## SUN SHINES ON PARK MUSIC

E MET, WE SANG, WE ENJOYED THE SUNSHINE.

The turnout was not bad for the Sunday afternoon of Easter/Passover weekend. Temperatures were in the low 50s, but felt warmer in the sun—when the wind wasn't blowing. The notes of a hammered dulcimer joined several voices, a lot of laughter, some stories, and songs.

This kind of thing should happen more often. The target is one Sunday afternoon a month, May through September, starting on Sunday. May 18, 2pm. Dotson Park's hypar pavilion has benches and is surrounded by more benches and picnic tables. Music always brings good weather, so no rain dates are planned beyond "next month."

Play a tune, sing a song, or just listen.

These events are different from concerts (no "performers") and from open mic nights ("serial performers") because there is no stage. It's less about performing and more about sharing; we enjoy the Park while we make our own entertainment.

There's ample opportunity for dedicated performances in Danby. DCAP's Community Concert series brings locally-and nationally-known artists into staged events. Danby's Community Church has *Sundaes On Wednesdays* during the summer, South Hill Cidery offers music, and Danby Food and Drink has both paid performers and open mic events.

The free open music sessions are sponsored by Danby Community and Park. Contributions to support the Park are welcome. Refreshments are provided; folks are welcome to share their own snacks. Sing, play, or listen. No need to register, just show up. This is fun for a whole family.

April's event brought a lot of folk music and old time tunes, while previous gatherings included blues, jazz, and even some show tunes.

## GREAT ROAD CLEANUP REPORT

A LMOST A DOZEN PEOPLE of all ages helped clean up the margins of NYS Rt.96B and Gunderman Roads in Downtown Danby. In spite of ominous weather forecasts, no rain dampened the cleanup on Saturday, April 19; short-sleeved shirts were more appropriate than raincoats.

Participants scoured the shoulders of Danby Road, from beyond Michigan Hollow Road northward to White Hawk Lane. There was mostly good news: less trash than in previous years!

Ted and Pamela have been coordinating road cleanup for the 2.2 miles of NYS Rt.96B thru Danby for many years. It's been interesting to see

what's been found along the roadsides. It changes, year to year.

By count (and, to some extent, by weight) road paint dominates the pickups. The pavement markings—both yellow and white—chip off over time. It is not ordinary paint (see *Correction* below); it's thick and heavy, and sometimes it's still attached to chunks of road.

We found fewer car parts than usual, and it was almost all small, lightweight plastic bits, presumably from auto accidents. There's also side view mirrors, underbody panels, and hubcaps. Maybe drivers are a bit more careful? Maybe things get cleaned up better right after accidents?

There are always cigarette butts. This year, there was less evidence of fast food. Maybe it's less popular, because it's more expensive? There's always plastic cups, plastic and glass bottles, and cans. Some are fresh enough to return for the container deposit!

Oddly enough, the greatest concentration of legal drugs—energy drinks and convenience-store pick-meups—filled the roadside in front of Danby's Town Hall. These, along with beer cans, are usually concentrated near *Speed Limit* signs. That's a source of concern about folks who are drinking and driving.

During the COVID pandemic, face masks littered the road. Those seem to be gone. Pieces of styrofoam, possibly from the same litter incident as the masses found several years ago, add bulk but not weight to the collection bags.

We re-delivered a fair number of mail pieces—bills and notices—that escaped, somehow, from mailboxes. This year, thank goodness, there were no wet telephone books.

Road cleanup is more than community effort to keep the roadsides more beautiful. It's also a window on what's happening with society and with travelers in our town. We were glad to see that, over all, there seemed to be less trash and debris along the road this spring. Maybe regular clean ups are having a good effect.

Everyone interested in helping with future cleanups is more than welcome. The more we do, the easier it gets, with less trash to pick up. It seems that community cleanliness is comfortably contagious. (pg)

## ROAD PAINT CORRECTION

A PRIL'S DANBY News contained an unfortunate error. It reported that discussion during one of Danby's Town Board meetings mentioned a \$50,000 cost for the Town's installation of a crosswalk between Town Hall and Dotson Park. That figure was improbably high.

