BE PREPARED—ISN'T ONLY FOR SCOUTS

DANBY RESIDENTS HAVE LEARNED to be ready for the power failures that seem to occur every few weeks. We've even learned to come together as a community to respond to the occasional flood and tornado. But what happens when an emergency requires, say, a mass evacuation?



New York State's Citizen Preparedness Corps (CPC) has been teaching people how to prepare for disaster or emergency situations since February 2014. It offers 90-minute courses that describe the types of risks and hazards people face. It teaches how to develop individual and household plans. The training encourages us to think about and save needed emergency supplies.

Learning in advance how to help yourself and others will help you react faster when facing a crisis.

On **Tuesday, March 24, 6pm**, the CPC will offer a "big event" training in the Fellowship Hall of Danby's Community Church. The New York National Guard teaches the classes and—hold on to your seat—at the end of the class you'll leave with a *Go Bag*—a knapsack, usually—filled with useful emergency supplies!

These amazing events are very well organized and presented. There's no downside to attending and a huge upside. You'll get good information, no matter what...but there is a one catch: **you must register in advance to receive a bag.**

BURN BAN IN EFFECT

THE ANNUAL STATEWIDE BAN prohibiting residential brush burning runs from March 16 through May 14. The NYS DEC enforces the ban to prevent wildfires and reduce air pollution.

The risk of wildfires is greatest during the Spring, and this winter was warmer and drier than most. Think about safety first, before starting a potentially dangerous fire.

Open burning of debris is the single-largest cause of spring wildfires in New York State. Local fire departments, many of which are staffed by volunteers, all too often have to leave their jobs and families to respond to wildfires caused by illegal debris fires.

DEDICATED TO DANBY: SHAWLEYS

TED AND I ARE IN THE UNIQUE POSITION of knowing how the Town of Danby operates, both from the inside (as Town Clerk) and the outside (as a frequent, but officially distanced participant). We've come to know the Shawleys as two of the most dedicated and longest serving Town workers. Even though they live outside the Town of Danby, they have put in long hours trying to make the Town's government—and its highways—roll along smoothly.

Candor residents Laura and Jack Shawley have been essential to Danby's operation for close to twenty years. Much of it has been, more or less, behind the scenes.

Laura Shawley arrived in November 2007 as a part-time bookkeeper. She brought extensive experience in the specialized financial software used by municipalities. It wasn't long before part-time became full time, as she became the official assistant to both the Supervisor and the Highway Superintendent. She managed records and finances for *Highway* (as the insiders call it) and represented Danby on the County's Health Care Consortium. Whether it was following best bidding practices on highway supplies to finding ways to save the Town money on employee healthcare, Laura has kept Danby finances in the forefront of her mind.

It's always been a joy to watch Laura's annual tutorial, as she re-introduces the Town Board to the rules of how its budget, the tax base, the tax rate, and the tax levy interact. She's also mastered the complexity of rules that govern NY State's "tax cap".

In November 2013, the timing was right for Jack Shawley to be brought onboard as Deputy Highway Superintendent. The Superintendent, Carl Seamon, needed help to strengthen and improve operations at the Highway Department, including facility improvements and guiding the staff to work together as a team. Jack's thirty years of management experience with H&E Stork fit right in with Danby's needs.

Lucky for Danby, and lucky for them, Laura and Jack have now had 13 years of working together. "People ask us, what it's like to work together like this," Laura says. "We love it!"

Over the years, the Shawleys have worked with various Highway Superintendents, Town Clerks, Town Supervisors, and members of the Town Board. They've navigated the personnel changes and governing styles with quiet diplomacy. No matter the shifts in what was asked or needed, Laura and Jack have always served with the intent

of caring for the good of Danby residents. They are the essence of non-partisan, working for the Town rather than any particular person.

Changes are coming. Jack is looking to retire next year. He's *of an age* and has been working for close to fifty years. He has worked well with Keith Shipman, the current Highway Superintendent, for several years and there is now less of a need for a full-time Deputy. Highway's staff is as good as it's ever been. Systems are solidly in place for road assessment and improvement. Jack can step back.

