

HARVEST FESTIVAL: 11th-ON-THE-11th

Join the Danby Community in Dotson Park for the 11th sort-of-*Annual Harvest Festival* on Saturday, October 11, 1-5pm. Last year's festival fell victim to unseasonably bad weather. This year, the event host, *Danby Community and Park*, has learned its lesson: Have A Rain Date. If Saturday's weather is tougher than life in Danby, it'll happen on Sunday, October 12.

There's a lot to celebrate. Apples, pumpkins, autumn leaves. Danby's beauty and Danby's amazing people. Most especially,



a bright future for the Park. This will be the first Harvest Festival hosted by the newly merged Danby Community and Park. All the DCAP directors will be there, so find us and let's talk about what's happening for Dotson Park and community programming.

It's a family event with lots of family-favorite activities. In the center ring (safely behind a storm fence) we have two mat-

ter-transporters: a pumpkin-tossing trebuchet and its diminutive sidekick, a potato launcher. Bring a pumpkin (6-8" diameter, maximum) or bring your cull potatoes and other small vegetables (2" maximum).

There will be activities for children of all ages including face

painting. Meet the *live Raptors*. Explore Dotson Park's natural beauty on foot or in the Hay Wagon. Visit the small bonfire to roast hot dogs, not dogs, and marshmallows for S'mores, and stay to sing around it. Other treats like apples, pretzels, and fresh cider will be served up.

New this year: a selfie stand for take-home pictures. You, your family and friends, hay bales, and...pumpkins.

COOKING FOR ABUNDANCE

ORN BREAD CAN BE CONTROVERSIAL TERRITORY and I'm going to step right into it. I have no desire to add to cultural divisions—even culinary ones—but we

can't ignore the strength of regional opinions about this uniquely satisfying and oh-so-American side dish.

Cool weather and an abundant harvest turns kitchen staff toward soups, stews, and chili. Corn bread is a natural companion and a wonderful balance to savory one-bowl meals. It cooks up quickly, even faster than a soup or stew. Between the bread bowl and the soup pot, there's often enough left overs for future quick meals..

The pairing just might be perfect Autumnal comfort food.

So, what's the controversy? How does the content of an 8" square baking pan raise memories and provoke division? In short, sugar versus no sugar. Moist and cake-like, or drier and more crumbly. Far be it for me to tell right from wrong. As the saying goes, "You Do You."

Some years ago, a friend was visiting. I'd made a butternut squash soup and cornbread for dinner. He gave the corn-

bread a bit of side-eye but, being *raised right*, he took a chunk and bit into it. His eyes went wide with surprise. "Oh! This is real cornbread," by which he meant, no sugar.

His father was from North Carolina. My grandmother was from Tennessee and I learned cornbread from her. Even though both of us were born Northern Yankees, the cornbread was the taste of ancestral homes and memories.

It also went well with the soup.

Among the many cornbread recipes—three in the Original Moosewood Cookbooks alone—my personal favorite comes from the old Fannie Farmer cookbook. As Fannie says, this is sturdy, solid, and slightly dry—a direct legacy from our American past.

I admit that Fannie's standard is only a jumping-off point for me. I almost always add frozen kernel corn (Ted says, "Never enough."). A bit of black pepper never hurts. If the mood strikes, I add chopped sweet and/or spicy pepper, diced onions, or grated cheese. The mix-ins don't need measuring, just add to sight and taste.

The wonderful thing about something basic and simple, like cornbread is that it's adaptable to creative instinct. However you make it, enjoy the abundance of the Harvest.

SOUTHERN CORN BREAD

Ingredients

34 cup yellow corn meal

1 cup flour

3 tsp baking powder

½ tsp salt

1 cup milk

egg, well beaten

2 Tbsp cooking oil or melted bacon fat

Method

Preheat oven to 425.

Grease an 8x8 baking pan.

Mix dry ingredients in large bowl.

Beat wet ingredients well in separate bowl.

Add the wet ingredients to the dry and mix well.

Pour into baking pan. Bake for about 20 minutes, until a toothpick prick comes out dry.

INTERNET GAME CHANGES...AGAIN

Over the last decade or so, the promises and reality of Internet service in Danby have felt like a a game of CalvinBall (google it!). Just when you start believing in a solution, the rules change.

Well, according to the latest information, it's a new ballgame, again. The NYS ConnectAll Office announced that all existing plans are changing. The Town of Danby had signed into a County grant application (to get fiber buildout to unserved residences) and, now, that won't happen.

