NEW YORK FIDDLE TUNES & MORE

THE FELLOWSHIP HALL of Danby's Community Church will fill with the sounds of fiddle and piano on Saturday afternoon, April 11, 2pm. The traditional music duo of Tim Ball and Alex Fortier bring Upstate NY Crossroads music to Danby. The concert is free and open to all. Donations are cheerfully accepted to offset costs and help support future programming.

Tim Ball is a well-known violin teacher and traditional dance musician, rooted in the NY Southern Tier. Tim is an accomplished American fiddler, singer, and guitarist. He grew up in Watkins Glen and studied violin at Ithaca College. Alex Fortier, raised in Maine's traditional music scene, has played piano since the age of six, and was graduated by the University of Rochester music program.

During two decades of performing in Celtic and dance bands, Tim has built a reputation for deep musical knowledge and an expressive playing style. He joins the musical traditions of Ireland, New England, Canada, and Appalachia, with the heritage of his native upstate New York.

Tim and Alex have created a strong musical partnership. They were featured on Bound for Glory last October.

Danby Community and Park divides the 2.2-mile stretch of NYS Rt.96B running through Danby's Central Hamlet into six to ten 1/4-mile sections, each just long

Earth Day, April 22, falls on a Wednesday this year. The folks of Danby Community and Park think this is a great opportunity to make an entire week of appreciating and protecting our natural world. A good excuse to make several visits to Dotson Park.

Over two weekends, April 18/19 and 25/26, bring your family out for a self-guided walk in the park to see how spring is unfolding. There are several trails and the disc-golf course in addition to the open areas and the natural playground next to the park entrance. Take the

time to explore areas you haven't seen before. Each day is bound to be different, depending on the weather and how the season unfolds.

You can help beautify Danby, on Saturday, April 18, 10:30am, with the annual *Great Danby Road Cleanup* along Danby Road /NYS Rt.96B (details in another article). We'll meet at the Dotson Park entrance.

If you're a gardener—or would like to be one—stay for a *Seed-Starting Workshop* with Julie Clougherty, 1-3pm on Saturday, April 18. More details in another article.

On Sunday, April 26, 10am, you can join your neighbors and be part of a *Spring Bioblitz Discovery Walk* with Amanda Piha. More details about that in another article as well.

Much of Dotson Park is wetland, and spring is the wettest season of all. So be sure to wear good waterproof boots. The same ecology that helps preserve about 90 acres of land in the center of Danby provides habitat for wildlife. You never know who and what you might meet. (dcap)

BURN BAN IN EFFECT

THE ANNUAL STATEWIDE BAN prohibiting residential brush burning runs through May 14. The NYS DEC enforces the ban to prevent wildfires and reduce air pollution.

The risk of wildfires is greatest during the Spring. Think about safety first, before starting a potentially dangerous fire.

Open burning of debris is the single-largest cause of spring wildfires in New York State. Local fire departments, many of which are staffed by volunteers, all too often have to leave their jobs and families to respond to wildfires caused by illegal debris fires.

GATHERING ABUNDANCE EARLY SPRING FOODS

As days get longer and outside temperatures rise, many of us are impatient for fresh produce. The ground is still too wet to plant, but seedlings can be started inside our houses. Even if it's a small garden, or just a few containers of cooking herbs and simple vegetables, "growing your own" is a great way to connect to nature and build resilience into your food budget.

If you know where to look, and what you're looking for, April also brings ephemeral vegetable treats. Our ancestors knew where to find the earliest greens and edible plants out in the wild. Some rare plants need to be harvested sparingly but at least one is readily available, and can be freely harvested...but only for a few weeks. Let's explore three early spring specialties.

Fiddlehead ferns are one of the first wild-foraged foods I learned about. They are the initial, plump and tender curl of a particular type of fern. They are quite popular. Some local stores, like Wegmans or Greenstar, carry them as a specialty food in early spring.

Wild onions, known as ramps, can be wild harvested in moist woodlands. Some parts of the country have them in an abundance; they are so beloved that you will find *Ramp Festivals* in parts of the South. Around here, they need to be gathered gently and sparingly. Both the leaves and bulbs are edible. They are very versatile, with a strong flavor, so a little can go a long way. A simple sauté in butter is a delicious way to enjoy this spring treat.

You may find both Fiddleheads and Ramps from the early Ithaca Farmers' Market vendors. The Market starts up again at Steamboat Landing in mid-April. And did you know that some of the founders—the Gartleins—are Danby natives?

The last of our Spring Specialties is readily abundant, to the chagrin of many property owners. There is one good thing about this invasive species: you can eat the early sprouts of Japanese Knotweed! It tastes like mild rhubarb or early asparagus. Knotweed is a kind of dark star in wild edibles circles.

Knotweed is very versatile wild food. It can be cooked either savory in stir fry dishes, or sweet in muffins and desserts. Thanks to its tendency to spread and to be next to impossible to get rid of, knotweed is found all over Danby. Avoid harvesting along roadsides or other places where pesticides may have been sprayed.

The plant is particularly abundant at the intersection of Comfort and Lieb Roads and we have it on good author-

ity that the property owner would be *delighted* to have neighbors harvest copious amounts. Check out the field by the old cow shed. The knotweed sprouts would be fully organic!

Numerous sources, including the prestigious *Bon Appetit*, magazine describe ways of cooking young knotweed shoots. After a deep dive down the "How to cook knotweed" rabbit hole, I'm looking forward to those first signs of spring.

