HARVEST FESTIVAL - SAVE THE DATE(S)

PLAN TO JOIN the Danby Community in Dotson Park for its 10th not-quite-annual Harvest Festival. First there was COVID and then, last year, we were rained out. We're not going to let that happen this year. In case the gub-mint weather control fails, we have a rain date in the plan.

Save the date(s): **Saturday, October 11, 1-5pm** (if it rains on Saturday, then Sunday, October 12)(and if it rains on Sunday, too, we'll make an announcement about Monday, Columbus Day (a.k.a. Indigenous People's Day, Fraternal Day, Native American Day, Discoverer's Day, American Indian Heritage Day, Dia de la Raza, Commonwealth Cultural Day, and Yorktown Victory Day).

Of course, the weather this year will be crisp and colorful.

There's a lot to celebrate. Apples, pumpkins, autumn leaves. The beauty of Danby and its people. And, most especially, a bright future for the Park. The Harvest Festival is sponsored by the newly renamed Danby Community and Park.

There's lots of time-honored favorite activities and some new ones during this family event. The Harvest Festival's centerpiece is its pumpkin-throwing trebuchet (and its diminutive sidekick, the potato launcher). Bring a pumpkin (6-8" diameter, maximum) or bring your cull potatoes and other small vegetables (2" maximum) for launching.

We'll have carefully tended file for roasting hot dogs (meat and vegetarian), for marshmallows for s'mores, and for Danby-ite to sing around as the sun gets lower in the west.

There will be activities for children of all ages, including face painting and exploring the natural beauty of the Park.

Lloyd's Boys will bring banjo and fiddle tunes and some oldtime songs to the park. When they're not playing, you can ask about their instruments and the history of their music.

Dotson Park, at 1825 Danby Road, is the recreation centerpiece of Downtown Danby. It features a Natural Playground, a Pavilion sheltered by a hyperbolic paraboloid roof, a Disc Golf course, and miles of trails. You can find more information at [dotsonpark.org]. 

COOKING FOR ABUNDANCE

Our Area is fortunate to have several CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) farms that provide a wide range of fruits and vegetables. Even if you have a small garden, it can be worth "having a share" of a variety of less usual crops. Each week can be a new adventure with the potential of wonderful flavor combinations.

Last year, we discovered a salsa made with Tomatillos and Peaches. It is best eaten fresh but can also be canned for winter enjoyment.

TOMATILLO-PEACH SALSA

Ingredients

6-8 tomatillos, husked

large peach (not too ripe, so it can be chopped)

½ onion, thinly sliced, red onion adds color

2 jalapeños or other hot peppers2 Tbsp cilantro leaves, chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced

2 Tbsp lime juice,

1 Tbsp olive oil

½ tsp salt

Method

Chop tomatillo and peach. Cut onion. Mince peppers, cilantro, garlic. Combine all ingredients.

Refrigerate.

Optional

Quantities of peppers, salt, cilantro, garlic, lime juice: adjust to taste. (pg)

If you look for recipes online, most will instruct you to roast or broil the ingredients before chopping everything together. This will make a delicious but somewhat mild salsa. If you like more of the crunch and tang of raw tomatillos, try chopeverything ping fresh. It's less juicy that way, as well.

If you like a smoother salsa, try blending 1/3 to 1/2 of the mixture. A touch of salt and splashes of lime

juice help the peaches keep their color and give the salsa a satisfying zing. Simple, elegant, and delicious. (pg)

Noise Law Looms Large

Bottom line: the Town has published a draft Noise Law and it's important that Danby residents review it and comment in writing or verbally.

A N ITEM ON THE AGENDA for the 18-August meeting read, Propose Enacting Guy Krogh Draft of a Noise Law? Anticipating the discussion, I asked two questions during the Privilege Of The Floor opportunity to speak at the beginning of the meeting. (1) Why was the Noise Law process dropped for two years and (2) Why is it coming up again, now?

The Town Board's 25-minute discussion began with a brief summary of the origin of this version of a Noise Law. After opening the subject with, *On to an easy topic now*, the Supervisor explained why the process had been dropped and summarized the origin of this draft.

The reason this got dropped, it's hard to believe it's already been 2 years. Warren Cross was charged with coming up with something. We had gotten to the point where it was sim...we thought it was as simple as possible and asked Guy [the Town's Attorney] to draft something, and which is what this is. It didn't look anything like what we thought it was going to when we gave him the simple thing we wanted it to be. So the group kind of recoiled.