Laura is also pulling back. She is retiring from her position as Bookkeeper. After the Supervisor noted that it's an "at-will" position and named a replacement, the Town Board suggested that the position be advertised to the public. Laura will continue as Assistant to the Highway Superintendent, managing the many materials contracts and the financial aspects of Danby's road maintenance. When a new Bookkeeper is chosen, Laura will help with explaining the complex requirements—imposed by NY State—that assure that public funds are spent in appropriate ways.

Although increasing personnel costs are apparent at tax time, many of Danby's residents are unaware of the roles played by the Town's employees, including the fact that several of them wear multiple hats. Dedicated and effective employees like the Shawleys are well worth their salaries! 🍷 (pg)

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CABBAGE AND POTATOES

RIGHT NOW, BIG, FLUFFY, WET SNOW is falling outside and March promises to start off with wintery chill. These are the days once called the, “terror time.” A time when nothing edible is growing in the ground and when winter stores—both firewood and food—are getting low. Before the era of global trade, this was the season when fresh fruits and vegetables were a past memory and a dream for the future.

There’s a reason why many northern European cultures have versions of cabbage and potato *peasant food*. Long into the winter, these ingredients can remain edible in cold basements and root cellars. You will find cabbage-potato borscht and cabbage-filled *Solyanka* from Russia, through Ukraine, and into Germany. *Solyanka*, traditionally, can be either a soup or a hearty casserole with cottage cheese. Either way, it is enriched with sour cream. A very yummy recipe for *Solyanka Casserole* is included in Molly Katzen’s original *Moosewood Cookbook*.

In Ireland, the most famous cabbage and potato recipe is *Colcannon*. As with most peasant foods, it couldn’t be simpler. Mix hot mashed potatoes, cooked green cabbage, and butter and milk.

There’s even a popular Irish song about this food:

*Did you ever eat Colcannon, made from lovely pickled cream?
With the greens and scallions mingled like a picture in a dream.
Did you ever make a hole on top to hold the melting flake
Of the creamy, flavoured butter that your mother used to make?
Yes you did, so you did, so did he and so did I.
And the more I think about it, sure the nearer I’m to cry.
Oh, wasn’t it the happy days when troubles we had not,
And our mothers made Colcannon in the little skillet pot.*

These are the comfort foods of winter. They helped our ancestors survive the lean months, ward off starvation, and even bring a little joy. Tradition says that *Solyanka* was one of the first dishes a new bride would serve after the wedding. Today, *Colcannon* is still a common addition to many St. Patrick’s day celebrations. 🐾 (pg)

WHY IS THE DANBY NEWS LIKE PUBLIC RADIO?

- ① Both the DN and Public Radio present information that supplements and, sometimes, clarifies official, sanitized verbiage in expensive, taxpayer-funded publications. By law, government publications *must* present the government in a positive light.
- ② The choice to defund both the DN and Public Radio was not budget-related. Sometimes, public officials feel threatened by distribution of a different perspective. Danby now budgets about twice as much for its house organ than it formerly paid for the DN. Danby’s powers have said, on the record, that they expected the DN to shut down.
- ③ Both the DN and Public Radio depend on the public to keep an independent voice alive.

SKATING ON THIN ICE

Skate Park Plans Collapse

DANBY'S TOWN BOARD, in its February, 2026 publication, reported that its, "...initial idea of a covered skate park using a former equipment shed as the enclosure has proven to be unreasonably expensive to implement." Residents who have not followed the saga might be puzzled.

Early in 2025, an outside group of skate enthusiasts approached several Towns, requesting that each of them build a skate park. One of the selling points was a local option would be more useful to local youth than the very fine facility in downtown Ithaca. However, one of the requirements was that it had to be built on municipal property; any other location would require a prohibitively expensive liability insurance policy.

An interested citizen, Zachary Larkins, identified a possible location: an old Highway Department storage building on Town property on Bald Hill Road. The decaying structure had been slated for future demolition. During Town Board meetings, Larkins predicted that repair would be easy; he would do the work himself, including the creation of wooden ramps and other skate equipment (rather than the solid equipment used downtown. He estimated the cost of materials—all to be donated—at about \$5-6,000.

The outside group hasn't been heard from during Board meetings since then.

One resident inquired, during a meeting, whether the Town's Code Officer had been asked to evaluate the structural integrity of the building. It's not clear whether that ever happened. Board discussion also revealed that, if Larkins ran for office, as a Councilperson he would no longer be able to solicit donations.