Careful review of the meeting recording confirmed an expression of surprise about the unexpectedly high cost, but the actual amount is still unknown. The number "twenty" was clearly audible, along with something that might have been "seven" or "thousand." The official who spoke does not remember the exact words. It was unlikely to have been \$20 or \$27; a figure in five digits seems a better fit for the context.

Another official opined that the \$50,000 cost might have referred to a larger project including the crosswalk but the recorded discussion was only about the crosswalk.

Apologies for hearing the wrong number.

#### April

## "SUPER SITE" POLLING PLACE IN WEST DANBY

EARLIER THIS YEAR, the Tompkins County Board of Elections proposed closing its polling place in the West Danby Fire Station. The reason was simple: thanks to the many alternatives (early voting, voting by mail) to voting on Election Day, it is no longer cost-effective to

run the site.



Danby voters objected to the idea of having to travel miles as the crow flies—and 600 feet in altitude—to vote in Uphill Danby. After all, New York is known for promoting, not restricting the abil-

ity to vote. Commissioners Steve DeWitt[D] and Alanna Congdon[R] met with Danby residents on February 15...and were persuaded to try a different alternative.

In a letter to West Danby resident Pat Curran on April 1, the Commissioners wrote, "We agreed to keep the West Danby Fire Station as the polling place for Danby 2. In addition, per the suggestion of a few people at the meeting, we will allow voters from Newfield to vote there also. In addition, voters from Danby 2 will be allowed to vote in Newfield if they choose."

The *Danby News* encourages all Danby residents to vote, West Danby residents to vote in West Danby, and also invites Newfield residents to vote in West Danby. Tell your friends, both in West Danby in Newfield! *Keep our polling place cost-effective!*

## LETTER: URGING CLEANER ROADS

One thing that would help with road cleanup is to eliminate the dirt that is mixed in with the salt spread on the roads during the winter.

The dirt/mud and stones gets tracked onto our driveways and into our homes. When it is dry, the dirt creates clouds of dust that settles into our homes, all over our outdoor furniture, cars, windows and into our lungs...especially for those who try to walk on the sloppy roads on nice days.

In the spring when the sweeper makes a run in an attempt to remove the dirt, the biggest impact is the tremendous clouds of dust that we then have to deal with. It's Danby's version of the dust bowl.

We have to avoid walking on Danby roads most of the winter. Better to go into the Town of Ithaca where the roads are much, much cleaner.

Does it really save that much to mix dirt with the salt? Dealing with the mud and dust ends up costing all of us in the long run. Even mixing in sand would be better than the dirt that is currently used.

## RECYCLING UPDATE

Tompkins County's Recycling and Solid Waste Center (RSWC) will be closed on Memorial Day and Independence Day (May 26 and July 4) and recycling collection will be delayed one day during those weeks.

If you plan to drop off trash, yard waste, tires, or Freon units, you need a Solid Waste Permit to use the RSW facility. Permits are available in the office, 122 Commercial Ave, Ithaca, or via its online shop.

#### Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

HHW includes automotive care products, lawn and garden products, products containing mercury, fluorescent light bulbs/tubes, and more! RSWC holds six HHW drop-off events held each year; the next one is on Saturday, May 17. Residents with a valid Permit can sign up for an event at no additional charge. ## FREE RABIES VACCINATION CLINIC

RABIES IS A DEADLY DISEASE caused by a virus that attacks the central nervous system (brain and spinal cord). Infected mammals can transmit rabies virus to humans and other mammals. Rabies is almost always fatal once symptoms appear.

New York State requires all cats, dogs, and ferrets to have their first rabies vaccination between 3 and 4 months of age. To make it easy to keep your pets vaccinated, the Tompkins County Health Department holds rabies clinics throughout the year.

After an initial vaccine,

- Cats may receive either a 1-year or 3-year vaccine depending on the type of rabies vaccine given and whether proof of previous vaccination is available
- Dogs receive a 3-year vaccine.
- Ferrets must be vaccinated annually.

The next free rabies vaccination clinic will be in Danby on Wednesday, May 7, 2025, 6-8pm, in Danby's Fire Station, 1780 Danby Road. Please register for an appointment at [tcgov.co/health]. Please bring proof of any prior vaccinations!
