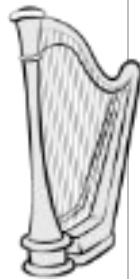

The harp experience on May 23 is part of a series of DCAP *Do It Yourself* programs to help grow our individual and community resilience in the face of such stressors.

Therapeutic music—harp and voice—has been shown to help the body relax and reduce anxiety. It might even harmonize your nervous system. Resting in a safe container of sound, rooted in deep listening, you connect with your own inner resources for ease and stability.

Pamela Goddard is a Certified Therapeutic Harp Practitioner. She works with groups and individuals in a variety of settings. For the past six years, since retiring as Danby Town Clerk, she has brought the soothing sounds of harp music to patients and staff at Cayuga Medical Center in Ithaca, Arnot Hospital in Elmira, and various nursing homes in the region.

BURN BAN IN EFFECT

THE ANNUAL STATEWIDE BAN prohibiting residential brush burning runs through May 14. The NYS DEC enforces the ban to prevent wildfires and reduce air pollution.

The risk of wildfires is greatest during the Spring. Think about safety first, before starting a potentially dangerous fire.

Open burning of debris is the single-largest cause of spring wildfires in New York State. Local fire departments, many of which are staffed by volunteers, all too often have to leave their jobs and families to respond to wildfires caused by illegal debris fires.

THE JOY OF NOODLE SOUP

OUR LATEST IDEA FOR STRETCHING your food dollars while still having something interesting and delicious to eat: Noodle Soup. It starts with a “student budget” basic and ends with some gourmet improvisation.

Years ago, one of the owners of Win-Li Asian Market remarked on my package of frozen dumplings. “Do you ever make dumpling soup?” she asked. “It’s so easy, so quick, so healthy, and so cheap.”

The basics are: noodles, frozen dumplings, broth, and an array of vegetables. Put them together and you’ve got a hot and hearty one dish meal. The instructions are simple: slice or chop the veggies while you bring the liquid to a boil, add everything else, and cook about 5 minutes until the noodles are soft.

The noodles are easy to find. Grocery stores have a huge selection of packaged ramen noodle soups, priced from about 30¢ to \$2 (avoid the “instant cups”). The packaged products include packets of dehydrated flavoring. A friend introduced us to the *Shin* and *Neoguri* labels, which have a more hearty taste but, beyond that, you may not notice the difference between flavors. You can also start from scratch with plain noodles or pasta of any kind.



Most packages tell you to add water. Chicken or vegetable broth are an improvement. Low- or no-salt broth is fine (we save the veg water from steaming or cooking veggies). Figure on one pint (or 500ml) of liquid per person; better brands, intended for one serving, have enough noodles and flavoring for two!

There’s a substantial variety of veggies you can add. Crunchy veggies (carrots, daikon, mu radish, hakurei turnips) go in early so they soften. Mushrooms gain a solid texture from a few extra minutes of cooking. Leafy veggies (napa cabbage, spinach, bok choy) can be added to the boil with the

noodles.

Dumplings are available in many groceries—Wegman’s has a good, if pedestrian house brand—but Asian stores have an incredible assortment of varieties: beef, pork, shrimp, vegetables, and more. The dumpling bags aren’t inexpensive but we’ve found that three dumplings are a good serving for one; a bag makes many meals. Dumplings cook in about the same time as the noodles. Frozen shrimp do, too, if you like them.

As the Win-Li sage said, “Easy, healthy, quick, and cheap.” Just the thing for a warm, hearty bowl of comfort. 🍜 (pg)

IT'S BEAR-LY SPRING!

AFTER HIBERNATING through a long winter, groggy black bears across New York State venture out of their dens, stretch their legs, and look for their first meals of spring.

Rupert, the Danby Bear, is ready to visit! (Danby's bears are all Rupert, regardless of age, gender, or origin.)

Adult male bears are usually the first to emerge having lost up to 30 percent of their body weight. Females with nursing cubs emerge later and may have lost up to 40 percent of their body weight. Bears are especially hungry in the spring due to depleted fat reserves and will search extensively for easily obtainable, calorie dense foods.

