A New Way To Spend Money Takes Danby By Storm

[This item borrows heavily from an article in the Tompkins Weekly and from online comments in the Danby/South Hill Facebook Group.]

Danby's Town Board dropped a Bombshell during one of its recent meetings: the Town had been awarded a grant for more than \$4 million, to be used to construct a municipal sewer system. The grant would cover 75 percent of the installation cost but required the Town to come up with additional funding of about \$1.5 million.

The article prompted a lot of questions, both online and during subsequent Town Board meetings. Indeed, during the January 22 meeting, it became apparent that many of these questions might well have been considered prior to the grant application. As Greg Hutnik, the Danby Planner said, "We just need to temper that excitement with the reality that not everyone is on board with this project. People are wary of change."

Where Is This Proposed

Most of the discussion has focused on the Central Hamlet. Roughly speaking, the "downtown" area runs along NYS Rt.96B from Michigan Hollow Road to Miller Roads. The

Danby's Community Concerts for 2025 start in February with the original music of Sera Smolen, Tom Mank, and Rich DePaolo. Modern folk, blues, and improvisation

The concert will be held on Saturday February 8, 2pm, in the Fellowship Hall of Danby's Community Church, 1859 Danby Road, a.k.a. NYS Rt.96B. There's plenty of parking. OUR NEIGHBOR: MUS DOMESTICUS

IN PREVIOUS ISSUES of the Danby News we have introduced you to neighbors in Danby. This month, we're giving some focus to neighbors who not only live near you, but sometimes live with you. Mice.

We had a greater than usual response to our bit on "Mouse Relocation" in the January Danby News. One kind reader dropped us a note pointing out that, It is illegal in NYS to release animals off one's property—although a lot of people don't care and do it anyway. The reasoning behind this is the possible spread of rabies.

However, it is also not doing the animals any favors. Releasing them into an unknown territory (already full of other animals) is usually a death sentence, and especially now for house mice with the cold temps outside. Really a snap trap is more humane. It usually kills instantly."

We heard from other readers, who shared their stories of live catch-and-release, with destinations out in wild, open space areas, as far from human buildings as possible. Each of us must discern what is "most humane": to kill outright, or to give the creature a chance at a new location. As you decide, remember that returning mice to the wild also provides potential food for mouse predators like owls and foxes.

The *Danby News* would never advocate for violating the law, even when the law lacks common sense or unnecessarily costs its readers money. It is legal to kill mice. Taking field mice or even house mice out of your house is more or less returning them to their proper place. As much as house mice are semi-domesticated, they live some of their life out in the wild.

Let's leave the law and talk about mice. Did you know, there are several species of mice co-existing in the area at the same time? House mice and field mice are different species, but both are common pests in homes and may contaminate stored food and damage wood, insulation, and wiring.

Field vs. House: Know the Differences

It isn't always easy but their characteristics and behaviors differ quite a bit.

Field mice can be found in the yard, under trees, or even inside your house. They are a bit bigger than house mice, brown-ish with white bellies. House mice tend to be grey and their eyes and ears are larger.

House mice generally live close to humans; they may live

in fields and wooded areas, but seldom go far from buildings. They may summer in the fields and then move into our homes as the weather gets colder.

The house mouse, *mus domesticus musculus* (from a Sanskrit word meaning "to steal.") is a wild animal, that

has benefited significantly from associating with human habitation...to the point that truly wild populations are significantly less common than the semi-tame populations near us. Perhaps for this reason, the life expectancy of a house mouse is two or three years. A field mouse will be lucky to live more than one year—but they reproduce more often.

Out in the wild, house mice generally dwell in cracks in rocks or walls or make underground burrows consisting of a complex network of tunnels with several chambers for nesting and storage and three or four exits. When living with humans, house mice nest behind rafters, in woodpiles, storage areas, or any hidden spot near a source of food.

Field mice (also known as deer mice, think "ticks") also build burrows and tunnel systems below ground. Burrow systems consist of a circular tunnel around the roots of a tree, another tunnel leading below the tree to a nesting chamber, and other tunnels serving leading to entrances (usually two). Cooperative burrowing has been documented, with several adults living in the same nest.

Field mice are excellent jumpers, with stronger hind legs than house mice. Those strong legs and specially adapted claws help them be amazing climbers. I once watched a mouse quickly climb the siding of our house and slip into a tiny crevice in the roof line.

The field mouse diet is highly diversified and, yes, they'll get into your garden and eat what's there. They will store food where they nest. House mice keep their food apart from where they nest.

