2025 CANDIDATE FORUM ON JUNE 4!

PART OF DANBY COMMUNITY AND PARK'S MISSION is to present educational and informative material to Danby residents. This year, the tradition continues with its semi-annual Candidate Forum: candidates for the Democratic nomination to run for public office representing the Town of Danby have been invited to answer questions from the public.

The event will take place in Fellowship Hall of Danby's Community Church on Wednesday, June 4, at 7pm. It will be divided into two halves: three candidates for County Legislator will be questioned 7-8pm, and three candidates for Town Councilperson will answer questions 8-9pm.

As always, the League of Women Voters will moderate the event. The LWV will collect written questions from the public. Each segment begins with opening statements and ends with closing statements. In between, a series of questions will be posed with each candidate getting one minute to answer.

The event will also live-stream on YouTube; afterwards, a recording will be available. Links to both the live-stream and the recording will appear on the LWV web site, [lwvtompkins.org].

TWO ELECTIONS DURING JUNE!

JUNE, 2025 OFFERS TWO OPPORTUNITIES to vote in Danby: the Primary Election on June 24 and a Special Election of Danby's Fire District on June 17.

The Special Election requests voters to authorize the purchase of a \$656,634 Pumper Tanker, including borrowing \$450,000 via the issuance of a bond. By comparison, the District's annual budget is about \$600,000.

Voting for the Special Election will be 6-9pm in the DVFC Fire Station, 1780 Danby Road.

ELECTION '25: DANBY IN TRANSITION

DANBY'S POLITICAL DEMOGRAPHICS are lopsided: 57 percent of registered voters are Democrats, 21 percent have not indicated any party affiliation, and only 17 percent are registered as Republicans. As a result, most elections are decided during the Democratic Primary; this year it's on June 24, with early voting beginning on June 14.

This imbalance wasn't always the case. In recent memory, it was not uncommon for Democrats to register as Republicans to gain a voice in choosing local officials (party registration is required to vote in Primaries, but party affiliation does not restrict a voter's choice during the November General Election).

There will not be a Republican Primary and, unfortunately for Danby's non-Democratic voters, the deadline to indicate party affiliation passed on February 14. New voters, however, can register for the Primary until June 14.

About the Candidate Statements

The competitive candidates were asked to provide statements and a photograph for publication. The statements were limited to 340 words (enough to fill a column, depending on the length of words) and are printed verbatim. The photographs were adjusted in size so that all the faces are about the same size and cropped to the same shape.



The Candidate Interview

Danby's government is moving toward changing the face of Danby, with a Wastewater plan that will enable denser housing, a Noise Law to codify relations between neighbors, and other laws. All candidates were asked to address "hot topics" in Danby. Some did, others did not.

- biographical information
- why you came to Danby (or Caroline, for LD13 candidates), and how long ago
- your involvement in your community
- most Danby residents do not attend Town Board meetings or follow Town affairs. *How would you improve resident engagement?*

For Town Council Candidates:

- Preserving rural character is part of Danby's Comprehensive Plan. Anecdotal evidence suggests many residents of Danby are here because of its rural character. The formulation of Danby's new Zoning Law used downtown Dryden, Trumansburg, and the Ithaca Commons as models. *Are you in favor of developing Central Danby and the West Danby hamlet along those lines? Does the current effort toward dense development of the hamlet area affect Danby's rural character?*
- The effort toward establishing a wastewater system in the Central Danby area has generated considerable skepticism from Danby residents. Many think they'll end up paying for something they don't need, for the benefit of dense housing development for new residents. *Are you in favor of continuing along this path?*
- In recent years, Danby's Government has tackled—and not always resolved—issues with solutions that many residents did not accept. *How will you include members*

IRENE WEISER—LEGISLATOR

We're living through a time of unprecedented injustice and economic upheaval. Some Danby residents are already experiencing job loss, while federal cuts to food stamps, Medicaid, Headstart, and more could cost Tompkins County up to \$25 million—10% of our budget—and impact 40% of county residents. These cuts may also imperil the County's broadband project that would serve many Danby homes, and federal climate funding is being slashed even as extreme weather threats grow.



Meanwhile, NYSEG's energy costs are soaring, while overcharging and outages continue. And

come January, *over half the County Legislators will be new* along with new leadership in County departments of Social Services, Whole Health, Finance and Public Works.

In the face of these challenges, our need for experienced local leadership has never been greater. I am the only candidate with proven governing and policy experience, and endorsement by the Working Families Party.

