▲ can citizenship. Voting in elections of all kinds—local, state, and federal—is both a right and a duty. We all appreciate how important and exciting the "big" elections can be but many seem to take local elections for granted. Don't.

Sometimes, local officials are unopposed at the ballot box. It's happening this year in Danby. No matter. It's still important to go to the polling place to participate. It's the kind of habit that *should* be addictive.

Don't feel left out! Even when your favorite candidates aren't on the ballot, you can make a statement by marking the ballot for those candidates you think will do a good job...and leaving other boxes blank.

#### The Mechanics of Elections

Some countries will penalize you if you don't vote. Some states hit the news media by throwing up roadblocks to voting. New York State tries to make it convenient and easy to vote...while still keeping safeguards in place that protect election integrity.

**Different Ways To Vote**—there are so many options. There's Early Voting In Person, Early Voting By Mail, Election Day Voting In Person, and the traditional Absentee Ballot. These days, for mail-in voting, the Early-By-Mail option makes more sense for most voters. In a few cases—for example, permanent disability or voting from abroad—an Absentee Ballot is useful.

## **COOKING FOR ABUNDANCE**

Home cooking makes the best of local produce from your garden, a neighbor's surplus, or a CSA. Considering cost, nutrition, and lack of chemicals, it's a much better deal than processed foods.

Home cooking doesn't have to be hard. It can be easy, fun, and flexible to your family's needs and tastes. Personally, I find chopping fruits and vegetables relaxing and satisfying. Home cooking is almost a form of

## TOMATO SQUASH SOUP

#### Ingredients

1 Tbsp oil (olive or vegetable) 2 Tbsp minced onion

2 cup squash/pumpkin puree (canned or fresh)

minced fresh rosemary (or ½ tsp 1 tsp dried)

4 cup tomato juice ground ginger ½ tsp

**Optional** 

1 Tbsp toasted pumpkin seeds, lightly chopped

#### Method

Cook minced onion in oil using a 2 quart saucepan until onion is translucent.

Add remaining ingredients, cook over low heat for 15 minutes.

Puree in blender (or a stick blender in pot) Return to heat; add a bit more tomato juice if it seems too thick.

Reheat without boiling.

#### Serving

Serve w/ cornbread, cornmeal biscuits, or toasted bread w/ herbed butter. (pg) meditation. At the end, you have a delicious meal with the satisfaction of having made it yourself.


This month, I'm sharing a delicious, savory soup that makes a perfect start for a Thanksgiving dinner. It comes from the Sage Cottage Herb Garden Cookbook, a limited edition resource from Trumansburg author Dorry Norris. Back in the '90s, Dorry ran the Sage Cottage B&B and Herb Garden. Recipes like this tomato-pumpkin soup developed from a decade of classes offered by the B&B.

Norris calls this, Pumpkin Soup, but the primary flavors are tomato, rosemary, and ginger. It calls for pumpkin puree, but I usually substitute a winter squash from our pantry: butternut, hubbard, even acorn. The hearty flavor of this vegan recipe will satisfy everyone at the table. **№** (pg)

## SOCIAL SECURITY COLA COMING MEDICARE ADVANTAGE PLANS CHANGE

#### **Good News**

75 MILLION AMERICANS—and as many as 820 Danby residents—will receive a 2.8 percent increase in their Social Security benefits and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments in 2026.

This automatic cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will take effect on January 1, 2026. Official notices of this change will be sent to payees, starting in December.

On the other end of Social Security's cash flow, the amount of earnings subject to Social Security tax will increase from \$176,100 to \$184,500. As my mother used to say, "You should be happy to pay tax, it means you're earning money."

#### Not Always Good News

As many, many Medicare recipients in Tompkins County have learned, Excellus Medicare has terminated at least one of its Medicare Advantage plans in Tompkins County. Most customers received a *your plan is being discontinued* notice in September.

Some Danby residents may not have received this notice. Due to coding errors, Danby-ites in the 14883 ZIPcode

may have been mistakenly registered as Tioga County residents in Spencer. The plan(s) is *not* being discontinued in Tioga County, so renewal materials were distributed instead of the termination notice. Look at your *2026 Medicare Advantage Enrollment Kit*. If Tioga County shows through the window in the cover page, contact Excellus immediately!

Meanwhile, Excellus has not (yet) provided much, if any, information about replacement plans to its soon-to-beterminated customers. Plans do exist, both from Excellus and other providers. You can find them online (if you have Internet), you can call Excellus, or you can get advice from Tompkins County's Office for the Aging, 607.273.5482.