Both types of mice are fast! They can run 6-8 miles per hour in short spurts. Even so, they are territorial and tend to stay 50 feet from their home territory. So, when we move them we relocate them to new territory. Mice were inadvertently relocated (from Asia and Europe) to this continent by explorers and traders, when they hitched rides in grain storage and other containers.

MONKEYS DON'T DO SHAKESPEARE

We have all grown up with the belief that an infinite number of monkeys, typing randomly for an infinite amount of time, could eventually produce Shakespeare's works.

The key word is, "infinite."

Two Australian mathematicians, Stephen Woodcock and Jay Falletta, put this theory to the test and the results are as improbable as they sound.

They used "real" numbers and calculated that if every monkey on Earth typed one letter per second for the life of the universe...they could not reproduce the 885,000 words Shakespeare wrote during his lifetime.

proposed system would be gravity-driven, taking advantage of the prevailing slope downwards from Michigan Hollow to Miller. The municipal leach field or treatment facility would be near Miller Road.

The funding also covers a system in West Danby.

Who Pays For The Construction And Hookup

The grant covers 75 percent of the cost, and Danby must pay for the remaining 25 percent. The Town Board is looking into additional grant applications to cover this amount. Of course, conventional wisdom suggests that the next time a government project comes in on time and on budget...will be the first time. So, if the Town must cover any cost, the Town could choose to assess the cost to properties within the Water District (see below) but would probably choose to borrow money, perhaps by issuing a debt bond that would spread the cost and interest across all properties in the Town.

According to the Office of the State Comptroller, "In general, hook-up charges are the responsibility of the owner of each property connecting to the system."

This Sounds Like A Lot Of Money

It is, especially for a municipality the size of Danby. If you look at the Town Tax Bill you paid in January, you'll see that the entire budget for 2025 was about \$2.5 million.

What Services Are Provided, and Who Pays For Them

Properties within the Water District could connect to the municipal wastewater system instead of their existing septic systems. However, all properties would be assessed an annual usage fee.

"It's not going to be an easy sell, because you have to consider that if you own a property in the Town of Danby, you already have a septic system," said Joel Gagnon, the Danby Supervisor. "A small portion of them are failing, but if yours is not, you're probably not keen on having a water district annual expense of hundreds of dollars. Hooking up to public sewers would be an added expense compared to pumping our tanks every few years."

So, Why Bother, If We Already Have Septic Systems

The main advantage of a municipal wastewater system is not to existing homeowners or businesses, but to potential owners of new development. New homes and businesses will not incur the cost of installing private septic. An additional advantage comes from not needing about an acre to install the system; this would enable dense development of new homes and multi-unit developments.

Some of the Town Board members question the "Field of Dreams" assumption: "If you build it, they will come." With the proposed municipal system, the hamlet could become densely populated...if they come.

So, Why Was The Grant Awarded

Gagnon said, "The state [of New York] has a policy of encouraging new growth to be where infrastructure already exists and is not aimed at enabling new growth in places where there isn't that infrastructure..." During a subsequent Town Board meeting, when asked to justify the grant award in a location where there isn't any current infrastructure, Gagnon acknowledged the incongruity and added, "Well, they awarded the grant."

The grant funding is environmentally motivated but is being used to promote dense development in downtown Danby. Gagnon asks, "Are we willing to take on additional expense to enable the kind of growth that we say we want?" Some, including some Town Board members, questioned whether the best future for Danby is to have a dense downtown like Trumansburg or Dryden...or the Ithaca Commons.

Several residents participating in the online and meeting discussions noted that people move to Danby because it isn't densely populated.

What's A Water District

A Water District is, at heart, a benefit district. All property and property owners within the district must benefit from the district and all the property and property owners that are benefit from the district must be included within the limits of the district.

During Town Board discussion, Gagnon noted that the District could be defined as the entire Town, which would

minimize the financial impact on those in the downtown corridor. It all depends on how "benefit" is defined.

Do We Get A Choice Here

The formation of a Water District *can* and any Bonding *must* be subject to approval by voters. Much like the recently defeated proposal to make the position of Town Clerk subject to appointment by the Town Board, the Town Board creates a plan, enacts a law to implement it, and then the voters get to weigh in.

Gagnon, known as a promoter of development in the Hamlets, puts it into a nutshell, "I think many of us have trouble imagining how and where Danby could change for the better if sewers were added. We need...convincing that those changes would be for the better." He continues, "We do not have to accept the grant.... We have options that we did not have before thanks to this grant and we should carefully consider both the pros and the cons."

Despite the high cost of living (in Danby), it remains popular.