I'm a retired veterinarian, a 34-year Caroline resident, and 4-year Danby property owner. I served nine years on Caroline's Town Board, where I led efforts to ban fracking, expand broadband and community solar, protect aquifers, support youth, seniors, and the food pantry, and provide timely emergency medical services. For the past 15 years, I've led Fossil Free Tompkins, which shut down the coal-burning Cayuga power-plant and stopped the Dryden pipeline while securing millions in clean energy funds. I helped draft laws to stop crypto-mining and CO2 fracking and I continue to fight to hold NYSEG and their regulators, the Public Service Commission, accountable.

As your county legislator, I'll work for both progress and accountability—prioritizing fiscal restraint—while maintaining the social safety net and standing up for all whose civil rights are threatened. I'll push for climate resiliency, clean energy, and economic developments that strengthen our rural community. And I'll be available to meet regularly to discuss what's happening.

KYLE EMILY ERICKSON—LEGISLATOR

Bio

I was born and raised in Tompkins County. We purchased our home in Brooktondale in 2015. We were looking for a forever home, a place where we could build community and feel connected to people and nature.

Community

For the past decade, I have poured my extra time and energy into my role as a teacher, advisor and coach at Ithaca High School. It is a privilege to be part of the lives of young people throughout Danby and Caroline.



Engagement

I will prioritize regular and varied communication with constituents. Possible approaches may include regular office hours at the Brookton's Market, Danby Food and Drink, or other local gathering places and submitting monthly update articles to local publications.

Internet

The County submitted a grant approximately one year ago to NYS to secure internet for every unserved home in Tompkins County. Though the timeline for reviewing the county's application has been delayed, it seems highly likely that the County will receive the money. I support the existing plan of partnering with Point Broadband, a fiber internet provider, to complete the project.

NYSEG

There is an ongoing investigation into NYSEG's billing practices, initiated by Representative Josh Riley in response to constituents' concerns and calls by county legislatures, including Tompkins, which passed a resolution supporting this measure in April. While we wait to learn about the results of this investigation, the NYSEG office at 1387 Dryden Road takes walk-ins for bill-related questions from 9am-3pm.

Federal Government

I am proud to be a part of a community that strives to build a safe, healthy and just home for all its residents.

So far, the courts have been helpful in halting federal actions that target progressive communities. We don't know what will come next. In these uncertain times, it is paramount that the legislature remains focused on strengthening local government so that it can continue to be responsive to constituents' needs.



MARK PRUCE—COUNCILPERSON

I'm a father, partner, web developer by profession, gardener and tinkerer by hobby, and community organizer by passion. I'm 38 years old and moved to Danby ten years ago to live at White Hawk Ecovillage. I love living in



Danby - for its natural beauty, wide-open spaces, and proximity to the culture and community of Ithaca. I work from home for a non-profit dedicated to public service, which ignited my decision to serve our community.

As a volunteer for Loaves & Fishes and No Mas Lagrimas, I've learned how critical community groups, and their partners in local government, are to meeting the

needs of our neighbors and improving our quality of life.

As a leader at White Hawk Ecovillage, I've learned the value, and challenge, of building agreement across perspectives to move towards our short and long term goals.

As a senior manager and web developer at work, I've become a certified project manager and learned to manage complex projects on budget and deadline. I've also modernized our use of data and digital tools - skills I would gladly use on the Town board.

As manager of Tracy Mitrano's campaign for Congress, I met folks from all over the area and learned about their priorities and values, but also their fears and frustrations with our less-than-functional federal government.

While I am asking for your vote, I don't believe that your involvement in our town should end at the ballot. I will work with the board to make it easier for you to stay engaged in town affairs, for example by hosting informal events (with childcare) to give updates and get input from the public. When tough issues arise, like the potential stormwater system or noise conflicts, I'd like to lead the board to proactively get input from all voices and viewpoints to inform any proposed solutions. When people feel that confrontation is the only way to have their opinions heard, there has already been a breakdown of the process - we can do better than that in Danby. 🐾

JAMES TYLER STEIN—COUNCILPERSON

Hello neighbors! I was recently appointed to the town board after former member Paul Hansen retired. A bit about myself: I'm a former public library Reference Assistant and current IT IAM Specialist at Tompkins Community Bank. My wife and I relocated from Athens, Ohio to the Ithaca area in 2014 after losing a hard-fought battle to prevent fracking in our community. We chose the Ithaca area after witnessing the tremendous people-powered movement that demanded and won a state-wide fracking ban, based on scientific research as outlined by the NYS Dept of Health. We were briefly engaged with the anti-fracking movement in Ithaca, from our arrival until the ban was passed in June of 2015.



