THE CAT CAME BACK

Last September my husband, Jim Lassoie, and I went on a 2-month van camping trip. Our 7-year old lab, Bertie, and our 14-year old orange cat, Bubba came with us. It was Bubba's first road trip. We weren't sure this was a good idea, but we didn't have a lot of options. Even an an old cat can learn new tricks.

The Pacific Crest Overland Route follows mostly dirt roads from Canada to Mexico, through the mountains and deserts of Washington, Oregon, and California. We boondocked at night or stayed at forest service campgrounds...that we typically had to ourselves. Bubba did well on our travels but tended to wander when we were camped. We got a harness for him and would tie him up at times depending on his mood. All went well for six weeks until Bubba wandered off one night in California's Tahoe National Forest...and didn't return. We looked, called, and waited for two days before making the painful decision to continue our journey without him.

We were told that there were a lot of mountain lions in the area and figured that one of his kin may have taken him. We erected a memorial for him on the overlook where we had camped and had a teary departure.

Fast forward three months to mid-January. The Grass Valley Vet Hospital near Sacramento in California called us to say that someone had brought in Bubba. He was alive and well and was identified by his microchip!

Bubba had found his way, still wearing his harness, to a small community—about twelve houses—called Goodyears Bar. It is an old gold mining town, about six miles by road down the mountain from where we had camped. A couple, Katie and Mike, took him in and he became a part of their family. They called Bubba the miracle cat; he showed up in their lives only two weeks after their own cat died. Since Goodyears Bar is a very isolated community they assumed someone had dumped Bubba. Eventually, they took him to the clinic, where the microchip was discovered.

I flew to Sacramento and drove two hours into the mountains. Katie and Mike were both happy and sad; they were ready to adopt Bubba (who they thought was a she and called Goldie). We had a wonderful visit.

Bubba is a lucky cat. We will never know what he did during three weeks on his own but, somehow, he found Katie and Mike, who took him into their home, took care of him, and gave him lots of love. We are happy Bubba is home. Katie and Mike have since adopted a new cat. No more road trips for Bubba.

EMBRACING WINTER

Some years, Spring appears in March. 2025 doesn't look like one of those years. As I write this, it's 11°F and hasn't been above freezing for a week. Ice from a brief melt coats our driveway and snow is swirling around the house. We're ready to throw our snow shovels into the drifts.

But wait, this can be a time when we embrace the joys of winter. "What joys?" I hear you ask. The March and April transition from winter to spring has silver linings, beginning with lighter and longer days. March opens with 11-hour days and closes with 12½ hours of daylight.



CITIZEN PREPAREDNESS

The Next Citizen Preparedness Training Course will be offered in Ithaca on March 6 in the Elks Lodge, 124 Coddington Road.

The Citizen Preparedness Corps (CPC) gives residents the tools and resources to prepare for any type of disaster or emergency, respond accordingly, and recover as quickly as possible to pre-disaster conditions.

CPC trainings are led by New York National Guard members working with experts from the state Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services (DHSES) and local emergency management personnel.

With severe weather events becoming more frequent and more extreme, it's more important than ever to be prepared for disasters. This is a great opportunity to learn how to properly develop family emergency plans and stock up on supplies. Preparedness kits will be distributed to every family that attends. The training is offered free of charge but registration is required. To register, visit [prepare.ny.gov].

RADON TESTS

THE RADON-SCARE YEARS of the last century have faded from our memories. The fracking years are also behind us. Yet, radon is still with us; in fact, the Marcellus Shale is significant source of radon gas.

The EPA categorizes counties into zones. Tompkins County is inside the Red Zone ([epa.gov/radon] and follow links to the map). Between 30 and 50 percent of tests conducted within Tompkins County have detected radon levels above 4pCi/L (pico curies per liter).

Living in a Red Zone area means that it is important to test your home for radon...and re-test again every five years. If your home already has a mitigation system in place, a re-test every two years is recommended.

Radon home-test kits can be purchased at many of home-improvement retailers. Test kits are also available from the NYS Department of Health (the \$12.25 cost includes the kit, laboratory analysis, and postage). Free radon test kits are available through the Tompkins County Whole Health Department. Staff provides instructions on how to use the kits and can assist in setting up the radon test at your home. NOT TOO LATE TO RUN

March is the month of the NYS Political Calendar when prospective major-party candidates work to qualify themselves for a place on the ballot. A citizen took advantage of *Privilege of the Floor* during a February Town Board meeting to question, repeatedly, why no notice of political openings—or how to run for office—was publicized by the Town.



After all, he noted, the Town policy is to announce openings for *appointed positions* and *employment*, why should elected positions be any different?

Danby has three (vacant) Town Board seats up for election in 2025, along with a Supervisor, a Clerk (vacant), a Highway Superintendent, and a County Legislator (vacant).

According to conventional wisdom, people usually run for office for one of three reasons: they're unhappy with the way things are run, they're not angry but think it can be done better, or they want power. Any or all of these might apply to Danby.

There's some paperwork, but the real work in March is to collect about 75 signatures on a petition. You have to follow some commonsense rules very carefully. It's not too hard...and then you're on the ballot!

If you'd like to run but want to do it outside the majorparty lines, Independent Nominating Petitions are circulated during late April and early May.

Move fast while you can. Contact the Board of Elections, [votetompkins.com] or 607.274.5522. It is an amazing source of useful information and can put you in touch with party organizations.

Wrong.

Right, but with a different party affiliation.

MARIE'S ROOT SOUP

IN EARLY FEBRUARY, we posted a picture of a bowl of soup on the Danby/South Hill Facebook group. It must've looked yummy and several people asked, "Do you do take-out?"

Slow Lane isn't zoned for a restaurant and we have no interest in becoming a food venue, but we are more than happy to share the recipe for the hearty Carrot-Sweet Potato Roots soup. This is one of our winter standbys, and a real pleasure of the season.

Homemade soup is so much more satisfying than heating a can. The meditative process of chopping vegetables, the pungent cooking odor and, of course, the pleasure knowing every ingredient in your bowl. We use local produce from the Full Plate Farm Collective.

This recipe is adapted from one our friend Marie shared with us, years ago. Adjusting a recipe to your home's needs and tastes is another joy of home cooking. Experiment with what you've got and what looks good in the market. The mix of spices gives this soup flavorful complexity...and it's rather simple to make. It's vegan/vegetarian.

Step 1: 1 onion, diced

3 carrots, peeled and diced

2 large sweet potatoes, peeled and diced

(or similar amount of butternut squash)

½ tsp cardamom

½ tsp turmeric

½ tsp ginger (fresh or dried)

½ tsp cinnamon

pinch cayenne powder

Step 2: 14 oz vegetable broth

2 cups water

2 med "field apples", peeled and diced

Serve: sour cream or yoghurt

Method

- 1) Sauté onions in oil in large soup pot.
- 2) Add carrots, sweet potatoes, and spices. Sauté all together with the spices for a few minutes.
- 3) Add liquid and apples. Cook covered until vegetables are soft.
- 4) Blend with an immersion blender (or in small batches with a regular blender) until smooth. Adjust liquid to your desired consistency.

Marie's soup tastes great as is. For extra creaminess and protein, stir a dollop of sour cream or yogurt into your bowl. The warm orange color of this soup pairs well with bright purple/pink beet hummus on rye bread. It's a warming winter meal.