The matter progressed and turned out to be not so simple. A structural engineer was eventually hired to evaluate the building and make recommendations. The cost for this consultant hasn't been revealed, but it's likely to have been, in the range of \$5,000. Reading between the lines of the Town Board's report, the professional engineer probably determined that the cost to repair the structure was exorbitant; it would be easier to tear it down.

Building a new facility to municipal specifications —no shortcuts and paying prevailing wage for laborers —is not going to be cheap.

If you didn't understand the electron joke, google, "heisenberg uncertainty principle".

One can speculate that—it's only common sense—the Town's insurance underwriter might notice the additional liability exposure and raise the Town's insurance cost. And that there would be ongoing maintenance and supervision costs.

It's not a question of whether a skate park is a good idea. It is, however, the sort of thing that requires a careful plan in the first place. It also requires a careful analysis of whether its cost is justified in terms of the Town's central mission and the additional burden on taxpayers, versus the number of people who would benefit. And the understanding that, for many Town residents, the distance is not much less than the distance to the downtown skate park.

Wastewater System(s) For Danby's Hamlets

The Town Board also announced the creation of a Wastewater Committee to study a consultant's report and make recommendations. The Committee could include participation and voting by residents who attended.

The Committee had its first meeting in January but, sadly, that meeting was not effectively announced to the public. It's hard to participate when a meeting is announced only a day or three in advance, and only on a web site that is not part of every resident's daily Internet reading. There was no meeting announced for February, and none appears for March, either.

In recent months, this has been an ongoing problem for the Town Board. Meeting dates are being changed after they are published by the Town.

Legally, this is acceptable but it is hardly transparent. A government should prioritize the delivery of meeting notices and deadlines to the public. Advance planning is called for, to avoid the need to change dates.

Legal Notices are obscure. Web sites are purely passive: you have to know what is on the site before visiting the site. Deadlines and meetings need to be delivered to residents and should not happen too soon after publication.

Special Events Law Returns

The Town Board has discussed a revised document that, some might say, is designed to exclude all but super-sized events from regulation. For example, an event with fewer than 100 people on a 1-acre lot is exempt. If the lot has 1.01 acres, 399 people are allowed. Think about it; imagine where you'd put 99 people (plus cars) on your 1-acre lot.

Wisely, though, many private events are also exempt: weddings, family gatherings, and the like will *always* be allowed.

The new document is available on the Town's web site. The public is invited to look at it...but, be quick, because it will soon come up for another discussion. Without public input to temper poor analysis, these things tend to gain momentum and get passed!


AMERICAN LEGION POST 221, 1231 Danby Road, has several dinners planned in the near future. All are open to the public!

LESS PAPERWORK, LESS OVERSIGHT

AS OF JANUARY 5, 2026, the mailing schedule for Medicare Summary Notices (MSN) has changed.

MSNs will now be mailed twice per year (every 180 days) instead of quarterly. Beneficiaries are encouraged to create a [medicare.gov] account to review claims in real time. Online access allows individuals to monitor processed claims more frequently rather than waiting for the mailed notice. 🐾 (tc)

WHEN CHOCOLATE...ISN'T

AVID DANBY NEWS READERS may remember an item lamenting the replacement of wholesome Ice Cream with something called, *Frozen Dairy Dessert*. Summary: if it doesn't say, *Ice Cream*, it isn't.

Well, lovers of treats and sweets now have another kind of label to scrutinize: chocolate, in general. *Food & Wine* recently noted that the grandson of the creator of Reese's Peanut Butter Cups has alleged that the Hershey Company replaced chocolate and peanut butter in the Cups with cheaper alternatives.

The company acknowledged some "recipe adjustments." It adopted vegetable oil "compound coatings" into several products; those with, "new shapes and sizes."

You have to read the label carefully. For example, Hershey's Mr. Goodbar carries the label *chocolate candy* rather than *milk chocolate*. Other non-chocolate labels include *chocolatey*, and *chocolate coating*. These labels are a legal designation called a *statement of identity*. The standards are set by the Federal FDA, which requires specific minimums for several ingredients...including chocolate liquor. *Caveat emptor*. 🐾 (tc)