Harvest the shoots under 1 foot, remove leaves, and peel the stems. It should be easy to snap the tender stalks by hand. Larger plants are too big and fat and they will be tough and stringy. Chop the cleaned stalks and then boil in water for five minutes to reduce sourness, or cook down for crumbles, sorbets, jams, fermented pickles, or tempura.

For savory dishes, slice the young shoots into thin strips and stir-fry them with other vegetables and your choice of protein. Create a stir-fry sauce using for instance, soy sauce, ginger, garlic, and a hint of sesame oil.

Many cooks suggest mixing the knotweed shoots with apples or pears for sweetness.

Go foraging, beat back an invasive plant, and have some spring goodness. 🍄 (pg)

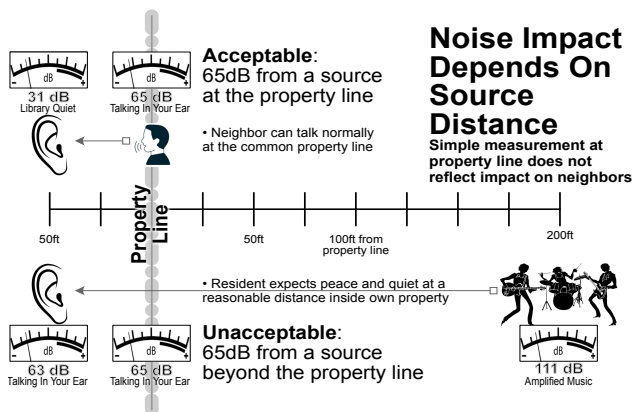

- ① Both the DN and Public Radio present information that supplements and, sometimes, clarifies official, sanitized verbiage in expensive, taxpayer-funded publications. By law, government publications *must* present the government in a positive light.
- ② The choice to defund both the DN and Public Radio was not budget-related. Sometimes, public officials feel threatened by distribution of a different perspective. Danby now budgets about twice as much for its house organ than it formerly paid for the DN. Danby's powers have said, on the record, that they expected the DN to shut down.
- ③ Both the DN and Public Radio depend on the public to keep an independent voice alive.

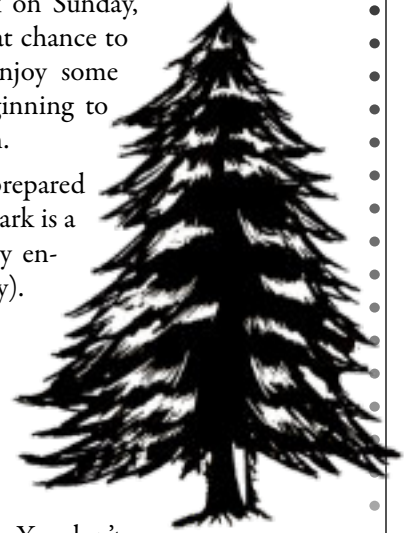

SPRING DISCOVERY HIKE IN DOTSON PARK

READY TO SHAKE OFF WINTER and get back outside? Join your Danby neighbors for a relaxed Spring Discovery Hike at Dotson Park on Sunday, April 26, 10am. This is a great chance to come out of hibernation, enjoy some fresh air, and see what's beginning to emerge in the park this season.

Dress for the weather and be prepared for wet conditions (Dotson Park is a wetland so boots are strongly encouraged to keep your feet dry).

We'll also be participating in the Paleontological Research Institution's Spring BioBlitz. It's an effort to document as many species living in our region as possible over a short period of time. You don't need to be an expert to take part!



To join the BioBlitz, download the free iNaturalist app, create an account, and start observing. The app allows you to snap photos (or to record sounds) of plants, animals, and fungi, and upload them. from your phone. You can also upload pictures taken with a camera. Not sure what you're seeing? No problem, the app can help with identification, and a community of users will help refine it over time.

TOMPKINS COUNTY ETHICS BOARD

TOMPKINS COUNTY'S LEGISLATURE is seeking residents interested in promoting public confidence and ethical conduct in local government.

The Tompkins County Ethics Advisory Board (TCEAB) has one vacancy for a term expiring December 31, 2029. This position *cannot* be filled by a current elected or appointed official. The Board meets at least once annually and, additionally, within 30 days of receiving a written complaint. It provides advisory opinions to municipal officers and employees on ethical matters.

Interested applicants must submit an Advisory Board Application by April 15. Applications are available from the Legislature, 121 East Court Street in Ithaca, or can be downloaded from the County's web site, [tompkinscountyny.gov]. NEW YORK STATE PARK LIFEGUARD QUALIFICATION

THE NEW YORK STATE Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation is offering statewide qualifying procedures for lifeguards at the Odessa Montour High School, 300 College Ave, in Odessa, NY. They will be at 9am on Saturdays, April 4 and May 9.

A third event will take place at Southern Cayuga High School, 2384 State Route 34B, in Aurora, NY, on Friday May 29, 4:30pm.

All qualifiers are open to new candidates as well as returning lifeguards. The qualifying procedures evaluate practical lifesaving skills and cardiopulmonary resuscitation skills. All items of the qualification procedure are evaluated on a pass/fail basis. Candidates are encouraged to arrive a half hour prior to the qualifier to register and are given an opportunity to practice their CPR skills. Candidates are required to bring swimming gear, their picture ID and their own pocket masks for the CPR portion of the exam.
