COOKING FOR ABUNDANCE

THIS IS THE SEASON OF ABUNDANT GARDENS. With it comes the need to do *something* with all the beautiful garden excess. The deeply wet ground, from the steady rains of spring, combined with the speedy arrival of heat (Summer sure came screaming in, didn't it?), could well result in a bounty of cucumbers, summer squash, peas and beans, and other goodies from the ground.

Our first recommendation is: get to know your neighbors. If you've got more than you can manage of something, you may know someone who doesn't and would welcome some of the good freshness from your garden. Our communities can use more kindness, generosity, and care. Sharing actually feels good and helps build relationships and resilience. At a time of financial uncertainty, community resilience is a necessity.

This comes to mind as a result of a friend's generosity. In late May, I happened to mention that I like rhubarb but I have no rhubarb plants. It turns out, my friends had way more rhubarb than they could use. To my delight and surprise, I was gifted two huge bags--more than five pounds--of rhubarb stalks. It was just the tip of their rhubarb patch; a well-established rhubarb patch is a *gift that keeps on giving*.

There are many good things to do with rhubarb. Pie, of course, often combined with strawberries. We're fond of rhubarb crisps and and cobblers. Rhubarb sauce (like apple sauce but rhubarb) is good on so many things. We made some for now and canned several pints for later.

One of my favorite uses of rhubarb is to cook it into a vinaigrette dressing for salads. Given the other current abundance—lettuce and early greens--this is a *win, win*: homemade dressing on homegrown salad. Fresh and healthy. See one dressing recipe in this issue.

RHUBARB/BERRY VINAIGRETTE DRESSING

This dressing is delicious on fresh green salads, especially with slightly bitter greens like arugula and frisée endive. When made solely with berries, there is no need to cook the fruit. Combining fresh rhubarb or canned rhubarb sauce with berries or other fruits makes a wonderfully balanced sweet/tart dressing. Try this with different seasonal fruits, all summer long.

¼ cup honey
½ cup water
¼ cup cider vinegar
2 cups chopped rhubarb
1 tsp thyme leaves
Generous pinches of salt/pepper
Optional
½ to 1 cup berries, chopped

Heat the water and honey, add the rhubarb and cook for 5 minutes. Stir in the other ingredients and let cool. Blend until smooth. Will keep for a couple of weeks in the refrigerator.

As voters found out on Primary Day, June 24, the Danby Fire Station is comfortably cooled!

Boating

Stay safe on the water this summer by being prepared and using the appropriate equipment, whether enjoying a ride on a motorized boat, paddling a kayak, or wakeboarding. Learn more from the National Safety Council (google: "national safety council boating safety").

Where Are You

You can download the "what 3 words" [what3words.com] app to a smart phone. It utilizes your phone's GPS and provides three unique words to assist emergency responders in pinpointing your location, whether on the water or on local hiking trails.

Citizen Preparedness Corps

EFFECTIVE INTERNET SERVICE

EVERYBODY LOVES TO HATE BIG BUSINESSES. If you can put up with the impersonal service, though, I've recently learned that Verizon has a useful Internet service for locations not served by wired-line providers.

The story began when my previous provider of more than 30 years (call it "C" to protect the innocent) let me know that it would be shutting off the fixed-wireless antenna I was connected to. I sympathize with its plight, trapped in a vicious cycle—not under its control—of unreliable service and fewer customers.

My service requirements are somewhat more demanding than most customers. I run servers that require "static IP addresses" in order to be reachable from the internet. Clar...uh, my unnamed provider...understood the need and was technically savvy enough to fulfill it. What's more, when there were problems, I could call and speak to a human who knew me and could, at least, provide useful information.

Some ordinary internet users can also use static IPs. I hear that video streaming services work better if you have one. But, for most, it's a foreign country nobody visits.

Few wired-service providers offer anything similar and if they do, it's at an exorbitant price. Satellite service, fuhgeddaboutit; they don't do it and, if they did it's either low quality or owned by megalomaniacs.

But, back to the story, and I promise to get to the the "hook" of this item, which is an unexpected internet service option.

I still have a wired landline. It has problems so often, I know all the key phrases needed to get my repair call through a chain of faceless agents who try to sell me something. One day, to get even, I responded, "Sure, but only if you can provide a static IP address," and the agent unexpectedly replied, "No, we can't do that...but let me connect you with the Business Services Department."

Let's skip almost two months of frustration, spending hours a day on the phone, Verizon's marketing and sales making wildly fanciful promises of what the company could do, technical people providing incorrect information, well-informed but expensive "VIP service specialists" who weren't allowed to provide the information I asked for, and documentation intended for idiots (e.g.,

"This is the power button. Press it to turn the power on."). I now have a static IP—one, rather than my previous sixteen—for a reasonable price and, by darn, it works.