The Supervisor addressed the second question with, Why now? Well, a couple of reasons. One, there are at least two board members here whose turn done in December who thought that it might be nice in the course of their four years on the board that they actually dealt with this issue because they thought it was important.

Another member chimed in, Yes, we have heard over the over these years, 'Why aren't you doing this?' and we also have heard from people, 'Don't ever do it.'

A third added, *There have been noise issues raised since that time, especially more recently.*

Two items were not mentioned in these answers. Two years ago, the Noise Law was an issue during one of Danby's rare contested elections. During the intervening two years, when the Noise Law was touched on during a meeting, one Town Board member would advocate against public involvement in the process, referring to the emotionally charged public response to the issue.

I told a joke on Zoom the other day. Nobody laughed. I'm not even remotely funny. Based on a cursory reading of the proposed law (added to the agenda shortly before the meeting), I also offered two P-O-F criticisms of the proposed law. (1) The physical standard for acceptable noise—90dB—is too high; it is a level far beyond disturbing the peace, it can cause hearing loss and (2) A property owner is liable for penalties, even they are not the person making the noise.

The Supervisor acknowledged both concerns. Most of ten minutes of talk centered around his experience as a landlord. It's a concern of those of us who are landlords. Um, that we, as a landlord, are responsible for our tenants' behavior when we don't have a whole hell of a lot of control over it.

Open For Public Comment

Danby's residents could be forgiven for not knowing about it, but Town Board members also seemed unsure, saying, variously,

- This has been out for two years for public discussion. If anybody has read it at all over the two years, and before, there's been no change.
- Did we did we get much feedback on it? I don't remember. I don't think we formally proposed it.
- There was a public hearing on it. Wasn't there? That was a humongous number of people here yelling and screaming.
- Well, we had we had public comments, but it was not on this draft.
- The previous drafts were never formally proposed but we did solicit public comment, and boy, did we get it.
- Does that stop anybody who's known about the Noise Law from looking it up and commenting about it, with all the comments?
- Good luck trying to find it. Until today, I couldn't find it.

Well, gentle readers, the ball is in your court.

The proposed law is not too lengthy but, like other documents prepared by the Town's Attorney, it may include language drawn other municipality's laws...whose relevance to Danby isn't always clear.

As one Town Board member said, So the first thing that comes to my mind is that I noticed that, uh, mining activity is exempted from the noise law, and I feel like, if we're going to exempt mining, but not music, that's insane to me.

After all, the current incarnation of the "Noise Fuss" is all about complaints regarding loud music events.

There's a giant blob of incredibly hot rock beneath New Hampshire. The Northern Appalachian Anomaly, or NAA, sits about 124 miles below the state. It is on course for New York and will arrive in about 15 million years.

We'll leave the light on. Seriously, you can't make this stuff up!

TDECIDED to take some past information from September 30, 2010 and September 27, 2012 to share in this Reminisce #37 column.

From 2010:

In late summer, we attended the West Danby Picnic to honor Roy Casterline and Carol Sczepanski for the many years of service they have given to their communities. Roy, along with wife Mary, ran the West Danby Water District for 40 years; Carol Sczepanski served as Danby's Town Clerk for 20 years. ELECTED BUILDING INSPECTORS?

Danby's Town Board is responding, in its own way, to complaints about derelict buildings and trash in front yards.

During an August meeting, a report from Danby's professional Code Officer was discussed. As a first step toward enforcement, the C.O. had been asked to investigate several houses badly in need of repair. Notably, the house next to Town Hall, easily seen by drivers on NYS Rt.96B.

The document being discussed was not available to the public, as might be suggested by NYS Open Meetings Law.

The discussion indicated that the document contained more than just the C.O.'s report. It sounded as though the document also included candidates for Town action, personally scouted out by one or more Town Board members.

These elected officials—not trained professionals—began by verbalizing locations like, "The house on Bald Hill

Road with plastic over the windows." Eventually, at least one owner was named *during a public meeting*.

The recording of the discussion is available online.

There's nothing wrong with anyone observing the state of local structures from the road. Similarly, complaints about immediate neighbors are accepted by the Code Officer.

On the other hand, it might be impolite for anyone to air comments *on the public record* about homes observed during random drive-bys.

In this day and age, it seems intrusive for elected officials to take it on themselves to initiate enforcement actions. It was uncomfortable to hear this discussion, a bit too much like a local version of Washington, DC.

In defense of what might seem to be an unfortunate crossing of a line, one Town Board member did suggest that certain residents could benefit from housing rehabilitation grants available thru the Town. That said, it was not at all clear that that was the incentive for the impromptu inspection tour.