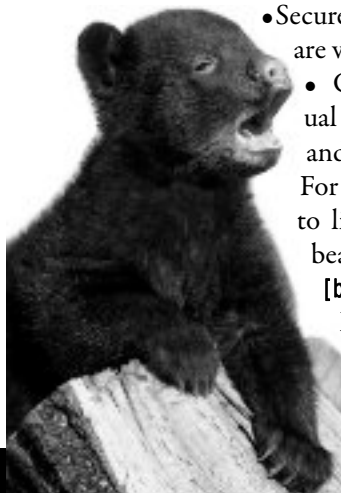
Bears have plenty of natural food but they will readily use human food sources like bird feeders, unsecured garbage, and pet food left outdoors. Continued access to human food sources can make bears bolder, which can lead to human-bear conflicts around homes and residential areas. To avoid bear conflicts take a few steps to prepare:

- Empty or remove bird feeders and clean up spilled seed.

- Secure your garbage cans. Bears are very strong!

- Clean or remove all residual grease and food from grills and store all pet food inside.

GREAT DANBY ROAD CLEANUP

EARTH DAY CAME AND WENT and Danby's roads are the cleaner for it.

In the days surrounding Earth Day, at least three groups gathered to pick up trash. Two weekends early, a crew hiked the rural, forested road triangle: Bald Hill-Lieb-Comfort. All three miles of it! Even though these are not main thoroughfares, several bags of small trash were collected. A lot of it was in one spot, almost as if it was a favorite trash dump for motorists.

A second community effort took place over a period of days in West Danby. Peter McDonald organized neighbors to make NYS Rt.34/89 visually attractive.

The largest group, organized by Danby Community and Park, got together on April 18 to work on the 2.2-mile stretch of NYS Rt.96B running through Danby's Central Hamlet. It was the largest volunteer turnout ever, with 20 people—from age 8 to 80, it seemed—filling dozens of bags in a bit more than an hour.

We met at the entrance of Dotson Park for distribution of bags and safety gear...and a short safety talk. One team (pictured), spearheaded by Danby resident Sydney Bond, representing the New Heart Church, headed south. Others rode in cars to a second rallying point north of Miller Roads. The final few pairs divided the in-between, "downtown" stretch of road.

There were too many participants to thank each one individually, but our town (not to mention the thousands of travelers on the roads) owes a big round of applause to everyone who took part! 🐾 (tc & pg)



WHY IS THE *DANBY NEWS* LIKE PUBLIC RADIO?

② To paraphrase Public Radio, “We don’t try for the illusion of fairness, we let the facts speak for themselves.”

③ The choice to defund both the DN and Public Radio was not budget-related. Sometimes, public officials feel threatened by distribution of a different perspective. Danby now budgets about twice as much for its house organ than it formerly paid for the DN. Your tax dollars are funding Danby’s powers have said, on the record, that their decision would shut down the DN.

④ Both the DN and Public Radio depend on the your contributions to keep an independent voice alive.

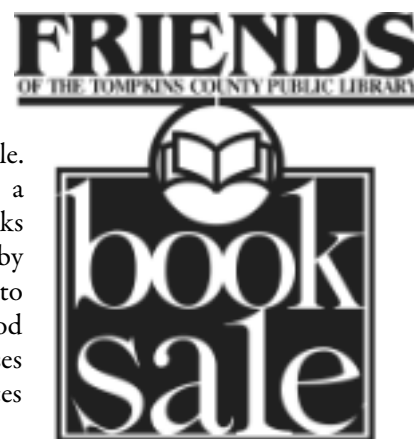


BOOK LOVER’S BONANZA!

REMINISCING #43

I WILL SHARE SOME of my May 26, 2005, Ithaca Journal Town Talk with an emphasis on Memorial Day.

There was going to be a Jennings Pond clean-up day, and volunteers were always needed to complete this effort.

We watched the fireworks over South Hill celebrating Ithaca College graduation. I often wonder how all the IC graduates are doing now, in 2026.

I had updates about the 2005 Danby Fun Day, which would now include Dan the Snake Man's reptiles, a cake wheel, vendors, displays and a bigger and better parade.

Flashing Feathers Bow Hunters was sponsoring a golf tourney at the Catatunk Golf Course in June. Proceeds would send kids to Environmental Conservation Camp.

I wrote that Memorial Day is more than a three-day weekend marking the beginning of summer. It was originally known as Decoration Day, a time set aside to honor the nation's Civil War dead by decorating their graves.