Instead, NYS State has embarked on a plan to implement fixed wireless access. It's pinning hopes on a company called *Community Broadband Networks*, whose local

branch in Geneva [cbn-america.com/cbn-flx] offers 100Mbps plans for about \$40/month. Its coverage, however, is about one lake away from Danby, so don't hold your breath for a quick solution.

"Fixed wireless" is similar to the service that Clarity Connect offered 10 years ago, but the technology has changed. CBN uses Tarana's advanced radio nodes [taranawireless.com]. Signals from multiple antennas are combined to re-

duce interference from weather and obstructions like Danby's trees, and from other wireless signal sources.

Much of the funding for this project might come from the Federal Government. If the Feds fund the request and actually provide money...the clock starts ticking on yet another up-to-4-years-in-the-future project.

TOWN AUDITED AGAIN

Imagine MY Surprise when I received a telephone call from a knowledgeable and usually well-informed Danby source, asking me whether I'd seen the online [fingerlakes1.com] article entitled, Major Tax Collection Failures Prompt Audit In Danby.

Huh? What? Another audit of the Town Clerk's office?

Well, yes, but not even close to what the headline described. As reported in the *Danby News*, back in 2022, the NYS Office of the Comptroller had audited the Danby Clerk's office and issued a report citing several failures. Some loss of tax payments had occurred.

Yes, mistakes happen, even to the best of us. The bigger concern was that the Town did not inform its voters and taxpayers of the audit or the subsequent report, and little or no discussion took place during Town Board meetings ...until the *Danby News* covered the story. Cause and effect are not clear; the timing might have been a coincidence.

Back to 2025 and that *fingerlakes 1* article. The title is egregiously misleading. In 2022, it was a routine audit, if more thorough than previous ones, that uncovered problems, not an audit prompted by known failures.

The article contained several other instances of incorrect reporting. The Justice Court was not involved, as stated in the article's opening sentences. Although the article mentions 2022, it's not clear why it was published in 2025. The article named and quoted a former clerk but described her as the current clerk.

fingerlakes1 ended with, "The town said it plans to implement corrective actions." Considering that the audit was

three years old, what has happened since then? As it turns out, not nothing, but the article didn't report the new news. Neither, it seems, did the Town (although it may, since it knows I'm writing this item).

The NYS Comptroller did a followup audit in May, 2025, and a report was issued in August 2025. The Town would, of course, have been aware of the audit and was made aware of the report's content before its August 29, 2025 publication date.

In short, the 2025 audit examined the Town's followup, corrective actions taken to respond to ten recommendations in the 2022 audit. The Town implemented four, took partial action on one, and did not follow up on the remaining five.

Now, it's important to understand that Comptroller's Audits do not require any action by the Town. Auditors are not law enforcement, they merely make recommendations. A town, any town, can choose to ignore the recommendations. A generous reading of the 2025 audit gives the impression that the Town's efforts made some positive impression on the auditors. Yet, even if they are not the most important ones, one can't help but to wonder about the inaction on the unaddressed recommendations.

Read the reports for yourself. Google "NYS comptroller audit" and you'll see "2022M-8-F" and "2022M-08" in the top hits.

Meanwhile, if you see further audits—or, perhaps, anything—mentioned by *fingerlakes1*, be sure to fact-check the article before getting worried.

Harvest Festival, con't from front page

A trebuchet is a dinosaur from human history, designed to hurl large, heavy objects a long distance. Lacking pianos and compact cars, we use pumpkins. Trebuchets use gravity. A bucket full of rocks goes down and a throwing arm goes up. A second arm or a sling, attached to the arm, multiplies the throwing power, very much like your forearm and hand multiply the strength of your upper-arm muscles.

Our potato launcher uses compressed air as a spring. Unlike the trebuchet, which lifts big things into slow, magnificent arcs, the launcher propels small objects very far and very fast. They literally vanish from sight!

Useful information, served up in the form of fun, will be available from the Danby Fire Department and the Tompkins County Health Department. Can you tell the difference between a poppy seed and a tick?

The fabulous sounds of music by Lloyd's Boys (2-4pm) will draw you in like a moth to a porch light. We'll have a sing-around and music swap around the campfire. Bring your voices and instruments, and gather together to bring harmony to this community gathering in the Park.

DCAP is grateful for pumpkins donated by Candor farmer, Bill Huizinga. You can find his farm stand on Route 96B, south of Willseyville.