Around that time, I was inspired by Bernie Sanders' support of policies like Medicare for All, Raising the Minimum Wage, and A Federal Jobs Guarantee which acknowledges the huge amount of work there is to do to surrounding Climate Change, to name a few. To help the campaign, I volunteered to phone bank and made calls on election day to help voters locate their polling stations.

In 2016 we bought a cabin in Danby, added solar panels, and made it our permanent home. We've welcomed three children since then, in no small part because this community made us feel like the future would be safe here.

My interest in local politics is to ensure this promise is kept, for our family and for everyone who does and who will someday call our beautiful rural town home. I love this community and support its vision for an inclusive hamlet surrounded by nature, with clean air, water, and open space for everyone. I believe in democracy, and so while I will of course bring my own knowledge and experience to bear, I will always solicit and seek to prioritize the positions of my neighbors. I will work towards solutions which foster a sense of community belonging and recognize the financial and material concerns of each individual as integral to the community's peace and well-being as a whole. 🐾

MATT SULLIVAN—LEGISLATOR

I grew up in Danby, graduating from Ithaca High School in 2007. My career has been centered around service—first as a combat medic with the New York Army National Guard, and currently as a paramedic with Bangs Ambulance.



My leadership experience includes deployment in Iraq and Kuwait, where I was awarded the Army Commendation Medal. I founded Bangs Ambulance Workers United, a CSEA-affiliated union, where I now serve as president.

People engage when they have real decision-making power and when issues are raised that are important to them. As a representative, I see

my job as translating your will and interests into government action. I will hold regular town halls to hear from you, my constituents, and put you in the driver's seat of county government. I will post updates on social media and explore ways the county can better communicate with residents. Danby is not uniquely challenged with resident apathy. Meeting people where they are is the best way to improve engagement.

Internet access is a necessity for many in Danby, and necessary utilities like electricity and internet can't be entrusted solely to for-profit companies. It is also more of a priority for some people than for others. I would support the establishment of a cooperative, community-owned internet service to provide access without increasing the tax burden or shelling out to for-profit internet companies. A similar model can work for electricity. I plan to explore public utility and co-op electricity generation models that are beholden to their customers, not their shareholders.

It's my goal to ensure necessities like internet, electricity, good union jobs, and childcare are accessible to everyone in Danby.

With federal funding increasingly uncertain, strategies like public corporations and co-ops provide for the common good (like internet and childcare) without increasing the tax burden. I will support public corporations and other non-tax revenue streams for the county. We need to make sure that when the federal government threatens the rights of our citizens, we are self-sufficient and able to stand up for them.



ZACHARY LARKINS—COUNCILPERSON

I grew up in Hartville, Ohio, a small rural community an hour south of Cleveland. I've been working in construction for over two decades. My partner has a degree in enology and viticulture and we were looking to move to an area that was suitable for that field so we moved here in 2023.



I started attending town board meetings when I moved here because I wanted to understand the community better. I also attend most planning board meetings. I volunteered my time on the boardwalk project in Dotson Park and am currently working on seeing a new skatepark/ town park and a cross walk into existence.

Posting notices on facebook of current town activities and talking to people about what's going on in person is the base level of trying to get more people involved in town events.

Danby has a unique opportunity to develop areas to retain residents and an opportunity to provide more housing so more people can enjoy this town. It can start something that is its own thing. Danby doesn't have a school, a 55 plus/assisted living community, or a grocery store/general store. Having the density preserves rural areas. If the town continues on the path of establishing a public wastewater system that will only help with the density and possibility of businesses being mixed in with residential within the hamlets. I support a public sewer system if it is paid for only by the people who use the system. Density can support this. More residents means a larger tax base.

From talking to residents it seems like anytime an issue comes up there is discussion at town board meetings. The loudest voices don't always have the answer that is most beneficial to the whole of the town, but it is important to hear everyone's concerns.

I plan on making space for people to have their voices heard, not just within the time span of a meeting.

of the public in the consideration of future sensitive questions?

- In general, how will you promote meaningful input to Town decision-making from Danby residents who do not share your viewpoint?

For County Legislature Candidates:

- Danby has one of the worst Internet coverages in the county. It has been more than 10 years since the Legislature began to address this issue, county-wide. There does not appear to be a useful solution in the near future, and future Federal funding is uncertain. *How do you propose to provide good-quality service to Danby?*
- Many residents feel that NYSEG is providing poor service and is generating inaccurate bills. *How do you propose to address this problem?*
- The current Federal administration appears to be pushing back against “woke” local governments. For example, sanctuary cities and DEI. *How do you propose to future-proof existing and new County policies? How about the many arts and educational organizations in the county? Will this add a crushing burden to county taxpayers?*