When the last census was conducted [2000] the median age of WWII veterans was 76 years. Printed facts can always be found in history books, but who will be left to talk

to us about World War experiences first-hand, speaking from the heart with stories that we should all hear, especially now during these days of continuing wars? I was able to contact the following Danby area war veterans: Harold Beach and Bob Doan (Army), Charles Boykin and Frank Fredericks (Marines), and Gerry Dawson (Navy). I also spoke with Gerry Fredericks, who lived on Bald Hill Road with her husband, Bill.

Bill was the most highly decorated WWII veteran in Tompkins County. I held both his Silver Medal and Purple Heart in my hands. Bill was injured in Normandy and evacuated to England. Gerry told me that Bill, when in the back lines, tailored his own dress uniform, including his Eisenhower jacket, as well as those of his buddies. Gerry didn't even know Bill knew how to sew! During the war, Gerry worked for Bell Aircraft in Buffalo, makers of the experimental one-man fighter jets. I felt very honored to hear stories from all these heroes.

In 2026, we have beloved family members currently serving in the military. These are scary times, and we continue to keep them, and all who serve, in our thoughts, prayers, and in our hearts. May I please ask you to do this, also? Thank you. 🌻 (gh)

ETHICAL CORRECTION

IN THE APRIL 2026 ISSUE of the *Danby News*, an item entitled, "Tompkins County Ethics Board," was intended to solicit interest from Danby residents to engage in meaningful volunteer efforts. Ironically, its final sentence, *Complaints are rare and none regarding Danby officials are currently pending*, was incorrect.

As the issue arrived in mailboxes, a Danby resident reached out with a correction. Using the anonymous eponymous name, *Danby Resident*, and an account on a secure eMail service, Resident pointed out that, in fact, there *was* a pending case about a Danby official and provided a link to the Ethics Board meeting video.

On February 13, Supervisor Joel Gagnon had formally requested an advisory opinion *regarding his own actions* taken during a Town Board meeting in early February. At the end of March, the Ethics Board unanimously found violations both for the failure to disclose the appearance of and/or an actual conflict of interest and for use of his position for potential financial gain.

The details of Gagnon's request, the action in question, and the findings of the Ethics Board can be found online. Google "tompkins county ethics", click on the obvious result, then click on the appropriate blue rectangle.

An article at [ithacavoice.org] described that, *Gagnon argued he is unable to follow the recommendation to recuse himself from the hiring process, citing that it is not a board appointment.*

Gagnon formally responded to the opinion on April 15, saying, in part, *While I disagree with the opinion given and fault the process employed in arriving at it, I nonetheless recognize now, as I did not prior to it being raised as an issue, that [it] could be seen (and in fact is seen by a substantial number of people) as in fact being one in which I have a conflicting interest. I will respect the opinion and act accordingly.*

The matter has also appeared on [reddit.com] and [change.org]. 🌻 (tc)

SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET VOTE

THE THIRD TUESDAY IN MAY—Tuesday, May 19—brings the annual ICSD Budget Vote (and School Board Election). Vote from Noon-9pm in the meeting room of the DVFC Fire Station, 1780 Danby Road.

But...why vote? Two good reasons, and they may lead you in different directions: the value of education and the dwindling balance in your checkbook.

The value of a good education cannot be overstated. It can make you a better person and lead to better job opportunities, understanding of the world (and world events), and relationships with others. Our greatest gift to the next generation...is good education.

Education doesn't have to be expensive but it often is. From the nearly \$300,000 (plus generous benefits) paid to Ithaca's well-dressed District Superintendent to the rapidly rising cost of supplies, services, and utilities, the expenses are piling up. Sometimes it seems that teacher salaries are the only "cheap" part of the school system...and many feel that that's a problem, too; a good education depends on good teachers.



Total your taxes. In 2025, about $\frac{2}{3}$ of property taxes went to the Ithaca City School District. About $\frac{1}{4}$ of Danby's Town Tax went to its Fire District. Oddly, the turnout for those two budgets (approved, if indirectly, by voters!) can be vanishingly small. Only a few hundred of Danby's 2,500-ish voters turn out for School Budgets. Fire District voting usually gets about 25-ish ballots.

According to [realtor.com], the median sale price for a home in Tompkins County, as of April 2026, is \$360,000. The proposed School Tax on that home would be almost \$5,600, up \$130 from last year.

Whether you prioritize education or your pocketbook, if you don't vote you can't complain. Vote early and often, but only once in any election. Your vote counts! 🐾 (tc)