PRESERVING OLD BARNS

Seeing this favorite old barn on Facebook, one contributor reflected that Danby is losing all of its wonderful old barns. Another responded that New York State actually has a program intended to help with the

rehabilitation of agricultural treasures.

Only a decade ago, a Danby sage opined that Danby's most important agricultural product was...building lots. There is only one large working farm in Danby but there are several "small agriculture" sites. Still, many of Danby's old barns are in dilapidated and fading. It costs a lot of money to stabilize and preserve old barns.

A NY State tax incentive for qualified rehabilitation work may help.

The Historic Barn Rehabilitation Tax Credit program offers a state tax credit equal to 25 percent of qualified expenses. Work may be interior-only, exterior-only, or both. Generally, in-kind repairs and some amount of retrofitting and replacement materials are allowed.

But—this is important—work that changes the historic appearance of the barn or work that transforms the barn into a residence does not qualify. The intent is to keep these barns as agricultural or scenic structures.

What qualifies you for this tax credit? The property owner must be a New York State taxpayer. The barn must have been constructed prior to 1946, and must have been originally used for agricultural or related purposes. Again, the barn may not have been used as a human residence in the year prior to the credit application.

Who defines "historic"? The age of the structure is the main thing. The barn does not have to be listed on a register of historic places and it may still qualify if it has been moved from its original location. If you do not know if your barn is old enough, the Division for Historic Preservation staff can help you with the research.

Qualified Rehabilitation Expenditures (QREs) must amount to \$5,000 or more and the credit may be applied to work that has already been completed. There is no cap on the amount of credit allowed as part of this program.


From 2005

Ofton events in October, 2005: A pumpkin carving party was held on October 27 at Common Ground on Danby Road and a Halloween gathering was scheduled for October 29 in the Danby Fire Station, which was free and open to all.

An election night supper included pork roast and all the fixings. Cost was only \$7! Money raised was used to keep the church driveway cleared through the win-

ter. Of course, volunteers have always been always welcome to offer their services for this job.

The 2005 Danby Fall Festival at the church was a big success according to co-chair, Susan Hautala. Sue reported that the crowd was steady and the Chicken BBQ sold out in the first hour. The Church's Women's Society sponsored the event and used the money raised to support various service organizations and church needs.



I read up a bit on the origins of the Danby Church. Early on, church meetings were held in the various members' homes, in the school house, or in a barn built in 1812. Work on the church lasted from 1817-1820. Since there was no way of heating the structure on cold winter days, each family brought their own foot stove. By 1835, the congregation had grown to 100 members. The stately old New England style church was selected in 1981 to be photographed for the Department of the Interior in Washington, D.C. Plans were already in the works for 2007 to celebrate the church's 200th anniversary.

I dedicated this 2005 column to the memory of Toni McBride, who passed in 2004. Toni was a good friend to the entire Danby community, all the time she and Judy Vandermark ran the Danby Market. She had a strong spirit, good heart and a cheerful presence.


In The Eye Of The Beholder Is It Trash Or treasure?

THE AUGUST ISSUE of the Danby News described action taken by Danby's Town Board in response to a complaint—and a possible law suit against the Town—about a garbage-filled yard.

That complaint seemed to prompt a tangential subject, examination of possible action to demolish derelict structures around town. In September, the *Danby News* noted that individual Town Board members had gone beyond

responding to resident complaints;

they were driving around town looking for possible additional violations.



The garbage issue (also known as "property maintenance") was not in-

cluded in the agenda available to the public in advance of the meeting, yet the Town Board returned to the original complaint during its September 22 meeting.

After what must be a decade and more than one Code Officer, little or no progress or action seems to have happened. With little else on the agenda, a marathon, almost hour-long discussion took place to determine what action could be taken. As the discussion seemed to make clear, the threat of a law suit prompted the Board to override the Code Officer's written determination that no action was called for. It directed the C.O. to prepare paperwork (a citation?) immediately. The Board was careful not to mention the name of the complainant; an address on Nelson Road was mentioned.

An address on West Miller Road was also mentioned in the context of future action.

During the lengthy discussion, Board members repeatedly interpreted the text of *Town Law #1 of 1987, Property Maintenance*. This lesson in small-town government can be found online at [youtu.be/aGl0P0LvnJQ&t=2390s]. It was not clear from the discussion whether the Town Attorney was consulted.

Whoever put the S in "fastfood" is a marketing genius.

These text messages request accurate payment information, supposedly so tax and revenue agencies can deposit money into taxpayer's bank accounts.

- block the sender,
- delete the message, and
