre of Dryden, Barbara Ann (Joseph) Bargher of Danby. Grandchildren: Brittany, Kimberly, Cody, Brent, Devin, Olivia, Haley, Michael, Cole, and Derek. Great

grandchildren: Emmy, Austin, Colton, Graham, Demi Jo, Cora, and Crew.”

There was playground equipment for the children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. Before her husband Robert died, theirs was one of the most festively decorated properties for the Christmas holidays.

A celebration of life for Linda Howe was held in the Danby Community Church in early December. In remembrance of Linda’s life, the family asked that any charitable donations be made to the Danby Community Church, 1859 Danby Road, Ithaca, NY 14850 or the American Legion Auxiliary #221, 1231 Danby Road, Ithaca, NY 14850. 🐾 (pg)

REMINISCING #29

IT'S A NEW YEAR and in this *Reminiscing* column I am going to start with what I feel was the best part of my January 22, 2009 Ithaca Journal column (#131 of more than 600) and, in my opinion, the best part of a new year. It was the quote, "Strangers are friends you have yet to meet." I find New Year's Eve to be sort of a sad evening and look forward to getting past it, starting a new day, making new friends and continuing to enjoy family and "old" friends! Phooey on any other resolutions!

I wrote to tell folks that *The Bee Movie* was available in the Danby Community Library and shared a recipe for Bee Movie cranberry-honey mustard sauce, which is: 1 jar all-fruit cranberry jam, 2 Tbsp. honey, 2 Tbsp. Dijon mustard, 1 clove of garlic crushed and peeled. Combine all ingredients in a small bowl and whisk until blended. Brush on chicken, turkey, or fish and bake in a pre-heated 350-degree oven for the required amount of time for whatever you are cooking. This recipe is found in a cookbook by Peter J. D'Adamo.

I also went back in time to the 1970s to write about when kids played on the playground of the Danby Elementary School, families attended dish-to-pass suppers at the school, and in the winter kids and adults alike skated on the small manmade pond at the edge of the school grounds. Do you remember those times? Since the closing of the school in 1979, the school building and grounds look so empty and messy, right up to today in 2025. I have called the Ithaca City School District to voice my concerns about this, but to date, very little seems to have been done.

In closing, I want to share a more recent thought, and that is how saddened I was about the passing of Linda Howe. The calling hours and service for Linda was standing room only, as well it should be for a friend and neighbor who has done so much for this community all through the years. Danby Pre-K, Danby Clerk's office, Danby Seniors, American Legion Post #221, walking in Ithaca's Veterans' Day Parade, and just generally being someone who could always be counted on for whatever was needed. OUR NEIGHBOR: WILLIAM FARRELL

WE WERE SADDENED TO HEAR of the passing of William “Bill” Farrell early in the Fall of 2024. Bill was of a Danby generation that not only believed in, but embodied community connection and service. He was a quiet supporter of many of the aspects of Danby that make our small community unique.

Sometimes, we only get to know our neighbors once they are gone. Here are some moving excerpts from his obit:

William F. Farrell, a kind, humble, sensitive man, passed away on October 4, 2024, at the age of 93, in Cayuga Medical Center where he was on palliative care. His passing was peaceful and exactly as he would have wished.



Bill was born in Massena, New York on December 7, 1930, and, after several family moves, came to Ithaca with his parents, Jim and Marion Farrell. When only 17 years old, Bill enlisted in the US Army. The Korean War broke out just as he was to be discharged. He was shipped to Korea where he served with the 3rd Infantry, 10th Combat Engineers, all brave souls who suffered through the harshest conditions. He received the Army of Occupation Medal (Japan), Korean Service Medal, and three Bronze Service Stars.

Bill returned home to Ithaca and began a long career as a home builder, landlord, and occasional farmer. If one

asked Bill what he did for a living, he would reply, “I’m a carpenter,” but but he was so much more. He literally could fix anything (well, maybe not electrical fixtures), and you could always find him working on something, whether it was on his home, his farm equipment, or his antique cars. When friends, family, or neighbors needed something repaired—or just advice—Bill was their first call.

A child of the depression, Bill was frugal with himself but generous with family and friends. He especially enjoyed Americana poetry and could recite from heart both *Barbara Fritchie* and *Old Ironsides*. Bill was an active member of the Ithaca Old Car Enthusiasts and an inaugural member of Island Health and Fitness, where he exercised three times a week until illness pre-

vented him from this activity.

It was Bill’s wish that there be no memorial service. According to his obit, “He always felt that his 80th birthday party, where his family and friends gathered to celebrate him, was the best celebration of life one could have.” However, he did want a military recognition, and that was held at his gravesite on his birthday, December 7, followed by a luncheon at The American Legion. That date is also Pearl Harbor Day, a most fitting day to honor this proud veteran. 🐾 (pg)

➡ **Healthy Neighborhoods, con’t from front page** tinguisher (you can never have too many!), a genuine Rubbermaid bucket (you can’t clean anything properly without one) full of green cleaning supplies, night lights, a hypo-allergenic pillowcase cover, and a copper mesh to mouse-proof the house (no home in Danby is complete without at least one mouse, after all). There was even a radon-detector kit (we’re awaiting the result of the multi-day test).