Finally, here's the gem that *ordinary internet customers* can use, if you can convince Verizon to give it to you. It's called a "Home Internet Gateway." A grey box about 5x5x12. Plug it in, wait for it to start up, and *voila*, you have up-to-100Mbit service for about \$40/month. It just works and it even meets the current definition of "Broadband."

FWIW, this is cheaper than my previous service and much, much faster. Hard to believe, coming from a "big business."

There is almost no documentation but you don't need any. Just plug it in and it works. It's based on cellphone service (like a Mi-Fi, but better) so there's no landline, no TV cable, and no fibers. But there's one catch.

Verizon severely limits the number of customers it will sell the service to. I had one in my home for one day (to prove that there was, in fact, a good connection, before upgrading to a more specialized device). My nearest neighbor asked for one...and was told, "No, not available in your location." I told a slightly more distant neighbor...he got one and loves it. So, it's hit or miss, depending on whether Verizon thinks the cell tower servicing your location has enough capacity provide service—and they're very conservative.

Even with seemingly random availability, this is a viable option for the hordes of us underserved and unserved customers in Danby. Our local "big providers" aren't rushing to provide us with service, the County's targets keep getting further and further into the future, and don't even hope for a solution from the current Federal Government.

If you want to try one—you can have it for a few days with a full refund if you don't keep it—mosey on down to the Verizon store in NYS Rt.13 in Ithaca. Maybe you'll get lucky. I'm very interested in your experience if you follow through!

INVEST IN POSTAGE BEFORE 13-JULY

THE POST OFFICE—USPS—is raising postage rates on July 13. A first-class stamp will go up from 73¢ to 78¢, a 6.8 percent increase. Other rates will also increase for an overall hike of about 7.4 percent.

If you buy *Forever* stamps before July 13, they'll be worth 6.8 percent more, almost overnight. You can't easily sell a hoard of stamps, but if you plan to use them eventually (like, holiday season) they're a better investment than you can get from a bank, less risky than the stock market, and more predictable than gasoline.



This increase follows on the heels of two changes in 2024 (from 0.66 to 0.73), two more in 2023 (from 0.60 to 0.66). That's a 30-month simple-interest rate of 30 percent, or about 11 percent per year, compounded. A good investment! 🐼 (tc)

ART AND NATURE FOR KIDS

Danby program has room for more!

IN THIS FUN AND RELAXED outdoor program on a 42-acre homestead right here in Danby, children ages 5-13 are guided in inspiring explorations of nature and creative self-expression. They are encouraged to discover their own artistic interests, ideas, and styles in painting, drawing, and mixed media.

They are also free to use the time for other creative pursuits like journaling and the perennial favorite, building fairy houses in the woods. There are nature trails, sheltered outdoor spaces for art making, a play structure, chickens to feed and collect eggs from, and more.

Each one-week session runs Monday through Friday, 9am-Noon. The two August sessions also offer an option for extended hours until 3pm.

Tuition is \$215 per week, or \$385 with the extended hours option. Preregistration is required. Discounts are offered for multiple weeks or multiple children from one family. Scholarships are also available, based on need.

TURN OFF THE LIGHTS AND LET THE FIREFLIES FLICKER

What do pesticides and LED street lights have in common?

It appears that both of them, along with development and ordinary homeowner yard maintenance are contributing to the decline of several species of glow-bugs.

Years ago in June and July, Danby's fields were full of magical, moving and bobbing, blinking lights. Not so much any more.

Bright lights confuse fireflies, making them cease their normal behavior. They tolerate red light so, if you're finding your way thru fields to observe them, cover your flashlight with red cellophane.

As long as you can protect or restore their habitats, there's a good chance you can reverse firefly decline in your neighborhood. 🐼

SHOE DRIVE IN DANBY

A SHOE DRIVE to benefit the Twin Tiers Honor Flight is coming to Danby in August.

Raise money for a good cause? Nothing to buy or sell, just look in your closet for pairs of gently worn, used or new shoes. Maybe they don't fit or are out of style. Bring them to 338 Gunderman Road, in Danby. There is a container at the end of my driveway to deposit the shoes and it will be there the whole month of August 2025.

Ask your family, friends and neighbors if they have any shoes. We collect shoes, sneakers, crocs, flip flops, boots, dress shoes, and even bedroom slippers. They can be men's, women's or kid's sizes.

It's hard to believe that 600 million pairs of shoes will go into U.S. landfills every year. The majority of these can still be worn. The shoes we collect are picked up by our partner, Funds2orgs, which sends us a check based on the weight of the shoes. The shoes are then sent to third world countries where they help others start micro-enterprises to provide sustainable incomes.

All of the money raised is used for Veterans' "Honor Flight" trips. Over the past 6 years we have raised more than \$25,000 from shoe donations! Since 2014, more than 600 veterans have visited their memorials via funded 6 flights and 15 overnight bus trips.

Twin Tiers Honor Flight is a 501(c)(3) charity and is registered with the Charities Bureau of New York State and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