If you have a Medicare Advantage plan, whatever its source, the word on the street is that it will cost a lot more than in 2025.

#### The Bottom Line

Only a minority of benefit recipients feel that a 2.8 percent increase is enough to keep up with rising expenses. This sentiment is consistent across political party affiliations, so it must be true. The increase in Medicare premiums, alone, may consume the entire COLA. Those surveyed felt that an 8 percent increase might be more realistic.

## IMPROVING TCAT BUS SERVICE FOR 9-TO-5-ERS

TRECENTLY GOT A JOB AT CORNELL, and was excited about the prospect of being able to take the bus to work. Unfortunately, the current Route 65 bus schedule doesn't accommodate my work schedule. The only inbound bus from Danby arrives at Cornell at 7:33, well before my 9am shift begins, and the last outbound bus leaves Cornell at 4:38, nearly an hour before my shift ends.

I reached out to TCAT and proposed adjusting the Route 65 schedule to better accommodate 9-to-5 commuters. The scheduling manager indicated that he might be willing to make changes if there is enough interest. My proposed changes (indicated in bold below) are minor. They would simply require extending the existing Route 65 short trips in the morning and afternoon so they

lots of hours. They're conveniently located and have plenty of parking. On Election Day, most of Danby votes at the DVFC Fire Station, 1780 Danby Road. West Danby residents (and Newfield residents!) can visit the West Danby Fire Station, 47 Sylvan Lane.

During Early Voting, the polling places are the Ithaca Town Hall (the old Post Office) downtown and the Crash Fire Rescue building near the airport.

**Election Security**—New York's elections are secured through a combination of robust physical and digital protections. This safeguards voting machines, voter databases, and other critical systems. NYS collaborates with federal agencies and other partners to stay updated on emerging threats and best practices.

Many of these safeguards are hidden from the public. Others are right out front for the public to see. Although your interaction with Election Inspectors at polling places may seem casual, the workers are following detailed procedures that result in a careful record of activities. The only thing that isn't recorded...is the association between your identity and your actual voting choices.

Election Workers—No, they're not volunteers. They don't get paid much, so their motivation comes from a strong desire to see our democratic processes continue to work smoothly. By law, every election activity—all year 'round—must include at least one participant from both major parties. Workers represent a party but the work is inherently non-partisan; workers cooperate once they come thru the door.

The participation of local residents as election officials is one of the safeguards of the system. In a nutshell, the local folks know who you are. After a few years at the same location, even the less-local officials recognize frequent voters (another reason to vote in every election).

The Election Day voting ritual is a test of stamina for workers. The day begins at 5am, when the room and equipment is set up, and closing activities often extend to 10pm. Please treat them kindly!

So, go out and vote. The more voters, the merrier. As our Poll Site Managers say, "Thanks for voting! Come back again...just not today." (pg & tc)

Pamela was an Election Inspector for almost a decade before she was elected as Danby's Town Clerk. Ted has been an EI, a Poll Site Manager, and a Machine Technician for almost 25 years and interfaces, on a daily basis, with voter data and the Board of Elections.

## TOWN BUYING PROPERTY

Toward the end of its Monday, 20-October meeting, Danby's Town Board went into Executive Session to discuss, "the property negotiation," privately.

Spoiler alert: the Town Board agreed to spend as much as an additional \$50,000 of taxpayer's money.

NYS Law allows a discussion out of the public eye—*Executive Session*—under certain circumstances. "The proposed acquisition, sale or lease of real property," is one of these circumstances.

A motion to enter ES must be proposed and voted on in public. Similarly, after the private ES, the motion to end the ES must be handled in public. Generally, actions (that is, votes) cannot occur during an ES,

The NY Coalition for Open Government notes that wording like, "I move to go into executive session to discuss litigation," is, "not specific enough under the law...." In this case, the specific real property must be described.

Town Board members—both as individuals and collectively—have decades of experience with this procedure. Nevertheless, on 20-October, the public (well, me) had to repeatedly remind them of necessary procedure.

What's more, according to NYSCOG, an ES, "should not be scheduled in advance; there should not be an agenda item that states, 'Executive Session." The meeting agenda contained such an item.

After returning to the public eye, the Town Board agreed to buy the property, "...at its assessed value," but that value was not announced and the meeting was promptly adjourned. The public (me) then inquired about the expense. One Board member offered, "\$50,000," and another another said, "The assessed value is \$26,000."

Why the difference? Did the Board know how much it was spending? Or, is it possible that the total cost of the project is almost double the purchase price? (tc)