We were offered smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, but declined since Danby’s Code Officer had insisted—when we built the house—that we install nine (count ’em, nine) hard-wired detectors.

There was printed material on subjects ranging from ticks to a Family Preparedness workbook. Everything was accompanied by patient, thorough explanations.

**You can get almost everything you want delivered to you.
Except medical care.
Bring back house calls.**

Does this sound like something you can take advantage of? Sure does. The HNP is open to homeowners and renters in Tompkins County, and it’s not income-based.

Oddly enough, Danby is not an area of the County that has been identified as having a greater need for these supports...so you have to ask about participation. Don’t wait: sign up by calling Diana, 607.274.6702, or google *tompkins healthy neighborhoods program*”

Oh, one last note. According to HNP, “We are not there to judge or be invasive. If you have any questions or concerns with anything in your home, we will gladly help you with any problems and refer you to local agencies or programs if we cannot assist you. Any identifying markers you provide us with (i.e. name, address, phone number) are kept confidential within our program. Only staff from our program have access to this information.” 🐾 (tc)

CONSIDER THE OPTION OF A MOUSE RELOCATION PROGRAM

WE LIVE IN THE COUNTRY. We live with mice. This is a simple fact of life, for many if not most of us.

I don't know a house tight enough to keep mice out. Our home was built just ten years ago, is highly insulated, airtight, and built to all recent guidelines. Mice found their way in, before we did!

Different folks have different ways of dealing with the problem. For some, it's no problem at all; they practice co-existence. Years ago, a friend, farther out in Western NY, had a big tank that became *mouse haven* during the winter time. He'd catch them and keep them as companions in a place where they could do no damage. When spring came, he took them out to a place where they could enjoy the pleasures of really being field mice.

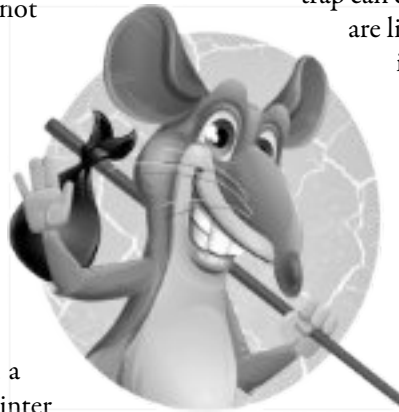
Others want the critters gone and use dangerous-to-mouse-health traps or even poison. We highly recommend not poisoning the mice, as they can crawl away and become a poisoned dinner for owls and other predators.

Humankind has sought a better mousetrap for centuries. Most are made to kill, often slowly and painfully. Here's another option. Mouse Relocation.

We use Victor *Tin Cat* live catch traps. These are like *Hav-A-Heart* traps, but in mouse size. They are available online and in stores like Home Depot and Walmart for less than

\$20. We've had two, for over 30 years, so they are a good long-term investment.

Baited with peanut butter (mice **love** peanut butter!), the trap can catch several mice overnight. The traps are library-book size and you can put them in tight areas, even drawers. The only harm to the mouse is the annoyance of getting caught. *[note: when the trap isn't in use, leave the top open; mice don't know it's not in use —editor]*



What next, you ask? If you dump the peanut-butter-sated mouse outside, won't it just come back? Yes, if you let it out too close to home.

Animals will return to where they know they can safely find food and shelter, unless there's a better alternative. Mice can find their way home from at least a quarter-mile away. So you need to take the mouse at least a mile (or two) away from home.

This is where the Mouse Relocation Program comes into play. Trap at your home. Take the Tin Cat and its occupants for a ride, down to a distant farm, a state forest, or some other open space. Open the trap on the side of the road and let them go. *Be free, little field mouse, be free!* Some may need urging to leave that peanutty-smelling trap.

Relocating your mice to someone else's house isn't neighborly, but do what you need to do. Those particular mice won't be in *your* kitchen any more. 🐭 (pg)

NY State requires all cats, dogs, and ferrets to have their first rabies vaccination between 3 and 4 months of age.

NOT EXACTLY INTERNATIONAL

TRAVELERS WILL BE EXCITED TO KNOW that, starting just before April Fools Day in 2025, United Airlines will begin direct flights from Ithaca to Washington, DC. Direct flights to Newark, though, will end.

Some humorists say that Washington, DC is practically a foreign country to us upstaters, but the County Legislature has decided to drop funding for the U.S. Customs facility at the airport. The airport will no longer be able to process international flights...and will have to drop "International" from its name. According to the *Ithaca Voice*, the facility lost around \$258,000 in 2023 alone, servicing only 26 flights that generated about \$15,000 in revenue. Prior to its opening in 2020, the facility cost about \$6 million to construct. 🐾 (tc)
